Former EMS director killed in pickup crash

 The former director of Pampa EMS, Derek Wade Brewster, was killed around 6:30 p.m. Thursday in a vehicle crash in Potter County.
 Brewster was traveling south on Ranch to Market 1061 in a 2001 Ford pickup truck when the truck veered off the right shoulder of the road, according to a Department of Public Safety collision report. Brewster lost control of the vehicle,

drove off an overpass and the vehicle caught fire, according to the report.
 He was pronounced dead at the scene.
 Brewster, 37, worked as a paramedic for Emergency Services Foundation of Texas (ESFT), a nonprofit corporation organized in 2007.
 ESFT operated two emergency services

providers: Pampa EMS and Boys Ranch EMS, which is northwest of Amarillo.
 Brewster, who lived in Amarillo, was working for Boys Ranch EMS at the time of his death. DPS Trooper Christopher Ray said the wreck occurred about 15 miles from Boys Ranch.
 Alan Price, current director of Pampa EMS, said Brewster joined Pampa EMS in late 2009 and was director from around June 2010 to September 2011.
 "Derek was a great guy," Price said.

"He loved the outdoors, was a good father and a great paramedic."
 A statement posted by ESFT on its Facebook page said Brewster was well known throughout the EMS community in the Panhandle.
 "The EMS community has lost a great man. R.I.P. Derek your watch is over. We've got it from here. GOD bless, and thank you for all your knowledge and skill. You will be missed by all."

Woman dead in house fire

Street seal coating to begin later next week

The City of Pampa's annual seal coat maintenance program will begin on or around Thursday, July 18 and will continue until all streets are completed. Seal coating a street consists of applying a layer of liquid asphalt on existing paved streets followed by a layer of crushed rock to provide for an improved wear surface.
 It seals and protects the road and provides strength so that the underlaying base can resist the abrasive and disruptive forces of traffic.
 Residents are asked to not park their vehicles in the street and are asked to shut off their sprinklers the day that

work is to be performed on their street to help keep water off the streets. The list of streets to be seal coated are: Crane Road from Rosewood to the end of the alley; Cinderella from Rosewood to the end of the alley; North Crest from Hobart to the alley north of Willow; Sierra from North Crest to Pembroke; Primrose from Crane to 23rd; 23rd from Primrose to Perryton Parkway; 25th from Hobart to Perryton Parkway; 30th from Charles to Perryton Parkway; 23rd from Charles to Duncan; Duncan Street Spur from Duncan to Perryton Parkway; 30th from Duncan to Beech; Chestnut from 25th to the alley; Fir from 25th to the alley; Comanche Trail from 23rd to

Kiowa; Laguna from Navajo to the alley; 23rd from Comanche to the alley; 22nd from Evergreen to the alley; 20th from Holly to the alley; 19th from Beech to Evergreen; 18th from Duncan to the alley east of Holly; Chestnut from 18th to 22nd; Beech from 17th to 18th.
 Streets also getting seal coating are: Dogwood from 16th to 18th; Evergreen from 16th to 18th; Dogwood from Harvester to 16th; Evergreen from Harvester to 16th; Fir from 16th to 17th; 17th from Beech to Chestnut; 17th from Dogwood to Fir; 16th from

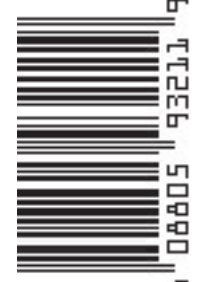

HOUSTON (AP) — Officials with the largest county in Texas say electronic files containing

personal information of 21,000 current and former county employees have been stolen.

First Assistant Harris County Attorney Robert Soard tells the Houston Chronicle that an outside law enforcement agency contacted the county two weeks ago about the theft. He declined to identify the agency but said it discovered files created in 2005 and 2007 containing the names, Social Security numbers, birth dates and hire dates of every person employed by the county at those times.

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State's gas prices rise as summer continues

The statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline in Texas now sits at \$3.38, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is 4 cents more than one week ago but less than what drivers are paying nationwide. The national average is now \$3.52, which is 14 cents more per gallon than the average in Texas. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas are paying the most at \$3.44 and drivers in Amarillo are paying at least at \$3.28.

Over the busy Independence Day travel weekend drivers across the country enjoyed some welcome relief at the pump. These declines in retail prices have largely been the product of regional supply disruptions being resolved. Prices paid by impacted motorists, especially in the Midwest, have retreated from lofty highs as refineries have come back online and production has returned to normal levels. An increase in demand for fuel as a result of drivers heading out to summer destinations has led to recent pump price increases in Texas.

"Drivers in Texas are now paying about \$47 to fill up the average 14-gallon size fuel tank," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "As families continue to make their summer road trips, we encourage them to make sure their car or truck is maintained exactly like the vehicle manufacturer recommends. We want people to maximize their fuel efficiency but more importantly, get to their vacation destinations safely."

Feds charge 150 accused in online wildlife sales

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 150 people face federal and state charges after authorities disrupted online wildlife trafficking operations involving tiger, leopard and jaguar pelts, elephant ivory and live birds.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced the arrests Thursday after an undercover operation that included officers from 16 states, three federal agencies and three Asian countries.

Items seized under "Operation Wild Web" include the pelts of endangered big cats such as the Sumatran tiger, leopard and jaguar; live migratory birds such as the California scrub jay; whale teeth; and elephant and walrus ivory.

Federal officials worked with officials in California, Texas, New York,

Florida and Alaska and other states. Wildlife officers in Singapore, Thailand and Indonesia ran similar operations at the same time.

The items were seized last August.

Darlene Ewing, the chairwoman of the group. "When you've got 12 of the worst years in the history of Texas, it's time to celebrate the ending of it."

So a soiree was planned, complete with party hats, cake and drinks.

But when the last piece of cake is polished off and the final toasts are made, Texas Democrats may not be much better off politically than they were before the invitations went out. Some political observers argue that the Democrats could be worse off, now that they have lost their favorite piñata.

The leading contender to succeed Perry, Attorney General Greg Abbott, also a Republican, is every bit as conservative as the governor. But Abbott, who is expected to declare his candidacy on Sunday, does not carry the baggage that Perry accumulated during an often tumultuous tenure in the governor's office — not to mention Perry's gaffe-plagued 2012 presidential run.

Mark P. Jones, a political scientist at Rice University, said that 2014 is looking like yet another blowout year for Republicans, which means more dashed Democratic hopes of turning Texas blue, or even gaining a statewide toehold. Democrats have not won a statewide office since 1994.

"Democrats were going to lose every statewide race in 2014 with Rick Perry running, and they are going to lose in 2014 without him running," Jones said. "If a Democrat does poorly, this sends a signal to the national Democratic Party that the blue food in Texas isn't ready to pick."

Hopes of a Democratic resurgence in Texas soared after this year's first special session when state Sen. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, helped stop an abortion bill with a filibuster and an assist from protesters who disrupted the proceedings with their serea

It was a temporary victory: The Republican-led Legislature is on the verge of passing the same legislation in a second special session.

But the fight energized the moribund Democrats, and activists are urging Davis to run for governor next year.

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Bouncin' around Blessed by a special friendship

I remember my first day as a freshman in high school like it was yesterday.

It would have been the day after Labor Day, 1959 in Inglewood, Calif. I was standing by my locker trying desperately to remember the combination and not look like

I was panicking. There was another girl standing in much the same way in front of her locker. We shared nervous giggles, and I quickly realized that she was blind. As she

deftly opened her lock, I lost my fear, opened my lock, and we introduced ourselves.

Those few moments were the start of a friendship that has lasted more than 50 years. Throughout high school Norma and I were rarely apart, and if we had different classes, I made sure she got to her class before I went to mine. Norma was active in just about everything in which a teenage girl at that time could do. Since I had an after-school job and Norma participated in after-school activities, we usually didn't get together outside of school until the weekends. Norma taught me Braille, and how to use a slate and stylus so we

could write notes like other kids.

Norma's mom took me in and treated me just like another daughter, and her dad teased us and took us places. We spent many Saturdays at Pacific Ocean Park in Santa Monica riding the rides, eating hamburgers and flirting with boys. Other Saturdays were spent splashing in her neighbor's swimming pool. Norma taught me many things: She taught me how to play the guitar and to pick out simple tunes on the piano. She taught me how to navigate a dark house with no lights on, a skill for which my toes and shins have thanked me many times. She taught me

lipstick without looking in the mirror.

But the most important thing she taught me was that having a physical handicap was not the defining factor in one's life. My home life was not happy but when I was with my best friend, I could laugh and be a teenage girl. One weekend I was invited to go with Norma to her aunt's house in Malibu. We had a great time at the beach, and the first night we decided to sleep outside on the patio. We got our sleeping bags laid out, and I clipped a bag of donut holes above us on the clothes line. Later that night, it started to rain, a fact I only discovered

Texas human trafficking update

Human trafficking is a horrific crime that subjects its victims to modern day

slavery — forced labor — for little or no pay. According to the U.S. State Department, as many as 27 million men, women

and children worldwide remain trapped as slaves by traffickers who strip away their dignity and basic human rights by preying on their vulnerabilities and exploiting them for involuntary labor and compulsory prostitution services.

This horrendous crime touches victims across the globe — and right here in Texas.

Eliminating human trafficking is a lofty goal, but it is well worth the effort because the cause is just — saving those who suffer the anguish, pain and shame of servitude. In 2003, the State of Texas took major steps to fight human trafficking by passing one of the first state-level anti-trafficking laws in the U.S. At the same time, regional task forces and other collaborative efforts were established across the state to identify human trafficking victims, create service response systems, and bring traffickers to justice.

In 2009, the Texas Legislature passed House Bill 4009 by Sen. Leticia Van de Putte and Rep. Randy Weber, creating the Texas Human Trafficking Prevention Task Force. The Task Force's inaugural report to the 82nd Texas Legislature highlighted the Task Force's collaborative approach to address human trafficking on a statewide and regional level. Of the 35 legislative recommendations identified in the 2011 Task Force Report, the Texas Legislature enacted 32. The anti-trafficking legislation, which was sponsored by Sen. Van de Putte and Rep. Senfronia Thompson, provided an improved legal framework for combating human trafficking by:

- Defining sex and labor trafficking.
- Increasing penalties upon conviction.
- Creating automatic life sentence for subsequent convictions.

• Affording more protection for child trafficking victims.

• Including certain convictions in the sex offender registry.

• Opening the use of protective orders for victims.

• Fostering closer cooperation between investigating agencies.

Unfortunately, while Texas has made significant progress, traffickers continue to adapt their criminal enterprises to entrap more victims and evade law enforcement. To eradicate human trafficking within our borders, Texas must meet these challenges head-on and with renewed commitment — providing new building blocks for law enforcement, prosecutors and service providers.

Recognizing that the most successful efforts will be those that utilize collaborative endeavors and pooled resources, the Human Trafficking Prevention Task Force published its report for the 83rd Texas Legislature — outlining additional steps the State must take to prevent human trafficking.

Once again, Sen. Van de Putte and Rep. Thompson made human trafficking prevention a major focus of their lawmaking efforts. During the 83rd legislative session, these two seasoned, tireless legislators authored and guided several human trafficking prevention bills through the lawmaking process. The new laws will toughen penalties against offenders who employ, authorize or compel a child to work in a sexually oriented business; improve victim identification, shelter and assistance; develop additional preventative strategies; and expand the duties of the Human Trafficking Prevention Task Force.

Improving and strengthening the State's human trafficking prevention laws will give Texas law enforcement agencies more training, tools and power to recognize and battle this problem. In light of human trafficking's complexity as a criminal enterprise, we all need to work together to find solutions that help victims and punish their oppressors.

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50 years after JFK, Dallas sheds shadow of history

DALLAS (AP) — Anger seethes from the letter mailed to City Hall on Nov. 23, 1963, the day after the tragedy, raging that this city “virtually invited the poor insignificant soul who blotted out the life of President Kennedy to do it in Dallas.”

“Dallas, the city of Hate; Dallas, the city of Shame.” As the nation and world mark this year's 50th anniversary of the assassination of John F. Kennedy, special attention once again falls on the Texas metropolis. The “hate/shame” letter, which came from California and was one of many that poured in after the shooting, shows how the city instantly became a focus of fury, resentment and confusion, which locals have struggled with in the ensuing decades.

With scrutiny renewed by this year's milestone, Americans are learning again about the hostility toward Kennedy and his policies darkly voiced by some Dallasites before the assassination. The passing of five decades prompts new reflection on the city's tormented but evolving response to the crime here that changed history. And finally, many Americans wonder: How will Dallas mark that terrible day this year?

No longer are residents confronted by scorn when they tell people they're from Dallas — as then-Mayor Wes Wise was a decade after the assassination when asked by a fellow mayor how it felt to be the leader of “the city that killed Kennedy.”

But it was a legacy that took time for the young city to come to terms with — a

fired on the presidential motorcade from a sixth floor window.

The old depository building could have been razed but instead now houses the Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza, dedicated to telling the tale of that day unflinchingly.

“The story of the museum is also the story of Dallas,” said Stephen Fagin, associate curator. “It's the story of the city and how the city has emerged from the long, dark shadow of history.”

“Welcome Mr. Kennedy to Dallas.” That was the headline across a full-page advertisement in The Dallas Morning News on Nov. 22, 1963, as the president made his way to the city on a political fence-mending trip.

A quick read made it clear the ad's greeting was sarcastic: It went on to ask a series of questions that implied he was a communist sympathizer.

Reading it, Kennedy quipped to first lady Jacqueline Kennedy that they were “heading into nut country.”

Just four weeks earlier, his United Nations ambassador, Adlai Stevenson, had been harangued by a group of ultra-conservatives as he spoke at a downtown auditorium. Frank McGehee, a Dallasite who had founded

the anti-communist National Indignation Convention, shouted questions at Stevenson through a bullhorn until police took him away. Audience members loudly interrupted Stevenson's speech, and as he left, a woman bopped him on the head with a protest sign.

“It was headlines across the nation,” recalled Darwin Payne, a professor emeritus of communications at Southern Methodist University who was a reporter at the Dallas Times Herald in 1963.

Three years earlier, during the 1960 presidential campaign, protesters accosted Kennedy's running mate Lyndon B. Johnson and his wife Lady Bird as they crossed a downtown Dallas street from one hotel to another. At a White House luncheon in 1961, Dallas Morning News publisher E. M. “Ted” Dealey, told Kennedy to his face that a “man on horseback” was needed to lead the nation, not someone “riding Caroline's tricycle,” a reference to Kennedy's young daughter. James F. Chambers Jr. of the rival Dallas Times Herald told Kennedy that Dealey's views didn't represent everyone. A war of editorials followed.

Besides McGehee's group, the anti-communist John Birch Society had an active chapter in Dallas. And the outspoken Maj. Gen. Edwin Walker, who resigned from the U.S. Army after being reprimanded for giving troops right-wing propaganda, settled in Dallas, where he flew the American flag upside down in front of his home.

Anti-Kennedy fliers in

the form of a “Wanted” poster with a mugshot-style portrait of the president appeared on the streets just before Kennedy's visit. Michael V. Hazel, historian of the city who was a high school sophomore in 1963, remembers his younger brother and a friend found such literature on the neighborhood sidewalk, leaving his family appalled. To most locals, Hazel said, “I think those incidents seemed rather isolated and almost fringe-type things.”

But beyond the city, after the assassination, those incidents took on greater meaning to those looking for explanations. “The city got branded with the ‘City of Hate’ because the extreme conservatives, the right wingers, had a following and they were good at getting publicity,” said Gary Mack, curator of the Sixth Floor Museum, who added, “A lot of people knew about them, but they didn't have a lot of followers.”

In fact, as the president and first lady arrived in Dallas after buoyant stopovers in San Antonio, Houston and Fort Worth, bright skies and cheering throngs greeted them. As the motorcade made its way downtown, Kennedy even had his car stop so he could greet children who'd lined up.

Crowd estimates range from 150,000 to 200,000 people, about a third of the population of the city at the time, said Mack, adding, “When you look at the films and photographs, you cannot find more than two or three negative signs any-

where. There were nothing but cheers.”

Wise, the future mayor who was a reporter with KRLD radio and television in 1963, agreed. He'd covered the Stevenson fracas, which was on his mind as Kennedy's motorcade left Dallas' Love Field. "It was such a cheerful crowd that my fears kind of went away," Wise said.

Near the end of its route, the motorcade approached the school book depository, located across from Dealey Plaza, a grassy area marking Dallas' birthplace in 1841. Texas first lady Nellie Connally, sitting beside her husband in front of the Kennedys in the limousine, recalled saying: "Mr. President, you certainly cannot say that Dallas doesn't love you."

When the bag of donut holes got wet and fell on my face.

We made quite a sight trying to get ourselves and our gear inside without waking the whole house.

People sometimes treated Norma as though she were mentally deficient or deaf. One Saturday we walked into town to window shop and have lunch at Woolworth's. The waitress kept asking me "What does SHE want to order? What does SHE want on her burger? What does SHE want to drink?" Each time I would say something garbled to Norma, she would garble back to me, and I would answer the waitress. We laughed so hard our Cokes came out our noses.

Norma told me that one Sunday a lady at her church came up to Norma and her parents and her sister Carole, and took Norma's arm saying "Oh, my dear, I wish you could have heard that sermon!" Norma's answer: "Oh, I read lips!" Though we went our different ways after high school, we managed to stay in touch. Norma married (her husband, Tom, is legally blind) and had two children.

She worked for many years for the State of California teaching other blind people how to function in a sighted world. We stay in touch by email and phone, and talk about our children and our grandchildren. We still giggle and laugh, and we comfort each other in the hard times. We had a chance to talk in person and catch up on hugs 10 years ago at our 40th high school reunion, and our poor husbands could only sit and listen. And just this past weekend, Norma and her family stopped to visit us here in Pampa, on their way to Houston. We laughed and giggled into the wee hours, and the years fell away. I have been so blessed by our friendship!

The rifle shots came moments later.

As mayor at the time, Earle Cabell was on the receiving end of much of the criticism of Dallas that quickly followed.

The letters from around the world are part of his papers housed at Southern Methodist University, one of the sponsors of a series of public programs to mark the anniversary.

One letter writer alluded to an "insanity" predominating the city and its politics, while another was incredulous that Oswald himself could have been fatally shot while being escorted by police.

Oswald was not part of a far-right contingent (in fact, he had fired a shot at Gen. Walker in April 1963). He was a Marxist sympathizer who lived for a time in the Soviet Union, but his motive in the assassination remains murky.

"It's one of the great tragedies of history that he and Kennedy would be on the same block at the same time, but it's not Dallas' fault," said historian Tim Naftali, senior research fellow at the New America Foundation.

Some letters to the

city offered sympathy and support — and leaders began contemplating how to move forward.

Stanley Marcus, who led the Dallas-based luxury retailer Neiman Marcus, wrote a paid editorial on New Year's Day 1964 titled "What's Right with Dallas?" that got widespread attention. He listed not only the city's positives — such as its business climate — but also noted areas where the city could improve, including a need to eradicate a "spirit of 'absolutism.'"

Also in 1964, J. Erik Jonsson, co-founder of Texas Instruments, who succeeded Cabell as mayor, announced his "Goals for Dallas" initiative focusing on the future. Results included the new Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport, kindergarten in public schools and other changes.

Current Dallas Mayor Mike Rawlings called the program "a healing process as well as a planning process."

A dozen years after the assassination, with her appointment as chairwoman of the Dallas County Historical Commission, Lindalyn Adams began spending time at county offices near Dealey Plaza and noticed

something striking: the constant flow of people who came to see where the president was killed.

"I could see visitors, no matter whether it was icy cold, terribly warm, hot, or whatever, night or day in that area," she said.

Adams herself had vivid memories of Nov. 22, 1963. Her husband, a professor of obstetrics and gynecology, had an office overlooking the emergency room at Parkland Memorial Hospital, where Kennedy was taken. They lived close enough to Love Field that she heard the engines rev up on Air Force One later that afternoon to return the body to Washington.

"It was absolutely terrible on all levels," said Adams, a Dallas native, "the fact the president was lost, the fact that it happened in our city, which we all loved."

Initial attempts by the city to satisfy the grieving and curious who flocked to the site proved unsatisfying.

In November 1966, a plaque was installed in Dealey Plaza giving a basic narrative of events. Four years later, officials dedicated a cenotaph designed by architect Philip Johnson. This "open tomb" featuring only Kennedy's name etched in

granite amid 30-foot-high concrete walls was confusing to many.

Even the discussion of a memorial stirred debate, with some in Dallas suggesting it should have been installed instead in Washington, D.C., Fagin noted, "because it was a painful memory that people here didn't want to think about."

By 1970, the Texas School Book Depository, the most visible reminder of the assassination, sat empty after the book company moved out.

Following a push by a small group to buy the building and tear it down, the City Council passed an order in

1972 blocking demolition. Eventually, the building caught the eye of county officials looking for additional space.

Adams, part of a group that toured the "ghostlike, eerie" structure, recalled taking a freight elevator up to the empty sixth floor and peering from the window that had been Oswald's sniper perch.

"I looked out of it for the first time and I thought, 'Oh my gosh, it's so close,'" she said.

The county bought the building in 1977 and opened offices there in 1981, with the sixth and seventh floors remaining empty.

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At least 6 dead in France train crash near Paris

BRETIGNY-SUR-ORGE, France (AP) — A train carrying hundreds of passengers derailed and crashed into a station outside Paris on Friday on the eve of a major holiday weekend. At least six people were killed and dozens were injured, including nine who are in critical condition, the Interior Ministry said.

The crash at Bretigny-sur-Orge station was the deadliest in France in years, and President Francois Hollande rushed to the scene after abandoning plans in the capital.

Some of the train cars slid toward the station, crushing part of the metallic roof over the platform. Images from the site on French television and on Twitter showed dented metal and shards on the platform, and debris from the crash clogging the stairwell leading beneath the platform.

Some 300 firefighters, 20 medical teams and eight helicopters were deployed to get survivors out of the wreck, according to the Interior Ministry.

Hollande praised "the mobilization of the emergency services," and reached out in "solidarity with the victims' families." He added that an inquiry has been launched to determine the cause of

the accident, which left around 190 people injured or in treatment for shock.

Ben Khelifa, a 20-year-old accounting apprentice whose commuter train was on the adjacent track, told The Associated Press that the derailed train "was unrecognizable."

"There was nothing but metal scraps," he said. "The train just collapsed, just like that, on its side... There was blood."

He added that he was one of a number of passengers in the adjacent train that went to help pull trapped survivors out of the wreckage.

"People were screaming, people were asking where their children were," he said.

Another witness, Bazgoua El Mehdi, 19, told Le Parisien newspaper: "I heard a loud noise. A cloud of sand covered everything. Then the dust dissipated. I thought it was a freight train, but then we saw the first casualties ... Many passengers on the (train) were crying."

It was unclear whether all the casualties were inside the train, or whether some had been on the platform, or how fast the train was traveling. The head of the SNCF rail authority, Guillaume Pepy, called it a "catastrophe."

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Snowden wants Russia asylum, lawmaker says

MOSCOW (AP) — National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden wants asylum in Russia and is willing to stop sharing information as a trade-off for such a deal, according to a lawmaker who was among a dozen activists and officials to meet with him Friday at the Moscow airport where he has been marooned for weeks.

Snowden appeared nervous, but in apparently good health during the meeting behind closed doors in the transit zone of Sheremetyevo airport, Duma member Vyacheslav Nikonov told reporters.

Human Rights Watch provided a photo of Snowden at the meeting, the first new image to appear of the former NSA systems analyst since the Guardian newspaper broke the story of widespread U.S. Internet surveillance based on his leaks.

Whether Russia would be willing to take Snowden up on his request is unclear. The Kremlin has signaled that it wants Snowden out. But granting asylum would be a diplomatically risky move, threatening to worsen Moscow-Washington already strained by U.S. criticism of President Vladimir Putin's crackdown on the country's opposition and Putin's allegation that the U.S. is meddling in Russian affairs.

But it would allow Putin to portray Russia as a principled defender of human rights and openness, despite the fact that it allows its security agencies to monitor the Internet.

Dmitry Peskov, Putin's spokesman, told Russian news agencies after the announcement that Russia has not yet received a new

bid for asylum and that Putin would continue with his insistence that Snowden stop leaking information.

Both Nikonov and Genri Reznik, a lawyer who participated in the meeting, said Snowden was willing to stop leaks.

"He said he was informed of this condition and that he can easily accept it. He does not intend to damage the United States' interests given that he is a patriot of his country," Nikonov said. However, it is unclear whether Snowden still is holding onto potentially sensitive information about U.S. intelligence operations.

Snowden is believed to have been stuck in the transit zone since June 23, when he arrived on a flight from Hong Kong, where he had gone before his revelations were made public. He had been expected to transfer in Moscow to a Cuba-bound flight, but did not get on the plane.

A brief video of the meeting's opening shown on the Russian news site Life News showed Snowden speaking, then being interrupted by a flight announcement on the airport's public-address system.

"I've heard that a lot in the past weeks," Snowden said, smiling ironically.

Snowden made an initial bid for Russian asylum, but Putin said he would have to agree to stop leaking before asylum would be considered. Snowden then withdrew his bid.

Venezuela, Bolivia and Nicaragua recently have offered him asylum, but it is unclear if he could fly to any of those countries from Moscow without passing through airspace of the United States or its allies. Some European countries allegedly refused to allow Bolivian President Evo Morales to fly through their airspace on his way home from Moscow last week because of suspicions that Snowden was on his plane.

In a text of his opening statement at the meeting released by the anti-

secrecy group WikiLeaks, Snowden said he wanted to accept all asylum offers and travel to the countries that have made them "to extend my personal thanks to their people and leaders."

He also denounced the United States for what he said was pressuring its allies to block him from their airspace. Snowden could be hoping that Washington would not risk trying to block a flight he was on if he had Russian asylum.

In the short term, he could also be seeking Russian asylum simply as a way of being able to get out of the airport and move freely.

How long a decision would take is unclear. Anatoly Kucherena, a member of a Kremlin advisory body who was at the meeting, said the process could take two to three weeks. But Putin's imprimatur could accelerate the process, as it did when French actor Gerard Depardieu was granted Russian citizenship in a matter of a few days.

The activists at the meeting included Sergei Nikitin, head of Amnesty International's Russia office, and Tatiana Lokshina, deputy head of the Russian office of Human Rights Watch. Also taken into the meeting room was Russia's presidential human rights ombudsman Vladimir Lukin.

They came after an email in Snowden's name was sent on Thursday. On Facebook, Lokshina posted the text of the email, which says in part that Snowden wants to make "a brief statement and discussion regarding the next steps forward in my situation."

Hundreds of journalists flocked to the airport, but were kept in a hallway outside the meeting area which was behind a gray door marked "staff only." It was not clear if Snowden would have to come out that door or if he could exit by another route.

Russia has said it cannot extradite him because by remaining in the transit zone he is technically outside Russian territory.

Although the meeting left Snowden's fate still uncertain, it at least confirmed where he was; speculation had swirled that he had been spirited out of the country.

"We found for ourselves that he is real, he's no phantom," said Kuchurena.

Dreamliner issues at 2 UK airports

LONDON (AP) — Two Boeing 787 Dreamliner planes ran into trouble in England on Friday, with a fire on one temporarily shutting down Heathrow Airport and an unspecified technical issue forcing another to turn back to Manchester Airport.

The incidents are unwelcome news for Chicago-based Boeing Co., whose Dreamliners were cleared to fly again in April after a four-month grounding due to concerns about overheating batteries.

The fire at Heathrow involved an empty Ethiopian Airlines plane, which was parked at a remote stand of the airport. British police said the fire is being treated as unexplained, and that there were no passengers on board at the time of the fire. Heathrow's runways reopened after about an hour.

Boeing spokesman Marc Birtel said in an email that the company had personnel on the ground at Heathrow and that the company "is working to fully understand and address" the situation.

The U.S. National Transportation Safety Board said Friday that it was sending a representative to London to assist British authorities with their investigation of the fire.

Ethiopian Airlines was the first airline to resume

using the 787, with a flight on April 27 from Ethiopia's capital of Addis Ababa to Nairobi, Kenya, after the battery incidents.

The registration number of the plane at Heathrow —ET-AOP — is the same as the aircraft used in the April 27 flight. Randy Tinseth, vice-president of marketing for Boeing's commercial unit, was on that initial flight and said that it "left on time, landed early and was truly perfect."

Ethiopian Airlines could not immediately be reached for comment after Friday's incident, and it was not clear how long the plane had been parked at its remote stand.

Soon after the fire at Heathrow, U.K. tour operator Thomson Airways

confirmed that one of its Boeing 787 Dreamliner planes travelling from England to the U.S. had to turn back after experiencing a technical issue.

Thomson said that flight 126 travelling from Manchester Airport to Sanford, Florida had returned to Manchester "as a precautionary measure."

It did not specify the nature of the technical issue, but said all 291 passengers had disembarked from the plane and engineers are inspecting the aircraft.

Richard Aboulafia, an analyst with the Teal Group Corporation, said it was too early to comment about the fire at Heathrow except that this is "not a welcome development" for Boeing.

Improvements being made to Harvester athletic facility

■ New floor allows for better use of practice facility.

The Pampa Harvesters have a new practice field at their disposal, and it is really just an improvement being made to another building.

“We had a gym that the floor had gone bad on and we were going to have to

do something to make it usable for anything more than just batting cages,” Pampa ISD Athletic Director Heath Parker said.

The floor improvement is to benefit not just baseball players, but every outdoor sport including football, track and softball.

“We essentially talked

about, ‘How can we benefit the most amount of people?’,” Parker said. “So what we have done is we have replaced the floor with a multi-purpose field turf that matches what is on our outdoor field, so that all outdoor sports and band will have access to a facility to train in year

round, probably most importantly from December to March.”

This additionally benefits the athletes because it gives them a chance to practice on a field that doesn’t cause injuries because of how hard the field is, which can cause ankle and leg problems. The facility will be open to all student-athletes when the building can be legally open, which will

coincide with the school district being open. The facility is practically a maintenance-free facility.

“It’s almost a maintenance free surface,” Parker said. “We anticipate when you can get 10 years out of this style of surface outdoors, we should be able to get 20 years indoors. The cost of the surface is less than the cost of a gym floor and the life span should

be twice as long.”

The project was funded by the Summer Facility Maintenance Funds. It also helps in keeping the costs for the district down by keeping outdoor sports off of the gym floor in non-court shoes.

“All the coaches are overly excited about taking care of our kids, and this is one way to do it,” Parker concluded.

■ Jimmie Johnson seems primed at a sixth Sprint Cup Championship, but other drivers may make it hard for him

With four wins under his belt and eight races until the Sprint Cup Series Chase for the Cup (which is NASCAR's playoffs) begins, it is very hard to

argue that Jimmie "Five-time" Johnson isn't going to win his sixth Sprint Cup Championship.

Johnson is in the lead in the Sprint Cup Standings ahead of Clint Bowyer by 49 points. Not to mention he is the first person since Bobby Allison in 1982 to sweep the Daytona races, the Coke Zero 400 and the season-starting Daytona 500. When the Chase begins Johnson tends to be the best driver on the track. According to bleacher-report.com there have been 90 Chase races run

since its inaugural season in 2004. Johnson has won 22 of them. It is no secret that Jimmie Johnson is the model of consistency in NASCAR, having four wins, a pole position, eight top-five finishes and twelve top-10 finishes. So I ask the question, who will be Johnson's biggest challenge in the Chase for the Cup?

It would be easy to look at the Sprint Cup Standings and just go down the list and assume those are going to be his 11 challengers. But there are guys who have been a model of consistency but not won a race, like Clint Bowyer (2nd), Dale Earnhardt Jr. (5th) and Kurt Busch (9th). Each of these guys has finished in the top-10 11, 10 and eight times respectively and Busch and Dale Jr. each has won the pole position at least once. But if a driver wants to have an edge in the Chase they have to win races, as each win is 10 "bonus" points

after the points are reset at the start of the Chase.

So that brings us to the race winners. Right now Matt Kenseth seems to be the top challenger for Five-time. Kenseth sits sixth in points, with four wins. He has won pole-position twice, had nine top-10 finishes, and had four top-five finishes. But where he leaves fans scratching their heads is his three DNF's and his average start is around eighth place, but his average finish is around 15th place. So while he tends to win and do well, he also has races where he just can't seem to finish high enough to contend for the win.

Kevin Harvick, sometimes called by commentators "Mr. Where did he come from?," is another driver who could make a late season push towards the Sprint Cup Championship. He sits fourth in points with two wins, five top-five finishes, and 10

top-10 finishes. He gets his nickname from how he sometimes finishes high after running mid-pack throughout the entire race. In fact, Harvick hasn't finished less than 10th since before his win on May 26 in Charlotte. Before that he finished 11 in the All-Star race, fifth at Darlington, 40th (second-lowest all season), and won at Richmond. Harvick is driving well at the right time, and could be Johnson's no. 1 threat.

Kenseth and Harvick right now seem to be the two best drivers to take on Johnson, but there are eight races till the Chase, and clutch (no pun intended) drivers may emerge and challenge the already 12 potential Chase candidates.

Until then, "Let's go racing, boys (and Danica Patrick)!"

Darvish is a two-time All-Star. The right-hander plans to attend the All-Star festivities in New York. The All-Star game is Tuesday night at Citi Field.

OSU's Gilbert on watch list for Hornung Award

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma State says its cornerback and kick-returner Justin Gilbert has been named to the preseason watch list for the Paul Hornung Award.

The award from the Louisville Sports Commission recognizes versatility on the football field.

The list was compiled by college football experts based on a combination of 2012 statistics, career performance and expectations heading into the 2013 season.

Gilbert has five career kickoff returns for touchdowns — an Oklahoma State record and tied for the Big 12 record. He has started in 26 consecutive games.

Oklahoma State opens the season Aug. 31 in Houston against Mississippi State.

NASCAR No. 2 driver to race at Vt.'s Thunder Road

BARRE, Vt. (AP) — One of NASCAR's top ranked drivers is going to be racing at Barre's Thunder Road in the Vermont Lottery Commission Governor's Cup 150.

Clint Bowyer, currently ranked 2nd place in the NASCAR Sprint Cup Standings, will be racing in Barre on Thursday evening.

Last week, Bowyer was

part of a last-lap surge to finish fourth in the Daytona 400. The finish vaulted him to 2nd behind Jimmie Johnson.

The Governor's Cup race will also be a showdown for local racing talent and give them a chance to compete with stock car stars like Bowyer.

Mark Cavendish wins eventful stage 13 of Tour

SAINT-AMAND-MONTROND, France (AP) — Mark Cavendish won the 13th stage of the Tour de France in a sprint finish Friday and Chris Froome lost a sizeable chunk of his overall lead after being caught out by Alberto Contador.

Flat stages are normally relatively free of incident, but the 173-kilometer (107.5-mile) trek from Tours to Saint-Amand-Montrond showed that even Froome's formidable Sky team can be vulnerable.

With about a third of the stage gone, the main pack was split into three and Alejandro Valverde dropped way out of overall contention after stopping to repair a puncture and losing a huge amount of time.

Valverde was second overnight but that spot was overtaken by Dutchman Bauke Mollema, while the two-time former

champion Contador improved to third.

They both gained more than one minute on Froome.

Appeal expected in ex-Bengals cheerleader lawsuit

COVINGTON, Ky. (AP) — A gossip website operator who lost a defamation lawsuit brought by a former Cincinnati Bengals cheerleader plans to appeal, and some First Amendment lawyers warn the verdict could adversely affect other websites.

A federal court jury in Covington, Ky., awarded Sarah Jones \$338,000 in damages Thursday, finding that posts about Jones on the Scottsdale, Ariz.-based website thedirty.com in 2009 were substantially false.

The jury also found website operator Nik Richie acted with malice or reckless disregard in posting the submissions he said were anonymous.

One post alleged Jones had sex with every Bengals player, and the other said she probably had two sexually transmitted diseases.

Jones said the posts were false and caused her severe mental anguish.

Richie denied any malice and said he wasn't required to fact-check anonymous submissions before posting them.

Harvick keeps Bud, drives No. 4 for Stewart-Haas

LOUDON, N.H. (AP) — Kevin Harvick will take his Budweiser sponsorship with him when he moves to Stewart-Haas Racing next season.

Harvick will drive the No. 4 Chevrolet for SHR. Budweiser will serve as primary sponsor for 20 races as well as the Budweiser Duel during Speedweeks at Daytona International Speedway. Budweiser will serve as a major associate sponsor for the remaining races on the Sprint Cup Series schedule.

Harvick has 21 Cup wins, 96 top-fives and

198 top-10 finishes in his career. He drives the No. 29 for Richard Childress Racing and is fourth in the point standings this season.

Harvick made the decision last year to leave the RCR team that hired him in 1999. He's made the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship the last three seasons.

"When you show up to the same desk for 12 or 13 years, you're like, 'Man, I need a new desk,'" Harvick said Friday at New Hampshire Motor Speedway. "It's just something where you want a change

of pace. That's one of the pieces it all boiled down to."

SHR fields cars this season for Stewart, Ryan Newman and Danica Patrick. Stewart said Newman, 16th in the points race, will not return in 2014.

"We're not ready to expand to a fourth team," Stewart said. "That's what's made this a bitter-sweet day. I'm bringing in another one of my friends to the organization, also knowing that I'm losing a friend at the end of the year. ... This was a business decision."

US airlines' on-time rating drops again in May

(AP) Summer travelers should pack plenty of patience: More flights are running late this year than in 2012.

The U.S. Department of Transportation says that only 79.4 percent of domestic flights arrived on time in May, down from 83.4 percent in the same month last year.

Hawaiian Airlines was most likely to arrive on-time, while American Eagle, the regional-flying affiliate of American Airlines, had the worst rate.

Five planes were stuck on airport tarmacs for more than three hours, which is longer than allowed by federal regulations. Cancellations ticked up slightly from a year ago.

In the last five years, mergers have reduced the number of U.S. airlines and flights, which should help the carriers stay on schedule. But flights are extremely full — average occupancy on all the major U.S. airlines topped 85 percent in June — which means it can take longer for passengers to get on and off the plane.

The May results were still better than April, when airlines blamed furloughs of federal air traffic controllers for causing nearly one in four flights to be late and nearly one in 50 to be canceled.

"On-time performance was still pretty solid at nearly 80 percent as airlines navigated (stormy) summer weather," said Jean Medina, a spokeswoman for Airlines for America, a trade group of the largest U.S. carriers. "It's also important to note that customer satisfaction, as ranked by lower complaint rate, is improving."

Look at Twitter and you'll see that many travelers gripe about airlines, but few of them bother to file a formal complaint with the Transportation Department. In May, there were 561 complaints against U.S. carriers, or one for every 100,000 people who got on a plane. That was down by about one-third from the rate in May 2012.

Consumers were most likely to complain about United Airlines or Fort Worth, Texas-based American Airlines and least likely to kvetch about Alaska or Southwest.

Hawaiian, which benefits from favorable flying weather, held its usual spot at the top of the on-time rankings, with 92.4 percent of its flights arriving within 14 minutes of schedule — that's the government's definition of on-time. Alaska Airlines and Delta Air Lines were next.

At the other extreme, just 69.9 percent of American Eagle flights were on-time. ExpressJet and Mesa, which both operate regional flights for bigger airlines, and Frontier Airlines all scored below 75 percent.

Among the five largest U.S. airlines, Delta had the best on-time record, followed by US Airways, United, Southwest and American.

Two of the five flights that sat on the tarmac for at least three hours were operated by American. The others were Alaska, Shuttle America and ExpressJet.

Another 345 flights sat on the ground for at least two hours, including 93 operated by American, 59 by American Eagle, 49 by United, and 35 by US Airways.

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Police: Teen in Asiana crash hit by fire truck

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — One of the two Chinese teenagers killed in the Asiana Airlines disaster was struck by a fire truck while she was covered by firefighting foam, a new detail that raised the possibility she may have survived the crash only to die in its chaotic aftermath.

It wasn't clear, however, whether Ye Meng Yuan, 16, was already dead or whether she was alive after Saturday's crash.

Authorities were still trying to determine the cause of death, and San Mateo County coroner Robert Foucrault said his initial results would likely be released sometime next week. He would not comment on the police investigation.

Police said the teenager was on the ground and covered in foam that rescuers had sprayed on the burning wreckage of Flight 214. When the truck moved while battling the flames, rescuers discovered her body in the tire track, police spokesman Albie Esparza said.

The airliner collided with a rocky seawall just short of its intended airport runway on Saturday. Two people were killed and dozens of others injured although most suffered minor injuries. Investigators have said the plane came in too low and slow.

Nearly a week after the crash, investigators have pieced together an outline of the event — what should have been a smooth landing by seasoned pilots turning into a disaster.

With each new bit of information, the picture emerging is of pilots who were supposed to be closely monitoring the plane's airspeed, but who didn't realize until too late that the aircraft was dangerously low and slow.

Nothing disclosed so far by the National Transportation Safety Board investigators indicates any problems with the Boeing 777's engines or the functioning of its computers and automated systems.

"The first thing that's taught to a pilot is to look at the airspeed indicator. It is the most important instrument in the cockpit," said Lee Collins, a pilot with 29 years and 18,000 hours experience flying a variety of airliners.

"Airspeed is everything," he said. "You have airspeed, you live. You don't, you die."

Investigators are still trying to nail down hundreds of details about the crash that also injured dozens. NTSB Chairman Deborah Hersman has cautioned against drawing conclusions from the details released so far.

But investigators already know a great deal.

They've listened to the Boeing 777's voice recorder, which captured the last two hours of conversation in the cockpit. They've downloaded its flight data recorder, which captured 1,400 indicators of what was happening on the plane.

The flight's four pilots have been interviewed, as have passengers and dozens of witnesses. Air traffic control recordings and video of the flight's last moments, including the crash itself, have been examined.

According to details released so far, the pilot flying the plane, Lee Gang-kuk, 46, had nearly 10,000 hours of flying experience, but just 35 hours flying a

Boeing 777. He had recently completed training that qualified him to fly passengers in the 777, and was about halfway through his post-qualification training.

He was seated in the left cockpit pilot seat. In the co-pilot position was Lee Jeong-Min, an experienced captain who was supervising Lee Gang-kuk's training. It was Lee Gang-kuk's first time landing a 777 in San Francisco.

At 11:19:23 PDT, after a nearly 11-hour flight, the plane was traveling over the San Francisco Peninsula. The weather was near perfect, sunny with light winds.

Lee Jeong-Min and a third pilot sitting in a jump seat just behind the main seats, a first officer, were supposed to be monitoring the plane's controls. One of their most important jobs was to closely monitor the plane's two airspeed indicators.

In the U.S., if an amber bar is more than five knots above or below the target speed during landing, the pilot flying is supposed to abort and make another attempt, according to pilots interviewed by The Associated Press.

As the plane descended to 1,600 feet, the autopilot was turned off. At 1,400 feet, the plane's airspeed was about 170 knots.

The flight data recorder shows the plane's autothrottle — similar to a car's cruise control — was set on idle during the approach, Hersman said, and that there were multiple commands at times given to the autothrottle and autopilot.

At 11:26:58 and 1,000 feet, the pilots made contact with the airport tower. When they were cleared to land 12 seconds later, the plane's altitude had dropped to about 600 feet. The plane was configured for its approach and the landing gear was down. The airspeed was about 149 knots. A target speed of 137 knots was set.

At 500 feet there was an audible automated altitude alert. The airspeed was about 134 knots. At this point that pilots realized they weren't properly lined up with the runway, Hersman said.

"Between 500 and 200 feet, they had a lateral deviation and they were low. They were trying to correct at that point," she said.

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Packed train derails near Paris, 7 believed dead

BRETIGNY-SUR-ORGE, France (AP) — A train carrying hundreds of passengers derailed and crashed into a station outside Paris on Friday on the eve of a major holiday weekend. At least seven people were believed killed and dozens were injured, the interior minister said.

The crash at Bretigny-sur-Orge station is the deadliest in France in years, and French President Francois Hollande abandoned plans in the capital to visit the scene.

All trains from Paris' Gare d'Austerlitz were suspended after the accident.

A passenger speaking on France's BFM television said the train was going at a normal speed and wasn't meant to stop at Bretigny-sur-Orge. He described children unattended in the chaotic aftermath. He said there are swarms of emergency workers at the scene.

Al-Qaida-linked gunmen kill Syrian rebel commander

BEIRUT (AP) — Al-Qaida-linked gunmen killed a rebel commander in Syria aligned with the Western-backed militias fighting against Bashar Assad's regime, the highest-profile casualty of growing tensions between moderate and jihadi fighters among rebel forces.

Observers worried Friday that the commander's death will increase distrust and suspicion between forces already at odds over territory and leadership as the nearly three-year civil war continues in Syria.

Loay AlMikdad, a spokesman for the Free Syrian Army, said Friday that members of the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant — a group reportedly made up of al-Qaida's branches in Iraq and Syria — were behind the killing of Kamal Hamami. Hamami, known as Abu Basir, served in the Supreme Military Council of the Free Syrian Army, a group headed by a secular-minded moderate that has the support of Western powers.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said gunmen shot Hamami dead late Thursday after militants tried to remove a checkpoint he set up in the Jabal al-Turkoman mountain in the coastal province of Latakia. The observatory said two of his men were seriously wounded in the shooting.

AlMikdad told Al-Arabiya TV that Hamami "was assassinated at the hands of the forces of evil and crime at one of the checkpoints." He added that the group that killed Hamami "should hand over those who carried out this act to stand trial."

Activists monitoring the war previously reported occasional clashes between rebel groups and Islamic militants active in rebel-held areas, especially in the north where the opposition has control of a large part of the region. There also has been infighting between Kurdish and Arab groups over control of territory captured from government along the border with Turkey in the past year.

Some cars slid toward the station, crushing part of the metallic roof over the platform. Images from the scene shown on French television showed gnarled metal and shards on the platform, and debris from the crash clogging the stairwell leading beneath the platform.

"I heard a loud noise. A cloud of sand covered everything," one witness, Bazgua El Mehdi, 19, who was on a nearby train, told Le Parisien newspaper.

"Then the dust dissipated. I thought it was a freight train, but then we saw the first casualties ... Many passengers on the (train) were crying."

Officials didn't comment on reports that some of the passengers may still be trapped on the train. It was unclear whether all the casualties were inside the train, or whether some had been on the platform, or how fast the train was traveling. The head of the SNCF rail authority, Guillaume Pepy, called it a "catastrophe."

The cause of the crash was under investigation. Two train cars, Nos. 3 and 4, initially derailed, then knocked the other cars off the track, Pepy said.

"Some cars simply derailed, others are leaning, others fell over," he said.

Interior Minister Manuel Valls said at least seven people are believed dead and several dozen injured, but added that the casualty toll is "in constant evolution" and could rise.

The SNCF said the train was carrying about 385 passengers when it derailed Friday evening at 5:15 p.m. (1515 GMT; 11:15 a.m. EDT) and crashed into the station at Bretigny-sur-Orge, about 20 kilometers (12 miles) south of Paris. The train was headed from Paris to Limoges, a 400- (250-mile) kilometer journey and was about 20 minutes into what would have been a three-hour journey.

The accident came as France is preparing to celebrate its most important national holiday, Bastille Day, on Sunday, and as masses of vacationers are heading out of Paris and other big cities to see family or on summer vacation.

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
