
#### Rare flower to bloom at UC Santa Barbara

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — An Indonesian flower famous for its foul odor is expected to unfurl its putrid blossom within the next week at the University of California, Santa Barbara.

The school says its greenhouse will be open to the public during the one-day blooming of the so-called corpse flower.

Unlike other flowers that rely on bees for pollination, this one counts on flies. It attracts them with the smell of rotting flesh, and they in turn spread its sticky pollen.

Its nauseating scent comes from two sulfurproducing chemicals within its leaves.



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





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## Detroit and the tale of tomorrow

Just ahead of Congress as it takes an August recess, the president fares

Who wouldn't want to change the subject under such conditions: The problem is we aren't likely to descend from the rhetorical stratosphere to the ground level, where political promises originate and just as often falter. Shall we talk about Detroit?

On the ground level, it's easier to understand one of the prime factors afflicting the once-proud city. To wit, city leaders made promises as if there were no tomorrow and then borrowed to make good the promises again as if there were no tomorrow.

One of the irritating features about tomorrow, politically speaking, is that it always seems to be somewhere down the street — way, way off. No need to worry for now. This is today, not tomor-

Detroit is in hock for possibly \$20 billion, of which \$3.5 billion is money owed to municipal pension funds. There's no more cash to stuff into the stocking. Tomorrow came, transformed from a gauzy day of sunshine and candy cane clouds into the dark Day of Reckoning. In various Yesterdays, municipal unions had wanted pay and pension boosts. Detroit's leaders said, sure. Somehow the money would be found, whether from borrowing or higher taxes or the borrowing necessary when the higher

taxes failed to produce the necessary wherewithal. Somehow all things would work out! Today at least the municipal unions wouldn't be rendered unhappy, handed political axes to grind — or worse.

And so Detroit, like a number of other U. S. cities, is bankrupt. A few others are merely broke: Chicago, for instance, with a pension debt of possibly \$36 billion, Los Angeles with a similar debt estimated at \$30 billion. Tomorrow comes fast, as today fades from view.

Modern America hardly invented insolvency and frivolity — human traits as old as Aesop 's Fables. The moral-religious outlook of an older America, nevertheless, restrained some of the wilder impulses of the human species. It was acknowledged fairly regularly that actions produced consequences; that as a man sowed, so he reaped — due to which reality it was useful to think carefully about the crop one was planting, all the while watching the weather.

Appraisals of this character fell out of favor as politics assumed a larger and larger role in life. What politician was going to go around with dour face and wagging finger, warning happy constituents of reckonings to come? The ancient moral law fell into disuse. History as a predictor of outcomes turned into televised entertainment.

And so ... Detroit. Maybe Chicago. Maybe Los Angeles. Maybe a Medicare system yoked to unrealistic promises made for the sake of political returns, the future shoved further into the future, the can kicked as far down the road as possible. A moral overhaul for a nation suffering from the neglect of sound moral teaching is, you might say, a bit overdue. I wouldn't count on the president to undertake such a task as he buzzes around the country this

Speeches of that character aren't hard to write; politicians deliver them all the time.

## Why would a group in the Texas Panhandle want to have high tea?

Many people do not realize that Pampa and Gray County, amongst the Indian wars and cowboy tradi-

tions, have a group of British men to thank for many of the things you see in Pampa today.

Montagu Kingsmill "Montie" Brown was born May 22, 1878, in the little village of Eastcote, Middlesex County, England, one of 12 children of an Irish mother and a

British father. When he was 7 years old, he was sent to a boarding school 60 miles from London at a place called Brackley, which was located 20 miles from Oxford and was known as Magdalen College School. Here he remained until the age of 15 when his father went broke and it became necessary for Montie to get a job. This was the end of his formal education, the remainder of it being obtained in the "school of hard knocks" as explained by Brown. He was a loyal alumnus of this latter school, but did not recommend it over formalized education, and thus it was that he dedicated himself to helping children attend college who otherwise might not have had the opportunity.

His first job was office boy for a timber merchant in the heart of London, and for two and a half years he drew

what he termed the "huge salary" of \$2 a week. Then he went to work in a bank at a salary of \$250 a year and while there he received a raise of \$50 a year. There were no adding machines at that early date and all checks had to be listed and added up "by main strength and awkwardness" as he explained it. This experience proved invaluable to him in later years when he was employed by the White Deer Land Company in Gray County. When the Boers in South Africa

declared war on England, the nation had no infantry to speak of and called on the various yeomanry units to furnish the manpower.

This seemed a golden opportunity to young Montie, who was a member of his county yeomanry unit to "join up and see the world at no expense to myself" His experiences in what he called the only "gentlemanly" war ever fought were many and colorful and when it was over, he returned to England feeling he would surely return to Africa someday.

This was not the case, however. His Uncle Andrew Kingsmill began trying to interest him in a vast new land in the southwest part of the United States which he himself had visited. Located in the Texas Panhandle was an outgrowth of the old Francklyn Land and Cattle Company which had been owned and operated by a group of Englishmen headed by the


Prime Minister of England, Lord Rosebery. Andrew Kingsmill was a banker and agent for Lord Rosebery, and so it was that he had become familiar with this land company and he had to know Mr. T.D. Hobart, the manager.

He succeeded in influencing his nephew, M.K. Brown, to change his plans for adventure elsewhere in the world for a trip to an area in Texas which was to become his home for the rest of his life.

The group enjoyed snacks, hot tea and iced tea and had the opportunity to learn just why Pampa would have high tea. The White Deer Land Museum's Memorial Board looks forward to hosting the ladies again next year.

The White Deer Land Museum has an exhibit dedicated to the re-creation of M.K. Brown's apartment. In his apartment upstairs in the museum you will see British flags and other memorabilia from his home country.

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## The role of the 'sole military adviser' to the president

It's not often that a testy exchange at a hearing, followed by



a senator's statement that he would put a hold on the nomination until he got an adequate answer to his question, opens

Two days after brokering a deal to avoid the senatorial "nuclear option" — an effort by the majority to strip the minority of their filibuster rights by agreeing to a compromise that in grade school might win you an extra few minutes of recess and in Washington leads to accolades of utter disbelief at such good will — Sen. John McCain announced that he intended to put a hold on the nomination of Joint Chiefs

Dempsey to serve another

The reason was Dempsey's refusal to answer McCain's question or rather, to give him the kind of answer he wanted.

The question was this: "Do you believe the continued costs and risks of our inaction in Syria are now worse for our national security interests than the costs and risks associated with limited military action?"

The answer was this: "I am in favor of building a moderate opposition and supporting it. The question whether

to support it with direct kinetic strikes is a decision for our elected officials, not for the senior military leader of the nation." In other words, it is

the president's decision whether to use military force, and the man McCain called his "sole military adviser" refused to say what option the military favored.

In this instance, it is clear why McCain was so frustrated. He went to Syria and met with the rebel forces. McCain favors stronger military ac- I expect this particular tion. He is looking for (and maybe believes he has, if he were to speak freely) a supporter and an ally in Dempsey, a voice at the table advocating for and not merely explaining the military option.

He is frustrated that the most powerful military man in the United States is so careful, reticent, reluctant to throw his power around.

Imagine that.

Talk about a miracle. I'm not arguing that civilian control of the military ultimately turns on how Dempsey frames his analysis of the military options in Syria. Indeed, Armed Services Committee Chairman Sen. Carl Levin seemed to have come up with a compromise by the end, when he announced that the general would return in the future to discuss with the committee the pros, cons and costs. Said Levin: "If you'll do that, it may be a step that would be a constructive, positive step."

I expect he will do that.

dispute will be resolved.

But the fact that it could be a dispute at all is one of those minor miracles of democracy and the rule of law that is easy to forget in our collective disgust with the day-to-day operations of our government.

We live in a country where the most powerful military man actually (if you share McCain's view) has to be encouraged to take a strong position on whether the nation should resort to a military option.

Name one other country in the world where that is a "problem."

Meanwhile, a majority in the Senate was in fact able to craft a deal to address the problem of stalled nominees (for as long as two years), which should not have been a problem in the first place.

But, hey, we are still talking about Washington, D.C., in 2013.

## Become like child No. 18

The final child that we want to take a look at as an example for us to imitate is Jesus!



All the information we have concerning His childhood can be read in Luke 2:40-52.

What we first learn

about his early childhood is that Jesus' life made him physically strong. His playing combined with helping Joseph in the wood shop made him a muscular man. Now not muscular like freakish

body builders, but more like a lean boy with muscles that could work all day beside His father.

Then we learn that He opened Himself up to be filled with the wisdom of God. He didn't spend all of his time as a child just playing and hanging out with His friends.

Then finally we learn that because He had allowed Himself to be filled with God's wisdom, then God's grace could rest on Him.

Know for sure that it was these three truths about Jesus' childhood that made the only detailed story from those years possible: The time when Jesus was 12 years old and got left in Jerusalem.

Mary and Joseph loaded up Jesus and the necessary supplies for their trip to Jerusalem for the annual Passover Feast; a 200-mile round trip if they took the most direct, most dangerous route; 300 miles if they traveled the easier, safer route that allowed the children to have friends to play with. It was at least a three-week

Everyone loaded up for the journey home after the Passover Feast was complete. No doubt throughout the first day Mary and Joseph thought that Jesus was with one of the other families in the caravan. When they stopped to make camp that evening, the panic set in; Jesus wasn't with any of the other families. They scurried back to

Jerusalem and began searching. At the end of the first day - NO JESUS; the second day — NO JESUS. Then on the third day they finally found their boy. Where? In the outer court area of

So what was Jesus doing there? He was listening to the Jewish teachers expound on the Old Testament scriptures. Unlike most young boys His age, Jesus was asking questions, hard questions. The text in Luke says that everyone was amazed at His questions and His answers. Truly His time learning God's wisdom and bathing in God's grace had proven to be a heavenly blessing indeed. That is why His questions were so hard to answer and His answers were so hard to argue against.

About that time Joseph and Mary showed up, very, very unhappy. Jesus simply replied, ""Why were you searching for me? Didn't you know I had to be in my Father's house?" Of course they didn't get the point, they were still wrapped up in the panic of the previous days. But Jesus got it. He knew who His Father was and He knew what His life was to be about.

For the rest of His years as a growing boy all we know about Jesus is that He willingly subjected Himself to the will and wishes of His parents, that He continued to grow in God's wisdom and that not only did people notice His uniqueness, but Father God did as well.

Our lesson? How much time do we spend soaking up God's wisdom? If our answer is "very little," then we will not be spending much time in the grace hot tub. God's wisdom and His grace go together. Jesus understood that and we need to as well. So open your Bible and get to soaking up God's wisdom. Every hour you do, God will pour out an extra dose of His
