## Making the scary not so scary

■ Children who are victims or witnesses to crimes can tell their stories to specially trained, caring advocates.

McKenzie Price said the children she meets at her job are the bravest kids she will ever know. "Kids have more courage than anybody might think," she said.

Price is a forensics interviewer for The Bridge, a children's advocacy center that provides videotaped interviews of children who are victims or witnesses of a crime. She is one of four forensics interviewers who works for the Amarillo-based nonprofit agency, which has an interview room at The Brown Alliance for Children on North Ballard Street.

The agency serves 26 counties in the Panhandle and, along with Amarillo and Pampa, has sites in Dumas and Hereford. It is working on getting another site in Childress, Price said.

Forensics interviewers are qualified to conduct the same interviews with minors that can be performed by law enforcement officers of Child Protection Services workers.

The difference is this: Price and her colleagues are specially trained to work with children. And, with one videotaped interviewed, the child isn't subjected to multiple interviews by investigating agencies.

An important part of her job is putting the children at ease, she said. In the front of the office is a play area with stuffed animals that Price calls the "living room."

Children are offered juice and snacks.

Angela was 14 years old and 9 months pregnant. She was referred to The Bridge on a report stating the father of the unborn child was her mother's 32-year-old boy-

During the interview, Angela disclosed she had been in a relationship with "Chris" for more than a year, and that her mother knew about some of the things that had happened. Angela said she loved Chris, who told her he would marry her when she was old enough.

After the birth of her baby, Angela threatened to hurt herself. Angela and the baby are now in separate foster homes, although a case worker is making it possible for Angela to care for her child as much as she can. She is going through counseling and her mental health is improving, Price

AUSTIN (AP) Health officials in Texas say they've had 122 reports of people being sickened in a cyclospora outbreak that spans 15 states so far.

Texas switched to the lethal, single-dose sedative last year after one of the drugs used in its three-drug execution process became difficult to obtain and the state's supply expired.

Other death-penalty states have encountered similar problems after some drug suppliers barred the drugs' use for executions or have refused, under pressure from deathpenalty opponents, to sell or manufacture drugs for use in executions.

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## White House briefings: where's the news?

A former Obama White House press aide is calling for an end to the White House's daily press briefings. "The daily briefing has become a worthless chore for reporters, an embarrassing nuisance to administration staff, and a source of added

friction between the two camps,' Reid Cherlin wrote in New Republic. "It's time **SAUNDERS** to do the humane, obvious

thing and get rid of it altogether.' Amen to that.

My complaints about the briefings are different from Cherlin's. I don't think there's enough friction between the camps. As I watched Monday's briefing on streaming video, I spied a number of journalists looking at or typing on their phones. The press corps and White House spokesman seem like an old married couple; one knows what the other is going to say before the other says it.

The press corps doesn't come off well in many exchanges. President Barack Obama met for lunch with Hillary Clinton. America wants to know: What was on the menu? Spokesman Josh Earnest was ready with an answer: grilled chicken, pasta jambalaya and salad.

There's this awful trend in journalism that, in the rush not to be late, produces stories that preview what is going to happen. Then when, say, a speech is over, it's already old news, so no one covers it.

So at the briefings, reporters ask: What will the president say?

Then there's the inevitable answer: "I don't want to get ahead of the president's speech tomorrow.'

Your average American would want to know why an administration does what it does, yet your average journalist wants to know when. In its first interview

with the president since 2010, The New York

Times asked the president when he would announce his decision on the Keystone pipeline and when he would name a successor to Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke. When reporters stray

from the usual routine, it doesn't do much good. On Monday, CBS

News correspondent Major Garrett tried to get a yes or no answer as to whether the administration thinks the Egyptian military is responsible for the violence that has left so many dead.

Garrett's tactic enabled Earnest to engage in a typical press secretary dodge referring to other officials' cryptic statements. Another handy tool: telling reporters to talk to another press secretary in a different department.

It cannot be good for reporters to just sit there as press secretaries spin and drill the same old talking points without saying anything revealing.

As Cherlin wrote, if there were a Hippocratic oath for press secretaries at daily briefings, it would begin: "First, make no news.'

No problem there; the beat reporters know the rules, including what not to ask. After George Zimmerman and his family received death threats, Gabe Finger, a high-school intern at The Daily Caller, asked press secretary Jay Carney whether the president planned on taking any action to protect the Zimmermans or were they "on their own."

Carney answered that he was not aware of any threats — another favorite dodge in this White House.

Then he hit the intern for making a "ridiculous statement." You see, Finger asked a question that a conservative might ask. And to this White House, with this press corps, that is utterly ridicu-

Obamacare or socialized medicine, but I think it is a crying shame when all citizens of the richest country in the world do not have health insurance.


It might take a little time to raise all the money they need for their treatments,

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## When life hits you like a roundhouse kick

Sometimes life hits you like a roundhouse kick, reminding you about what really matters. That happened to me this past week with the life, bravery and fighting spirit of 35-year-old

Jen Bulik. I was just about to continue my series on Thomas Jefferson and public education, when I read Jen's story.

(I'll pick up that series again in two weeks, after I highlight another amazing story of sacrifice and leadership.)

Last December, Jen went to her doctor with a cough, and the young hairdresser was diagnosed with pneumonia. When the cough persisted, doctors ran more tests and discovered that Jen had stage 4 lung cancer, according to the New York Daily News.

After five months of intense treatment, Jen's doctors had to bring her the unfortunate news that it wasn't helping and that she had six months to live, at the most. Jen and her family were, of course, devastated, and so was her fiance, Jeff Lang.

But Jen wasn't ready to give up. With a positive and hopeful push forward, she let it be known that there was something that she wanted more than anything else: to marry Jeff. So she told her fiance: "Let's get married. I want to focus on life."

With virtually no time to plan, Jen discarded her dream wedding and settled on a small ceremony in her parents' backyard, with a few folding tables and a barbecue reception.

That's when Bay Area wedding planner Erica Ota heard of Jen's situation. Ota decided to call up her reserves and offer Jen the wedding that she had dreamed about since she was a young girl.

In just 12 days, Ota recruited more than 30 vendors, who donated about \$50,000 worth of products and services, including a jazz band and a parade, which was planned by Jen's neighbors, according to NBC Bay Area.

The reception would be garnished with hundreds of feet of lighting so it would look "like a fantasy land," Ota described. And the tables would be decorated with Jen's favorites: succulents - beautiful and tough drought-tolerant plants and flowers, just like the

fighter she is. Ota explained: "It was my goal for them not to pay a dime. I thought to myself, 'These people have already suffered enough. Why not be able to give them a gift, a wonderful gift that they and their families will never be able to forget?""

She added: "The thing is they're such simple people — so positive and so hopeful — and they didn't ask for anything from anybody. But they deserve this and more. ... They are truly wonderful people with good hearts and good souls."

Jen and Jeff were married July 27 in a fairy tale wedding at a local park, where they exchanged their vows under some beautiful redwood trees. According to the San Jose Mercury News, when they did, they shouted, "I do!"

And then St. Gabriel's Celestial Brass Band led the marital party on a jazz march to Jen's parents' backyard, where they celebrated their love and marriage with 120 family members and friends in a dream reception. And they danced into the night under the twinkling of thousands of strung lights and the

There are so many amazing and courageous life stories going on right now, I know. But I suppose this one stood out to me because I believe in fighting against all odds and for the things that matter most, such as love, marriage and family.

I'm not a theologian. I can't explain why bad things happen to good people or, for that matter, why good things happen to bad people. (See my good friend Randy Alcorn's book "If God Is Good: Faith in the Midst of Suffering and Evil" for a surprisingly insightful treatise on that issue and much more. Go to http:// www.epm.org.)

But this much I know: As my 92-year-old mom wrote in her autobiography, "Acts of Kindness: My Story," "bad things happen to good people, but good people can survive bad things with God's help.'

As difficult and even cruel as life can be, the truth is that we must strive with hope and optimism until we can no longer. And when we've done all we can do, we must remember that our ultimate survival and healing are offered beyond this life with God's help.

Jesus said it this way: "I am the Resurrection and the Life. He (or she) who believes in Me will live even though he (or she) dies."

His words remind me of a poem titled "What Cancer Can't Do," which explains its limitations:

'Cancer is so limited. It cannot cripple love. It cannot shatter hope. It cannot corrode faith. It cannot eat away peace. It cannot destroy confidence. It cannot kill friendship. It cannot shut out memories. It cannot silence courage. It cannot invade the soul. It cannot reduce eternal life. It cannot quench the spirit. It cannot lessen the power of the resurrection. Amen - amen.'

Two things in particular stand out about Jen's situation to me.

First, as Ota put it, "there are opportunities every day to do extraordinary things for other people." She said: "This was an opportunity I saw to do something extraordinary for somebody else. So why not?'

This story reminds me that we're created for community. We're called to be a blessing to others; we shouldn't be consumed merely with

2014.

There were 22 attacks on U.S. and NATO troops in 2011, 48 in 2012, then only seven attacks as of July. That's compared with 20 this time last year, according to Pentagon spokesman Navy Cmdr. Bill Speaks.

The Pentagon report also reclassified nearly a dozen previous attacks on coalition troops and Afghans patrolling with them as insider violence, which raised the number of attacks from 88 to a total of 102 from 2007 through 2012.

A total of 144 NATO troops — 92 of them Americans — died in those attacks. Seventy of the attacks were aimed solely at U.S. troops.

A senior coalition intelligence official said the incidents had been reclassified in some cases because new evidence came to light, like an Afghan soldier being arrested for acting as a Taliban infiltrator and admitting to staging past attacks.

The official spoke on condition of anonymity because the official was not authorized to discuss the review process by name.

A count kept by The Associated Press has 72 troops from the U.S.-led NATO coalition killed by insider attack from January 2012 to July 2013, including nine so far this year.

To help stem insider attacks, both NATO and Afghan security forces devoted more counterintelligence resources to monitor communications by Afghan troops on leave, including whom those troops associated with when visiting family at home. The Pentagon report said U.S. counterintelligence teams identified 85 Afghans suspected of posing an insider threat and removed them from their posts, while several dozen more were being monitored.

"I make a point to get to know everyone on this base who carries a gun," Bourbeau said, a reporter beside him as he approached the Afghan guard at the main gate, hand outstretched to shake the Afghan's hand.

Bourbeau was one of a few dozen Marines living at Camp Alamo, a small base next to Camp Garmser, which houses several hundred members of the 1st

It was one of those Afghan troops Bourbeau had befriended who saved a group of expatriate contractors when a young recruit enraged over an anti-Muslim film had grabbed a gun, climbed a watch tower and opened fire on their truck as they left the adjacent U.S.

"He was a young kid who had just seen television for the first time in his life the night before," Bourbeau

The film on Afghan TV that night was the same one that triggered protests across the Middle East around the anniversary of 9/11 last fall. Afghan army Sgt. Zarif

Ali heard the shooting and charged the watch tower to protect the American Marines he assumed were the "He'd been shooting to-

ward the Americans from the tower, so I aimed my weapon at him and told him to come down" or be shot, Ali said.

The young recruit gave himself up, and the sergeant won the trust of the Americans and a promotion from the Afghan army.

There is far less trust at the small U.S. outpost located next to an Afghan army and police post in the small town of Garmser, where an Afghan teenager killed three Marines last August.

The teenager, employed by the Afghans, had free run of the once-open base. After the attack, the Marines installed a checkpoint and barbed wire to divide the Americans from the Afghans, and posted 24-hour guards.

## With 3 'hops,' NSA gets millions of phone records

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama's national security team acknowledged for the first time Wednesday that, when investigating one suspected terrorist, it can read and store the phone records of millions of Americans.

Since it was revealed recently that the National phone records of every American into a database, the Obama administrathat such records are rarely searched and, when they are, officials target only suspected international terrorists.

Congress on Wednesday showed how easy it is for Americans with no connection to terrorism to unwittingly have their calling patterns analyzed by the government.

It hinges on what's known as "hop" or "chain" analysis. When the NSA identifies a suspect, it can look not just at his phone records, but also the records of everyone he calls, privacy protections and everyone who calls those national security," Robert people and everyone who calls those people.
