# A teacher with a sense of the **'Old West'**

Junior high teacher competes in international shooting competitions.

One doesn't have to travel far to capture the landscape that appears in classic westerns such as "The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly" and "Tombstone." Even better, many Western enthusiasts can go to any of the museums and antique shops around the Texas Panhandle to see the clothes, accessories, weapons and tools that are used in these famed Westerns. But what many people may not know, there is an international organization that relives the scenes and practices shooting old pistols and shotguns like they are defending their town from incoming robbers and troublemakers. The organization is the Single Action Shooting Society, also known as SASS, and there is a proud member of it right here in Pampa. Sixthgrade history teacher, Stephanie Logan, aka Panhandle Cowgirl, competes in SASS events regularly and practices her shooting three to four times a month. # In memory of seven children

Charge nurse at hospital creates foundation to plant seven trees at Moore, Okla. elementary school.

The tornado that devastated Moore, Okla. on May 20 truly hit home for Shawn Rene Sunderland-Nicholes, because it actually was her home while she was growing up.

Though she's lived in the Texas Panhandle since 1995, Nicholes' parents still live in Moore and their house was missed by just three blocks when the violent F5 storm carved out its mile-wide path of destruction through the Oklahoma City suburb.

Nicholes, who now lives in Fritch and works at Pampa Regional Medical Center as a charge nurse, first found

out about the storm when her father's sister in Amarillo called her and asked, "Have you heard anything about your parents? Are they all right?"

Nicholes, who hadn't heard the news yet about the tornado, replied, "Are they NOT supposed to be all right?"

At first, she wasn't able to get through to her parents. A while later she was able to text her mom and find out they were OK.

It was by the grace of God her parents weren't among those killed or injured.

Her mother had come home early from her job as a hospice aide, which was a good thing. It also was good that her father, who works nights, hadn't left the house to go to his job.

Nicholes' mom told her they went over to a neighbor's







You pay taxes? You contributed to the \$2 billion your government gave Egypt this year. And last year. And every year – for 30 years. Most of it went to Egypt's military. How's that worked out? Now our government

will "cautiously" support anti-government rebels in Syria, even though some

are openly

battling the Russians in Afghanistan. That conflict led to the rise of al-Qaida. One of the Mujahedeen factions went on to become the Taliban, with whom we now fight.

Advocates of foreign intervention argue that our government must aid friends and fight obvious foes, and that the world would be in worse shape had we not intervened. They say it's important that America send soldiers

overseas to acquire "influence" in the world. I don t duy it. It's important to defend ourselves. We were right to retaliate after 9/11 and after the Japanese bombed Hawaii. But often politicians think: When in doubt, America must "lead." I wish they thought: When in doubt, stay out. Political essayist Randolph Bourne famously wrote, "War is the health of the state." He was right. Whenever there is war, government grows in power, as he saw happening in the U.S. during World War I. The public longs to be led to safety. People will tolerate sacrifices and civil liberties violations in wartime that they never would tolerate in peacetime. Once they acquire political power, even silly leftists embrace military action. After Sept. 11, Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., declared that the "era of a shrinking federal government is over." In fact. government had never shrunk. For politicians like Schumer, a terrorist attack was another excuse to spend more. Most Americans didn't anything to stop object · terror. Political and military leaders often exaggerate threats. Adm. Mike

Mullen, a chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff under both George W. Bush and Barack Obama, said of the post-9/11 world, "This is the most dangerous time I've seen growing up the last four decades.<sup>3</sup>

This the most dangerous time? More than when Soviet nuclear missiles were pointed at us?

9/11 was horrible. But it was an unusually successful attack. Even if there were a similar attack every decade, that would kill paid to arm far fewer Americans than house fires. Or stairs. Or bathtubs even. Of course, our brains are wired to the Islamic react more strongly to the dramatic attack. But that fear leads us to spend big on things that don't add to our safety.

Some current Egyptian protesters are angry at America — not because they are Islamists who support terrorism, but because they support secular, classical-liberal figures like the late Mohammed Noah, who encouraged free markets and outreach to Israel.

The U.S. government does at least criticize leaders like Morsi, and Hosni Mubarak before him, when they behave in authoritarian ways but we don't stop selling them military hardware. Defense contractors don't have much incentive to obsess about what regimes will do later with the weapons sold to them now With power changing hands in Egypt once again, maybe it's time for us to butt out. Let them sort out their own politics — instead of us helping train police and arm soldiers who beat up the protesters who may become the next generation of leaders. Suggesting that will get me called an "isolationist." But there's nothing isolationist about it. America can have a huge impact on the rest of the world even without deploying the military or governmentfunded foreign aid. We already do. Let our movies play in theaters across the world. Let our rock music alarm mullahs. And let neoconservatives fund overseas sales of books filled with ideas local autocrats consider dangerous.

# Museum to open special rodeo exhibit

cluding, Wade Thomasson, Crawford Atkinson, Irvin Cole, E.J. Hanna, F.E. Imel, Rex Barrett, John Hayes, Roy Sewell, J.E. Murfee Jr., Orval Christopher, John Sims, Arlie Carpenter, and E.O. Wedgeworth. These men recognized that the town of Pampa needed a source of entertainment, and together they provided what would eventually be the annual Top O' Texas Rodeo.

Rodeos are a place where locals can show off their talents, youngsters can get their feet wet in the

June 20, 1945 was a red-letter day thrilling sport and people can come from miles and miles to enjoy an amazing performance. Never has a single event brought together a community like a rodeo, and Pampa is proud to still offer this amazing performance every year.

In 1962, the rodeo became an event of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (now known as the PRCA). Having a pro rodeo brought several famous people to the city of Pampa including Judy Lynn, Molly Bee, McBride and the Ride, Asleep at the Wheel, Miss Rodeo America, Red Stegall, and even Binion's Stagecoach, to name a few.

In 2008, the rodeo took on yet another new look by once again becoming an amateur rodeo after 45 years of being a professional rodeo.

During the weeks before the rodeo the town really comes alive. Local events kick up and everyone gets involved. There are many activities, performances and chances to get out and support your local merchants.

This year, the White Deer Land

Museum will be hosting a celebration of the Top O' Texas Rodeo. We look forward to meeting some of the "legends" of Pampa's rodeo and we do hope to see you all there. If you have been involved with the Pampa rodeo or professional rodeo we urge you to come by or contact the museum before the event to fill out a biography.






If only every 16-year-old had the courage and grit of Malala Yousafzai, the Pakistani girl who was shot in the head by the Taliban last year for advocating girls' and women's education.

Last Friday, she spoke to the United Nations and said education could change the world, Reuters reported.

expects to be ignorant and free in a state of civilization, it expects what never was and never will be."

Pakistan is not alone in dealing with extremists' assault on education. Tragically, on July 6, Islamists shot and killed 42 people – including 29 students and one teacher — at a boarding school in northeastern Nigeria. It was one of three such school shootings since May, when the military began its crackdown on the Islamic extremist group Boko Haram, whose nickname translates as "Western education is sinful" in Hausa.

Malala explained to the U.N.: "They shot my friends, too. They thought that the bullets would silence us. But they failed, and out of that silence came thousands of voices.'

She added: "The terrorists thought that they would change my aims and stop

my ambitions, but nothing changed in my life except this: Weakness, fear and hopelessness died. Strength, power and courage was born."

Aren't those some riveting truths and, even more, a rallying cry to continue to fight tyranny over the human mind and spirit? When courageous souls are willing to confront strongholds, they can overcome any adversity and change any culture.

And here's where Malala's mission and mercy ramp up: "I'm not against anyone. Neither am I here to speak in terms of personal revenge against the Taliban or any other terrorist group.

I'm here to speak up for the right of education of every child. I want education for the sons and daughters of the Taliban and all terrorists and extremists.

I do not even hate the Talib who shot me. Even if there is a gun in my hand and he stands in front of me. I would not shoot him.'

Let's remember that she's not fighting a war on terror from without.

Her mission is for education, freedom and reform from within. And that's the most potent type of warfare and transformation for individuals and society

Reuters noted that Pakistan has 5 million kids who don't attend school.

Only Nigeria outnumbers it, with nearly double that number not attending school, according to the U.N.'s cultural agency, UNESCO.

In 2010, The Guardian reported that "girls are far less likely to attend school than boys in many of the world's poorest countries. ... In Malawi, of those that (enroll), 22.3 percent of boys complete primary compared (with) 13.8 percent of girls. In rural Burkina Faso, 61 percent of girls are married by the age of 18 and over 85 percent never get to see the inside of a secondary school."

Last week, Malala presented U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon with a petition signed by some 4 million people.

It's an appeal for leaders everywhere to ensure that the 57 million children around the world who do not attend schools are provided a safe and clear path to be educated by funding new teachers, schools and books, as well as ending child labor, marriage and trafficking.

Malala is a wiser warrior than any extremist leader. She knows that the Taliban are afraid of educated women because they know that women's freedom would mean their loss of control and demise. They fear that women will know the truth and the truth will set them free

In her own words, she said: "The extremists were and they are afraid of books and pens. The power of education frightens them. They are afraid of women. ... We realized the importance of pens and books

when we saw the guns.' Jefferson would have concurred with Malala about the power of education. In his 1818 report for the University of Virginia which he founded — he asked: "What but education has advanced us beyond the condition of our indigenous neighbors? And what chains them to their present state of barbarism and wretchedness but a bigoted veneration for the supposed superlative wisdom of their fathers and the preposterous idea that they are to look backward for better things, and not forward, longing, as it should seem, to return to the days of eating acorns and roots, rather than indulge in the degeneracies of civilization?"

He wrote the same year, "If the condition of man is to be progressively ameliorated, as we fondly hope and believe, education is to be the chief instrument in effecting it."

As the 16-year-old Pakistani warrior told the U.N., "let us pick up our books and our pens. They are our most powerful weapons. One child, one teacher, one book and one pen can change the world. Education is the only solution."

At the very least, maybe it's time for global powers especially the U.S. — to relearn the wisdom of Ma-

lala and Jefferson: Freedom and democracy are spread and embedded more by the weapons of books and pens than they are by the weapons of warfare.

Thirty minutes later, the storm passed so close by it caused the house to shake as they huddled in the basement.

"My mom said it was the most demonic roar she had ever heard," Nicholes said. She held my dad's hand so hard that she thought she broke it.'

Although her parents' house and the neighbor's house were still standing, most of her childhood neighborhood had been destroyed, Nicholes said.

"Their homes looked like they were sandblasted with mud and three blocks away the neighborhood was leveled," she said.

As she was getting ready for work the next day, Nicholes starting thinking about what she could do to help her hometown.

She heard on the news that among the 23 fatalities where seven children who attended Plaza Towers Elementary School.

A few of the victims were 9 years old, the same age as her twin daughters.

When a church group gets together at someone's house for a prayer session, do you usually find the super dedicated or the wishy-washy folks; the hot or the lukewarm? You and I both know that the lukewarm folks don't usu-

of this article. The child we look to for an example now is named Rhoda and we can read her story in Acts 12.

the text

The setting for her story is one of martyrdom and intense persecution. Herod murdered James, one of Jesus' twelve and brother of John and arrested/imprisoned Peter. The Jerusalem church family was feeling the pressure and therefore did exactly what faithful Christians are always to do in times of tribulation: pray.

They gathered at Mary's house, the Mary who was the mother of John Mark not Jesus' mother. No doubt the prayer time was intense; times of tribulation and persecution have that affect. They had gathered to pray for their dear leader, the apostle Peter. If Herod had already murdered James, then surely he had the same plans for Peter.

In the midst of the prayer session there was a knock at the front gate. Mary had a young servant girl named Rhoda who took care of those kind of duties, especially while they were all praying. Rhoda went to the gate and was stunned with joy to see Peter, no doubt a regular visitor to Mary's home. Forgetting to open the gate she ran back into the house and burst into the prayer session and interrupted the proceedings. Before anyone could scold her for bursting in unannounced, she exclaimed that it was Peter at the gate.

Oddly everyone who had been praying for Peter's release cried out that Rhoda was either crazy or that she has seen Peter's angel. Rhoda wasn't even one of the ones praying and yet she believed her eyes immediately with no doubt. Those who had been praying for Peter's release completely blew off an eye

witness. Of course the story ends with Peter knocking longer and louder, his entrance into the house and the awesome testimony time concerning his miraculous release and deliverance. Rhoda proved to be right.

What is the lesson we need to get from Rhoda? Sometimes it isn't the most significant Christians who believe the easiest and quickest. Sometimes it is the believers who we don't hardly even notice who have the strongest faith and find it easiest to believe the unbelievable. Such a believer was Rhoda. Not prominent in the early Jerusalem church, not even prominent in Mary's household, but renowned in the halls of heaven where faith is what counts.

Never be afraid to believe what God clearly shows you. And never fear proclaiming to others what God has shown you; not even to church folks who might just disregard you. Make sure it is the truth, then speak it. God bless. Mike
