Attorney Thomas A. Kokoska knows what it's like to be holed up in a windowless office in Manhattan for 15 hours a day with little contact with other people. A 1986 graduate of Southern Methodist University School of Law in Dallas, Kokoska said he is thrilled to get away from those working conditions to work for the Warner Law Firm in Pampa. Kokoska said his passion is working on big, complex cases. Although that kind of legal work is more commonly

found in the big cities, Kokoska said the Warner firm actually has some complex cases in the queue that lured him to Pampa. The corporate attorney got to know John Warner's daughter, Melanie, who lives in Fresno, Calif., working as a writer and editor. From Melanie, he heard about her dad's small but scrappy law firm in the Panhandle. Kokoska said he is looking forward to working with an attorney with such a distinguished career as Warner's.

## County may vote on budget Monday

The Commissioners Court of Gray County will hold a special session at 9 a.m. Monday, Sept. 9, in the Gray County Courtroom, 205 N. Russell St. The commissioners will consider adopting the budget for FY2014 and adopting a tax rate for FY2014. The county's proposed budget lists total expenditures at \$8,717,142 and total revenues at \$7,569,328. The proposed effective tax rate for this year is .456 per \$100 of assessed value. The commissioners will also consider the sale of land owned by Gray County that is inside Gaines County. If that land is sold, the proceeds will go to the school district. The Commissioners Court reserves the right to retire into executive session concerning any of the items listed on the special meeting agenda, whenever it is considered necessary and legally justified under the Open Meeting Law.

## Texas military ask for AG opinion on same-sex benefits

The Texas Military Forces has asked Attorney General Greg Abbott how it should proceed with an apparent conflict between federal and state law over whether to extend veteran benefits to same-sex spouses. The request asks how Texas Military Forces (TXMF), a state agency that includes the Texas National Guard, should reconcile Texas law, which does not recognize same-sex marriage, with the U.S. Department of Defense's recent policy of extending such benefits to same-sex spouses. TXMF says national guard personnel are under state purview only until they are called to active duty, at which point they answer to the federal government. The result is legal ambiguity. "What action, if any, can the TXMF take in order to fulfill the [defense department] policy of extending spousal and dependant benefits to same-sex spouses without violating the Texas Constitution or Texas state law?" the letter asks. The attorney general has 120 days to complete the legal review, and an Abbott spokesman said the process usually

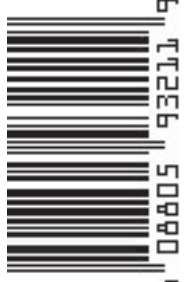

## US rig count drops 9 this week to 1,767

HOUSTON (AP) — Oilfield services company Baker Hughes Inc. says the number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. dropped nine this week to 1,767.

The Houston-based company said in its weekly report Friday 1,365 rigs were exploring for oil and 394 for gas. Eight were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago there were 1,864 active rigs.

gas-producing states, Colorado gained two rigs and Kansas, Pennsylvania and Utah each gained one rig.

Texas lost eight rigs, California lost three, New Mexico lost two and Louisiana and North Dakota each lost one. Alaska, Arkansas, Ohio, Oklahoma, West Virginia and Wyoming were unchanged.

The U.S. rig count peaked at 4,530 in 1981 and bottomed at 488 in 1999.

like the things I've done. The more I talked to him, the more I wanted to do it. Pampa is growing with the oil. I can do investigative work here just like anywhere else."

Kokoska has worked on both coasts. In California, he served as general counsel with the Fresno Grizzlies, the Triple A affiliate of the two-time World Series Champion San Francisco Giants. In Connecticut, he was general counsel and secretary with DeMatteo Industries, a business conglomerate.

The Connecticut native is returning to Texas after being away for 23 years.

During his first stint in Texas, Kokoska represented billionaire Bum Bright

and his various entities, including the Dallas Cowboys, Texas Stadium and Bright Bank.

His clients have ranged from Indian tribes and casinos to moving and trucking companies, from art auction houses to galleries and artists, from banks and financial institutions to technology startups and authors. "The input and ideas I receive from these meetings help me effectively represent and advocate for my constituents in the Texas House," King said.

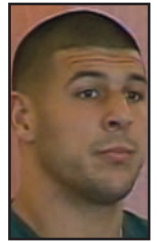


# Aaron Hernandez pleads not guilty

FALL RIVER, Mass. (AP) — Former New England Patriots star Aaron Hernandez pleaded not guilty to a first-degree murder charge Friday following his indictment in the killing of a friend authorities say was shot five times in an industrial park.

Hernandez firmly answered "not guilty" to six charges, including murder and weapons and ammunition possession charges.

His attorneys agreed that Hernandez, 23, will continue to be held without bail, but reserved the right to

request bail later. His next court hearing was set for Oct. 9.

Defense attorney Charles Rankin said Hernandez's lawyers are confident that Hernandez will be exonerated during a trial.

"Not one shred of evidence has been presented yet," he said.

The arraignment "is

like the opening kickoff," Rankin said, and encouraged people to keep an open mind and let the lawyers do their work.

A Massachusetts grand jury last month returned the indictment against Hernandez in the death of Odin Lloyd, a 27-year-old semi-professional football player from Boston who was dating the sister of Hernandez's girlfriend.

Hernandez was arrested in June and pleaded not guilty to murder and weapons charges in district court.

The indictment moves the case to superior court, where jury trials in murder cases are held.

Hernandez, who was cut from the Patriots within hours of his arrest, has been held without bail.

Prosecutors say the former NFL star orchestrated Lloyd's killing because he was upset at Lloyd for talking to some people with whom Hernandez had problems at a nightclub a few days earlier.

Defense attorneys say the evidence is circumstantial and that the state's case

won't hold up.

Two other men who prosecutors say were with Hernandez when Lloyd was killed are also facing charges.

Ernest Wallace was indicted on a charge of accessory to murder after the fact.

He earlier pleaded not guilty to the same charge in district court and was ordered held on \$500,000 bail.

Carlos Ortiz pleaded not guilty to a firearms charge and is being held without bail.

takes several months.

Daniel Williams, legislative specialist for Equality Texas, an LGBT advocacy group, would not comment on the prospective outcome of the attorney general's review.

But he said in the meantime, "the major general [of TXMF] should do the right thing.

In this case, the right thing is to respect the people who serve our country" by extending benefits to same-sex spouses.

The attorney general's office is likely to side with the state. On Wednesday, Abbott, who is running for the Republican nomination for governor, said litigation could follow if the San Antonio City Council passed a policy banning discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity. Citing free speech issues, Abbott wrote, "If the city ignores this advice and adopts the proposed ordinance, legal action will surely follow."

The ordinance passed on Thursday with an 8-3 vote.

## Original story:

U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder told congressional leaders in a Wednesday letter that the Obama administration would no longer enforce a law banning same-sex

spouses of veterans from receiving military benefits.

He said the Justice Department had chosen to extend the Supreme Court's rationale in its decision overturning part of the Defense of Marriage Act to Title 38, the public law that governs veterans' benefits, calling the definition of marriage in both cases "substantively identical."

The news follows Tuesday's very different announcement by the Texas National Guard that it will not provide benefits for same-sex couples.

Maj. Gen. John Nichols, adjutant general of Texas Military Forces, a state agency, said in a memo that the Texas National Guard was prohibited from enrolling same-sex families

in its benefits program at state-supported facilities, citing the state Constitution's definition of marriage as between a man and a woman.

Nichols encouraged couples affected by the policy to request benefits at one of Texas' federal installations instead.

"Despite the legal conflict, the Texas Military Forces remains committed to ensuring military personnel and their families receive the benefits to which they are entitled," the Texas National Guard said in the memo. The Associated Press reported on Tuesday — the first day gays in the military could apply for partner benefits — that Texas and Mississippi were the only two states refusing to process benefits requests from same-sex couples, despite a Pentagon directive that they do it.

It's still unclear what

implications Holder's letter will have in Texas. The Texas National Guard did not immediately respond to requests seeking comment.

But Brian Thompson, a member of the board of directors for Equality Texas, an LGBT advoca-

cy group, said Wednesday that he doubts it will have an immediate effect on the Texas National Guard's policy. "Holder's going to allow VA benefits to flow to same-sex couples who are married," Thompson said.

## Bouncin' Around

# Teachers provide the spark of learning and love to students

School has started again, and once again that mix of emotions from parents who are (a) relieved that the kids are going back to school, or (b) emotionally sending kids off to kindergarten, junior high, high school, or college.

In our family, the triplets have begun fifth grade, while their older brother is off to eighth grade. What memories do you have of your school years? I clearly remember my walk down to the end of our street, across the bridge over a "wash" (California's urban version of a river) and into my class. I still remember taking a nap on a mat, and my wonder at drinking milk out of a little square container. I guess I was a difficult student because my kindergarten teacher was going to be my first grade teacher, but she threatened to have a nervous breakdown if I were in her class, so they promoted me to second grade instead. Apparently the teacher didn't appreciate all my questions or my correcting her spelling errors. Our family went through a difficult time when I was in third grade,

and I attended three different schools. The third teacher, Miss Trombley (one of few whose names I remember) took me in hand and redirected my curiosity toward more challenging reading and science. At Christmas she cemented my adoration by giving me (and all the rest of the girls in the class) a gift of barrettes. I had never had barrettes before! Two more schools later, and I had my first male teacher, Mr. Alcanter, for fifth grade. Mr. A. provided the spark that ignited my love of writing. He encouraged me to enter an essay contest sponsored by our local newspaper, and I won with a story about a European orphan adopted by an American family. He visited our home, and tried to convince my mother that I should skip sixth grade and go straight to junior high. She refused, and I will always be grateful, because it was very difficult for me being the youngest in my high school class. There were several teachers in junior high and high school who kept me interested in learning. Mr. Beusee had his "knowledge knocker" — a thin dowel with a small block of wood on the end which he would use to rap an inattentive student on the head (and

which would probably get him in deep trouble today!) I tended to daydream a bit, so I did get the knowledge knocker a few times. Mrs. Stanger was devoted to studies of Lincoln, and shared her love with us. She felt that everyone used the wrong emphasis when reading or reciting the Gettysburg Address. We were taught to stress, "... government of the people, by the people, and for the people..." something she felt the American government failed to do. My high school American History teacher, Mr. Merrill, told us right off that we would not be required to memorize dates, as long as we knew them. Most of our learning was done in a more dramatic way, as we put on mini-plays based on the history we were learning. He and his wife adopted a little boy that year, and we kidded him that he should name his new son George, since that was Mr. Merrill's name too. His answer: "What, an American History teacher should name his child George III?" There was Mr. Gerald, my chemistry teacher, who refused to allow girls to believe they were not as able as boys to grasp the concepts. I can still name most of the elements in the Periodic Table of

Elements. I was in contact with Mr. Gerald recently, and was so pleased that he still remembered me after all these years (I graduated in 1965). In chatting with him, I found out that he and several other teachers knew that my home life was difficult, and that I had a job every day after school and on some weekends. They always made me feel like I was special in a good way, and that I could do anything I really wanted to do. Our daughter had some really great teachers in her school years, and she had some really awful teachers. Some of the awful ones would have been better suited as anything other than teachers, but hopefully she remembers the good ones and how they helped her. If you are a teacher, you have my sincere thanks for all you are doing for students, often in light of budget constraints and uncooperative parents. You may never know how you have touched any of these students, but I hope that at least some of them have been inspired, encouraged and cared for just as I was by the ones I mentioned here.

Is it possible that some of our young people have discovered that the latest fads that work their way into the church are not as deep and rich as the worship that has been handed down a couple of thousand years? Maybe some will start to see that there is a deep richness to a crucifix, a centrally placed altar, vested clergy, and reverent worship. So I go back to being so thankful my church is uncool. This is true for their pastor also. My 11-year-old son reminds me every day that I am not cool. My shorts don't go down to the knees far

enough. My hair is too short. My beard is too gray. And my knowledge of music is too dull, so he says. I realize that I am a middle-aged pastor in my mid-forties. I am not cool, in or with it. So I haven't tried to be cool to my younger members. Why? That would only annoy them. My pastoral care for my Millennials and younger members is to teach them, mentor them, and care for their souls as I would all of my other members of all generations. I speak to them about God's Word and offer them the Sacraments they need. The biggest difference I see with the older crowd and the younger crowd is that I hear more about aches and pains with the more mature in my flock than texting, friends, and movies. But what is taught and proclaimed and distributed is what our Lord taught, preached, and distributed in His ministry. All ages really can receive Christ's gifts in the same fashion. So our church ministers to the Millennials the same "uncool" way. The very old yet completely relevant historic liturgy and hymns of the Church, God's Word and the Sacraments, reverent services, and classes to teach the Faith are all part of our gathering. The worship is considered "other-worldly" as Heaven and earth meet together in the holy liturgy in the Eucharist. Christ crucified and risen for the forgiveness of sins is the central message. That is for all ages and has been around so much longer than the fads that come and go so quickly. So whether you are a Millennial, a Gen-Xer, a Baby Boomer or older what you get at my church is an un-cool church. God's Word and Sacraments are holy, lasting and humble and not "cool" like all that the world seeks. And I am just fine with that.

# Woman on death row could get retrial

PHOENIX (AP) — An Arizona woman who has spent more than two decades on death row after being convicted of having her 4-year-old son killed for an insurance payout is expected to be released on Friday while she awaits a retrial of the case that made her one of the state's most reviled inmates.

Judge Rosa Mroz of Maricopa County Superior Court set Debra Milke's bond at \$250,000 a day earlier, saying there's no direct evidence linking her to her son's death other than a purported confession to a detective. And, the judge said, the validity of that confession is in doubt.

Sheriff Joe Arpaio said Milke would probably be released Friday. Defense attorney Michael Kimerer did not respond to questions from The Associated Press.

If she is freed, Milke's lawyers have said she plans to stay at a home that supporters bought for her in the Phoenix area.

She has been imprisoned since 1990.

Prosecutors say Milke had her son, Christopher, killed to collect on a \$5,000 insurance policy. Authorities say she dressed the boy in his favorite outfit and told him he was going to see Santa Claus at a mall in December 1989.

She then handed the boy over to two men who were later convicted of taking the child to the desert and shooting him.

Her pending freedom, at least for now, comes six months after a federal appeals court overturned Milke's conviction, ruling that the prosecution should have disclosed information about the truthfulness of the now-retired detective who testified that Milke confessed.

Milke was a 25-year-old insurance company clerk when her son was killed. Now 49, she has maintained her innocence, saying she had nothing to do with the slaying.

The two men convicted in the case both remain on death row. Neither Roger Scott nor former Milke roommate James Styers testified at Milke's trial.

Scott confessed during a police interrogation and led detectives to the boy's body. Maricopa County prosecutors

are still seeking the death penalty against Milke at her retrial, tentatively for Sept. 30, and her alleged confession is at the heart of the case against her.

Police detective Armando Saldate Jr. testified at Milke's trial that she confessed to him in a closed interrogation room.

But Saldate's honesty was called into question during Milke's appeals. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals concluded in March that prosecutors' failure to turn over evidence related to Saldate's credibility deprived Milke's attorneys of the chance to question his truthfulness before jurors.

"No civilized system of justice should have to depend on such flimsy evidence, quite possibly tainted by dishonesty or overzealousness, to decide whether to take someone's life or liberty," Chief Judge Alex Kozinski wrote for the court.

The court noted four cases in which judges threw out confessions or indictments because Saldate lied under oath and four instances in which cases were tossed out or confessions excluded because Saldate violated the suspect's constitutional rights.

He was also suspended for accepting sexual favors from a female motorist he stopped and then lying about the encounter, the court said.

Deputy County Attorney Vince Imbordino argued last week during a bond hearing that the purported confession is still admissible, but Mroz said the undisclosed material concerning Saldate "casts serious doubt" on its validity. The judge scheduled a Sept. 23 hearing on the defense's request to prohibit the prosecution from using the confession during the retrial.

"Much has transpired since the original trial," Mroz said. Milke's ex-husband, a man named Arizona Milke, is convinced his former wife was involved in their son's murder. He said Thursday he intends to sue her, the state and Saldate for what he believes is a conspiracy to conceal the boy's real killer.

"She'll win this case criminally," he said Thursday. "But she'll lose it civilly, and so will the state."

# Zimmerman's wife says he is 'selfish'

SANFORD, Fla. (AP) — George Zimmerman's wife, Shellie, said she stood by her man "through everything" but once he was acquitted of murder charges in the 2012 shooting of teenager Trayvon Martin, he left her with "a bunch of pieces of broken glass."

Zimmerman, who filed for divorce from George Zimmerman on Thursday, told ABC's "Good Morning America" in an interview aired Friday that her husband is selfish.

In the interview, she said her husband only stayed in their house three or four nights since the trial ended in July and that they even tried counseling but she moved out Aug. 13.

"I have a selfish husband and I think George is all about George," she said.

Last week, Shellie Zimmerman pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor perjury charge for lying during a bail hearing following her husband's arrest after the fatal shooting of 17-year-old Martin. She was sentenced to a year's probation and 100 hours of community service.

"I stood by my husband through everything," she told ABC, "and I kind of feel like he left me with a bunch of pieces of broken glass that I'm supposed to now assemble and make a life."

ny perjury charge came after she lied about the couple's assets when her husband was seeking release from jail on a lower bond. Court records show that in the days before the June 2012 bond hearing, Shellie Zimmerman transferred \$74,000 — broken into eight smaller transfers ranging from \$7,500 to \$9,990 — from her husband's credit union account to hers. It also shows that \$47,000 was transferred from George Zimmerman's account to his sister's in the days before the hearing. Amounts of over \$10,000 would have been reported to the Internal Revenue Service.

After she pleaded guilty, she told ABC that she lied. "I can rationalize a lot of reasons for why I was misleading, but the truth is that I knew I was lying," she said.

In the interview on Friday, Shellie Zimmerman said she'll seek custody of the couple's two dogs and a share of anything he might win in a defamation lawsuit he's filed against NBC.

She says her husband was verbally abusive toward her and that he has been making what she considers "reckless decisions." She didn't specify what those decisions were. "In my opinion, he feels more invincible" since his acquittal, she added.

# US employers add 169K jobs; rate falls to 7.3%

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. economy is producing jobs at a still-subpar pace — a trend the Federal Reserve will weigh in deciding this month whether to slow its bond buying and, if so, by how much.

Employers added 169,000 jobs in August but many fewer in June and July than previously thought, the Labor Department said Friday. Combined, June, July and August amounted to the weakest three-month stretch of job growth in a year.

The unemployment rate dropped to 7.3 percent, the lowest in nearly five years. But it fell because more Americans stopped looking for work and were no longer counted as unemployed. The proportion of Americans working or looking for work reached its lowest point in 35 years.

The jobs picture is sure to weigh heavily when the Fed meets Sept. 17-18 to discuss whether to scale back its \$85 billion a month in Treasury and mortgage bond purchases. Those purchases have helped keep home-loan and other borrowing rates ultra-low to try to encourage consumers and businesses to borrow and spend more.

Friday's report "is a mixed bag that can be used to support an immediate tapering of the Fed's monthly asset purchases or delaying that move until later this year," said Paul Ashworth, an economist at Capital Economics, said.

The revised job growth for June and July shrank the previously estimated gain for those months by a combined 74,000. July's gain is now estimated at 104,000 — the

fewest in more than a year and down from the previous estimate of 162,000. June's was revised to 172,000 from 188,000.

In the past three months, employers have added an average of just 148,000 jobs. The average monthly gain for 2013 so far is 180,000, almost identical to the 183,000 average for 2012.

Stocks fell slightly in midmorning trading, but that may have stemmed mainly from tensions over the prospect of U.S. military action against Syria. The Dow Jones industrial average declined about 54 points.

The yield on the 10-year Treasury note fell to 2.92 percent, from 2.95 percent before the jobs report was released at 8:30 a.m. Eastern time.

Investors may think the report makes it less likely the Fed will significantly slow its bond purchases.



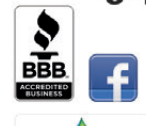

There is a clear difference in districts in high school football, and in the inter-district match-up between the 3A Pampa Harvesters and 4A Canyon Eagles the first half showed it.

Pampa was outgunned and out-matched in the first half as the senior "skill position" players for Canyon at quarterback, running back and wide receiver showed why they may be one of the best teams in the area.

It wasn't completely doom and gloom for the Harvesters in the first half as they still showed the ability to shake off tackles, get loose and get into the open field. Over the years, Richards said that the company has improved by becoming more efficient and time management has gotten better over time, as well.

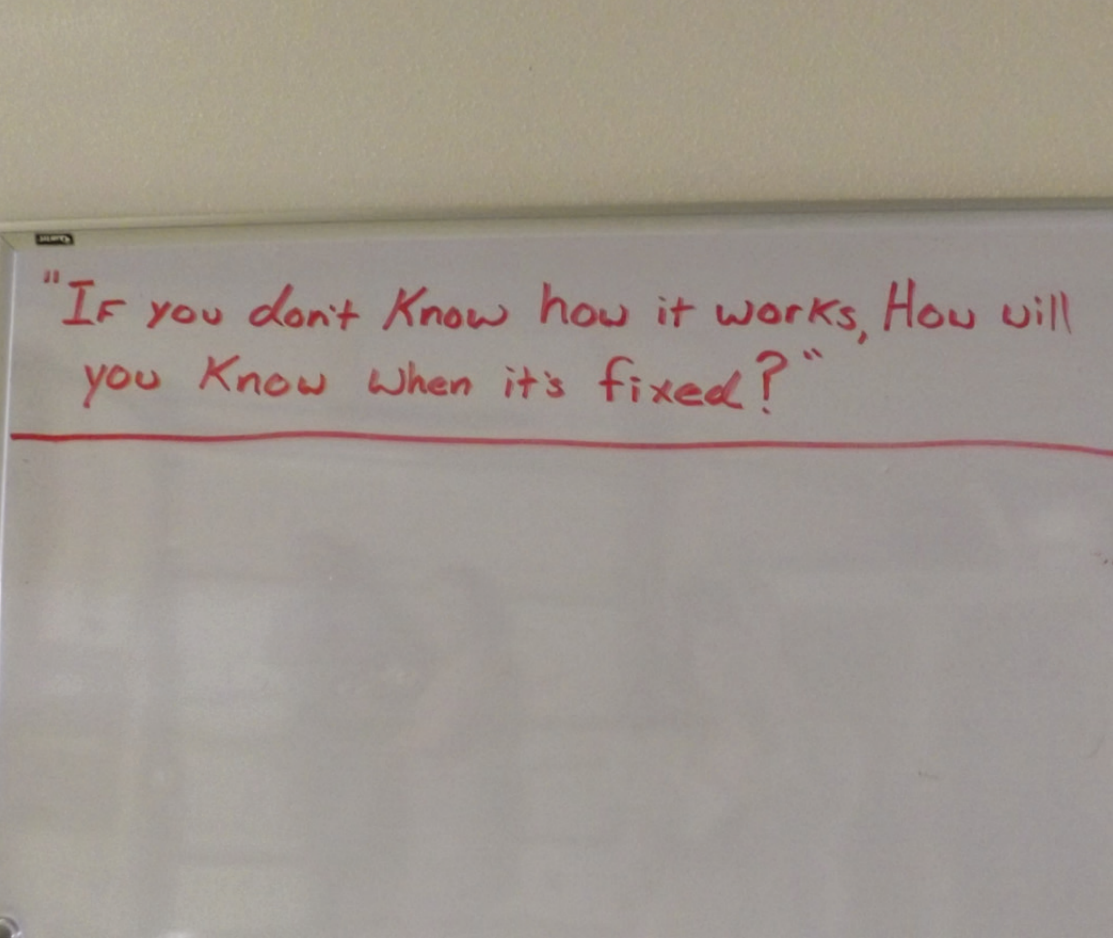
What you see is what you get with Malcolm Hinkle, which is why the company was voted the best customer service in Pampa (Ammons Companies tied for the win in this category).
