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Pampa's significance in World War II

Editor's note: This is the second in a two-part series about Pampa's military history.

From what we hear in the national news every day, politicians and citizens alike in the United States are divided on almost every political issue. Therefore, it is hard to say that we are unified as a country. But after the attack on Pearl Harbor, much like America after 9/11, the country for a while was unified under one flag, under one president and under one belief, "Let's go get the bad guys." The same sentiment

resonated throughout the community of Pampa, and it was largely because of an area west of town. Follow U.S. Highway 60 through Pampa until it merges with State Highway 152. Follow the merged highways until they split again and about two miles up State Highway 152 to the right is a dairy farm and Lindel Farms. But about 70 years ago this was known as "The Eagles' Nest of the High Plains." That's because between Dec. 14, 1942 and Sept. 30, 1945, the Pampa Army Airfield trained 6,296 aviation cadets and 3,500 mechanics. Though unconfirmed, it has been said that even legendary Dallas Cowboys head coach Tom Landry

did some of his military training here. Betty Lutz' late husband Edmond "Ed" H. Lutz was a cadet at the Pampa Army Airfield, and said that during World War II the Pampa Army Airfield was an important part of the community. Lutz is now 90 and has lived in Pampa since 2010. **Pampa Army Air Field, soldiers and the community** "Almost every Saturday night they had a dance party," Lutz said. "We all went up on the stage and sang the Air Corps. song." While Pampa Army Airfield was not constructed yet, the military

Drug-screening business to open

 A business that does primarily drug screening will open Monday in Las Pampas Square next to Sheila Webb State Farm. Jane Marlar, who has several certifications in various forms of screening, is one of two employees who will be working at Active Drug Screens. The company also has a location in Amarillo. Marlar said a big part of their business will be drug screenings for commercial drivers required by the U.S. Department of Transportation. In the Panhandle, lots of drivers are employed by energy companies. The company also will do physicals required by DOT for commercial drivers. Other services will include pre-employment drug tests, random drug testing and post-accident testing, DNA testing and hair follicle testing. Marlar said some companies prefer hair follicle testing to urine testing, because the former can discover evidence of drug use farther back in time.

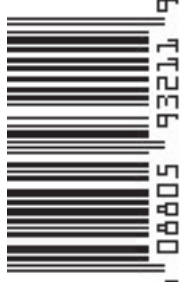

Man dies in plane crash in Amarillo

A 53-year-old pilot was killed Thursday is a small plane crash in Potter County, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Ben Harner of Tyler was pronounced dead at the scene.

He was flying a 1967 Piper PA-30.

No other deaths or injuries were reported.

Upon take off from Tradewinds Airport, the pilot reported engine trouble, according to the report.

Harner attempted to return to Tradewinds Airport to land. For unknown reasons, the aircraft struck a mobile home and crashed in the front yard.

Pa. judge fines woman who cursed at jury selection

ERIE, Pa. (AP) — A Pennsylvania woman has been fined \$500 for cursing because she was frustrated with being picked to serve on a jury.

The Erie Times-News reports Erie County Judge Ernest DiSantis levied the fine Wednesday on Kathleen Port.

DiSantis told the Erie woman she was "totally out of line" and explained jury service is a duty of citizenship.

Port, whose phone number is unlisted, apologized several times but was fined nonetheless.

She told the judge she was upset because jury service would make her miss work and cost her income.

DiSantis says Port could have claimed a hardship on her jury service questionnaire, but did not.

Port was also thrown off the jury, which was picked to hear an illegal weapons case.

Spain train-crash driver accused of 'recklessness'

SANTIAGO DE COMPOSTELA, Spain (AP) — Spanish police said Friday they have arrested the driver of the train that sped through a curve and toppled over, killing 78 people, and plan to question him over suspected reckless driving.

As blame increasingly fell on the still-hospitalized driver over Spain's deadliest railway crash in decades, authorities located the train's so-called "black box" that is expected to shed further light on the disaster's cause.

Investigators said they would seek evidence of failings by Francisco Jose Garzon Amo, the 52-year-old driver, as well as the train's internal speed-regulation systems in Wednesday's derailment.

The train company, Ren-

fe, defended the driver Friday, lauding what it called his exhaustive experience. But the country's railway agency, Adif, noted that the driver should have started slowing the train long before reaching the disastrous turn.

In an interview with The Associated Press, an American passenger injured on the train said he saw on a TV monitor screen inside his car that the train was traveling 194 kph (121 mph) seconds before the crash —

far above the 80 kph (50 mph) speed limit on the curve where it derailed. The passenger, 18-year-old Stephen Ward, said the train appeared to have accelerated, not decelerated.

And Gonzalo Ferre, president of the rail infrastructure company Adif, said the driver should have started slowing the train 4 kilometers (2.5 miles) before reaching a dangerous bend that train drivers had been told to respect.

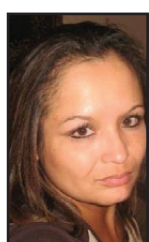

Fund set up for Pampa woman who needs jaw surgery

Most people would rather do anything than get a wisdom tooth pulled, but in Angela Rivera's case

it's a good thing she went to the dentist when she did.

While the tooth was getting X-rayed, the dentist

discovered something that didn't look quite right.

"They said something was going on there," Rivera said.

They sent her to an oral surgeon, who did the same tests and discovered she

had a cyst on her jaw.

The cyst was removed and two days later, July 1, Rivera was told it was cancerous.

"They told me they need to remove a piece of my jaw and reconstruct it," she said.

Rivera said if she has surgery her prognosis will be good.

But she is faced with two challenges: There aren't any doctors in this area who can perform the surgery she needs and she does not have health insurance.

"We are looking to the Dallas-Fort Worth area," said Rivera, who is married with a two sons, ages 18 and 23.

She works at Pampa Independent School District.

Rivera said she thinks she has found a surgeon,

but the cost will be at least \$10,000. She also will have travel expenses.

After the surgery, Rivera said the Don Harrington Cancer Center in Amarillo may help out with chemotherapy.

A fund to assist Angela Rivera of Pampa with her medical expenses has been set up at FirstBank Southwest of Pampa.

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Frog finds way into climate report for Ga. city

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — At first glance, the National Weather Service climate report for Augusta was alarming:

It had rained frogs in the east Georgia city.

The sophisticated device that measures rainfall at Augusta Regional Airport recorded .04 inch of precipitation, most of it in the form of a frog. The amount was recorded in Wednesday's climate report for Augusta.

The Augusta Chronicle reports that National Weather Service employees in nearby West Columbia, S.C., were suspicious when they saw that. So a technician was sent to inspect the All Weather Precipitation Accumulation Gauge, and forecasters learned that a frog had hopped into it. The climate report was then corrected.

Meteorologist Leonard Vaughan said amphibians have found their way into the gauge about a dozen times since the beginning of the summer.

beverages prepared by Pampa firefighters.

Harkcom said Chicken Express is helping out by providing a cooker.

Kaleb Kimbro, MDA's goodwill ambassador for Texas, will speak at the cookout.

Eleven-year-old Kaleb is from Shamrock and has a form of muscular dystrophy called hereditary sensory and motor neuropathy, or CMT for short.

CMT is a non-life-threatening form of the disease that only affects his outer extremities, said Erica Rendon, health care services coordinator for MDA's office in Midland.

Rendon said Kaleb is a very active kid, but sometimes walks with a limp. As time goes by, however, the disease will take its toll and

movement for Kaleb will become more and more difficult. Eventually he will be bound to a chair.

"He's a wonderful kid," Rendon said. "He's very passionate and a fantastic goodwill ambassador for Texas. These kids (with MD) are the epitome of what it's like to bounce back from bad news."

MD is a group of genetically-inherited diseases in which muscle fibers are unusually susceptible to damage. These damaged muscles become progressively weaker and most people who have MD will eventually need to use a wheelchair.

There are many different kinds of muscular dystrophy. Symptoms of the most common variety begin in childhood, primarily in boys. Other types of muscular dystrophy don't surface until adulthood.

People who have muscular dystrophy may have trouble breathing or swal-

lowing. Their limbs may also draw inward and become fixed in that position — a problem called contracture. Some varieties of the disease can also affect the heart and other organs.

While there is no cure for muscular dystrophy, medications and therapy can slow the course of the disease.

The Pampa Fire Fighters Association is the city's firefighters' union.

But it is much more than a union, Harkcom said, as it participates in a number of philanthropic endeavors in the community.

Besides raising money for the MDA, the association sells pink T-shirts to help Relay for Life and every year raises money for vouchers to buy shoes and socks for needy children in the school district.

The association has also sponsored teams for the Youth Optimist Club, Harkcom said.

One of the women in the group, who was nicknamed "Teddy" because she said she looked like a badly-stitched teddy bear, struck me with her sense of humor in spite of a very bleak prognosis. We began emailing and four years ago "Teddy" — whose real name is Denise — and her husband Barry met my husband and me in Las Vegas. We spent a very enjoyable day together before we had to go our separate ways, but the friendship was really cemented then.

Through the wonders of the Internet and Facebook, we've kept in touch, and this week we have had the pleasure of Denise's and Barry's company here in Pampa. While we women have talked and laughed and shopped (The Shabby Creek shop made a great impression!) the men have gotten better acquainted over their mutual love of old cars, golf, fishing, and moaning over how much we women spend.

By the way, Barry says if anyone wants to donate a 1928 or 1929 Model A to him in the interest of Aussie-Texas relations, he'd be happy to accept it. We've sampled the different cuisines of Pampa, from Smokin' Joe's to the Lampliter and a few places in between; wandered the aisles of Walmart (a novelty to our friends who live in Tasmania), been to Palo Duro Canyon, enjoyed a concert by the kids at band camp at WTAMU (including our grandson), and have been in and out of various shops in Pampa. Pampa should definitely be proud of the progress being made in this city. Everywhere we've gone, our friends have been impressed with how warmly-welcoming and friendly everyone is here. The color of hope

My friend Charles Krauthammer, a thinking man's pundit, believes some problems cannot be solved. Charles points to the Palestinian-Israeli situation and to the collapse of the traditional black

family in America. I disagree. It is possible to change black attitudes, but it will take a dynamic person to lead the way. The primary reason that Trayvon Martin is not alive today is that George Zimmerman feared him. Making his neighborhood watch rounds, Zimmerman saw a young man wearing clothing that unsettled him. Zimmerman profiled the teenager, and from there, things rapidly got out of control.

There is a perception in America that young black males can be trouble. According to a study out of Northeastern University, black men between the ages of 14 and 24 commit homicides at a rate 10 times that of young white and Hispanic males combined. This disturbing fact drives profiling and fear.

The reason that crime among young black males is so intense is the collapse of the traditional black family. Fifty years ago, the out-of-wedlock birth rate among African-Americans was 25 percent. Today, it is nearly 73 percent and growing, according to the Centers for Disease Control. By contrast, 29 percent of white babies and 53 percent of Hispanic children are born out of wedlock. Single-parent situations drive poverty and often lead to unsupervised kids. Many boys growing up without fathers often feel angry and abandoned. Thus, they seek comfort in all the wrong places.

President Obama and our leaders in Washington surely understand the root of the black crime

problem. So do self-appointed civil rights leaders such as Jesse Jackson and Al Sharpton. But they rarely discuss the matter in public. That might anger their constituency and be bad for business.

When was the last time you saw a demonstration discouraging young black girls from getting pregnant outside of marriage? When was the last time the president held a press conference on the issue? When was the last time we saw the federal government put out a public service announcement encouraging children to reject drugs and violence?

Maybe Jay Z could produce a PSA. How about Lil Wayne? Kanye West? These guys make millions rapping about dubious behavior. Sometimes they glamorize it. So why don't they lead the charge to improve things in Chicago's South Side and other places under siege?

There was plenty of outrage in the black precincts regarding the Zimmerman verdict. Understandable. But there is little national anger about thousands of African-Americans being gunned down in the streets by out-of-control young men, the vast majority of them black.

Until the American leadership begins to encourage the return of the traditional black family, the enormous problems of black poverty and crime will continue. And the fear of young black men will continue. And the death of innocents will continue.

Maybe Jay Z can rap about that.

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Detroit: the stalled Motor City

MSNBC host Melissa Harris-Perry — the same TV commentator who said

Americans need to stop raising kids as if they belong to individual families — had an extraordinary explanation for why the city of Detroit sought

to declare bankruptcy last week: not enough government. "This is what it looks like when government is small enough to drown in your bathtub, and it is not a pretty picture." She says budget-cutting Republicans threaten to transform all of the U.S. into Detroit.

What? Detroit has been a "model city" for big-government! All Detroit's mayors since 1962 were Democrats who were eager to micromanage. And spend. Detroit has the only utility tax in Michigan, and its income tax is the third-highest of any big city in America (only Philadelphia and Louisville take more, and they aren't doing great, either).

Detroit's automakers got billions in federal bail-outs. The Detroit News revealed that Detroit in 2011 had around twice as many

municipal employees per capita as cities with comparable populations. The city water and sewer department employed a "horseshoer" even though it keeps no horses.

This is "small enough government"? Harris-Perry must have one heck of a bathtub.

Politicians think they know best, but they can't alter the laws of economics. They can't make mismanaged industries, constant government meddling, welfare and bureaucratic labor union rules (Detroit has 47 unions) into a formula for success.

County Judge Rosemarie Aquilina wants to stop the bankruptcy process on the grounds that state law forbids Detroit to cut government services. But how will Detroit pay for the services? Unsustainable public-sector pensions, a bloated workforce — it's all supposed to continue somehow.

Politicians on Detroit's city council aren't even willing to sell off vacant lots that the city owns, or even a portion of the billions of dollars in art in its government-subsidized museum (including the original "Howdy Doody" puppet).

On my TV show, I confronted the council's second in command about his refusal to let Detroit sell land. He says he

voted against it "because the developer wants to grow trees. We don't need any more new trees in our city." The politicians micromanaged themselves into bankruptcy, and they want to keep digging.

A member of the British Parliament writes that Detroit is like the fictional city of Starnesville in Ayn Rand's 1957 novel "Atlas Shrugged" — a car-manufacturing city that became a ghost town after experimenting with socialism. In the novel, Starnesville's demise is the first sign that the entire society is approaching collapse.

Detroit is already there. 911 calls sometimes go unanswered. Two-thirds of the population left town.

As usual, the politicians want to try more of the same.

They constantly come up with plans, but the plans are always big, simple-minded ones that run roughshod over the thousands of little plans made by ordinary citizens. Politicians want new stadiums, new transportation schemes, housing projects.

Andrew Rodney, a documentary filmmaker from Detroit, says many bad, big-government ideas that have plagued the U.S. were tried out first in Detroit. "It's the first city to experience a lot of the planning that went into a

lot of cities."

Home loan subsidies, public housing, stadium subsidies, a \$350 million project called "Renaissance Center" (the city ended up selling it for just \$50 million), an automated People Mover system that not many people feel moved to use (it moves people in only one direction), endless favors to unions — if a government idea has failed anywhere in America, there's a good chance it failed in Detroit first.

And if you criticized them for it, politicians like former Mayor Coleman Young called you a racist. "To attack Detroit is to attack black," Young said. That tends to shut critics up.

But the laws of economics apply to us all.

Insulated from serious criticism, insulated from economic reality, Detroit thought somehow it'd muddle through — until now. There is a big lesson, if people elsewhere are willing to learn before it's too late.

AMARILLO — Returning for the 12th year in a row, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will offer QuickBooks Pro computer short courses on Aug. 19-20 in Amarillo and Sept. 9-10 in Lubbock. The trainings will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day in both cities, said DeDe Jones, AgriLife Extension risk management specialist in Amarillo, who will coordinate the event in that city.

Jay Yates, AgriLife Extension risk management specialist in Lubbock, will coordinate the Lubbock course.

Both events will be held at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center in their respective cities.

They are located at 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd. in Amarillo and 1102 E. Farm-to-Market Road 1294 north of

Lubbock. "Based on follow-up surveys, attendees have received an average economic benefit of more than \$2,000 per year," Jones said. "We've presented the program to almost 360 producers through the years." In the two-day course, participants will learn to enter transactions into the program and analyze costs and profits.

Registration for each two-day course is \$125 and includes computer use and teaching materials. Couples are encouraged to attend and will be charged only one registration fee if they share a computer. Class size is limited to 15 people to provide a hands-on experience, Jones said.

Those planning to attend should RSVP by Aug. 12 for the Amarillo session and by Sept. 2 for the Lubbock session. Payment is due upon arrival on the first day.

Gas price average up slightly but upward pace slows

The statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in Texas is \$3.54, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is up one penny from one week ago and is 11 cents less than the national average which is \$3.65. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas and Fort Worth are paying the most at \$3.60 and drivers in Corpus Christi and El Paso are paying the least at \$3.47.

Drivers in most states are paying more today for gasoline than a couple weeks ago, and those in parts of the Midwest, Northeast and Mid-Atlantic are paying significantly more as a result of new refinery issues, continued tight supplies and oil prices that are at their highest level in more than a year. Continued unrest in Egypt has contributed to higher crude oil prices globally. Another factor in the higher gas prices is an increased demand for fuel as many families continue to take summer road trips.

"Here in Texas drives are paying about \$50 to fill up the typical 14-gallon size fuel tank," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "AAA Texas encourages motorists to keep their vehicles maintained according to manufacturer recommendations to maximize

fuel efficiency."

Some other tips to maximize fuel budgets:

- Consolidate trips and errands.
- Slow Down. The faster a vehicle travels, the more fuel it burns.
- Avoid quick starts and sudden stops.
- Maintain steady speeds for the best fuel economy.
- Minimize the need to break by anticipating traffic conditions.
- Lighten the load. Don't haul extra weight, a heavier vehicle uses more gas.
- If you have more than one, use the car that gets best gas mileage for road trips.
- Pack luggage inside the vehicle, rather than strapped on roof which creates drag.
- Start trips early in the day while traffic is light.

Keep your eyes open for lower fuel prices, but don't waste gas driving to a distant station to save a few cents.

Xcel Energy improves eastern Panhandle transmission

AMARILLO — Xcel Energy is spending \$108.9 million on high-voltage transmission line projects to boost reliability and capacity in the eastern and northeastern Texas Panhandle, where growing economic activity has driven up the demand for electrical power.

"Some of the infrastructure in this area has served us well for 50 years, but the demands of a booming energy economy are overworking a system that was built to handle much less," said Riley Hill, president and CEO of Southwestern Public Service Company, an Xcel Energy company. "As part of our Power for the Plains transmission expansion initiative, these projects will alleviate that strain and help position the region for economic growth for years to come."

These and other transmission enhancement projects across the region were identified as necessary improvements in a 2010 study by the Southwest Power Pool (SPP), the regional transmission organization that coordinates reliability on the transmission system serving portions of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas and Louisiana.

SPP identifies areas of improvement and issues notices to construct. Xcel Energy's policy is to accept these notices to build and own new lines within

its existing transmission footprint.

Xcel Energy's Southwestern Public Service Company subsidiary serves close to 100 communities in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas and eastern and south-eastern New Mexico. The company's transmission system reaches even farther, taking in the Oklahoma Panhandle and portions of southwestern Kansas. By 2015, the company will spend more than \$2 billion upgrading generation, transmission and distribution facilities in almost every part of this area.

Completed and planned upgrades in the northeastern and eastern Texas Panhandle include:

- Hitchland-to-Ochiltree 230-kilovolt transmission line — This line runs 38 miles between the existing Hitchland Substation located in the north-central Texas Panhandle region and the new Ochiltree County Substation near Perryton. The existing 115-kilovolt lines between Perryton, Cole and Texas Farms substations have been reconfigured and routed through the new Ochiltree County Substation. The new 230-kilovolt line provides a stronger transmission source to the Perryton area and improves reliability on the existing 115-kilovolt

transmission system.

- Hitchland-to-Woodward 345-kilovolt transmission line — Xcel Energy and Oklahoma Gas and Electric Company (OG&E), are constructing a new 345-kilovolt double-circuit transmission line from Xcel Energy's Hitchland Substation in Hansford County, just north of Gruver, Texas, to an OG&E substation near Woodward, Oklahoma. The approximately 120-mile transmission line will provide another transmission interconnection point to the eastern electric transmission grid. Construction started April 1. The interconnection with OG&E is expected to take place in February 2014.

- Ochiltree-to-Lipscomb 115-kilovolt transmission line — This project involves the construction of 20 miles of new transmission in Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties. The line will connect the existing Ochiltree County Substation north of Perryton to a new substation east of Booker. The project also includes a new connection to the existing Wade Substation located between the Ochiltree County Substation and the new substation near Booker.

The project will improve reliability of Xcel Energy's existing system in Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties and will allow new load on the system in the Perryton and Booker areas. The line will also mitigate low voltage and overload condi-

tions should the Hitchland-to-Ochiltree 230 kilovolt line go out of service. The project also includes a capacity upgrade at the Booker substation to allow for future load growth. An existing 50-year-old line segment between Perryton and Booker will be removed as part of this project. Construction will start in late 2014, and the line is expected to be in service in December 2015.

- Bowers-to-Howard 115-kilovolt transmission line — This line will enhance electric reliability to the existing and growing loads in Gray and Wheeler counties. The estimated 38-mile transmission line will run between the existing Bowers Substation, three miles west of Lefors and a mile north of FM 2375 in Gray County, and the existing Howard Substation, near the intersection of FM 2473 and South Osage Street in Wheeler. The Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) gave final approval for the line on June 19. The company is expecting to have the line in service in 2014.

US govt says it won't seek death penalty for Snowden

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Eric Holder has told the Russian government that the U.S. will not seek the death penalty for former National Security Agency systems analyst Edward Snowden.

In a letter dated July 23, the attorney general said the criminal charges Snowden faces do not carry the death penalty and that the U.S. will not seek the death penalty even if Snowden were charged with additional death penalty-eligible crimes.

Holder says his letter follows news reports that Snowden, who leaked information on largely secret electronic surveillance programs, has filed papers seeking temporary asylum in Russia on grounds that

if he were returned to the United States, he would be tortured and would face the death penalty.

The attorney general's letter was sent to Alexander Vladimirovich Kononov, the Russian minister of justice.

Holder's letter is part of an ongoing campaign by the U.S. government to get Snowden back.

The attorney general's letter may allay reported Russian concerns about how Snowden might be treated if he is deported to the U.S.

Some Russian politicians, including parliament speaker Sergei Naryshkin, have said Snowden should be granted asylum to protect him from the death penalty.

If Snowden were to go to a country that opposes the death penalty, providing assurances that the U.S. won't seek the death penalty may remove at least one obstacle to his return to the U.S.

"I can report that the

United States is prepared to provide to the Russian government the following assurances regarding the treatment Mr. Snowden would face upon return to the United States," Holder wrote.

"First, the United States would not seek the death penalty for Mr. Snowden should he return to the United States." In addition, "Mr. Snowden will not be tortured. Torture is unlawful in the United States," Holder's letter said.

The attorney general said that if Snowden returned to the U.S. he would promptly be brought before a civilian court and would receive "all the protections that United States law provides."

Holder also said that "we understand from press reports and prior conversations between our governments that Mr. Snowden believes that he is unable to travel out of Russia and must therefore take steps

to legalize his status. That is not accurate; he is able to travel."

Despite the revocation of Snowden's passport on June 22, Snowden remains a U.S. citizen and is eligible for a limited validity passport good for direct return to the United States, said the attorney general.

A spokesman for President Vladimir Putin said Russia has not budged from its refusal to extradite Snowden.

Snowden, who is believed to have been staying at the Moscow airport transit zone since June 23, applied for temporary asylum in Russia last week. The United States wants him sent home to face prosecution for espionage.

Asked by a reporter whether the government's position had changed, Dmitry Peskov told Russian news agencies that "Russia has never extradited anyone and never will." There is no U.S.-Russia extradition treaty.

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Doctor: Bombs in northern Pakistan market kill 23

PARACHINAR, Pakistan (AP) — A pair of bombs exploded in a busy market area Friday evening in northern Pakistan, tearing through crowds of shoppers grabbing last-minute items to break their daily fast during the holy month of Ramadan and killing 23 people, a doctor said.

The blast struck a market in the town of Parachinar, which sits in the Kurram tribal area that borders Afghanistan to the west.

Dead bodies quickly overwhelmed Parachinar's

hospital, as more than 100 people wounded in the blasts sought medical attention, said Dr. Zahid Hussain, who works at the hospital. Hussain said the bombs, which went off in quick succession, killed 23.

"We have no place to keep the wounded," the doctor said. "Many of them are lying on the hospital floor and on the lawn."

The two bombs ripped through the main bazaar in Parachinar when people were doing their evening shopping before the iftar meal that breaks the day of

fasting during Ramadan, police spokesman Fazal Naeem Khan said.

One bomb was believed to have been planted on a motorcycle and explosives experts were examining the site Friday night, he said.

The second bomb detonated about four minutes after the first, about 400 yards (365 meters) away from the initial blast, government official Javed Ali said.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the attack. The Kurram tribal region, like much of

northwest Pakistan, has been roiled by violence for years.

Taliban militants trying to overthrow the Pakistani government have carried out a vicious campaign of suicide bombings and shootings against Pakistan security forces and other targets.

Parachinar is also home to a large number of Shiite Muslims, which are a minority sect in Pakistan. Many Sunni militants do not view Shiites as true Muslims, sparking repeated fatal attacks.

Ariel Castro agrees to plea in Ohio kidnap case

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cleveland man accused of holding three women captive in his home for about a decade agreed to plead guilty Friday in a deal to avoid the death penalty.

In exchange, Ariel Castro would be sentenced to life without parole plus 1,000 years, prosecutors said.

Castro was in court Friday morning to enter the guilty plea. When asked if he understood he would never be released from prison, Castro said: "I do understand that, your honor." He added, "I knew I was pretty much going to get the book thrown at me."

Castro, wearing glasses for the first time in court, was far more interactive than in previous court appearances when he mostly kept his

head down and eyes closed. During Friday's hearing, he answered the judge's questions in a clear, intelligible voice, saying he understood the proceedings and that he would never be released from prison.

Castro, who was born in Puerto Rico, said he could read and understand English well but had trouble with comprehension.

"My addiction to pornography and my sexual problem has really taken a toll on my mind." He later said he had been a sexual abuse victim as a child, but the judge cut him off.

The deal comes more than a month after a statement issued on behalf of the women said they were "hopeful for a just and prompt resolution" and had "great faith in the prosecutor's office and the court."

Castro, 53, had been scheduled for trial Aug. 5 on a 977-count indictment. The indictment included two counts of aggravated murder related to accusations that

he punched and starved one woman until she miscarried.

He was accused of repeatedly restraining the women, sometimes chaining them to a pole in a basement, to a bedroom heater or inside a van.

The charges alleged Castro assaulted one woman with a vacuum cord around her neck when she tried to escape.

The three women disappeared separately between 2002 and 2004, when they were 14, 16 and 20 years old. Each said they had accepted a ride from Castro, who remained friends with the family of one of the women and even attended vigils over the years marking her disappearance.

The women escaped Castro's house May 6 when one of them kicked out part of a door and called to neighbors for help.

Castro was arrested within hours and has remained behind bars.

News that Amanda Berry, Gina Dejesus and Michelle

Knight had been found alive electrified the Cleveland area, where two of them were household names after years of searches, publicity and vigils. But elation soon turned to shock as allegations about their treatment began to emerge.

Castro fathered a 6-year-old daughter with Berry, authorities said. They allege that on the day the child was born, Christmas 2006, Castro raped one of the other women, who had helped deliver the baby.

Berry told authorities that she, her child and the other women never saw a doctor during their captivity.

Knight said her five pregnancies ended after Castro starved and repeatedly punched her. The Associated Press does not usually identify people who may be victims of sexual assault, but the names of the three women were widely circulated after they disappeared, and they appeared in an online video thanking the public for its support.

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Egypt accuses ousted president in 2011 jailbreak

CAIRO (AP) — Prosecutors opened an investigation of ousted President Mohammed Morsi on charges including murder and conspiracy with the Palestinian militant group Hamas, fueling tensions amid a showdown in the streets between tens of thousands of backers of the military and supporters calling for the Islamist leader's reinstatement.

Clashes between Morsi supporters and opponents erupted outside a major mosque in the coastal city of Alexandria, with the two sides throwing stones and firing birdshot at each other. Police and army forces lobbed tear gas and deployed soldiers but were unable to break up the fighting, which killed two people and injured 24. Minor scuffles erupted in a Cairo neighborhood and in the Nile Delta city of Damietta with at least 18 injured, according to health officials.

The announcement of the case against Morsi, which is likely to pave the way to a formal indictment, was the first word on his legal status since the military deposed him on July 3. For more than three weeks, the Islamist leader has been held by the military in a secret location, incommunicado.

Supporters of Morsi denied the charges against him, calling them politically motivated but vowed to keep their protests peaceful.

On Friday, a spokesman for Morsi's Muslim Brotherhood said the move to prosecute Morsi showed "the complete bankruptcy of the leaders of the bloody coup."

Egyptians "reject the return of the dictatorial police state and all the repression, tyranny and theft it entails," Ahmed Aref said in a state-

ment. The accusations are connected to a prison break during the 2011 uprising against autocrat Hosni Mubarak in which gunmen attacked a prison northwest of Cairo, freeing prisoners including Morsi and around 30 other figures from his Muslim Brotherhood. The prosecutors allege Morsi and the Brotherhood worked with Hamas to carry out the break, in which 14 guards were killed.

The U.S. State Department spokeswoman Jen Psaki expressed deep concern about reports of Morsi's detention.

"I can't speak to the specific charges. But we do believe that it is important that there be a process to work toward his release," she said. "Clearly, this process should respect the personal security of him and take into account the volatile political situation in Egypt and that's where our focus is. We have conveyed publicly and privately that his personal security and treatment is of utmost importance."

Massive crowds, meanwhile, poured into main squares in Cairo and other cities in support of the military after the army chief Gen. Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi called for rallies. El-Sissi said days earlier he hoped for a giant public turnout to give him a mandate to stop "violence and terrorism," raising speculation he may be planning a crackdown on pro-Morsi protests.

At the same time, crowds of Islamist backers of Morsi massed at their own rallies,

part of what the Brotherhood and its allies had previously said would be their biggest protests to date to demand the reinstatement of the president. El-Sissi's call days earlier may have been in part aimed to overwhelm the Islamist numbers in Friday's rallies, as each side tries to show the depth of its public support.

The rival shows of strength only deepen the country's divisions since Morsi's fall. Clashes and fistfights broke out between the rival camps in Alexandria, with two killed and 24 injured, according to health official Mohammed Abu Suleiman. Skirmishes also broke out in the Mediterranean coastal city of Damietta and a Cairo neighborhood that left a combined 18 injured, Health Ministry spokesman Khaled el-Khatteeb said.

El-Sissi deposed Morsi after four days of giant protests by millions of Egyptians demanding the removal of the country's first freely elected president following months of political standoff between him and the largely secular opposition. Since then, Islamists have been holding sit-ins and rallies daily.

State media and pro-military private TV stations have been fiercely promoting the el-Sissi rallies, pumping up a nationalist fervor.

El-Sissi's portrait pervaded the crowds of tens of thousands in Cairo's central Tahrir Square: the smiling general in sunglasses on posters proclaiming "the love of the people," a combination photo of the general and a lion on lanyards hanging from people's necks, a picture of his face photoshopped into a 1-pound note of currency.

"The people, the source of all power, mandate the army and police to purge

terrorism," read a giant banner stretched across one entrance to Tahrir. Three tanks guarded another street leading into the square, and helicopters swooped overhead.

Security was heavy after el-Sissi vowed to protect the rallies from attacks by rivals. Tanks guarded one entrance to Tahrir and police were stationed at other parts. "The people give their mandate," read signs touted by many in the crowd.

"The army is here to protect the people, they don't lie," said Ezzat Fahmi, a 38-year-old in the crowd. He said el-Sissi had to call Friday's rallies "so the entire world can see that the Egyptian people don't want the Brotherhood anymore."

Across town in eastern Cairo, thousands of pro-Morsi supporters packed a sit-in camp outside Rabaa al-Adawiyah mosque, chanting against el-Sissi and vowing to continue their push for Morsi's return.

The Muslim Brotherhood and allies, dubbing themselves as the anti-coup coalition, called the timing of the charges against Morsi "a malicious attempt to incite public opinion" and drag his supporters into violent protests. The statement vowed not to let that happen.

Maged Osman, a 25-year-old Morsi supporter, said el-Sissi's call for rival rallies won't silence his crowd.

"He is fueling more anger from one sector against another sector," he said.

Clashes have repeatedly erupted the past three weeks pitting Morsi supporters against his opponents or security forces. Each side blames the other for sparking violence, and people in both camps have been seen carrying weapons. On Fri-

day, security forces in the Nile Delta city of Mahalla said they seized equipment and tools designed to create homemade guns, as well as guns and ammunition in an apartment. A security official said the tools and guns were seized following a tip that the products were being transported to pro-Morsi supporters. The official was speaking on condition of anonymity because he wasn't authorized to release the information.

It remains unclear what steps the military is planning after Friday's show of public strength. The most explosive step would be if it were to try to break up sit-ins by Islamists who have been camped out at locations in Cairo and other cities for weeks.

The military also could move to arrest more than a dozen Brotherhood figures who have arrest warrants against them. Or it could

take firmer action to stop any sign of violence by Islamist protesters — though the Morsi camp says it is the one targeted by attacks. The word "wanted" in English was plastered across photos of a number of Brotherhood leaders and allies who are facing arrest warrants on the front page of the state-owned Al-Akhbar newspaper. Many of them are believed to be taking refuge in the Rabaa al-Adawiyah sit-in.

At the same time, Islamic militants have stepped up attacks on the army and police in the Sinai Peninsula. More than 180 people have been killed in Egypt since Morsi's fall.

The prosecutors' announcement on Morsi could signal a greater move to go after the Brotherhood in courts. Besides Morsi, five other senior figures from the group have been detained.

had been constructing air bases and fields since war broke out in Europe in 1939. Lutz said that the way she learned of America's entry into the war, the attack on Pearl Harbor, was when she was at a dinner with her friend.

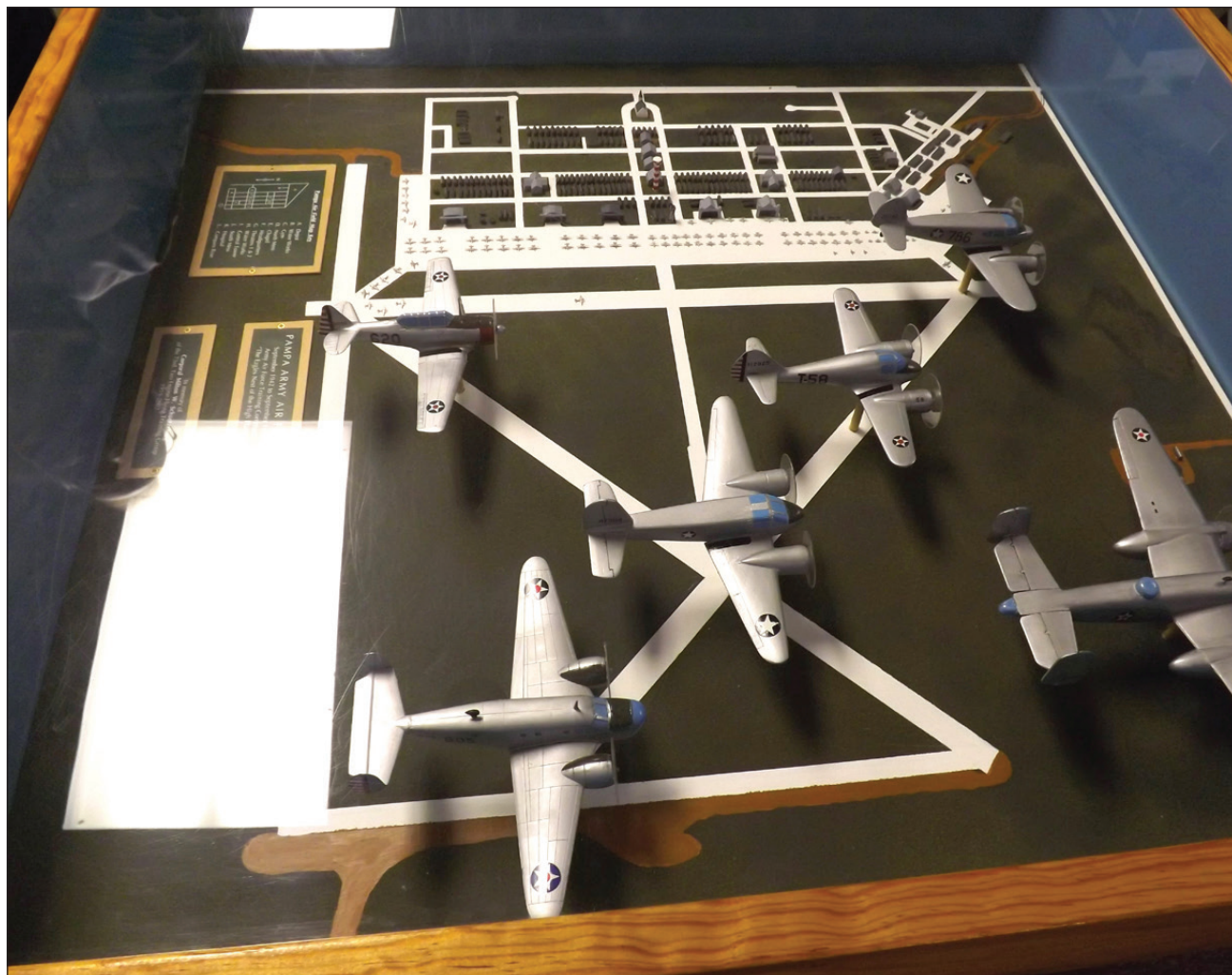
"We were at dinner with some friends who had come up from one of the air bases," Lutz said. "We had just ordered and a jeep rolled up, and the military police got out and came in and asked all the soldiers to stand and return to their base immediately. That was when Pearl Harbor was hit."

Lutz said that event was the beginning of the war for her, even though she knew it had started in Europe in 1939. Lutz said the town of Pampa was very supportive of the troops during the war.

"When they built that air base, they couldn't have built it anywhere where the townspeople have endured the war and helped the boys more," Lutz said. "I'm sure every Sunday, any boy they could have gotten in a house at Sunday dinner with the families."

Lutz said that her husband was at many airbases but said the hospitality and food for the airbase was just as good as anywhere. Lutz said that the public would catch a bus and drive over to the Pampa Army Airfield. After the dance they drove back to town. Lutz said that while everyone was wonderful to the men at the air base, she said one soldier did joke about having steak so much.

"One fella who sat across from him (Ed) said if we have steak anymore for dinner..." Lutz said. "They had steak from the farmers, and fresh vegetables. The people were just wonderful, and they (the soldiers) appreciated it." Lutz said that the soldiers were "ornery" at times. One of the instances she described was when the guys would stand on the corner, look up then go to eye level and talk and then

stare back up again. There wouldn't be anything but they had people looking up across town.

Ed Lutz in the military

The winters at the air base were very cold. Ed said that the English handled the cold better than Americans. But Ed was used to the cold because he was from Cleveland, Ohio.

The Pampa Army Airfield also had sections open to the public. They had a high altitude chamber that the public could try. They also had a flight simulator that was open to the public. Lutz said that normally these were open on Sundays and the security enforcement was still relatively high. Throughout the war Lutz said that she can't remember anybody who wasn't working for the war effort.

"I don't remember anybody who wasn't doing something for the war," Lutz said. "Knitting hats, knitting scarves, knitting socks, taking in food

or anything [to help the war]."

After the war, Ed was a test pilot after his six-month tour. Ed was in the reserves for 30 years after. He got called to Vietnam to be a helicopter pilot.

"He got orders for Vietnam, and he went in and asked what are they for," Lutz said. "And they said it was for a helicopter pilot. Ed said, 'I am the farthest thing from a helicopter pilot, I flew a four-engine, B-17 G-heavy bomber. I don't know anything about flying a helicopter. So they didn't take him.'"

During his tour he went on two consecutive 16-hour missions over two days flying and described the feeling two his wife.

"He said at the end of that (the second) mission he couldn't stand up or couldn't walk for a while," Lutz said. "He couldn't stretch his legs. They sat in the plane flying for 16-hours two days in a row, that was the only

time he had doubled missions that long."

His first mission and his last mission were to the Nazi headquarters in Berlin. After getting out of the service, Ed worked at the Cleveland Museum of Art for 30 years.

Lutz wasn't the only lady from Pampa who married a soldier. Though unconfirmed, it is said that roughly 25 ladies from Pampa married a soldier boy.

Lutz misses how the United States was during the 1940s.

"This is such a wonderful country, I grieve for it," Lutz said. "The 1940s, everybody everywhere was working for the war.

Pampa people, that was all that was on their minds, 'support America.' It was a wonderful place to be.



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I was so happy to be in Pampa at the time, and live here."

Ed passed away in 2008 and is buried in Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. There is a note at his grave site that says his unit received the Presidential Citation for being the most efficient bombing unit.

The airfield today

Construction on the air base started on June 1, 1942 and the arrival of the first planes were on Nov. 27, 1942. The airbase was open until 1945. Over time the property of the airfield was been purchased by Lindel Farms who now operates there. There is now a historical marker that designates where it is and in the horizon from the farm a water tower is still standing from the Pampa Army Airfield.

The concrete slabs from where the hangars formerly sat are still there and have farm buildings on top of it. Now the only visible structure is a water tower. There was a hangar, but it is said, also unconfirmed, it was destroyed by a tornado. The water tower is not just a marker of the Pampa Army Airfield, but it marks a time in history where the United States was unified and focused on "the bad guys."

■ Playing sports at an early age teaches life lessons.

This past week I covered the Pampa All-Stars playoff run in the Cal Ripken World Series tournament. The game came to an abrupt end in the seventh inning and the Pampa All-Stars lost.

I have covered many games in my short career, including a historic play-off run for the West Texas A&M Buffs last year in college. But this was the first time that I was so stunned that I couldn't even muster up questions for the coach because I couldn't believe it was the end of the game. But as I stood outside the dugout and overheard some of Pampa All-Stars coach Ryan Cloud's speech to the teary-eyed 9 and 10-year-olds in the dugout, the content of his speech was much more than just coaching up a team after a heartbreaking loss.

Cloud didn't talk to his team about the error on the final play of the game, and he didn't talk to them about what the other team did well to defeat the Pampa All-Stars. Cloud was telling the team that they have grown up a lot in this tournament, and the lessons they take from this tournament and baseball are going to shape them into great husbands and fathers one day. Then, in a quick chant, he asked the boys two questions, if they learned a little about baseball, and if they learned a lot about life. Of course, the young ball players yelled yes to both.

In my post-game conversation with Cloud, he told me that the lessons these kids take away from baseball are not just lessons in baseball, but lessons in life.

He could not have been more accurate with that statement. It is true with any sport. When I asked him what he told the youngster who threw the ball after the game he said that he told him, "It's life, you strike out sometimes and you win it all some-times." As adults we all know this.

Another lesson from baseball that these guys can take in life is that you don't go after everything that looks like it can be a hit. Too often we are looking for the home run hit in our options, whether it's a job, a car, a house or any important life decision. A couple year's ago, my wife (who was my girlfriend at the time) and I were looking to leave the apartment life and move into a house. We took the first one that came up, which was a duplex.

Upon moving in we realized that the house was too small, the win-

dow unit in our house didn't cool the entire area and the bathroom wasn't the best (more my wife's complaint than mine). Although we weren't entirely happy, we were grateful we had the house we did and stayed there two years because of financial and life circumstances.

But the lesson taken away from this was that we swung at the first pitch thrown at us, rather than getting to know the pitcher tendencies (looking at all our options) and swinging at the best one for us.

A lesson that Cloud also wanted the boys to learn was that they shouldn't dwell on this loss, but learn from it and change tomorrow. One of my main problems with the sports young kids play, such as the introductory games, is that they don't keep score. A lot of parents are on the fence about this, and while I don't have any kids right now, I would want my children to play games where scores are kept. Not so when they lose they feel like losers, but they learn what it is like when things don't go their way. To go with Cloud's lesson, if it doesn't go your way, what can you do today or tomorrow to make it go your way in the future.

If kids are taught everyone is a winner at an early age, the risk is a sense of entitlement. But I see the argument to be made against my side. When children lose, and lose a lot, you run the risk of low confidence and self-esteem. That is where good coaching and good parenting comes in to make sure the youngsters keep their chins up.

In Bobby Valentine's speech made on the 18th of this month, Mr. Valentine said that reality is an important lesson for kids. They need to know their role on the team and know that every position is important. When I thought of this I thought of football (which NFL preseason starts on Aug. 4, by the way, not to mention Harvester football shortly after). Everyone gives the credit of games to the quarterbacks, the running backs, the wide receivers and those awesome players who play on defense.

Basically if you're the star on the team, you are going to get credit for the wins. But the players people tend to

forget about are guys like the offensive lineman, and the truly consistent players. Without good offensive lineman, and Cowboy fans know this, the quarterback is running for his life and can't get his job done. But where this relates to life is that everyone you work with, both in school and at your career, is an important member of your team.

When you see your favorite music artist in concert, not all of them know how to set the stage to where they sound great up there. That's why they have sound techs that who are paid to do that.

This paper doesn't come out five times a week without our press workers, just like the press workers have nothing to run without editorial. I can't forget about our advertising and the lovely ladies who work the front desks to help the subscribers keep everything in order. Everybody is important to every team, whether you're in sports, on a school project or in your career.

In closing I could have talked about other lessons in sports, but you get the idea. I admit that the guys in sports we hear about on TV don't always behave themselves. Those are the guys who take what they do for granted, but not all of the players are like that because they've learned lessons from their craft.

In a message to the Pampa All-Stars and everyone who has been down in life, to quote legendary Green Bay Packers head coach Vince Lombardi, "The greatest accomplishment is not in never falling, but in rising again after you fall."

Falcons, Ryan agree on 5-year contract extension

FLOWERY BRANCH, Ga. (AP) — Now that he's wearing a \$100 million smile, quarterback Matt Ryan is ready to get back to work for the Atlanta Falcons.

"I've always not worried about the business side of it," Ryan said. "I really think as a player, if you're hung up or worried about that or thinking about all those things, you're taking away from what you should be doing."

Ryan and the Falcons agreed to a five-year contract extension on Thursday that was being finalized as he led the offense through practice on the first day of training camp.

A person familiar with the situation says Ryan's ex-

tension is for \$103.75 million deal, with \$59 million guaranteed. The person said Ryan will average \$20.75 million during the first three years of the extension. The person spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because the terms of the deal had not been announced.

Ryan, 28, is entering the sixth and final season of his original rookie contract and will earn a \$10 million salary.

The NFL's No. 3 overall draft pick of 2008, last season Ryan was invited to the Pro Bowl for the second time. He completed 68.6 percent of his passes, tops in the NFL.

New OSU O.C. says he is ready

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Mike Yurcich realizes he has been given an opportunity many small-college coaches dream about. Plucked from obscurity at NCAA Division II Shippensburg (Pa.) to become the offensive coordinator at Football Bowl Subdivision power Oklahoma State, Yurcich said Thursday he's grateful to be where he's at, while acknowledging he's also somewhat anxious for the chance to show what he can do at college football's highest level.

Francis (Ind.). After that, he spent six years at Edinboro (Pa.), becoming the offensive coordinator in 2006. In 2011, he became Shippensburg's offensive coordinator and his first team set school records for points, touchdowns, total plays, first downs and total offense. His second Shippensburg team led Division II in total offense at 529.2 yards per game, was second nationally in scoring (46.9 points per game) and passing offense (387.7 yards per game).

"That's a big jump, when you (work in) Division II and now you're in the Big 12 and you see the guys that are on the roster here," Yurcich said during head coach Mike Gundy's annual media outing at Karsten Creek Golf Club.

Those numbers — along with the fact that Yurcich ran a system similar to that run by Oklahoma State's two most recent offensive coordinators, Dana Horgensen and Todd Monken — caught Gundy's attention after Monken left to become the head coach at Southern Mississippi.

"They've done a heck of a job recruiting. You try not to let your jaw hit the ground, that sort of thing, but our guys are the best in the country. It's very special for me to be able to coach that type of athlete."

"When you have a pool of coordinators to choose from, and then you see how many of those guys will run the offense that we have and not their own system, that pool decreases dramatically," Gundy said. "We wanted a play caller with quarterback experience. Played the position. Coached the position. Coached wide receivers. Had been in a fast-paced offense. So it was really a good fit for us and I liked his personality when I spent time with him."

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Bail for Hernandez associate set at \$500K

ATTLEBORO, Mass. (AP) — A judge set bail Friday at \$500,000 cash for a man prosecutors say was with Aaron Hernandez on the night the former New England Patriots player's friend was shot to death.

Ernest Wallace appeared in Attleboro District Court on a charge of being an accessory after the fact to murder in connection with Odin Lloyd's killing. Defense attorney David Meier had sought bail of \$10,000, arguing Wallace wasn't a flight risk and wanted to return to his family in Florida.

But prosecutors asked for \$1 million bail, saying Wallace was at risk of fleeing and had a long criminal history that included drug convictions.

Meier wouldn't comment after court, including about whether his client expected to make bail. Wallace, who had previously pleaded not guilty, was taken back into custody following the hearing.

Gregg Miliote, a spokesman for Bristol County District Attorney Samuel Sutter, said after the hearing that prosecutors were pleased with the bail.

Hernandez has pleaded not guilty to murder in the death of Lloyd, a 27-year-old Boston semi-professional football player whose body was found June 17 in an industrial park about a mile from Hernandez's home. The two men were friends and Lloyd was dating the sister of Hernandez' girlfriend.

Friday's hearing followed the release of court documents a day earlier that included photos of Hernandez in his home, holding what authorities have said was a gun, both before and minutes after Lloyd's homicide.

The photos came from Hernandez's home video surveillance system and are among evidence authorities have obtained with search warrants.

Four pictures show Hernandez near the entrance to his basement holding a gun shortly after Lloyd was killed, according to a court affidavit. Two other photos show what authorities say is Hernandez in his living room, a few hours before Lloyd's killing, also holding what they say is a gun.

Authorities believe Lloyd was killed with a .45-caliber Glock, which they have said hasn't been recovered. Prosecutors have said that a gun Hernandez is seen holding in the home surveillance appears to be a Glock.

Authorities recovered an ammunition clip for .45 caliber bullets in Hernandez's Hummer as well as ammunition of the same caliber inside a condo he rented in Franklin, Mass.

Prosecutors say Hernandez orchestrated Lloyd's killing because he was upset at him for talking to people Hernandez had problems with at a nightclub a few days earlier.

They say Hernandez and two associates, Wallace and Carlos Ortiz, drove with Lloyd to the North Attleborough industrial park. Authorities have not said who fired the shots, but documents filed in Florida portray the former Patriot as the triggerman. According to the records, Ortiz told police that Wallace said Hernandez fired the shots.

A probable cause hearing for Hernandez is scheduled for Aug. 22. He will continue to be held without bail until then.

Newton says focus on winning, not contract

SPARTANBURG, S.C. (AP) — Cam Newton says the only thing on his mind as the Panthers open training camp is a three-letter word: Win.

Sure, Newton is aware of the \$100 million contracts awarded this offseason to fellow NFL quarterbacks Joe Flacco and Matt Ryan — and the hefty deal that could await him after the season.

But Carolina's franchise signal caller says a big contract isn't what motivates him entering year three.

On seeing Ryan's five-year, \$103.75 million extension, Newton shrugged saying "I didn't think anything. Good for him."

Under the new CBA, Newton isn't eligible for a contract extension until after this season.

But first he might have to prove he can win at the NFL level.

He's 13-19 as a starter and hasn't led Carolina to the playoffs.

Earnhardt still in the market for sponsor

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — For sale by owner: Major sponsorship for NASCAR's most popular driver.

Act fast, time is running out.

Dale Earnhardt Jr. is not only looking for his first win of the season, he's still hunting for a big-bucks sponsor for 12 Sprint Cup races this season.

Earnhardt said he's not worried, a sign that perhaps Hendrick Motorsports has a deal on the horizon.

"It is important to try to fill out what we have this season and we will," Earnhardt said Friday at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. "I don't have any doubt at all that we will get

that done. I think we almost have to look forward beyond that to try to find out who is going to be the partner that we can put a long term deal together that matches up with what we want to do in the future."

LB Cushing back for Texans after knee injury

HOUSTON (AP) — Linebacker Brian Cushing had never dealt with a major injury before and wasn't sure how he'd handle missing Houston's last 11 games after knee surgery last season.

Exactly a week later, he found motivation when his son Cayden was born. When his rehabilitation got tough, his first thought was that he had to get better so his son could see him play.

Cushing was back on the field for Houston's first day of training camp Friday and says he feels great. The Texans are taking it slow with Cushing, but they hope he returns as the player he was before the injury when he finished with 114 tackles and four sacks in 2011.

10-year-old girl qualifies for motocross race

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A 10-year-old girl from Somerville will be competing in a large national motocross race starting next week. WMC-TV reports that Gracie Sparks has qualified for the AMA Amateur National Motocross Championships at Loretta Lynn's Ranch in Hurricane Mills.

The race runs from July 29 through Aug. 3.

Sparks, who has been riding since she was 7 years old, earned one of just 1,446 qualifying positions for the race.

According to the race's website, she is one of about 25 riders who qualified in the girls' 9 to 11 age group.



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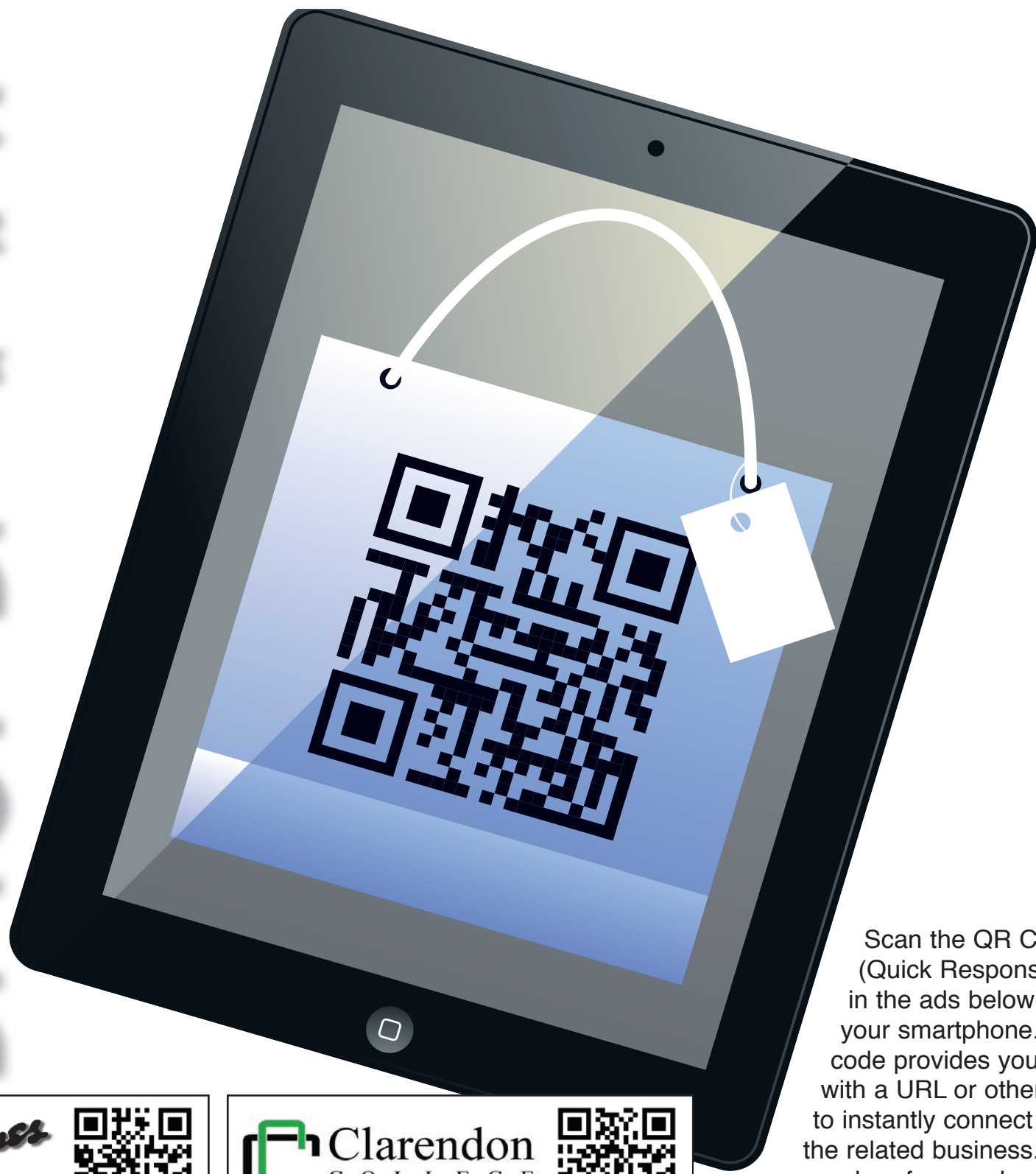
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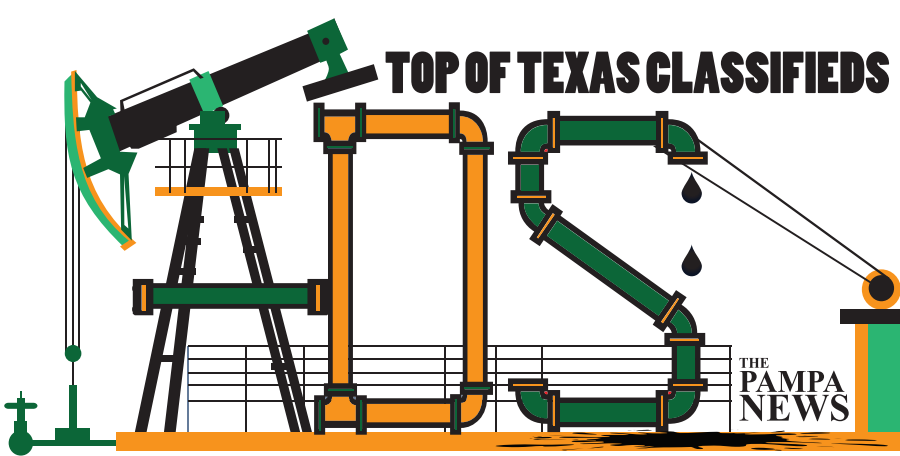

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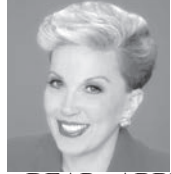


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Dear Abby...
