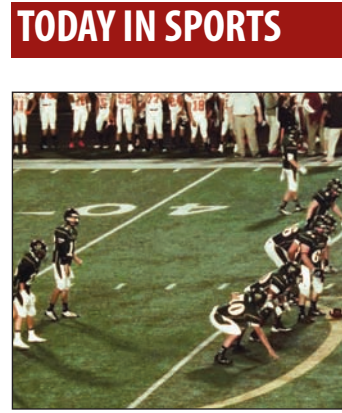

## Red River Steakhouse unveils tabletops that feature ads from area businesses.

 Is good as the food is at the Red River Steakhouse in McLean, on Wednesday it was the tabletops that got most of the attention.  
 The restaurant unveiled tabletops in its smaller dining area that featured embedded advertisements from area businesses.  
 ABC Advertising National Headquarters of Sedalia, Mo. produced the tables and solicited the advertising.  
 The restaurants never own the tables, said Derek South, the company's local representative.  
 The advertisers pay for a spot under a three-and-half-year contract and the restaurants use the tables at no charge, South said.  
 ABC is one of the nation's leading manufacturers of restaurant tabletops featuring advertisements. Their tables can be found in more than 3,000 restaurants across the U.S. with advertisements from thousands of businesses.  
 Originally, South said his company would place between 50 to 60 ads on a tabletop, but in time reduced the number to around 30 and made the ads larger.  
 The tabletops are made from a very hard compressed board and the trim is a solid ash wood.



South was at Red River Wednesday night, where a dinner of either grilled chicken or pork loin was served on-the-house to the advertisers.  
 "It's a win-win situation for everybody," South told The Pampa News.  
 ABC's restaurant clients get attractive, solidly-built tables for free and businesses get their ads in front of the hundreds of customers who dine at the tables over the period of the **TABLES** cont. on page 3

## Evolution, textbook review focus of SBOE hearing

 A past Texas State Board of Education chairman and outspoken creationist urged his former colleagues on Tuesday to approve high school biology textbooks he said would "strike a final blow to the teaching of evolution."  
 Appearing at a board hearing on new instructional materials, Don McLeroy, a Bryan dentist who lost his seat on the SBOE in the 2010 Republican primary, told board members that the science textbooks currently under consideration contained many "hidden gems just waiting to be mined by inquisitive students" that proved there was no evidence for evolution.  
 McLeroy's testimony diverged from other witnesses skeptical of evolution, who criticized the proposed textbooks for inadequate coverage of alternatives to the scientific theory and asked the board not to approve them until publishers made changes.  
 His statements prompted a confused question from board member Mavis Knight, D-Dallas.  
 "Are you saying 'adopt these books' face-

## KING SPEAKS AT CHAMBER LUNCHEON

 State Rep. Ken King was the guest speaker at Tuesday's Pampa Chamber of Commerce monthly luncheon. King lives in Canadian and represents District 88, which includes Pampa. King finished his first year at the Texas Statehouse, which included three special sessions. King said he has worked diligently to ensure rural Texas is not left behind in Austin. "There are only 19 (state) congressmen west of I-35." He wrote House Bill 1926, which was filed without the governor's signature. The purpose of the education bill is to set up online learning programs he said would raise the bar for students at rural schools. King said the intent is not to replace classroom teachers, but to provide opportunities not available to students in rural districts. For instance, Pampa High School does not have a teacher who can teach Mandarin Chinese, but there are four such teachers in Plano. A student in Pampa could take the course online while still participating in the classroom for his other subjects.

# Texas fruitcake chain controller appears in court

DALLAS (AP) — The former controller of the famed Collin Street Bakery chain has pleaded not guilty to federal charges claiming he embezzled nearly \$17 million from the company.

Sandy Jenkins was in-

dicted last week on 10 counts of mail fraud.

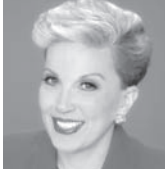
Court documents say Jenkins managed a scheme to defraud the Corsicana-based bakery by writing almost 900 fraudulent checks from 2005 through this June. The indictment

alleges he spent the money on luxury vehicles, a second home in Santa Fe, N.M., some 60 watches, about 600 bottles of wine, jewelry, and other items.

Bakery managers detected the fraudulent activity, confronted Jenkins and

fired him. They reported their suspicions to Corsicana police, who reported the matter to the FBI.

The Dallas Morning News reported Jenkins' plea Thursday (<http://bit.ly/18XdePs>). He remains in federal custody.

contract, he said. Will Frost, who owns Red River with his parents, agreed that the table-top advertising should stimulate business in the area. "We want to spread good will and show our support for businesses," he said. Since the restaurant opened in 1997, business has been non-stop, he said. Red River is located less than a mile off Interstate 40 and not only attracts interstate travelers, but people from towns all around the area. "It's worth the drive," Frost said. The building was originally a church and then a trinket shop, Frost said. The building was expanded in 2001, he added. Local musicians perform mostly original music on the weekends and the restaurant has a robust catering business, he said.

Frost said he first saw tables at the Blue Sky restaurant in Amarillo and thought they'd be a good idea for his restaurant. Jack A. Moreman, who owns Rolling Plains AG Compost Inc., in Clarendon, is one of the advertisers who attended Wednesday's dinner. "I think the tables look great," he said. South, who mingled with the business owners as orders were being taken, said he heard nothing but positive feedback. He said Thursday in an email the response has been so good that the restaurant wants to get the second room done soon. Among the Pampa advertising with displays on the tables are Texas Furniture, Prestige Auto Body, Bob Douthit Auto and The Pampa News. Most of the ads had "QR codes," which when scanned by a smart phone takes you directly to the advertiser's website or Facebook page.

tionously?" she asked. McLeroy said he wasn't. He said that despite assertions of "robust evidence" for evolution, the textbooks actually offered few facts supporting it. He cited lessons on the complexity of cell structures and gaps in fossil records. "Evolutionists argue that creationists want to force their religious views into the text, but just the teaching of biology accomplishments that," he said. "Support the Bible, adopt these books." The 15-member SBOE won't vote on the 14 science textbooks currently under consideration until November. Chairwoman Barbara Cargill, R-The Woodlands, said the board would also discuss revising the state's textbook approval process, which science education advocates have criticized for allegedly lacking transparency and including unqualified reviewers. Cargill herself has drawn accusations of improper involvement in the review process from the Texas Freedom Network, a group that monitors religious influence in public schools, after reports that she encouraged creationists on the panels. Cargill said she only attended the meetings to thank volunteers for their work reviewing the texts. State panels have been reviewing sample instructional materials since April. The panels, which are assembled by SBOE members, have included several prominent creationists and evolution skeptics, as well as others without a background in education or science. Their preliminary proposed changes obtained

by the Texas Freedom Network pushed for the inclusion of more arguments critical of evolution. Concern about creationists' outsize participation in the review process also prompted a University of Texas graduate student who served on the panels, Jimmy Gollihar, to write a letter to the state board last week. "It is impossible to conclude that the teams reviewing textbooks were anything other than grossly skewed and obviously biased," he said. "The net result of having a huge raft of non-scientists on the panels was that rather than checking for factual errors in the texts, I was put into the position of having to painstakingly educate other panel members on past and current literature." Prior to Tuesday's hearing, three SBOE members — Ruben Cortez, D-Brownsville; Marisa Perez, D-San Antonio; and Martha Dominguez, D-El Paso — expressed their disappointment with the process at a rally organized by the Texas Freedom Network. They said that publishers were being pressured into including non-science-based arguments against evolution and called for only "content-relevant educators" to be included on review panels. Cargill said during the hearing that she had asked publishers to voluntarily disclose for public review any changes they made to textbooks prior to their adoption. She also emphasized that any reports made by review teams were preliminary — and that in November, the board would take up suggestions about how to improve the process. "I'm very appreciative of the reviewers themselves," she said. "But we've got some work to do."

# Number of missing in Colo. floods drops

LONGMONT, Colo. (AP) — The number of people unaccounted for from Colorado's devastating flooding has fallen dramatically as rescuers reach stranded victims, and electricity and phone services are restored to ravaged areas, allowing residents to contact family, friends or authorities. But some of the stranded are refusing to leave their homes, prompting crews to show them photos of the surrounding destruction amid warnings that they could be cut off from essential services for several weeks. Some of those who did leave were getting a first-hand understanding of the destruction. Business owners were allowed back into the heavily damaged town of Lyons to assess the damage on Wednesday, and homeowners under mandatory evacuations were expected to follow Thursday. Also Wednesday, Jamestown residents were allowed home, and three entrances to Rocky Mountain National Park were reopened. Jennifer Hillmann, a spokeswoman for the Larimer County Sheriff's Office north of Boulder, said Wednesday that widespread airlifts have given way to "pinpoint" rescues and door-to-door searches. Urban search-and-rescue teams with dogs and medical supplies began picking through homes, vehicles and debris piles for victims. The number of people reported unaccounted for dwindled from a high of 1,200 to about 200. "We're having a lot of people who are holed up and they don't want to leave the area," Hillmann said. But she added that "we're getting a lot more people calling in and saying, 'hey, here's where I'm at. I'm safe.'" Search crews also are documenting the damage they find, Boulder County Sheriff Joe Pelle said. It is part of responders ending the "high-octane" emergency response to the widespread flooding that began last week "and moving into the long and arduous task ahead," he said. Ten helicopters were still flying rescue missions, down from a high of about two dozen. Some of the helicopters that have been used for emergency airlifts may be returned to Fort Carson, where they will be on standby, Colorado National Guard Lt. Mitch Utterback said. Many homeowners ignored the evacuation orders to stay with their homes, and they waved off rescue helicopters flying overhead. Hillmann said search crews were showing some of them photos of how broad the destruction is in hopes they will leave, noting that some mountain communities could start getting snow soon. "Although it might be OK where you are now, up the canyon and down the canyon are completely washed out," she said.

## There is no right or wrong vote on Syria

If you cobble together every major decision that President Barack Obama has had to make since he entered the Oval Office, none has been more perplexing and difficult as the decision to strike Syria

for using chemical weapons on its own people.

As members of Congress grapple with how they are going to vote, there is no typical constituency on any side of this debate. Congressional Black Caucus members, some of the staunchest supporters of Obama, are not enthralled with voting yes to authorize a military strike, sounding like many libertarian Republicans who can't justify to their supporters the cost of the action.

House leaders John Boehner, Eric Cantor and Nancy Pelosi have all encouraged their members to support the action, but they are standing out on a ledge and few are trying to pull them back in. Members are being accused of flip-flopping on the issue, but that's not how anyone should see this decision.

President Obama has made a series of statements on the issue, including his famous "red line" speech a year ago. Secretary of State John Kerry and Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel, two military veterans, have made the administration's case, but there is still a lot of doubt and confusion as to whether the United States firing missiles and/or drones into Syria will make a bit of difference.

Turn to cable news and reliable hawkish conservatives are on opposite ends of this debate. And then you have reliable dovish liberals who are saying the president must act.

Frankly, I would hate to have to vote on this issue; you can reasonably make the case for hitting Syria and the case against the action, all at the same time.

But one thing is clear: The American people are not in favor of the action. The NBC/Wall St. Journal poll shows nearly 80 percent of Americans wanting the president to get congressional approval to strike Syria.

The overriding issue for Americans is we are sick of war. After the debacle in Iraq, the long slog in Afghani-

stan, seeing thousands of our men and women return from the battlefield battling debilitating injuries, PTSD and the suicide rate through the roof, Americans of all stripes have said enough is enough.

That really is the most difficult issue President Obama has to overcome, even if we are offended by the use of chemical weapons on humans, especially children.

President Obama has made it clear that striking Syrian President Bashar Hafez al-Assad will not result in regime change. Well if we're going to hit him hard, and it won't alter the course of the civil war going on there, exactly why are we doing it?

Now for those who support President Obama, the other quagmire is taking out Assad and not knowing who will take over the country. There are numerous rebels fighting Assad, and some factions are led by al-Qaida. So taking out the Assad regime could put al-Qaida in charge of a major country in the Middle East, and now we have Afghanistan all over again.

Those are the fears expressed by members of Congress, and you know what? Everyone is right and no one is wrong.

Then the final issue is the credibility of America if we do nothing. "Our word is bond" has always been something American leaders have touted to the world. Saying that we would make Assad pay for using chemical weapons, and then not doing so, would embarrass the U.S. globally and allow Obama's critics to gloat that he is a weak leader.

I've tried to look at this issue from multiple angles and have not been able to find a sense of certainty on either side. Members of Congress are getting an earful from their constituents in town hall meetings, and competing interests on all sides are lobbying.

If there ever were a time the phrase "vote your conscience" applied, this would be it. And truth be told, no matter how a member of Congress votes, I can't be mad. Because those voting for or against will be right and just.

## Lindsey's plan for war on Iran

This summer produced a triumph of American patriotism.

A grassroots coalition arose to demand Congress veto any war on Syria. Congress got the message and was ready to vote no to war, when President Obama seized upon Vladimir Putin's offer to work together to disarm Syria of chemical weapons.

The war America did not want — did not come.

Lindsey Graham is determined that this does not happen again.

The next war he and his collaborators are planning, the big one, the war on Iran, will not be blocked the same way.

How does Graham propose to do this?

He plans to introduce a use-of-force resolution, a peacetime declaration of war on Iran, to ensure Obama need not come back to Congress — and can attack Iran at will. Lindsay intends a preemptive surrender of Congress' constitutional war-making power — to Obama.

He wants to give Obama a blank check for war on Iran, then stampede Obama into starting the war.

On Fox's "Huckabee" Sunday, Lindsey laid out his scheme:

"I'm going to get a bipartisan coalition together. We're going to put together

a use-of-force resolution, allowing our country to use military force ... to stop the Iranian nuclear program.

... I'm going to need your help, Mike, and the help of Americans and friends of Israel."

In July, Graham told a cheering conference of Christians United for Israel: "If nothing changes in Iran, come September, October, I will present a resolution that will authorize the use of military force to prevent Iran from developing a nuclear bomb."

That Graham is braying that he intends to give Obama a blank check for war on Iran is not all bad news. For he thus concedes Obama does not now have the authority to attack Iran.

And by equating Iran's "nuclear program" with a "nuclear bomb" program, Graham reveals that his bottom line is not Obama's bottom line, but Benjamin Netanyahu's.

Obama has said only that Iran must not be allowed to build a bomb. Bibi says Iran must not have a nuclear program.

Yet, make no mistake. The goal of Graham, the neocons, Israel and Saudi Arabia is not a negotiated solution permitting a peaceful nuclear program in Iran. The goal is a U.S. war to smash Iran.

On Nov. 10, 2010, Graham let it all out: "Instead of a surgical strike on their nuclear infrastructure, I think we're to the point now that you have to really neuter the regime's ability to wage war against us and our

allies. ... [We must] destroy the ability of the regime to strike back."

Graham wants us to do to Iran what President Bush II did to Iraq.

But there are obstacles in our warlord's path.

First, there is no conclusive proof Iran has decided to build a bomb.

Twice, the U.S. intelligence community, in 2007 and 2011, has asserted with high confidence that Iran has made no such decision.

Senators who do not seek a new war with Iran should call James Clapper, Director of National Intelligence, to testify publicly as to whether Iran is "racing" toward a bomb. Or is this the usual War Party propaganda?

As of today, Iran has not tested a bomb and, to our knowledge, does not possess any uranium enriched to the 90 percent necessary to build a bomb. Indeed, Iran has just announced that half its supply of 20 percent-enriched uranium has been converted to fuel rods.

Iran's new president, Hassan Rouhani, was elected on a pledge to get U.S. sanctions lifted and to end Iran's isolation. But to accomplish this, he must prove that Iran has no active bomb program and that he is willing to allow intrusive inspections to prove it.

As a first step to negotiations, Rouhani just appointed the most pro-American foreign minister in four decades.

Moreover, Iran, victim of the worst poison gas attack since Benito Mussolini invaded Ethiopia, launched by

Saddam Hussein with U.S. knowledge, has condemned any Syrian use of chemical weapons and signed the agreement banning them as well the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty.

The Ayatollah has issued a fatwa against an Iranian nuclear weapon.

Often, the interests of adversaries coincide. In World War II, with Hitler as the enemy, the monster Stalin becomes an ally.

Putin wants no U.S. war on Syria or Iran. This requires no chemical weapons use in Syria and no nukes in Iran. This coincides with U.S. interests, if not Lindsey Graham's.

The Russians, with ties to Tehran and Damascus we do not have, can be helpful in keeping us out of wars we do not want.

The true friends of America are those seeking to keep us out of wars, not those maneuvering us in.

That Vladimir Putin is going to Tehran, and Obama to the U.N. to meet Rouhani is good news.

Better news would be that Congressional anti-interventionists were meeting Graham's war resolution with one of their own, reaffirming that, as of today, Obama has no authority to launch any preemptive or presidential war on Iran.

## Oklahoma St. names former NCAA official for review

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma State has appointed a former NCAA official to investigate alleged misconduct in the football program. School president Burns Hargis and the Board of Regents said Monday that Charles E. Smrt will lead an independent review of alleged violations first

reported by Sports Illustrated. “While the articles do not implicate any current coaches or players to have direct involvement in any alleged misconduct, we have a responsibility to confront these disturbing reports head on and with complete transparency,” Hargis said.

Hargis said Smrt is a veteran NCAA enforcement officer. He is currently president of a consulting firm specializing in compliance audits. Before that he was on the NCAA enforcement staff for almost 18 years. Tucker Link, chairman of the OSU/A&M Board of Regents, said the board en-

dorsed Smrt’s selection to determine, “based on credible sources and confirmed facts,” whether there is any truth to the claims made in the articles. “But let there be no doubt, the OSU Board of Regents does not and will not condone illegal, immoral and unethical conduct or conduct that

violates applicable rules,” Link said. Smrt said Hargis has offered him unfettered access as he conducts his review. “He has asked me to pursue the facts wherever they may lead. I assured him that I will do so, and that I will conduct the review with care and urgency,” he

said. The alleged violations reported by the magazine occurred between 2001 and 2010. Among the potential NCAA violations mentioned in the report are cash payments to players from boosters and assistant coaches, and sham jobs for which players were paid.

## Cowboys’ Claiborne has injured shoulder

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Morris Claiborne laughed when reminded of his Twitter rant a few hours after a pass interference penalty cost the Dallas Cowboys a final chance to come back against Kansas City.

The easy smile seemed to show he had moved on after feeling compelled to tell “the haters out there your opinion doesn’t matter so keep it to yourself.”

Moving on is what cornerbacks get paid to do, even those playing with an injured shoulder, wounded pride and the burden of being a No. 6 overall pick that the Cowboys moved up eight spots to get a year ago.

Claiborne still thinks he made the right move coming over the back of Chiefs receiver Donnie Avery to break up a pass short of the first down on third-and-10 — even if Cowboys coach Jason Garrett joined the chorus of those saying he was a little too aggressive.

And even if the resulting first down eventually left Tony Romo more than 50 yards from field goal range with 16 seconds left in Kansas City’s 17-16 win.

“Ain’t thinking about it,” Claiborne said Wednesday after the first practice for Sunday’s home game against St. Louis. “It’s nothing to me. I’m a corner. I learn to let stuff go quickly.”

It’s not the first lesson in moving on for the former All-America from LSU.

Last year in Philadelphia, Claiborne got beat for a touchdown and was penalized three times — twice for defensive holding and once for interfer-

ence. Garrett says Claiborne impressed everyone with the way he kept playing in that game, and moved on after a 38-23 Dallas win.

But there is a troubling stat for Claiborne: In eight games since that day in Philadelphia, he doesn’t have an interception and didn’t even have a pass breakup in seven of them. He’s up to 17 career games, with just one interception.

Thus, the scrutiny when the glare of the spotlight turned negative again in Kansas City.

“I could care less what somebody else says,” Claiborne said. “As long as I’m not hearing nothing from my coaches or the owner, I don’t really care.”

Garrett doesn’t sound worried about him.

“The opposing offenses are going to have success against corners in this league,” the coach said. “The quarterbacks are too good, the receivers are too good and it’s your job to keep bringing it when you play those kinds of positions.”

“They might have some success, but you’re not going away and I think Mo has demonstrated that throughout his career.”

The bigger concern for Claiborne might be his left shoulder. It was dislocated in the opener against the New York Giants, and he kept playing after trainers popped it back into place.

To try to protect the shoulder, Claiborne was limited to nickel situations against the Chiefs, with Orlando Scandrick taking his regular spot.

## Houston rookie Hopkins off to great start

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Texans have grown accustomed to watching star receiver Andre Johnson make spectacular grabs.

Just two games into his NFL career, the Texans are already beginning to expect equally dazzling catches from DeAndre Hopkins.

Hopkins reached above a defender to pull in a 3-yard touchdown reception to give Houston a 30-24 overtime win over the Titans.

“If you’re out at practice watching him, he makes a spectacular catch at least once a day and sometimes three times a day,” offensive coordinator Rick Dennison said.

“So for us to put the ball up and him to make a play, that’s great to see, but we kind of expected it. That’s what he’s here for.”

Johnson was knocked out of that game with a concussion. And with his status uncertain for Sunday’s game against Baltimore, the rookie could be needed again.

“He’s been asked to do a lot since he’s stepped into the building,” quarterback Matt Schaub said. “He just continues to make plays and when you give him a chance, he’s going to make you look good.”

The Texans have been impressed with the maturity of Hopkins since they selected him with the 27th overall pick in this year’s

draft. It was the first time Houston had drafted a receiver in the first round since taking Johnson with the No. 3 pick in 2003.

He sustained a concussion in the second pre-season game and sat out until the opener. But he showed no signs of rust, grabbing five catches for 66 yards in his NFL debut.

Hopkins finished with seven catches for 117 yards against the Titans. He also had another big play to set up the score when he caught a 25-yard pass on third-and-10 to get Houston to the 1-yard line.

A loss of 2 yards on a run backed Houston up to the 3 before the touchdown by Hopkins.

Hopkins said he hasn’t

paid much attention to the excitement over his big game among fans and tries to deflect attention about his performance.

“I feel like it’s important to the team,” he said when asked about his playmaking ability. “It takes some pressure off other guys that are making plays. When you’re one-on-one you always want to win those matchups.”

He feels as if his development was helped by the challenge of matching up against Houston’s first-team defense in practice every day.

“My confidence has grown since the first day I came out here going against Johnathan Joseph,” Hopkins said of Houston’s top cornerback.

## Rangers fall to Rays in 12 innings Wednesday

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — It wasn’t the worst loss of the season for the Texas Rangers, at least not yet.

But Wednesday night’s 4-3, 12-inning loss to the Tampa Bay Rays is one they will remember if they don’t reach the postseason. There were so many ways they could have won it.

“This is tough because we were right where we wanted to be with the right person (Joe Nathan) on the mound,” manager Ron Washington said of the 11th inning. “Joe’s been solid for us all year. It just didn’t happen tonight.”

Desmond Jennings’ RBI single in the 12th inning moved the Rays into the top spot in the AL wildcard race. Texas has a half-game lead over Cleveland, which lost at Kansas City, for the second wild card, and Baltimore is a game behind the Rangers, who

have lost eight of nine.

Jose Lobaton opened the 12th with a single off Joseph Ortiz (2-2) and pinch-runner Sam Fulld went to second on Yunel Escobar’s bunt. Fulld then scored the winning run on Jennings’ hit to right center.

Brandon Gomes (2-1) of the Rays struck out Ian Kinsler with runners on second and third with two outs in the top of the 12th. Jeff Baker had led off that inning with a pinch-hit double.

Texas took a 3-2 lead in the 11th when Elvis Andrus scored from first base on Adrian Beltre’s two-out single.

But Nathan couldn’t hold the lead, even after getting the first two outs in the 11th. The Rays tied it on David DeJesus’ RBI single after Nathan walked Matt Joyce. Pinch-runner Freddy Guzman stole second and scored on DeJe-

sus’ ground ball up the middle.

“He didn’t hit it great, but he hit it enough to get it through the infield, in the right spot. A lot of times that’s what this game is about — hit it where they ain’t,” Nathan said. “He was able to do that and tie the game up. I tip my cap to those guys for battling with two outs.”

It was Nathan’s third blown save in 42 attempts.

“If it was the last game

and we weren’t in (the playoffs) because of it, that would be the toughest loss,” he said.

“But we’re still in the postseason, aren’t we? I can’t see how this can be the toughest loss. We get another opportunity tomorrow.”

Leonys Martin put Texas up 2-0 with a two-run triple off Chris Archer in the second. Jennings appeared to misread the drive in center, which went over his head.

## Harvesters will look to spoil Falcon homecoming

Both teams go into contest with lopsided losses against non-district teams.

After a lightning delay halted the game between Pampa and Dumas last week, the Harvesters fell to the Demons, giving up a lead late in the game. After giving up the lead, Dumas just kept padding to the lead, eventually winning 52-21. Bushland had a similar experience last week, falling to Harvester district opponent Dalhart. Bushland only managed to put 13 points in the loss. What does this mean for Friday's game? Both teams are hungry, having just one win between the two of

them. Bushland, much like Canyon, has a senior quarterback and wide receiver combination. Bushland quarterback Taylor Cornelius has 719 yards and six touchdowns on the year. He and Harvester quarterback Tyler Hooper both have thrown four interceptions, with Hooper having 407 yards in a run-heavy offense. Harvesters' offensive weapon senior Adrian Elam has 17 catches for 127 yards to accompany his 80 rushing yards on the year. Junior running back Brycen McClendon has emerged as the primary running threat for the Har-

vesters with 42 rushes for 189 yards. Both teams have allowed more than 370 yards a game on defense, with the Falcons almost matching that total on offense with 370 yards a game offensively. Last week was the most promising week for the Harvesters. The defense kept the Dumas option-offense in check for the most part, not allowing their dual-threat quarterback to get loose through most of the start of the game. The defense also had an interception that they took back for a touchdown at the start of the game.

The run defense failed the Harvesters last week late, but the Falcons like to throw the ball more than Dumas. This is an offense that likes to spread the ball around, with their leading receiver only accounting for 200 of the more than 700 yards that Cornelius has thrown. Tyler Hooper threw the ball a lot last week, and proved that he can spread the defense out, connecting on multiple occasions with junior wide receiver Zach Gates and Adrian Elam. The teams take the field in Bushland at Falcon Stadium at 7:30 Friday night.

## Browns trade Trent Richardson to Colts

BEREA, Ohio (AP) — Not long ago, Trent Richardson was viewed as a cornerstone for Cleveland's future.

On Wednesday, he became part of its recent inglorious past.

The Browns traded the powerful running back to Indianapolis in a stunning move just two games into the season and one year after drafting Richardson in the first round.

The team's new front office dealt Richardson for a first-round draft pick next year, when the team will have two opening-round selections and 10 overall.

Cleveland is rebuilding again and the team hopes to use those picks — seven in the first four rounds — to help turn around a floundering franchise.

Such a reversal was what the Browns had in mind when they took Richardson with the No. 3 overall pick in 2012. The former Alabama standout seemed to have it all: power, speed and good hands.

But Richardson wasn't the kind of back Cleveland's front office wants or apparently suited first-year coach Rob Chudzinski's offense. Richardson, who rushed for 950 yards as a

rookie despite playing most of last season with two broken ribs, gained just 105 yards on 31 carries in Cleveland's two losses this season.

He lacked the explosiveness the Browns' new regime was looking for, and it may not have helped that Richardson made it clear he wanted the ball more.

However, Browns CEO Joe Banner said there was nothing negative about Richardson and the team simply seized an opportunity to improve.
