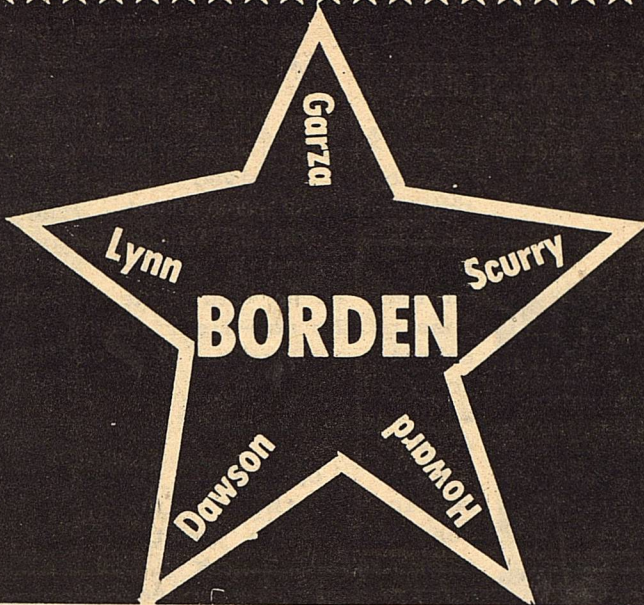

BORDEN COUNTY REPRESENTED IN AUSTIN

The Capitol Committee and the State Preservation Board are pleased to announce that Borden County will be represented among those etched on the Great Walk leading to the Texas State Capitol in Austin and want to thank the Borden County Commissioners Court for this accomplishment.

The Texas Association of Counties is sponsoring a project to have all 254 Texas counties' names included in a special section of the walk.

Over the past several years, plans have been underway for the restoration of the state Capitol, which will celebrate its 100th anniversary on May 16, 1988. To complete the first phase of the restoration, the Capitol Committee has enlisted the support of all Texans to share in this historic restoration by means of "A Walk in History" project.

Years of continued use and weather have deteriorated the Capitol's walkways. These approaches to the Capitol will be restored using 28" concrete diamond-shaped pavers upon which will be etched the name of each contributor.

Completion of the "Walk

In History" is scheduled prior to the May 16, 1988 centennial celebration of the Capitol's completion and dedication.

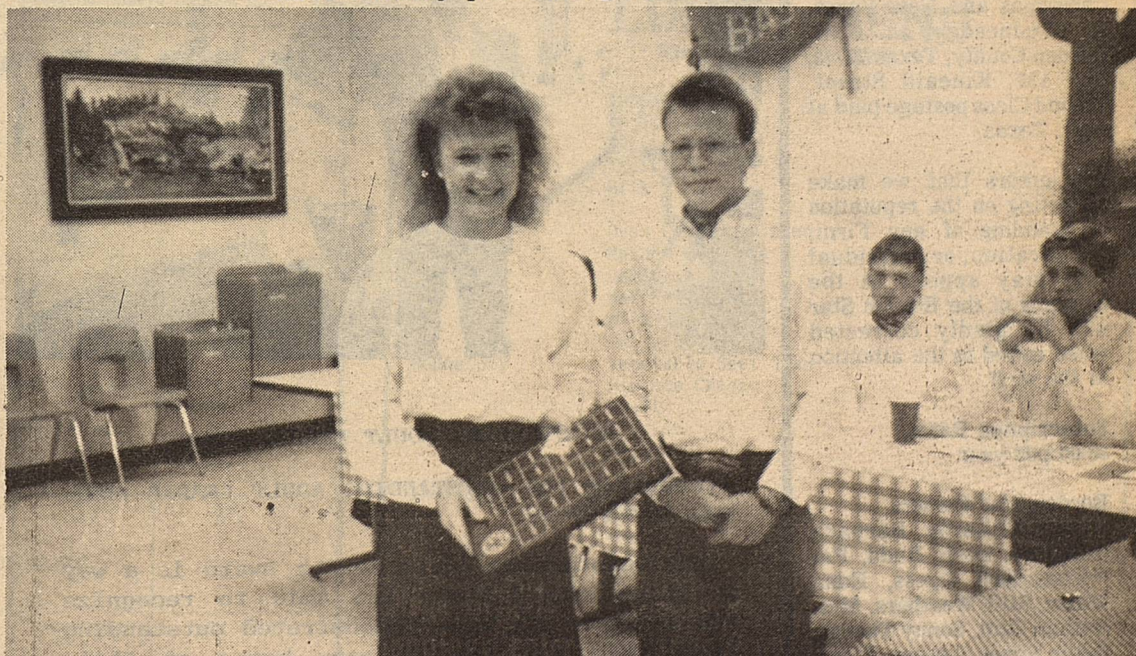

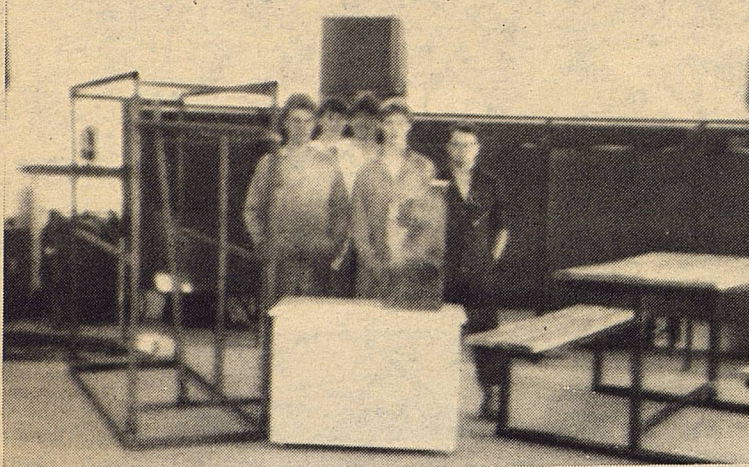

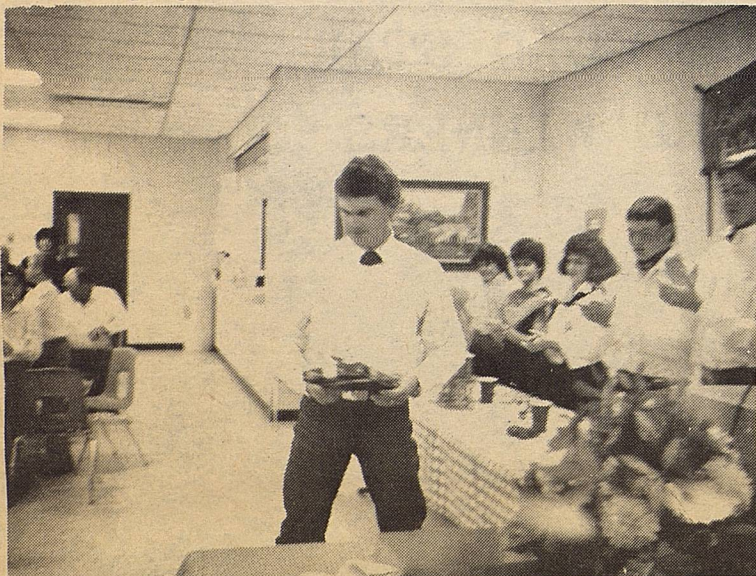

The Borden County Coyotes received a pre-Halloween trick Friday night as the Rule bobcats raced to an easy 83-49 win. The loss to the non-district Bobcats brought the Coyotes season to 3-6 with one more game to play.

Rule opened the scoring on their first possession. The Coyotes came right back to score and take the lead on a 2 yard run by Patrick Herridge and the PAT by Randell Hollis. Throughout the first quarter, it looked as if the team with the ball would score. The lead went back and forth several times. Jimmy Rios scored next for the Coyotes and Randell kicked the PAT. Jimmy also scored the next touchdown on a 4 yard run and Randell kicked the PAT. The first quarter ended with the Coyotes leading 24-20.

Jimmy Rios opened the

second quarter scoring on a 9 yard run, but the extra point was no good. That was all the scoring for the Coyotes in the second quarter, but the Bobcats scored two more to take the halftime lead 36-30.

In the third quarter, the Bobcats huge line and quick backs were just too much for the Coyotes. The Bobcats scored three times to the Coyotes single touchdown by Jimmy Rios on a 7 yard run. The PAT was good on a pass from Brian Bond to Chris Kilmer.

The fourth quarter was almost a copy of the third as the Bobcats scored 3 touchdowns to the Coyotes one. Will Phinizy scored on a 2 yard pass from Brian Bond. The PAT was blocked.

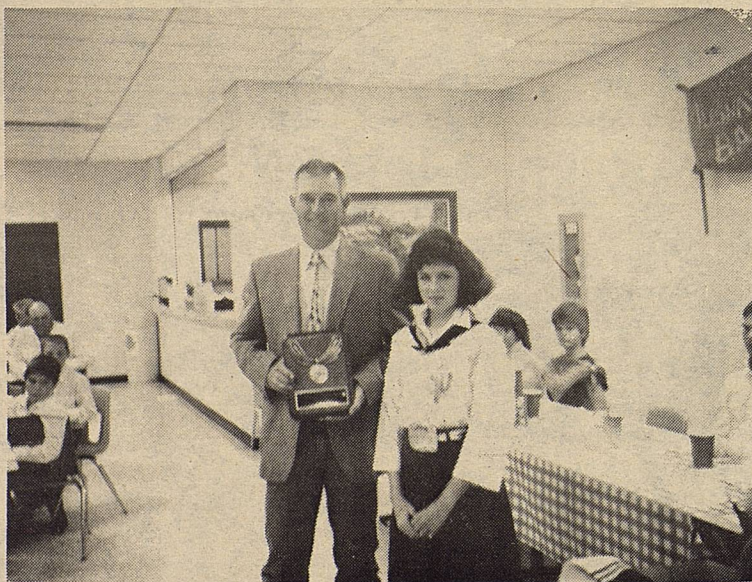
The Coyotes were glad that the game was finally over and hoped that the real Halloween night did not bring as much bad luck.

Jimmy Rios led the Coyote rushers with 119 yards on 23 carries with 4 touchdowns. Patrick Herridge had 65 yards on 15 carries and one touchdown. Chris Kilmer rushed for 61 yards on 13 carries. Brian Bond had 10 yards rushing. Will Phinizy caught 3 passes for 19 yards and one touchdown. Patrick Herridge caught 1 pass for 18 yards. Paul Strudivant caught 1 pass for 7 yards.

The defense was led by Will Phinizy with 11 tackles. The other Coyotes who made tackles were Patrick Herridge 10, Jimmy Rios 9, Brian Bond 8, Kerry Fryar and Randell Hollis 5, Harold Barnes 4, Chris Kilmer and Sane Kemper 2 each.

The Coyotes will end the season at home Friday against the Wellman Wildcats who are in a three-way tie for first place in the district race.

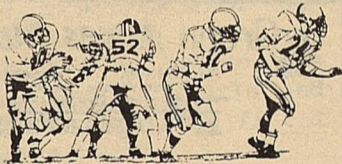

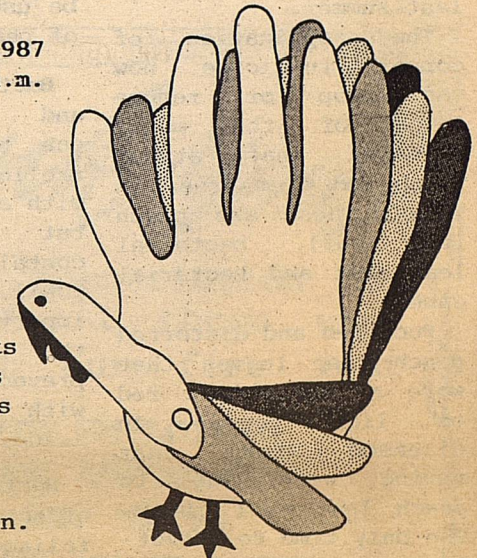

Following tradition, the gown was new, a hand-designed garter was blue and diamond

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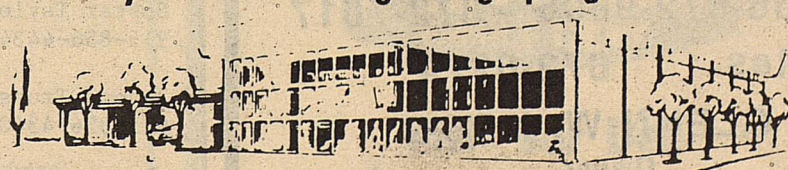

**FALL FRUIT TREE
SPRAYING CONTROLS
DISEASES**

Fall is often the time when fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

With the arrival of fall, there's often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer.

The application of copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the major diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree

damage. Copper is a metal and may cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly.

We suggest spraying when 70 percent of the leaves fall off the tree. Spraying too early will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

Fungicides containing chlorothalonil can also be used for the control of peach leaf curl.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide, but not fungicides containing chlorothalonil. But again, it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliage burn with the copper fungicide.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the main

trunk and main limbs.

Fall spray in North to Northwest Texas is most often applied from late October to Nov. 15, in Central Texas from Nov. 1 to Dec. 1, and in South Texas from Nov. 15 to Dec. 15. Application time will vary with the season, so check your fruit trees closely.

Fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees, because there's no other time when peach leaf curl of peach and plum trees can be controlled.

If you certified that you would plant a small grain crop on your ACR land and you have not planted one at this time, you could have problems, because the ACR is not eligible at this time. If you have planted the cover crop, you must report that it has been planted to make your ACR land eligible.

FAILED ACRES

Before you plow up any program crops that are not harvested, you must file an ASCS-574 for failed acres. The failed acreage must be due to a disaster such as hail, excess rain, and drought. The excess weeds due to unworkmanlike manner is not considered a disaster. If you filed an ASCS-574 and the reason for the 574 is due to weeds, then chances are very thin that the crop will be eligible for any deficiency payments.

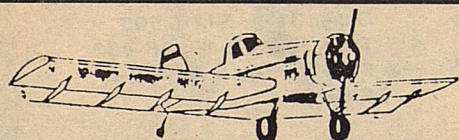

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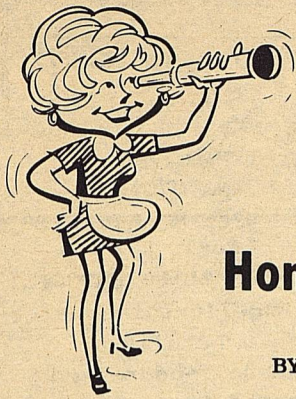

WHAT'S NEW IN THE MEAT CASE

If you haven't looked closely at the meat case lately - look again. You're likely to find leaner, lower-calorie and more convenient products.

At the 1987 Beef Industry Conference held Aug. 10-12 at Texas A&M University, a number of products already on the market, in test-marketing or being developed were on display. Here are a few of those items.

If you want to cut calories or sodium in your diet, there are beef products that can help you accomplish that goal:

- Close-trimmed meat with no more than 1/4 " fat on the outside.
- Cuts with USDA labels indicating they are "light," "lite," or "leaner," which means they can contain 25% less fat or calories than what is typically found for that product. Beef labeled "lean" or "low-fat" can not contain more than 10% fat.

- Fully-cooked beef luncheon meats and sausages with less fat.
- Lower-fat and lower-sodium beef sausage.
- Changes in packaging have also made beef products more convenient to use:

- Stores are packaging carefully trimmed cuts of beef in portions for smaller families and light eaters.

- Individual cuts of meat are being vacuum packaged for retail sale at the grocers. This form of packaging extends the refrigerator shelf life of meat by seven days. The packages can also go directly into the freezer, without requiring further wrapping to

prevent freezer burn.

If you're interested in reducing preparation and cooking time, a variety of beef convenience products are now on the market:

- Grocery stores are preparing beef for stir fry, shish kabobs, breaded beef cutlets, spiced oven-ready cuts of meat and other dishes to save consumers both preparation and clean-up time.

- Pre-cooked beef ribs, roasts & microwavable "heat and eat" entrees are being offered in many chain supermarkets.

There are even some new kinds of products on the market made from "restructured" beef:

- Beef bacon, strips and nuggets.
- Intermediate priced roast beef, steaks and

chicken fried steak.

If you think you don't have the time to prepare beef, or that it won't fit into your diet, some of these new products may change your mind.

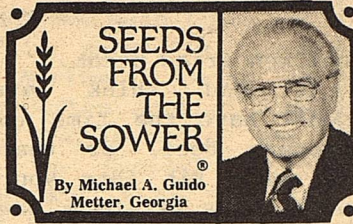

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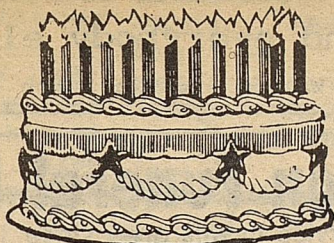
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
