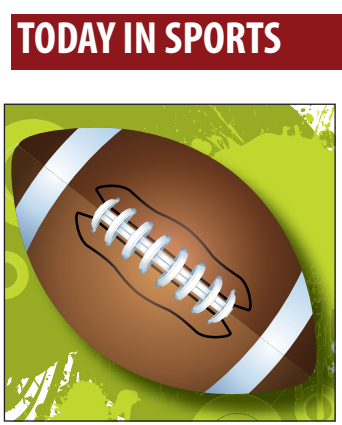

## The beginning of a beautiful, medical friendship



### PRMC and Borger's Golden Plains Community Hospital start partnership.

 When Pampa Regional Medical Center Chief Executive Officer Brad Morse came to town, his first order of business was to make the medical situation in Pampa even better. With Borger a half hour drive away from Pampa, he decided to see if there was any way for the medical centers of Pampa and Borger to work together.

"When I first got here I went over to Borger and said 'Is there anything we can do together,'" Morse said. "We are only 30 miles apart so it makes sense to at least try to be friends. So we talked about possibly sharing an ear/nose/throat doctor.  
 "There wouldn't be enough work in just Pampa or just Borger to have that specialty and keep them 100 percent busy. So we decided to start searching for a doc-

tor like that."  
 The partnership between the medical centers of Borger and Pampa are in no way a merger and there is not a financial combination. The only sharing in the costs will come with the paying for a shared physician.  
 "We found someone who is amiable to both places, we decided to split the expenses bringing that person here and keeping them here," Morse said. "When he is starting out he is going to work two and a half days in Borger and two and a half days here."

## Commissioners discuss heliport, courthouse landscaping

Pampa residents can take a trip back to the 1950s at the Classic Diner, which opened on Friday.

The new restaurant serves a buffet lunch Monday through Saturday from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. From 2 p.m. until closing, customers can order off a menu that includes

Keller said they also will serve fresh pies and cakes. And if you like ice cream, malts, shakes and banana splits, the Classic Diner has got you covered.

The restaurant is located in a former bakery on the north side of Texas Furniture.

Keller, who was the cafeteria manager at Pampa High School for 23 years, said starting her own restaurant is something she wanted to do for a long time.

She put her plans together during spring break, and then began working on the restaurant in June.

"I'm very excited and kind of nervous," she said on opening day.

The Classic Diner is located at 1421 N. Hobart St. Hours are 11 a.m. to 9 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Saturday. It is closed on Sunday.

## State gas prices drop from a week ago

The statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in Texas is now \$3.50, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is four cents less than one week ago and 13 cents less than the national average of \$3.63. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas and Ft. Worth are paying the most at \$3.54 and drivers in Amarillo, El Paso, and Corpus Christi are paying the least at \$3.43. In Texas, drivers are now paying about \$49 to fill up the

typical 14-gallon size fuel tank. Motorists in most states are paying less at the pump than a week ago and the declines were most dramatic in Midwestern states. Still, crude oil prices remain elevated due to positive signs for the global economy, continued unrest in Egypt and recent reports of violence in Libya, which produces two percent of global oil consumption. Some factors which could put upward pressure on prices include the ongoing summertime demand for gasoline, expensive oil prices, and the possibility of refinery glitches or supply disruptions from Gulf

Coast hurricanes. However, gas prices could remain flat or even drop if refineries run smoothly and no major hurricanes threaten the Gulf Coast. "The bottom line is we don't know where gas prices will go, but we'll continue to survey the prices around the state and provide drivers with updated gas price averages each week," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "We know many Texans still have long road trips to take in August, so we encourage drivers to maximize their fuel efficiency before hitting the roads."

## Troopers arrest 1,100 drunk drivers during July 4 enforcement

AUSTIN — Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) troopers made more than 1,100 DWI arrests during a 10-day special enforcement period, which included the July 4th holiday. The DWI enforcement effort from June 28 — July

7 included funding from a Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) grant. "These patrols are aimed at taking drunk drivers off Texas roadways and protecting the lives of all travelers," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The men and women of the Texas Highway Patrol dedicate their careers to keeping

our communities safe, and I'm certain troopers prevented potentially deadly crashes by removing these dangerous drivers from our roads." DPS Highway Patrol troopers made 1,124 DWI arrests during the July 4th enforcement effort. The TxDOT grant allowed increased patrols in high-risk locations during the

times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent, which directly resulted in 173 of the arrests. DPS enforcement also resulted in more than 15,700 speeding citations, more than 2,400 seat belt/child safety seat citations, 720 fugitive arrests, and 602 felony arrests during this time period.

## Hungry bear gets take out at Colorado restaurant

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — A hungry bear helped himself to a takeout dinner at a German restaurant in Colorado Springs. The manager of Edelweiss told The Denver Post the bear passed by a recycling bin early Wednesday

and followed his nose to a dumpster holding leftovers from the previous night. Surveillance video shows the bear on his hind legs, flipping open the dumpster's lid and nimbly rolling it out of a view into the parking lot to enjoy his feast.

The container was later found knocked over. The bear returned for more early Thursday. Wildlife officials say if the bear keeps coming back, it will be tagged and relocated to the mountains — or euthanized if that doesn't work.

# Mexican bid to smuggle phone into prison in coffin

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico City prison authorities say they have quashed an attempt to smuggle a prohibited cell phone into a city prison in the coffin of an inmate's mother.

Prisoners in the city have the right to have the casket of a deceased parent or child brought into the prison yard so they can bid farewell to their relative. But city correctional spokesman Emilio Castelazo said Friday that before the coffin was allowed into the Santa Marta Acatitla prison, guards searched the casket and found the cell phone inside.

Castelazo said a criminal complaint has been filed. Several relatives were with the coffin at the time. Cell phones are banned because inmates frequently use them to coordinate criminal activities outside

prison or make extortion calls.

## Police: Pa. robber left pink shoes, fled on bike

ALTOONA, Pa. (AP) — Police in central Pennsylvania are hoping to find the person who fits a pair of pink shoes he left behind after police say he accosted a woman, took \$200 from her, then fled on a neon green bike.

Altoona police Lt. Jeffrey Pratt tells the Altoona Mirror, "We have his shoes" — a pair of pink Adidas. Police say the robber swiped a bank envelope containing the cash out of the woman's hands after she left the Investment Savings Bank about noon Thursday. They say the suspect ran out of his shoes before hopping on a black-and-neon-green-colored BMX-style bike and peddling away.

Then as time goes on we (Pampa and Borger) will see if there are other things we can do together."

Morse said that the benefits from this partnership are not limited to just the hospitals, but to patients and physicians. Bringing physicians to Pampa and Borger keeps patients in the proximity of the aforementioned towns and keeps them from traveling to Amarillo for their appointments with specialists.

"The patients benefit from it because they can get the care here," Morse said. "They don't have to drive to Amarillo to get the care they need. They get in quicker and don't have

to wait several weeks. The physicians benefit because they have that specialist here that they can consult with. The hospitals benefit because it is a new line of business for both of us."

Morse said there are several other undisclosed aspects to the partnership yet to be announced that he is excited about.

Morse also stressed that the type of physicians being brought to the hospitals are "top-flight" and will accept most, if not all, of the insurance providers. This helps not just the hospital, but the city of Pampa as well.

"Economically it will be a great boost for us (the city of Pampa)," Morse said. "When I said it will benefit the hospital we will be able to work cases here and make money off them

like we haven't been able to before."

The inspiration for the partnership came from Morse and he hopes to reach out to other hospitals to have similar relationships.

"I just thought if there was a hospital that close (in Borger) why not go knock on their door and see if there is anything we can do together," Morse said. "Just like I did with Texas Tech (University Health Sciences Center in Amarillo). I've reached out to the hospital in Canadian and Spearman. We small hospitals need to work together. If we can help each other let's be good neighbors."

Morse encourages readers to come see the hospital and look at the changes that have taken place.

provided by the Texas Legislature, will help this community rebuild their infrastructure, school district and public works as quickly as possible," Perry said in a press release.

During the regular legislative session, the lawmakers also appropriated \$15 million to the governor's office for disaster recovery for communities like West and Bastrop, which battled a devastating 32,000-acre brush fire in 2011.

Following the approval of the state's appeal, it was announced that \$3.2 million of the Legislature's disaster recovery funds will be appropriated to West.

"One of the core responsibilities of our government

is to deliver assistance to its citizens in the wake of a disaster," state Rep. Kyle Kacal, R-College Station, said in a statement. "The people of West have been extremely patient throughout this process, and I'm pleased that they will finally begin seeing the necessary funding assistance they need in order to rebuild their community."

Josh Havens, a Perry spokesman, said FEMA will send a team to West to work with the community in assessing potential projects that will fall under a reimbursement process for rebuilding costs.

FEMA has appointed Kevin L. Hannes to serve as the federal coordinating officer for the recovery operations in the area, according to a press release from the White House.

### Bouncin' Around

## The animals of my life

I was doing some reflecting the other day about animals that have passed through my life. I know we had a cocker spaniel when I was very little, and my husband also had a cocker spaniel. It seems, however, that there have been more cats in our lives.

The first cat I remember was an orange and white fluff ball named JoJo. My brother, Pat, and I rescued him as a kitten when some kids had tried to bury him in a dirt bank.

He had so much dirt in his nose and ears that he couldn't hear well out of one ear and had a continual tilt to his head. When he was about three, he disappeared for a few days, and we finally found him in the garage with one eye missing and a broken jaw, apparently the victim of a collision with a car.

He was a sweet, loving cat who lived in our hearts and our home for about eight years. There was always a succession of injured or abandoned critters because they seemed to find my brother on a regular basis.

There was a sparrow who liked to snuggle into the hollow of Pat's chest. The little sparrow even survived a kitchen fire, much to the amazement of the firefighters who came to put out the blaze. The unnamed bird was released into the wild after he decided to bite Pat on the lip and refused to let go.

We once had a blue heron that walked into our front yard, covered in oil and unable to fly. Mom and I bathed him and fed him sardines. I suspect he only ate the sardines out of desperation, and after only a few days he was able to fly away.

My grandmother was given a canary that she named George, and shortly

after that a parakeet named Chester. Chester learned how to talk, but would often mix up his words or sentences. One day when my oldest brother came to visit along with his fiancée and her parents, we forgot about Chester who was allowed to fly freely in the house.

While there was a lull in the conversation, Chester flew over and perched on the shoulder of my future sister-in-law's father, whose name was George. To my grandmother's horror, George proceeded to say in a very clear voice, "George, you're sick! You need a psychiatrist." When a stray parakeet landed in our tree outside, we brought it inside.

It landed on a shelf, and Chester flew over, sauntered up to the bird (apparently female) and said very clearly, "Chester's a BOY!" You could almost imagine him wagging his eyebrows.

My aunt and uncle had a rooster who lived in their back yard. I spent most of my summer vacations with them, and I was afraid of that foul fowl.

He terrorized my aunt, chasing her into the house and pecking at her heels when she went out to hang laundry. One day the rooster was not fast enough, and Aunt Lizzy accidentally caught the bird's head in the back screen door. The bird survived, but walked with his head cocked at an odd angle, and he never went near my aunt again!

When our daughter was about four, she was afraid of dogs. Since our neighbors' Siberian Huskies were due to have puppies, we were allowed to get the "runt of the litter" whom we named Laika.

Laika grew to be the biggest of the pups, and probably the worst-mannered. He chewed the bark off the trees, dug up the tree roots, chewed the siding on the house, and even bit the dog trainer we hired. Laika's idea of protecting our daughter was to knock her down and sit on her. After one late

## Neglect at The Times

After a long three-year gap since their last exclusive sit-down interview with President Obama,

you might think The New York Times would be ready to ask tough questions on the most contentious issues of the day, beginning

with the deepening Obama scandals.

Wrong. Instead, the Times defined the "news" in this interview to be Obama's counter-attacks. Their stories focused on Obama's accusations that (a) the Republicans are liars about Obamacare, (b) the Republicans exaggerate the benefits of building the Keystone XL pipeline and (c) the Republicans oppose his use of executive power because he has the "gall to win the presidency."

The national media are faithfully executing their Obama second-term call to preserve and protect his legacy.

They are steering clear of any story that might imply that the president has in any way cut an ethical corner or abused his power. More: House Republicans investigating Obama scandals must be viewed as an assembly line for organized character assassination, not congressional oversight.

This is especially true at the Times, which sees the president as a far too special historical figure to get the punishing scrutiny applied to people the Times thinks are slack-jawed country bumpkins, such as Mike Lee, Ted Cruz and Rand Paul. They see Obama as a Jackie Robinson figure, a racial pioneer who endures the angry, spitting fury of the right-wing mobs with great courage and flair.

The tea party apparently deserves investigations by the IRS because their opposition to Obama is clearly based on racism, just like the people who spat on Jackie Robinson. In his interview with the Times, when asked about over-enthusiastic use of executive power, Obama sneered at conservatives. "Some of those folks think I usurp my authority by having the gall to win the presidency. And I don't think that's

a secret." He added: "But ultimately, I'm not concerned about their opinions — very few of them, by the way, are lawyers, much less constitutional lawyers."

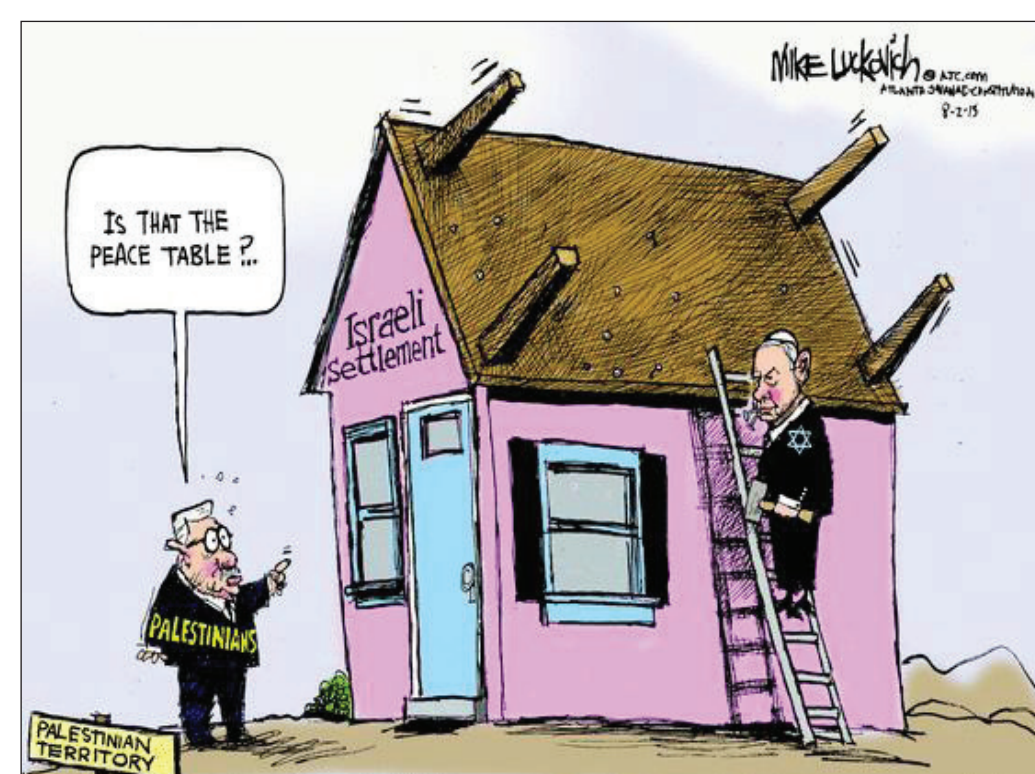
Instead of asking one solitary question about scandals, the Times decided it was more important to ask the most obvious question imaginable about Martin Luther King: "March on Washington coming up soon. Are you going to do anything to mark it? Are you planning on being a part of the 50th anniversary?" Why, yes, Obama stressed: "I have a copy of the original program in my office, framed."

Obama's critics on the Left were upset that Times reporters Jackie Calmes and Michael Shear failed to ask about surveillance programs and the Snowden case. They failed to upbraid him about his Justice Department's crackdown on journalists or requiring Bush-trashing/Pulitzer-winning Times colleague James Risen to testify in court. What about drone attacks? These lines of inquiry are reserved for the dreaded warmongering "neoconservatives" of Team Bush.

Obama isn't the only Democrat who is being awarded with feigned ignorance by the Times. The "newspaper of record" looked ridiculous when disgraced former congressman Anthony Weiner was forced to admit he kept right on "sexting" strange women who were not Mrs. Weiner after he resigned and promised to end his creepy online sexual misbehavior with strange women. In April, they published a gooey cover story in The New York Times Magazine titled "Huma and Anthony: The private life of a former power couple."

## Obama's solution to help the kids

As President Obama heads for a nice vacation at Martha's Vineyard, a place of wealth, I want him to work on a simple math calculation. One of the major themes of the president's administration is that there is a tremendous problem of "income inequality" in this nation that must be addressed.

Obama's solution is to redistribute income using seizure tactics.

His plan is to have the federal government provide subsidies for those with low incomes by taking money from business and the affluent. The problem is that high taxation restrains economic expansion and inhibits the country from creating new avenues of wealth. If the affluent spend less and

business invests less in expansion and development, wages for workers stagnate because there is heavy competition for jobs.

The president does not seem to understand that.

But the core problem of "income inequality" stems from failure to seize opportunity. If an American is insufficiently educated and does not develop useful skills, he or she will not be able to earn much money in the marketplace. And little is being done about that.

So here's the math deal, Mr. President. Right now, approximately 48 percent of American children living in female-headed households are poor. That's compared to a poverty rate of 11 percent for kids living in a married-couple situation.

The out-of-wedlock birth rate for African-Americans is close to 73 percent. For Hispanics, it's 53 percent; for whites, 29 percent. And sadly, most of these chil-

dren are growing up without fathers in the home.

So where is the national campaign to discourage women from having babies out of wedlock? Is the Department of Education doing anything about that? The media? Anyone?

Back in 1992, then Vice President Dan Quayle derided a TV character named Murphy Brown (played by Candice Bergen) for having a baby outside of marriage. Quayle was mocked unmercifully by the elite media and the salon set.

But Quayle was right. According to the U.S. Census, 34 percent of unwed mothers do not work, and that is driving abject poverty.

America offers the most people the best opportunity to pursue happiness. That's why millions of illegal immigrants have poured into the country — most of them poor. They believe they have a shot at improving themselves economi-

cally.

But children living in poverty without fathers to guide them are at a strong disadvantage in our competitive society. Obama's solution is to throw as much money as he can into programs to help these kids. But that will never work.

The traditional American family has always been the foundation for success in America.

But now it is being destroyed in some precincts. Welfare programs and public schooling will never overcome disadvantage on the home front. It is time for Obama to lead. The way to foster "income equality" is to encourage traditional upbringings and discipline.

Just do the math, Mr. President.

# House ready to lower rates on student loans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The cost of borrowing for college is about to drop.

The House on Wednesday was expected to give final congressional approval to bipartisan legislation linking student loan interest rates to the financial markets. The impact: lower rates for most students now but higher ones down the line if the economy improves as expected. "This is a win for students and taxpayers," said Rep. John Kline, the Republican chairman of the House Committee on Education and the Workforce.

The top Democrat on that committee joined Kline on the House floor to urge colleagues to back it. "It saves students and families money," said Rep. George Miller, D-Calif.

Undergraduates this fall would borrow at a 3.9 percent interest rate for subsidized and unsubsidized loans. Graduate students would have access to loans at 5.4 percent, and parents would borrow at 6.4 percent. The rates would be locked in for that year's loan, but each year's loan could be more expensive than the last. Rates would rise as the economy picks up and it becomes more expensive for the government to borrow money.

But for now, interest payments for tuition, housing and books would be less expensive if the House passes the bill, as expected. The next step

would be to send it to the White House, where President Barack Obama is expected to sign it into law.

The chamber earlier this year passed legislation that is similar to what the Senate later passed. Both versions link interest rates to 10-year Treasury notes and remove Congress' annual role in determining rates.

"Campaign promises and political posturing should not play a role in the setting of student loan interest rates," said Rep. Virginia Foxx, R-N.C. "Borrowers deserve better."

Negotiators of the Senate compromise were mindful of the House-passed version, as well as the White House preference to shift responsibility for interest rates to the financial markets. The resulting bipartisan bill passed the Senate 81-18.

The earlier House-written student loan bill passed the GOP-led chamber 221-198, largely along party lines. Eight Republicans crossed party lines to vote against it; four Democrats voted in favor of it.

With changes made in the Senate — most notably a cap on how interest rates could climb and locking in interest rates for the life of each year's loan — Democrats were expected to join Republicans and back the bill.

Interest rates would not top 8.25 percent for undergraduates. Graduate stu-

dents would not pay rates higher than 9.5 percent, and parents' rates would top out at 10.5 percent. Using Congressional Budget Office estimates, rates would not reach those limits in the next 10 years.

Even with those protections not all Democrats will back it, cautioned House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi. She said this "isn't the bill we would have written, but it is a bill that can pass and will have Democrats voting for and against."

The White House has endorsed the deal, despite objections from consumer advocates that the proposal could cost future students.

"The bottom line is that students will pay more under this bill than if Congress did nothing, and low rates will soon give way to rates that are even higher than the 6.8 percent rate that Congress is trying to avoid," said Chris Lindstrom, higher education program director for the consumer group US PIRG.

Rates on new subsidized Stafford loans doubled to 6.8 percent July 1 because Congress could not agree on a way to keep them at 3.4 percent. Without congressional action, rates would stay at 6.8 percent — a reality most lawmakers called unacceptable.

The compromise that came together during the last month would be a good deal for all students

through the 2015 academic year. After that, interest rates are expected to climb above where they were when students left campus in the spring, if congressional estimates prove correct.

The White House and its allies said the new loan structure would offer lower rates to 11 million borrowers right away and save the average undergraduate \$1,500 in interest charges.

Democrats were already talking about changing the deal when they take up a rewrite of the Higher Education Act this fall. As a condition of his support, Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee Chairman Tom Harkin won a Government Accountability Office report on the costs of colleges. That document was expected to guide an overhaul of the deal just negotiated.

The House, too, planned to address costs.

"Enactment of the Senate bill in no way means our work is done," Miller said. "This bill helps reduce costs to students and families, but it does not solve the long-term student loan debt crisis."

The Congressional Budget Office estimated the bill as written would reduce the deficit by \$715 million over the next decade. During that same time, federal loans would be a \$1.4 trillion program.

## 3 Utah sisters have 3 baby boys in July

LAYTON, Utah (AP) — July is full-fledged baby season for one Utah family.

Three sisters from Layton gave birth to three baby boys in the month of July, including two who were born about an hour apart, The Deseret News reports.

Even in baby-centric Utah, that's pretty remarkable.

The trio says they didn't plan on getting pregnant at the same time.

Misti Stokes, 24, said she found out first. Her younger sister, Courtnee Hoffman, 21, later asked her if she had a pregnancy test to spare. It was positive.

The sisters told their older sister, Kristal Turner, 25, then asked if she was sad she wasn't expecting, but she said no — because she was also pregnant.

Stokes gave birth to her baby, Boston, on July 3. Hoffman had her son, Stryker, early Saturday, and Turner's baby, Mack, was born 65 minutes later in the same hospital.

At one point before the birth, Turner passed her mother in the hallways of the Ogden Regional Medical Center. She was on her way to see Hoffman.

"She's like, 'What are you doing? Are you going to see Courtnee?'" Turner said. "And I'm like, 'No,

I'm going to have my baby.'"

The sisters were in rooms across the hall from each other, both feeling bad they couldn't be with the other to provide support. Nurses helped by keeping each up-to-date on the other's contractions and the babies' heart rates.

"We couldn't go really into each other's room very much, but we would send pictures back and forth and text and ask how each other is doing," Hoffman told The Deseret News.

The same doctor delivered both babies, the sisters said.

The three sisters say their bond is now stronger than ever.

"It's been fun to go through it together," Hoffman said.

The three baby cousins were together for the first time Tuesday.

"I really think that there's a reason why all three are born together," Turner said. "They are going to have a great support system for each other."

Utah had the highest birth rate in the country in 2009, U.S. Census data shows. Utah had 19.4 births per 1,000 people. The 3-year-old data is the latest available comparing state's birth rates.

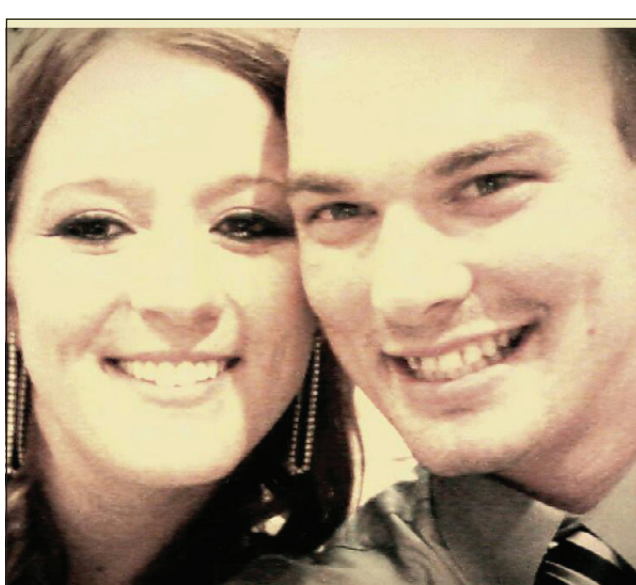

## From the Press Box

### ■ Preseason games don't count, but they matter.

The NFL football season unofficially kicks off Sunday at 7 p.m. But if you asked many football fans if they planned on watching the game they would likely shrug off your question and say, "It's just preseason." While they are right that it is "just preseason," where they are wrong is in the importance of it.

Many hardcore NFL fans, like myself, still watch most of the preseason games because it is a chance to take a look at your favorite team's progress from the end of last season. For many of the teams that are year-in-year-out in the playoffs not much will change and fans will just see a bunch of rookies and unknowns duking it out. ## Monday MLB drug deal deadline as playoffs loom

NEW YORK (AP) — Pressure to get suspensions over with before the playoffs could force an end to negotiations in baseball's latest drug scandal.

Monday appears to be the deadline for Alex Rodriguez and 13 others to accept suspensions for their ties to the Biogenesis of America anti-aging clinic. While A-Rod is expected to get a lengthy ban, a penalty starting that day would allow Texas All-Star outfielder Nelson Cruz to return for October.

Major League Baseball is prepared to issue two simultaneous announcements no

later than Monday, a person familiar with the process told The Associated Press on Thursday. One would list players who accept suspensions; the other would name those disciplined without deals, but who could challenge penalties before an arbitrator.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because no statements were authorized.

Most players face 50-game suspensions for their links to the now-closed Florida clinic, which has been accused of distributing banned performance-

enhancing drugs.

But baseball is threatening to kick Rodriguez out for life unless the three-time AL MVP agrees to a long ban, perhaps around 200 games.

Rodriguez appeared ready to talk Thursday as he was leaving the team's minor league complex in Tampa, Fla., waving a group of writers to his car in the parking lot and rolling down the window. However, when he saw a second group with TV cameras approaching, he said: "I'll talk to you guys, but no cameras."

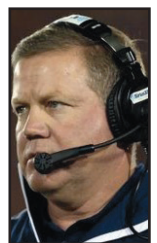

## Kelly says deal is near, hopes Irish repeat

**S O U T H BEND, Ind. (AP)** — Putting together back-to-back strong seasons has been rare of late at Notre Dame. Since going 10-1-1 in 1992 and 11-1 in 1993, the Irish have won at least nine games in consecutive seasons just once, going 9-3 and 10-3 in 2005 and 2006 in the first two seasons under Charlie Weis. Last season's 12-1 record, which included a blowout loss to Alabama in the national title game, was the first time the Irish have won at least nine games since then. It was the program's best record in nearly two decades.

Coach Brian Kelly said the Irish know the challenge ahead. "We've worked very hard to put ourselves back into position to get back into the national spotlight. We have no intentions of giving that up," Kelly said Friday. "So the focus has been since the last game of last year is to get back to the top of the mountain. You don't get there easily. It takes a lot of work."

The Irish get to work Monday when they begin practicing for the first four days at a facility in Marion, a central Indiana city about 100 miles southeast of the Notre Dame campus. Kelly said the players won't have access to TVs and predicted that the local Wi-Fi will crash shortly after the players arrive. "It's an opportunity for us to focus on football and each other," Kelly said. Kelly said his contract situation won't be a dis-

traction, saying a new deal is "imminent." Notre Dame athletic director Jack Swarbrick has said the school is working on a contract extension for Kelly, whose current deal runs through the 2016 season. Kelly, who interviewed for the Philadelphia Eagles job the day after the BCS game in January, said the basic deal for a contract has been in place since December. "We have a contract and an agreement. We have people that are paid money to look at these contracts. They look at them very closely. They don't operate as quickly as I would like to. But there are no issues contractually," Kelly said.

Kelly talking to the Eagles was one of many distractions that occurred for the Irish since the embarrassing 42-14 loss to Alabama. There was All-American linebacker Manti Te'o falling prey to an on-line girlfriend hoax and starting quarterback Everett Golson being suspended by the university

He batted .193 with four home runs and eight RBIs in 50 games with Oakland this season.

There's Bill Parcells, winner of two NFL titles as a coach and master of the franchise turnaround. Jonathan Ogden, one of the

premier offensive tackles of his time and owner of a Super Bowl ring. Larry Allen, to whom the same accolades can be applied, and a 1995 champion. Warren Sapp, an outstanding defensive tackle with a personality as big as any football stadium — and a 2002 champ. Dave Robinson, a major cog in Green Bay's championship machine under Vince Lombardi, winning

## Preview: Hall of Fame Game — Dallas Cowboys vs. Miami Dolphins

**How they finished:**  
**DAL-** 8-8 and third in the NFC East. Losing a win-or-go-home game to the Washington Redskins.  
**MIA-** 7-9 and second in the AFC East. Five games behind the division winning New England Patriots.  
**Last season highlights/lowlights:**  
**DAL-** Cowboys were ranked third in the NFL for passing with Tony Romo throwing for a career-high 4903 yards, 28 touchdowns and a career-tying 19 interceptions. With that many passing yards, there were rushing yards to be had. Injuries to both then-second-year running back DeMarco Murray and the offensive line caused the Cowboys to finish 31st in the league for rushing with Murray only accumulating 663 yards on 161 carries. Then third-year wide receiver was arguably the best at his position in the second half of games last season. Bryant gained 792 of his 1383 yards in the second half of games last

season. The defense was mediocre at best finishing with 19th overall and 22nd overall in passing and rushing defense respectively.  
**MIA-** Quarterback Ryan Tannehill, unlike his Redskins and Colts rookie counterparts, had a pretty average, but promising, rookie year. He had 3,200 yards with 12 touchdowns and 13 interceptions. His leading receiver was Brian Hartline who had a career-high 1083 yards. The Dolphins also had running back Reggie Bush now on the Lions roster, who followed up his career-high 2011 season of 1,086 yard with a 986-yard campaign in 2012. The Dolphins defensive front shined at times ranking 13th in the league at stopping the run. The Dolphins secondary, though, was ranked 27th in the league, which isn't going to cut it if they face Tom Brady twice a year.  
**Offseason moves:**  
**DAL-** Let's be honest, the Cowboys couldn't do much because they didn't have enough salary cap space after controversially extend-

the first two Super Bowls. Curley Culp, one of the original pass-rushing demons at defensive tackle who got his ring with the 1969 Chiefs.

Indeed, only wide receiver Cris Carter, merely No. 4 in career receptions and TD catches, is the only member of this year's class who never won a title.

Quite a group for the Hall's 50th anniversary celebration, which began Friday with a record 120 hall members expected to attend the ceremonies.

"I can't think of a better group of people to go into the Hall of Fame with," said Ogden, the Baltimore Ravens' first-ever draft choice and the first team member elected to the hall.

"It feels great. When I was playing, I was just out there working. I couldn't help the fact that I was the Ravens' first pick. It just kind of happened, and in my mind, all I wanted to do was go out there and help the guys win. So I don't look at it in that perspective. When I do step outside of myself and look at it, it's like, 'Wow, that guy, he had it pretty good.'"

Ogden, Allen and Sapp have the distinction of making the hall in their first year of eligibility. It's all the more impressive considering all three were linemen.

Allen became the anchor

of the Cowboys' blocking unit for a dozen seasons, then finished his career with two years in San Francisco. He made six All-Pro teams and 11 Pro Bowls, playing guard and tackle.

Cowboys executive vice president Stephen Jones believes "Larry would have been a Hall of Famer at guard or tackle, and either side. He was special like that."

Allen also was one of the strongest players the NFL has seen.

Sapp, whose induction speech might be the most anticipated because he's liable to say anything, was a cornerstone of Tampa Bay's powerful defense that was the key to winning the Buccaneers' only title after decades of futility.

"We took a place where they said careers came to die to a place that's become a destination," Sapp said, noting the Tampa 2 scheme is now played by defenses everywhere.

Parcells also was heavily involved in making popular — and successful — a specific alignment. The 3-4 defense came to life under Parcells with the New York Giants, and he led them to the 1986 and 1990 championships.

Parcells says it was his duty to provide a prosperous environment.

"You as an individual coach have a responsibility to try to give those players who put themselves at risk and in harm's way a chance to achieve success,

and that goes for universities and professional teams, as well," Parcells said. "I know I preached that to every organization and to every coaching staff I ever had. These guys deserve a chance to win, and we have to give it to them."

He did it in New England and with the Jets and Cowboys after leaving the Giants.

Robinson and Culp were voted in as senior members. Considering their pedigrees, it's stunning it took so long for them to make it; Robinson retired in 1974, Culp in 1981.

"That bust means an awful lot," Robinson said. "That bust will last forever."

Even though Carter can't flash a sporty Super Bowl ring, he can show off those mitts that clutched so many balls, perhaps the best set of hands any receiver has had. Highlights of his sideline catches remain a learning tool for wideouts today.

"Every minute that I stepped on that field from the time that I warmed up, I was trying to put on a show for those people," said Carter, who played 12 of his 16 seasons with Minnesota. "So they would be proud. I come from some humble beginnings, and I just believed that when people pay their money, hard-earned money, that they deserve a certain level of performance."

for the semester for what he termed poor academic judgment. A highly touted defensive lineman also backed out of his letter of intent and is headed to UCLA.

Kelly said none of that will have any effect on this year's team.

"It was in the rearview mirror the next day. We don't even think about it, don't even talk about it. It's history," he said.

Kelly said he decided to name quarterback Tommy Rees as the starter before the start of practice because of his experience. He said, however, that doesn't mean the job is his for all season.

"I made him the starter for Temple. My expectation is that he would take the job and continue to lead our football team," Kelly said. "He's the most experienced. He's won. He knows our offense very well. He's a senior, well respected. He's got all those things. It was really a quite easy decision."

Tougher decisions will have to be made at running back, linebacker and elsewhere, where the Irish lost veteran players.

"It's going to be fun. We have a lot of veterans coming back, but there's going to be a lot of things that we're going to have to evaluate," he said. "We're going to have a lot of players that will get that opportunity."

Notes: There were two items of note on the Notre Dame roster released Friday. First, basketball player Joey Brooks, who redshirted last season as a senior and was listed as a tight end during spring football practice, is no longer on the roster. Kelly said he didn't want Brooks taking opportunities away from younger players like

freshman Mike Heurman. ... The other is that Jesse Bongiovi is listed as a freshman walk-on cornerback. He is the son of singer Jon Bon Jovi, who began attending Notre Dame games when Weis was coach.

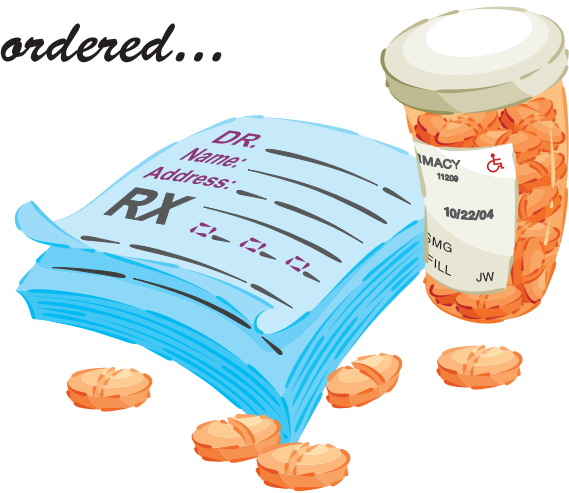

ing Romo's contract. The addition of former Tampa Bay Buccaneer and Pittsburgh Steeler strong safety Will Allen and outside linebacker Justin Durant could add some veteran help to a very young defense.

The Cowboys made most of their moves during the draft, taking a center at the end of the first round. But aside from the center the Cowboys didn't do anything else to help their offensive line that was so troublesome for Romo and Murray last year. But defensively they took a free safety, a corner and an outside linebacker.

The Cowboys coaching staff does seem to be excited about fifth-round pick running back Joseph Randle out of Oklahoma State University. According to nfl.com he is "productive back in the running and passing game. Possesses enough straight-line speed to eat up yardage when open lanes present themselves." But his weaknesses are that he is "a taller back who will run a bit upright at times coming through the line or in the open field. Receiver-like build makes pushing the pile a chore. One-speed back without an elite burst, second gear or great acceleration in the open field."

MIA- Miami had one of the more productive offseasons this summer. After landing speedy wide receiver in free agency, they also add former Atlanta corner Brent Grimes, linebacker Dannel Ellerbe and drafted Jamar Taylor.

The addition of Grimes and Taylor allows for a beefed up secondary and the addition of Ellerbe adds power to an already stout front seven.

The move that will likely hurt the Dolphins the most is the loss of tackle Jake Long, whom they took in the 2008 draft when they could have drafted

first-round names like quarterbacks Matt Ryan or Joe Flacco. They drafted Tennessee tackle Dallas Thomas in the third round in hopes he can be their new Jake Long. By giving Tannehill more weapons and beefing up an already zaf-tig defense, the Dolphins will expect more than a 7-9 season.

### Players to watch:

**DAL-** With the Cowboys it is going to be the first-team offensive line's gelling together. While they may only play one or two series, the protection that Romo (or more likely back-up quarterback Kyle Orton) has is going to show whether or not the Cowboys were smart in their drafting.

Running back Joseph Randle is another one to watch because the competition for the back-up running back position is going to be important due to DeMarco Murray's health. Just as last year, who will emerge as the no. 3 wide receiver is another story line. Last year Kevin Ogletree seemed like he would emerge, but inconsistent play led him to being let go in free agency. They have a handful of rookies and guys that have been at the bottom of the depth chart for a while now. Who will that guy be?

**MIA-** The progression of second-year quarterback Ryan Tannehill will be the biggest story for most of the Dolphins' fans.

The Dolphins want to be able to compete with the Patriots in the division, and if not for the division compete with the other teams in the AFC for a wild card position. Providing Tannehill with weapons is the way they plan to do that.

The gelling of the secondary is probably going to be the biggest thing to watch for, particularly the young secondary.

Second-round pick Jamar Taylor, third-round pick Will Davis and seventh-round pick Don Jones are all rookies to watch in this matchup.

## Sports Briefs

### Associate: Hernandez put guns in box in basement

ATTLEBORO, Mass. (AP) — New court records say that an associate of Aaron Hernandez told police the former New England Patriot put guns in a box in his basement after returning from the industrial park where his friend was fatally shot.

An affidavit released by Attleboro District Court says Carlos Ortiz told investigators Hernandez put firearms in the black box after Odin Lloyd's killing. The document indicates one was a small gun Ortiz handed Hernandez after they returned home. Ortiz said he earlier saw Hernandez with an additional "large handgun."

Hernandez has pleaded not guilty to murder in the death of Lloyd, a 27-year-old Boston semi-professional football player whose body was found June 17 near Hernandez's North Attleborough, Mass., home.

Authorities believe Lloyd was killed with a .45-caliber Glock, which hasn't been recovered.

### Eagles excuse Cooper from team

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Philadelphia Eagles excused Riley Cooper from all team activities on Friday after the wide receiver was caught on video making a racial slur.

Cooper said the last few days have been incredibly difficult and he will step away to seek counseling.

"My actions were inexcusable," he said. "The more I think about what I did, the more disgusted I get. I keep trying to figure out how I could have said something so repulsive, and what I can do

to make things better."

Cooper apologized publicly Wednesday after a video of him using the N-word at a Kenny Chesney concert last month surfaced on the Internet. The Eagles immediately fined him.

### Dillon seeks 1st win of the season at Iowa

NEWTON, Iowa (AP) — Austin Dillon knows that Saturday night's NASCAR Nationwide race in Iowa might be his best shot yet at a victory.

But it's not necessarily because Dillon is running so well. It's mostly because Kyle Busch is staying at Pocono Raceway.

Dillon, who took over the Nationwide points lead last week despite going winless through 19 starts, headlines a field almost exclusively made up of Nationwide regulars.

Brad Keselowski is the lone Sprint Cup driver scheduled to be in the field.

NASCAR's top series runs Sunday in Pennsylvania. Busch, who has won eight Nationwide races in 15 tries in 2013, won't attempt the Pocono-Iowa double-dip like he's done in the past.

### Woods to play with Bradley, Love in PGA

PITTSFORD, N.Y. (AP) — Tiger Woods was grouped with Keegan Bradley and Davis Love III for the first two rounds of the PGA Championship next week at Oak Hill.

The PGA of America said Friday that Woods, Bradley and Love are scheduled to tee off on No. 10 at 8:35 a.m. Thursday and start play Friday on No. 1 at 1:45 p.m.

# Lil' Learners Daycare is a hands-on learning experience

Kevin Rumrill has opened a daycare that she runs out of her house. Originally from Pampa, Rumrill recently returned after a stint in Colorado. She said she went through some life changes and it seemed like a good time to return to the area. Both of her children were born in Pampa and she has always enjoyed the town.

When Rumrill returned to Pampa after a career in education in Colorado, she still wanted to work with kids but wasn't interested in re-entering the school system. That is how she got the idea to open her own daycare, called Lil' Learners. Rumrill had previously worked as a paraeducator and was nominated for paraeducator of the year.

The curriculum for Lil' Learners focuses on hands-on learning and teaching children to recognize and read words at an early age. Rumrill will practice with the children daily, working with the letters of the alphabet and pictures in order to accelerate word recognition.

Other hands-on activities include working with edible finger paints and edible play dough in order to reduce the risk of harm. Rumrill focuses her disciplinary lessons on the book "7 Habits of Happy Kids," and has a paper tree on the wall in the back room with the seven habits, which she will go over daily with the children.

Other activities offered at Lil' Learners include music, nutrition lessons and Bible lessons. Rumrill also has a shaded playground set up in her backyard for outside play time. At the end of the day, Rumrill will review all the day's lessons with the children.

Rumrill has two employees working with her, Liana Goode and Shanell Jennings. Prior to employment, the women had to go through a background check as well as CPR and first aid training and certification. They are also required to take 30 hours per year of continued education classes in child care.

Although Rumrill does not currently have any form of financial aid for families, it is something she has begun to look into getting. She can have up to six full-time children ages 3-5 enrolled as well as six part-time children up to 11 years old, as she also has an after-school care curriculum. Drop-ins are also accepted on a first come, first served basis.

As for her future plans for the daycare, Rumrill says she would like to have full enrollment and wants to have a date night when she will have children over so that parents can have a night out. Once she reaches full enrollment she also wants to do a community project.

## Former Ohio captive says she knew she'd escape

CLEVELAND (AP) — Free and safe, one of three women kidnapped and raped over a decade in a ramshackle home smiled lightly as her tormentor was led out in chains, a method he had used to control them.

Michelle Knight, the first of the victims kidnapped after accepting a ride from Ariel Castro, spoke in a soft but determined voice Thursday in front of a judge who followed a plea deal and gave Castro life in prison without parole plus 1,000 years.

"We said we'll all get out alive someday, and we did," Knight said.

"You took 11 years of my life away, and I have got it back," she said in the hushed courtroom. "I spent 11 years in hell. Now your hell is just beginning."

Knight, who spoke just a few feet from Castro in the courtroom, finished her statement and returned to her seat without looking at him. Earlier, he had tried to make eye contact, but deputies quickly stepped into this line of vision.

Knight, 32, belittled Castro's routine of going to church and returning to abuse the women in the darkened Cleveland home, which was equipped with chains, locked doors and windows boarded up from the inside.

"What does God think of you hypocritically going to church each Sunday and then coming home to torture us?" she said. "The death penalty would be the easy way out. You don't deserve that. We want you to spend the rest of your life in prison."

Castro, a 53-year-old former school bus driver, pleaded guilty last week to 937 counts including aggravated murder, kid-

napping, rape and assault. A deal struck with prosecutors spared him from a possible death sentence for beating and starving Knight until she miscarried.

Castro apologized to his victims briefly in a rambling, defiant statement before he was sentenced, quibbling with the judge on whether rape is a violent crime. As people in the gallery watched wide-eyed, Castro repeatedly blamed his sex addiction, his former wife and others while claiming most of the sex was consensual and the women he held were never tortured.

"These people are trying to paint me as a monster," he said. "I'm not a monster. I'm sick."

He pointed out that the FBI was once close to him when agents talked with his daughter, who was walking home with victim Gina DeJesus on the day she disappeared.

"The FBI let these girls down when they questioned my daughter," he said. "They failed to question me."

He also said he was never abusive until he met his former wife, who is now dead.

"I am not a violent person," Castro said repeatedly.

Assistant prosecutor Anna Faraglia said Knight's appearance in court showed her resilience.

"She will survive, but she has gone through a lot of physical and emotional pain," Faraglia said.

All three women were willing to testify at trial about their ordeals if needed, she said.

The three women disappeared separately between 2002 and 2004, when they were 14, 16 and 20 years old. Each had accepted a ride from Castro. They es-

caped May 6, when Amanda Berry, now 27, broke part of a door to Castro's house in a tough neighborhood and yelled to neighbors for help. Castro was arrested that evening.
