Evolution, textbook review focus of SBOE hearing

A past Texas State Board of Education chairman and outspoken creationist urged his former colleagues on Tuesday to approve high school biology textbooks he said would "strike a final blow to the teaching of evolution."

Appearing at a board hearing on new instructional materials, Don McLeroy, a Bryan dentist who lost his seat on the SBOE in the 2010 Republican primary, told board members that the science textbooks currently under consideration contained many "hidden gems just waiting to be mined by inquisitive students" that proved there was no evidence for evolution.

McLeroy's testimony diverged from other witnesses skeptical of evolution, who criticized the proposed textbooks for inadequate coverage of alternatives to the scientific theory and asked the board not to approve them until publishers made changes.

His statements prompted a confused question from board member Mavis Knight, D-Dallas.

"Are you saying 'adopt these books' face-

The advertisers pay for a spot under a threeand-half-year contract and the restaurants use the tables at no charge, South said.

ABC is one of the nation's leading manufacturers of restaurant tabletops featuring advertisements. Their tables can be found in more than 3,000 restaurants across the U.S. with advertisements from thousands of businesses.

Originally, South said his company would place between 50 to 60 ads on a tabletop, but in time reduced the number to around 30 and made the ads larger.

The tabletops are made from a very hard compressed board and the trim is a solid ash wood.

South was at Red River Wednesday night, where a dinner of either grilled chicken or pork loin was served on-thehouse to the advertisers.

"It's a win-win situation for everybody," South told The Pampa News.

ABC's restaurant clients get attractive, solidly-built tables for free and businesses get their ads in front of the hundreds of customers who dine at the tables over the period of the **TABLES** cont. on page 3

KING SPEAKS AT CHAMBER LUNCHEON

State. Rep. Ken King was the guest speaker at Tuesday's Pampa Chamber of Commerce monthly luncheon. King lives in Canadian and represents District 88, which includes Pampa. King finished his first year at the Texas Statehouse, which included three special sessions. King said he has worked diligently to ensure rural Texas is not left behind in Austin. "There are only 19 (state) congressmen west of I-35." He wrote House Bill 1926, which was filed without the governor's signature. The purpose of the education bill is to set up online learning programs he said would raise the bar for students at rural schools. King said the intent is not to replace classroom teachers, but to provide opportunities not available to students in rural districts. For instance, Pampa High School does not have a teacher who can teach Mandarin Chinese, but there are four such teachers in Plano. A student in Pampa could take the course online while still participating in the classroom for his other subjects.

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

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There is no right or wrong vote on Syria

If you cobble together every major decision that President Barack Obama



he entered the Oval Office, none has been more perplexing and difficult as the

strike Syria for using chemical weapons on its own people.

As members of Congress grapple with how they are going to vote, there is no typical constituency on any side of this debate. Congressional Black Caucus members, some of the staunchest supporters of Obama, are not enthralled with voting yes to authorize a military strike, sounding like many libertarian Republicans who can't justify to their supporters the cost of the action.

House leaders John Boehner, Eric Cantor and Nancy Pelosi have all encouraged their members to support the action, but they are standing out on a ledge and few are trying to pull them back in. Members are being accused of flipflopping on the issue, but that's not how anyone should see this decision. President Obama has made a series of statements on the issue, including his famous "red line" speech a year ago. Secretary of State John Kerry and Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel, two military veterans, have made the administration's case, but there is still a lot of doubt and confusion as to whether the United States firing missiles and/or drones into Syria will make a bit of difference. Turn to cable news and reliable hawkish conservatives are on opposite ends of this debate. And then you have reliable dovish liberals who are saying the president must act. Frankly, I would hate to have to vote on this issue; you can reasonably make the case for hitting Syria and the case time the phrase "vote against the action, all at the same time. But one thing is clear: The American people are not in favor of the action. The NBC/Wall St. Journal poll shows nearly 80 percent of Americans wanting the president to get congressional approval to strike Syria. The overriding issue for Americans is we are sick of war. Lindsey's plan for war on Iran

This summer produced a triumph of American patriotism.



BUCHANAN was ready to vote no to

war, when President Obama seized upon Vladimir Putin's offer to work together to disarm Syria of chemical weapons.

The war America did not want - did not come.

Lindsey Graham is determined that this does not happen again.

The next war he and his collaborators are planning, the big one, the war on Iran, will not be blocked the same way

How does Graham propose to do this?

He plans to introduce a use-of-force resolution, a peacetime declaration of war on Iran, to ensure Obama need not come back to Congress — and can attack Iran at will. Lindsay intends a preemptive surrender of Congress' constitutional war-making power - to Obama.

He wants to give Obama a blank check for war on Iran, then stampede Obama into starting the war.

On Fox's "Huckabee" Sunday, Lindsey laid out his scheme:

"I'm going to get a bipartisan coalition together. We're going to put together a use-of-force resolution, allowing our country to use military force ... to stop the

Iranian nuclear program. ... I'm going to need your help, Mike, and the help of Americans and friends of Israel."

In July, Graham told a cheering conference of Christians United for Israel: "If nothing changes in Iran, come September, October, I will present a resolution that will authorize the use of military force to prevent Iran from developing a nuclear bomb."

That Graham is braying that he intends to give Obama a blank check for war on Iran is not all bad news. For he thus concedes Obama does not now have the authority to attack Iran.

And by equating Iran's "nuclear program" with a "nuclear bomb" program, Graham reveals that his bottom line is not Obama's bottom line, but Benjamin Netanyahu's.

Obama has said only that Iran must not be allowed to build a bomb. Bibi says Iran must not have a nuclear program.

Yet, make no mistake. The goal of Graham, the neocons, Israel and Saudi Arabia is not a negotiated solution permitting a peaceful nuclear program in Iran. The goal is a U.S. war to smash Iran.

On Nov. 10, 2010, Graham let it all out: "Instead of a surgical strike on their nuclear infrastructure, I think we're to the point now that you have to really neuter the regime's ability to wage war against us and our allies. ... [We must] destroy the ability of the regime to strike back.'

Graham wants us to do to Iran what President Bush II did to Iraq.

But there are obstacles in our warlord's path.

First, there is no conclusive proof Iran has decided to build a bomb.

Twice, the U.S. intelligence community, in 2007 and 2011, has asserted with high confidence that Iran has made no such decision.

Senators who do not seek a new war with Iran should call James Clapper, Director of National Intelligence, to testify publicly as to whether Iran is "racing" toward a bomb. Or is this the usual War Party propaganda?

As of today, Iran has not tested a bomb and, to our knowledge, does not possess any uranium enriched to the 90 percent necessary to build a bomb. Indeed, Iran has just announced that half its supply of 20 percentenriched uranium has been converted to fuel rods.

Iran's new president, Hassan Rouhani, was elected on a pledge to get U.S. sanctions lifted and to end Iran's isolation. But to accomplish this, he must prove that Iran has no active bomb program and that he is willing to allow intrusive inspections to prove it.

As a first step to negotiations, Rouhani just appointed the most pro-American foreign minister in four decades.

Moreover, Iran, victim of the worst poison gas attack since Benito Mussolini invaded Ethiopia, launched by Saddam Hussein with U.S. knowledge, has condemned any Syrian use of chemical weapons and signed the agreement banning them as well the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty.

The Ayatollah has issued a fatwa against an Iranian nuclear weapon.

Often, the interests of adversaries coincide. In World War II, with Hitler as the enemy, the monster Stalin becomes an ally.

Putin wants no U.S. war on Syria or Iran. This requires no chemical weapons use in Syria and no nukes in Iran. This coincides with U.S. interests, if not Lindsey Graham's.

The Russians, with ties to Tehran and Damascus we do not have, can be helpful in keeping us out of wars we do not want.

The true friends of America are those seeking to keep us out of wars, not those maneuvering us in.

That Vladimir Putin is going to Tehran, and Obama to the U.N. to meet Rouhani is good news.

Better news would be that Congressional anti-interventionists were meeting Graham's war resolution with one of their own, reaffirming that, as of today, Obama has no authority to launch any preemptive or presidential war on Iran.
