## TCEQ concludes two illegal dumping cases

■ No penalties handed down yet; 3rd investigation still ongoing.

Officials with the Texas Commission on Evironmental Quality (TCEQ) have concluded two of three coordinated investigations regarding cases of RV owners illegally dumping sewage waste from their vehicles into makeshift holes dug in various locations throughout Gray County.

According to the TCEQ report, a complaint investigation was conducted on April 30. The complaint alleged that an open pit had been dug next to an RV parked on South Doyle Street in Pampa. The complainant led the TCEQ official to the site in question, however, no one was home at the time. The TCEQ official left a contact card in the RV door including a brief explanation of the investigation.

While on site, the investigator observed a parked RV just south of a metal fence on the northeast side of the property along with an open pit. The investigator could see the sewage hose from the RV extending into the pit.

The TCEQ official then contacted the Gray County Appraisal District concerning ownership of the property. No 911 address had been assigned to this residence, whose owner of record is Laura Dean, of

On May 1, an unidentified woman contacted the TCEQ Region 1 office to inquire about the contact card that was left on the RV. The woman stated that Jorge Garcia, of Pampa, owns the property. Officials explained the alleged violation and need for corrective action to the woman. Garcia then received a Notice of Viola-

## **PISD Board** meets Tuesday

Will look to reduce initial quaranteed maximum price for new admin facility.

The Pampa Independent School District (PISD) Board will meet at 5:45 p.m., Tuesday to address engineering items included in the initial guaranteed maximum price (GMP) for the district's new central admin-

istration facility. The Board approved the GMP offer at their special called board meeting on May 7. Approval of the price allowed the project

to move forward while further budget talks with sub-contractors could take place.

The initial GMP, approved by the Board last week, was \$5.71 million. That total includes \$664,114 that will be charged to the district's food service, which will reduce the impact to the PISD budget and bring the price tag down to \$5.04 million. A \$250,000 contingency fee is also included in the figure; however, if that money is not used during the construction process, then it will be returned into the district's budget.

Last week, the Board discussed value engineering, or "making your dollars stretch," to further lower the overall cost of the facility. The Board is considering adding high performance coating to the concrete floor in the warehouse area for a savings of \$41,357. That would bring the actual construction cost down to just more than \$5 million, including contingency costs.

Other agenda items include:

- Re-elected Board members recite the Oath of Office • Set a date for a public hearing to discuss
- Consider approving guidelines for PISD Heritage Room.

Mojo's to open in June



A Buffalo Wild Wings-style restaurant with a homegrown Pampa feel is set to open June 11 in downtown Pampa. The restaurant is called Mojo's Sports Bar and Grill and it is located at 113 S. Cuyler St., in the old Dolly's Restaurant location.

Michael Mojica, of Pampa, has been leasing the location from local businessman Bill Arrington for the past 15 months. Mojica said if he opens the restaurant and it is successful and Arrington decides to sell, he will put pool tables and a dance

floor upstairs. Mojica said he was going to open last fall, but things weren't ready. His girlfriend, J.J. Wheeley, also has been helping him renovate the location. Mojica said that they both went to San Fransisco recently for a seminar with John Taffer, host of the show "Bar Rescue," for tips on "do's and dont's" when renovating a bar.

The restaurant will feature seat-

ing for around 100 with bleacher seats for those that want to watch the game on the 196-inch projection TV. That TV also has an XBOX 360 and Play Station 3 hooked up to it, as well as Bose surround sound system. There are 17, 40-inch TVs located throughout the restaurant, as well as two 80-inch TVs.

There will be a draught bar with six different beers along with a liquor bar. There will be 20- and 16-ounce draft beers. Foreign beers will only



TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) charges announced Friday May 9, telling authorities to now is withholding his name because he has been charged as a juvenile. The boy's attorney and his mother have declined to comment.

The boy told officers that the Romes brothers were dead and pointed authorities to their bodies after he was found with an allegedly stolen car at a gas station in Columbus, about 120 miles southeast of the trailer park in Ottawa, the Putnam County Sheriff's Office said.

The boy pleaded not guilty to a grand theft auto charge a week ago, but was not immediately charged in the deaths. The aggravated murder charges were filed Thursday in juvenile court, but a judge has been asked to send the case to adult court, said county Prosecutor Gary Lammers.

Authorities have released few details about what happened, saying they are limited because those involved are juveniles. Investigators have not said how the boys



ordered to remove the sewage discharge hose from the pit and have the pit filled in. The report states that by the time TCEQ officials conducted a followup visit on May 8, Garcia had already closed up the pit.

#### What a cesspool

A second complaint investigation was also conducted on April 30, alleging that an RV had been illegally connecting to a cesspool on South Doyle Street. As in the first case, no one was home when the TCEQ official made their initial visit so a contact card and case explanation was left on the RV door.

While surveying the exterior of the residence, the TCEQ official observed an RV parked under a large metal awning on the southwest side of the property near a fence. The official noted there was PVC piping extending outward from under the RV and into the ground, located next to a partially buried metal tank.

The Gray County Appraisal District was again contacted and TCEQ learned that the second residence on Doyle also

had no 911 address assigned to it. The property's owner of record is J.A. Men-

However, on May 6, an unidentified man contacted the local TCEQ office about the contact card left at the residence. The man stated that Garcia also owns this property. The TCEO official explained to the man the alleged violation and provided him a correction course of action. Garcia again recevied a Notice of Violation.

According to the report, when the TCEQ official conducted their followup visit on May 8, Garcia had removed the RV, PVC piping and partially buried metal tank and the areas had been filled in and raked.

Garcia must immediately stop using the cesspool and have it filled in. If Garcia chooses to dispose of domestic wastewater from the RV while parked at his home residence, he must formally apply and planning material and a fee must be submitted. TCEQ will then review the materials and could approve the upgraded on-site sewage facility for construc-

A third investigation into illegal sewage dumping in Gray County is currently ongoing. Details of that investigation will be released upon conclusion of the case.

Carson. Carson was greeted as a hero at the Conservative Political Action

Conference in mid-March, and his talk at the Prayer

Breakfast in February led The Wall Street Journal to write an editorial titled: "Ben Carson for President."

He's now on TV news shows, talking about how he won't talk about running for president.

Why so much love from the right?

In Carson's speech at the Prayer breakfast, he turned his personal story into a moral narrative that implied political orinciples that he distilled into policies such as Health Savings Accounts. If you give people Health Savings Accounts, he said, "they have some control over their own health care, and what do you think they're going to do? They're going to learn very quickly how to be

responsible. Instead of offering an overarching view that might give context to our debates and hope for managing diverse points of view in a divided country, Carson chose at the Prayer Breakfast – to reassert the rejected conservative idea of the flat tax and declare that it came from God. "I see the fairest individual in the universe, God, and he's given us a system.

It's called tithe. After a vague indictment of public education in this country, Carson swerved from promoting conservative principles to promoting himself. He told the Prayer Breakfast crowd, "Take a look at the chapter on education in my latest book, America the Beautiful."

He then explained, "I don't like to bring up

problems without coming up with solutions." So he talked about the Carson scholarships he's given out and the Reading Rooms he's funded (Ben Carson Reading Rooms). Then he told the people, "When you go home tonight, read about it: Carson scholars, carsonscholars.org.'

I did read about it. On the home page alone, I counted more than 20 mentions of "Carson" or "Ben Carson," four photographs of Dr. Carson, and one video titled "The Ben Carson Story.

Carson subverted the purpose of the prayer breakfast to promote Ben Carson.

And it worked. He sold about 46,000 copies of "America the Beautiful" in the six weeks following the speech, compared to about 1,000 copies in a similar period before the speech. His outgoing voicemail message. nearly seven minutes long, according to The New York Times, has instructions for how to get autographs, school visits, media interviews and speaking engagements, and for how to buy his books "and other merchandise.

Beneath the online transcript of Carson's Prayer Breakfast remarks, one Patricia Murphy wrote: "That man said what should be said ... and there was Mr. Obama, sitting there, being forced to listen to some common sense for a change. Too bad, Dr. Carson wasn't made our first black president ... he would have had this country moving ahead like a bullet train by now.'

Why do right-wingers fall for this stuff?

Oh, I see his appeal. He is a bright and accomplished man whose skill as a surgeon has saved children's lives and comforted their parents. He has overcome adversity and tells a good story. But do you have to go all the way with him?

## A radish among the beets and carrots

Beets and Carrots Back in the 1950s and '60s, we lived in a community just on the outskirts of Los Angeles. Around the

corner from our house there was a small grocery store owned by a Chinese couple, Clarence and Beth Lee. I took an instant liking to this quiet couple, and for some reason, unknown to me

now, I nicknamed them "Carrots" and "Beets." They followed suit by calling me "Radishes" because of my red hair.

I was always willing to run to the store for my mother or grandmother, because it usually meant some new treat for me from Carrots or Beets. Sometimes it was a piece of penny candy (yes, there was still penny candy then!), and sometimes I was invited to share a special cup of jasmine tea. Beets would tell me about Hong Kong and the beautiful harbor there, and she showed me pictures of the harbor and the mountain overlooking the harbor. Carrots was born in San Francisco sometime after the Great Earthquake of 1908.

He never talked much about his early life, but he was always quick with a smile or to ruffle my hair.

At that time, the community where we lived was not very culturally diverse. When I was in high school (1959-1963) there was only one African-American student in the entire school and very few Hispanic or Asian students. In my earlier years, we had moved around so much that I never made any close friends, but I had also not been around very many people of other national origins. So Carrots and Beets were quite interesting to me, and they were always willing to answer my many questions.

In the seven years that we lived in that neighborhood, I began to think of them as an aunt and uncle. One year, Beets went back to Hong Kong to visit her family. Poor Carrots was so lonely for his wife! I visited the store often, and I helped out a little when I could.


During high school I worked at a pre-school every afternoon, and since we did not have a car, my only means of transportation was the city bus or my own two feet. Most of the time, though, I made sure my

trip home after work took me past the little store. After about a month, Beets returned and the smile was back on Carrots' face. There was a smile on my face too, as there was a little package of jasmine tea just for me. I graduated from high school and started college. I also worked full time, so my visits with my Chinese "aunt and uncle" were fewer, but always full of laughter when I did get in to the store.

The sweet people never seemed to age, so I have no idea now how old they were at the time. In 1965, my mother and I decided to leave California and return to the Midwest where Mom was born. We were leaving behind friends and family and headed for a place I had never been.

My last visit to the little store was full of tears and hugs, and just before I walked out Beets presented me with a large bag of jasmine tea. To this day, the fragrant tea always reminds me of the little store, and the two people who taught me that age and nationality know no bounds.

## The IRS, Obama out of control

William Murchison "Trust us" is the mantra of Big Government. Trust us, why? Because



· the words hardly need speaking these days - "We know what you need; we know what you

want; we

know

how to deliver. You don't need to know our names, our faces. All you need to know is that we care.'

Big Government cares so deeply that it wishes to protect Americans from exhortations by suspicious groups made of suspicious people who are critical of our national direction. Maybe such groups will earn tax-exempt status, and maybe — heh-heh — they won't.

You never know how an IRS investigation will turn out: one more reason for wrath and alarm at the news that everyone's favorite federal agency has been scrutinizing groups faulting Big Government and its tendencies toward regulation and excessive

spending. This suspect category includes one group whose apparently subversive aim is to "make America a better place to live."

A "better place"? Wait. Doesn't the federal government have some ideas of its own as to the ways and means of making America better? Can Washington, D.C. let just any old band of middle class malcontents receive tax exemption for chiming in with possibly contrasting notions?

The tempest over IRS' policy of singling out tea party groups and the like for special scrutiny has political implications. How could Republicans and conservatives be expected not to clobber the Obama administration for inspiring, supposedly, a campaign to mute or silence critics?

The whole episode opens up, nevertheless, the question of how much power a free country can ever accord government without ceasing at some point to be free in any meaningful sense. In other words, this whole thing is bigger than a single president or government agency, no matter

how powerful.

On especially solemn occasions when government has overstepped in particular degree the limitations that ought to bind government, I abuse my tedious habit of quoting Lord Acton, the Victorian historian who wrote to Bishop Mandell Creighton: "Power tends to corrupt; absolute power corrupts absolutely." No eight words sum up better the perils attendant on surrender of rights and functions to government honchos

and holy men. A far worse habit than that of quoting Acton is the habit of looking the opposite direction when government acquires some new authority over daily life. A fair amount of authority, sometimes a lot of it – think of the military government can't dispense with. It could not otherwise provide basic protections. The work of reshaping society is at the other extreme of government endeavor. As government grows, its agents multiply; as they multiply, so necessarily they work out behind closed doors, out of sight: contriving, planning, executing, issuing rules, writing regulations, telling

us who gets a tax exemp-

tion and who doesn't. I intend no offense here to public servants who see their task as service, those who function more as technicians than as makers of policy. They differ from ideologues — the Obama administration is stuffed with them, from the White House to the Environmental Protection Agency to the National Labor Relations Board — committed to policy agendas of one kind or another. The superstructure of Big Government tends to hide them until, on account of investigation or accident, out comes word as to what they are doing.

You say the IRS has been leaning on conservative, as opposed to liberal, organizations seeking tax exemption? And that NLRB tried to punish Boeing for moving an aircraft assembly plant to South Carolina, a right to work state? Why, just imagine!

## House chairman sees IRS errors as part of pattern

Internal Revenue Service's improper use of tougher scrutiny of conservative groups seeking tax-exempt status seems part of a broader pattern of intimidation and cover-ups by the Obama administration, a top House Republican said Friday.

The accusation by House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dave Camp, R-Mich., came as his panel held the first congressional hearing into the tax agency's improper targeting of tea party and other conservative groups.

At a session that saw the IRS face harsh criticism from members of both parties, the justousted acting chief of the agency, Steven Miller, expressed regret for the heightened re-

"I want to apologize on behalf of the Internal Revenue Service for the mistakes that we made and the poor service we provided," Miller told the committee. "The affected organizations and the American public deserve better. Partisanship and even the perception of partisanship have no place at the Internal Revenue

Miller conceded that "foolish mistakes were made" by IRS officials trying to handle a flood of applications for tax-exempt status. He said the process that resulted in conservatives being "while intolerable, was a mistake and not an act of partisanship.'

George's report concluded that the IRS office in Cincinnati, which screened applications for the tax exemptions, improperly conservative groups for tougher

The report says the practice began in March 2010 and lasted more than 18 months.

The report blamed "ineffective management" for letting IRS officials craft "inappropriate criteria" to review applications from tea party and other conservative groups, based on their names or political views. It found that the IRS took no action on many of the conservative groups' applications for tax-exempt status for long periods of time, hindering their fundraising for the 2010 and 2012

## Woman describes Berlusconi's bunga bunga parties

MILAN (AP) — Silvio Berlusconi's ing show girls performing striptease acts as sexy nuns and nurses, but also dressed as President Barack Obama and a prominent Milan prosecutor whom the billionaire media mogul has accused of persecuting him, according to the first public sworn testimony by the Moroccan woman at the center of the scandal.

Karima el-Mahroug's testimony Friday at the trial of three former Berlusconi aides accused with procuring her and other woman for prostitution confirms a sexually charged atmosphere at the parties of the then-sitting premier.

They deny the charges.

The trial is separate from the one in which Berlusconi is charged with paying for sex with a minor — el-Mahroug when she was 17 — and trying to cover

El-Mahroug, now 20, said she attended about a half a dozen parties, using her nickname Ruby, and that after each, he handed her an envelope with up to 3,000 euros (\$3,900) in denominations of 500. She said she later received 30,000 euros cash from the former premier paid through an intermediary — money that she told Berlusconi she wanted to use to open a beautician salon despite having

El-Mahroug confirmed Friday what other witnesses have testified previously: that at some of the soirees, young female party guests had dressed up like nuns and danced for Berlusconi and then stripped down to their underwear.

## Ousted IRS chief regrets treatment of tea party

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Rep. "I want to apologize on behalf of the Internal Revenue Service for the mistakes that we made and the poor service we provided," Steven Miller, who has been acting IRS commissioner, told the House Ways and Means Committee as the panel held Congress' first hearing on the episode. "The affected organizations and the American public deserve better. Partisanship and even the perception of partisanship have no place at the Internal Revenue Service."

## Xcel seeks increase from Texas retail customers

SUBMITTED BY XCEL

AMARILLO — Xcel Energy filed a proposal this week with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to increase its fuel cost factors to reflect higher prices for fuel - especially natural gas - which, if approved, will result in higher fuel charges on Texas retail customer bills beginning

Lower natural gas prices over the past four years have made electricity generated with gas less expensive, but as the price of natural gas firms up, the increase is necessary to cover the higher bills the company

is paying for fuel.

Fuel costs are passed through dollar for dollar with no profit to the company. Falling natural gas costs led to a near-10 percent drop in overall residential bills in early 2012. Natural gas prices at the time were just under \$3 per MMbtu (million British thermal units). Since that time, natural gas prices have moved into the \$4 per MMbtu range.

Fuel costs make up about a third of a typical residential customer's monthly bill. For a customer using 1,000 kilowatthours a month, a new fuel cost factor that accounts for higher fuel costs will mean an average increase of \$5.87 a month, or

"Our fuel costs are significantly below where they were in 2008 and 2009 when natural gas prices spiked to historic levels," said Riley Hill, president and CEO of Southwestern Public Service Company, an Xcel Energy company

Hill added that Xcel Energy has developed a fuel mix that allows some flexibility in the face of fuel-cost volatility. The company generates about half the power used in the region with coal, about 40 percent with natural gas, and close to 10 percent with wind energy, he said.

Prices for coal have risen as transportation costs have increased, but coal generation still remains the most economical source of power in the region, followed by natural gas generation, Hill said.

"Wind energy is a great hedge against rising fuel prices, and we currently have almost 1,500 megawatts of wind energy on our system and potentially more on the way," Hill said. "As natural gas prices rise, we save on fuel costs by displacing gasfired generation with wind generation.

The company also is holding down fuel costs by generating or purchasing power from newer, more efficient natural gasfueled power plants that generate more electricity with less fuel, Hill added.






## Some lost everything to North Texas tornado

GRANBURY (AP) — Raul Rodriguez that killed six people and injured dozens. counts himself a lucky man.

For two years, the 42-year-old auto mechanic and his family have enjoyed life in his house in the Rancho Brazos Estates subdivision of Granbury, a North Texas town 40 miles southwest of Fort Worth. Built by volunteers for Habitat for Humanity, it was the first home Rodriguez has ever owned.

On Wednesday evening, he was home with his wife and three children when a storm began to rage.

"I looked out the window and thought, 'It doesn't look good,'" he said.

He gathered his family into a hall closet as a savage tornado roared over his neighborhood. All he could hear above the storm's din was the sound of every win-

After the storm passed, he and his family emerged to find his home damaged but Friday afternoon to survey the damage. still standing.

dow in his home shattering.

"I'm surprised. I can't believe it. My wife was the first person out, and injured people, bloody people, started coming to our house, asking us to call 911," he said.

Habitat for Humanity spent years in Granbury's Rancho Brazos Estates subdivision, helping to build many of the 110 homes in the low-income area. But its work was largely undone during an out-

Hood County Sheriff Roger Deeds said Thursday afternoon that two of the dead were women and four of them men; one man and one woman were in their 80s. Six or seven people have not been accounted for, he said at a news conference.

"I'm very confident we'll find those people alive and well," Deeds said, adding that 37 injured people were treated at hospitals. "We're going to keep looking. We're not going to give up until every piece of debris is turned over.'

Granbury bore the brunt of the damage. The weather service said the preliminary storm estimate for the Granbury tornado was an EF-4, based on the Fujita tornado damage scale. An EF-5 is the most severe, but an EF-4 tornado has wind speeds of 166 to 200 mph.

## Camp means community service for many young people

NEW YORK (AP) — At 14, Tyler Cohen had never been out of the country or traveled without his Long Is"Sometimes parents say, 'Oh, the ca monthlong service trip for teens.

There, he worked on a coffee plantation, made signs for a rainforest restoration project, built bunk beds for shantytown kids and helped fix up an orphanage, where a wily 5-year-old named Fernando snatched the white baseball cap off his head and ran away one afternoon.

'He thought he was so cool when he put it on. I told him he could keep it and his jaw literally hit the floor," Tyler recalled. "He was so surprised that somebody would do that for him. That really stuck with me, that something as simple as a hat could mean so much."

Tyler, now 17, turned the encounter into a homegrown charity, Caps Count, which has distributed about 7,000 donated caps to poor kids in the U.S. and orphanages around the world.

Count him among thousands of teens and younger kids who do more than the usual crafts, sports and swimming at day and overnight camps, and through special summer programs every year.

More camps have built in community service over the last decade or so, from nursing home visits to raising money for cancer research, and dozens of programs like the one Tyler did through Westcoast Connection offer give-back travel for teens.

A survey done by the American Camp Association found that 48 percent of responding resident camps include some type of community service. An ACA survey this year found 16 percent added new options in the past

Peg Smith, the association's chief executive officer, said the value of such experiences to kids between the ages of 12 and 17 is great as they sharpen leadership and problem-solving skills while "creativity is at an all-time

But not all service opportunities are created equal. With a few key questions, she said, parents can help ensure a quality experience for their kids:

— Is it really teaching volunteerism, responsibility and community? "It really should be a social enterprise, when they're out there doing something with others."

- Does it allow them to work in a new and diverse environment? "Will they get to engage with people that they might not normally have had an opportunity to en-

- Does it have a significant impact? Will they be volunteering at local soup kitchens, painting public or park buildings, visiting nursing homes, doing special events to raise money for good causes?

Perhaps most important, Smith said: "What does the camp think is being taught? The camp should be able to



### MLB hoping for large replay expansion in 2014

balls and strikes should be subject to instant replay.

Replay has been in place for home run calls since August 2008. Commissioner Bud Selig initially wanted to add trap plays and fair/foul calls down the lines for 2013, but change was put off while more radical options were examined.

"My opinion has evolved," Selig said Thursday after MLB executive vice president Joe Torre gave an update at a quarterly owners' meeting.

Torre hopes to have proposals by the Aug. 14-15 session in Cooperstown, N.Y. Umpires are under heightened scrutiny following two wrong decisions last week. After initially failing to award Oakland's Adam Rosales a tying home run in the ninth inning at Cleveland on May 8, Angel Hernandez's umpiring crew reviewed video and still didn't award him the homer even though replays showed the ball

clearly went over the fence. The following day, umpire Fieldin Culbreth's crew allowed Houston manager Bo Porter to improperly switch relievers in the middle of an inning, leading to a two-game suspension for the crew chief. "Have we had a bad week or so? Yeah,"

Torre said. "One was a rules thing; it had nothing to do with replay.' In tests last year at Yankee Stadium and Citi Field, MLB experimented with the Hawk-Eye animation system that

is used to judge line calls in tennis and the TrackMan radar software used by the

PGA Tour. While initially assigned to a large "special committee for on-field matters" that Selig established in 2009, replay recommendations will now come from a subcommittee of three: Torre, former St. Louis manager Tony La Russa and Atlanta president John Schuerholz, who is chairing the group.

"There are a lot of hurdles," Torre said. "You could start replaying stuff from the first inning on and then time the game by your calendar. That would be crazy. We have a rhythm in this game that we certainly don't want to disrupt.'

The group is examining whether to have replay officials in booths at ball- definitely something to look into."
