## Medication Cleanout coming to Pampa

Didn't use all of the medicine from the flu last winter? Or maybe there is a bottle of pills that has been sitting in the corner of the medicine cabinet from a previous tenant.

Whatever the case may be, Texas Tech School of Pharmacy is offering a means to rid houses of leftover pharmaceuticals.

Residents may bring unused, expired or no longer needed medication. Those interested are requested to leave the medications in their original containers and the clean out is for households only.

The Medication Cleanout will be held during the Pampa Health Fair at M.K. Brown Auditorium at 1100 Coronado Drive on Wednesday, Oct. 2, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"The primary purpose of the Medication Cleanout is to encourage residents to get rid of old or current medicine," said Jeani Jaramillo, assistant professor for Texas Tech School of Pharmacy. "(We want to) make sure it is not there for accidental poisoning, damage to the environment or even abuse."

A police officer will be on duty to accept controlled substances such as pain killers.

Jaramillo said that flushing it down the toilet, as popularly portrayed in movies and TV shows, is actually damaging to the environment.

According to the California State Board of Pharmacy, a recent study shows that 80 percent of U.S. streams contain small amounts of human medicines.

This is because sewage systems cannot remove these medicines from water that is released into lakes, rivers or oceans.

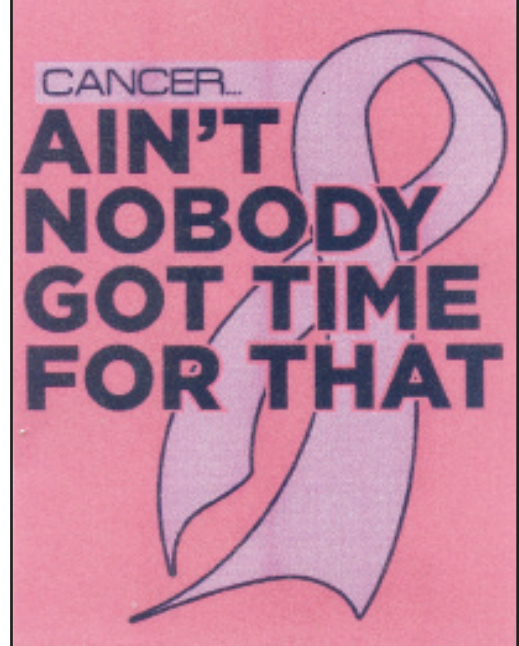

Dennis Kuempel, who lives in a house down the street from the property, said he has been trying to sell the land for a few months and has gotten several inquiries.

The acreage has grass and rolling hills. Kuempel said he envisions a buyer who might develop it with three or four houses each on 10-acre lots or someone building a single house on the entire tract.

The land is less than a half-mile from the 15-acre site where an apartment complex was proposed by a Kansas-based developer but failed for lack of a vote by city commissioners. Kuempel said he is not aware of any objections from residents in the neighborhood on him selling the property.

## 4 new species of legless lizards found in Calif.

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Scientists in California have discovered four new and separate species of legless lizards — snakelike animals that burrow into sand or soil.

The University of California, Berkeley says the discovery was made by its reptile and amphibian expert Theodore Papenfuss, along with James Parham of California State University, Fullerton.

Until the discovery, scientists believed there was only

one species of legless lizard in the American West.

They spent years scouring the state for the reclusive legless lizards. They found the new species at the end of a runway at Los Angeles International Airport, in a vacant lot in downtown Bakersfield, on the edge of the Mojave Desert and among oil derricks in the lower San Joaquin Valley.

The biologists are trying to determine whether the lizards need protected status.

Agriculture Department, a pickup for Maintenance Department and a Suburban for the district.

Consider and possibly take action to approve a maximum class size waiver for some classrooms at Wilson and Lamar Elementary

Small amounts of medicine have even been found in drinking water.

"We destroy medications through an incinerator designed specifically for incinerating pharmaceuticals," Ja-

ramillo said. "Because of its design, it gives off very low emissions."

Jaramillo said that the Medication Cleanout in Amarillo is held twice a year, once in the spring and once in the fall.

# Returning Coloradans find sickening flood damage

LYONS, Colo. (AP) — Coloradans who ventured back into the flood-ravaged town of Lyons found scenes of stomach-turning destruction, with dozens of homes destroyed, family keepsakes missing, food spoiling and mud everywhere.

"It's just sickening," said Gloria Simpson, whose family salvaged some of her grandmother's hand-made quilts Thursday from her 81-year-old father's home.

They found some family photos, but others were no where to be found.

Up and down Colorado's Front Range, the number of dead rose to seven, with three others missing and presumed dead.

But the number of unaccounted-for people dropped to about 140, thanks to rescues and restored communications.

Rescue operations ta-

pered off and the state began to turn its attention to finding homes for the displaced, restoring basic services and figuring out how to repair hundreds of miles of roads and dozens of bridges.

"Right now we're just moving from the life-saving mode to the life-sustaining mode," said Kevin Kline, director of the Colorado Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management.

Kline said it was too early to estimate the dollar damage but added, "It's going to be big."

The damage spans 17 counties and nearly 2,000 square miles.

Gov. John Hickenlooper said the state's reconstruction effort would be overseen by Jerre Stead, executive chairman of the global information company IHS Inc.

A new group within the

state Transportation Department will focus on repairing and reconstructing as much of the state highway system as possible by Dec. 1.

Underlining the urgency, Trail Ridge Road through Rocky Mountain National Park, one of the only routes still open into the flood-damaged town of Estes Park, was temporarily closed because of snow early Thursday. The high-elevation road normally shuts down in October for the winter.

Under tight security, hundreds of Lyons evacuees were given two hours to check on their homes Thursday.

On Sept. 12, the St. Vrain River destroyed dozens of homes, a trailer park, two bridges and sections of roads in the picturesque town of 1,600 framed by sandstone cliffs.

Darren Horwitz saw

boulders, broken glass and dislodged propane tanks strewn around Lyons.

His truck and sailboat that he parked at a friend's mobile home had been swept away.

"When you get there, the shock sets in," he said. Bob Ruthrauff, 84, found his home intact, but food was rotting in his refrigerator because electricity had been cut off.

He spent his two hours getting rid of the spoilage but was grateful.

"We're very lucky. We came home to a dry home," Ruthrauff said.

Utility poles were toppled and power lines were in tangles. Work crews cleared debris and tried to restore power, water and sewer service.

Flooding along the South Platte River pushed into western Nebraska but caused little initial damage.

# Anesthesiologist convicted for tax evasion

A self-employed Amarillo anesthesiologist has been convicted on six counts of federal tax evasion.

Each count carries a maximum penalty of five years in federal prison and a \$250,000 fine if convicted,

along with restitution.

Edgar A. Lockett Jr. was found guilty during a trial last week in U.S. District Court in Amarillo. He was taken into custody after the trial and has a hearing scheduled next week to determine whether he can be released on bond, according to the clerk's office at the U.S. District Court.

The U.S. Attorney's office alleges that Lockett owes more than \$1.4 million in unpaid income taxes.

The indictment alleges Lockett has not filed income tax returns since 1999, except for a joint re-

turn filed with his spouse for 2007.

The indictment states Lockett concealed his assets from the IRS by placing funds and property in the names of nominee companies, and secreting his income in bank accounts under his dead father's name and social security number.

In the past Lockett has worked under contract with Pampa Regional Medical Center, but no longer has privileges or an association with the hospital. He has formerly practiced in Amarillo, Mineral Wells and McAllen.

## Bouc'in' Around ... In a more literal sense

The title of this column, "Bouc'in' Around," has several meanings that have sprung up from my life experiences.

Besides my world travels, my family moved three times from the time I was born (in Temple City, California) until I was six. My earliest memories of our second house, in San Gabriel, are of my red tricycle, playing games with the kids next door, and of my father burning up the back yard. I think he was trying to burn some dry brush, and it got away from him; at the time I was confined to bed with the "hard" measles, and was afraid our house would burn down with me in it. Our third home, in La Puente, was Mom's "dream home" and had a wood-burning fireplace in the den, a beautiful big kitchen, and a big yard for us kids to play in.

There was a tree in the front yard

that I was able to climb and I would pretend it was my horse as I sat astride the largest limb. I named my "horse" Goldy, and we went on long trail rides while the family went looking for me as I sat obscured by leaves. It was a good place to hide from my two older brothers. During my parents' divorce, we lived briefly in El Paso, and we returned to California aboard the Super Chief train a few months later to find we didn't have a home. Mom found us an apartment above a furniture store, and my bedroom was a coat closet where Mom opened up a folding cot for me each night. My grandfather had recently died, so Gram came to live with us, which made two adults and three kids in a two-bedroom apartment. I remember one warm night when my brothers slept out on the roof (a flat roof that could be reached from our kitchen) and one of the boys painted scary eyes on the wall surrounding the roof with fluorescent paint.

I was happy to stay in my little

room. Mom didn't drive, so we moved quite a few times to be near her places of employment. She was a talented artist, and was once offered a job with the Disney studios, but had to turn it down because there was no public transportation she could use. During my school years, we lived in seven different houses in four cities, and the longest I went to any one school was the four years of high school. Even though we lived near "Hollywood" the only personalities I got to meet were the Beach Boys, and that was only because the stepson of one of the Wilsons attended the nursery school where I worked. We lived in Inglewood during the time of the Watts Riots and several earthquakes, and those were definitely not wonderful experiences. In 1965 Mom and I set off on Route 66 in my Corvair. Waukegan was home to me for over thirty years, and I shared my husband's pride in a city that produced Jack Benny and Ray Bradbury. While

## Boehner Republicans heading for big mistake

What in the world is the matter with Boehner Republicans in the U.S.

House? Haven't they had enough of Obama exceeding his presidential authority, disobeying the Constitution by refusing to "take care that the laws be faithfully executed" and issuing executive regulations to "legislate" what Congress refuses to pass, such as the DREAM Act?

We've never had a president who so arrogantly grabs and uses such unlawful power. He repeatedly granted waivers or exceptions or delays to groups from laws that gave the president no such authority, such as welfare reform and Obamacare.

The latest example of Speaker John Boehner's coziness with Barack Obama is the current plan to give the president a grant of tremendous power, not authorized in the Constitution, called Fast Track. The Constitution gives Congress exclusive authority "to regulate commerce with foreign nations," but Fast Track would give the president power to sign trade agreements before Congress has an opportunity to vote on them and then unilaterally write legislation making those agreements U.S. federal law.

Fast Track allows the president to send these executive-written bills directly to the House under rules that limit debate, forbid all amendments and require a vote within a preset time period. In other words, the House cedes to the president its constitutional power to write legislation that regulates commerce with foreign nations.

We know how Fast Track works because we had it when we joined NAFTA. Among its obnoxious provisions is allowing the president to appoint for the trade negotiations 700 industry advisers who are given access to confidential negotiating documents that are denied to Congress and the U.S. public.

Obama is pressing hard for the immediate passage of Fast Track, so he will have a free hand in making deals with other countries. Now in the fast lane is a new trade treaty called the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) with 11 countries: Mexico, Canada, Japan, Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia, Brunei, Australia, New Zealand, Peru and Chile.

All trade treaties come

encrusted with glowing predictions of creating new jobs for Americans, and those promises always turn out to be false. Like the old saying, "Fool me once, shame on you, fool me twice, shame on me," it is shame on the Boehner Republicans if they induce us to pass another trade treaty that creates jobs only in other countries.

For example, Obama promised that our free-trade deal with Korea (KORUS FTA) would be a major job creator in the U.S. That was a lie: After the KORUS went into effect, sales of U.S. goods to Korea fell 17 percent (costing 40,000 U.S. jobs), and imports rose 18 percent, so KORUS was a jobs creator in Korea, not in the United States.

In his campaign, Obama promised to eliminate or reform NAFTA-type trade models but has now made them a major part of his agenda. That shift is probably because of the other provisions of the trade agreements that nobody knows about until after they are locked into U.S. law.

Some of the 11 TPP countries are notorious for their persecution of Christians, including Brunei, Malaysia and Vietnam. Brunei, for example, where current negotiations are now going on in secret, has a constitution that states: "The religion of Brunei Darussalam shall be the Muslim religion," which means Islamic Sharia law supersedes all other law and regulates all aspects of life.

Brunei ranks 28 on the Open Doors' annual World Watch List of 50 nations where Christians suffer the most persecution for their faith by Muslim governments. Brunei forbids the importation of Bibles and all non-Islamic texts or symbols, yet Obama has the gall to tell us TPP is "free trade" and that we should give him extraordinary powers under Fast Track.

According to Public Citizen's Global Trade watch, 24 of the 29 chapters of TPP are not really about trade but rewrite some of our domestic policies. These chapters include provisions about the environment, health, food safety and Internet freedom protections, plus giving corporations expanded privileges over federal, state and local governments.

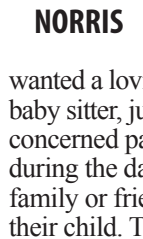

## Domestic espionage and your child's safety

Last week, WCSC-TV reported that after Benjamin and Hope Jordan relocated to Charleston, S.C., they needed to find a baby sitter for their 7-month-old son, Finn, but what they found was a wolf in sheep's clothing.

Benjamin and Hope wanted a loving, nurturing baby sitter, just like any other concerned parents who work during the day but have no family or friends to watch their child. They had done their homework and thought they had discovered her in 21-year-old Alexis Khan. She passed a background check and had credible work experience as a baby sitter, and both of Finn's parents thought she was "a good fit."

Five months into her baby-sitting, however, the Jordans noticed that their trusted and loyal dog, Killian, had become overly protective of Finn when the baby sitter came around. Killian, a black Lab and German shepherd mix, is normally docile and friendly.

Thank God for not only canine instincts but also maternal discernment. As an act of precaution, Hope wanted to record what occurred while Kahn was baby-sitting. So the Jordans planted their iPhone under the couch to record any interactions between the baby sitter and their infant son.

To their horror, it captured the sounds of an abusive baby sitter and a beloved baby shrieking in pain.

Benjamin explained the

recording to WCSC: "It started with cussing. Then you hear slap noises, and his crying changes from a distress cry to a pain cry. And I just wanted to reach through the audiotape, go back in time and just grab him up."

He further lamented, "To know that (for) five months, I had handed my child to a monster not knowing what was going on in my house for that day."

After reviewing the audio recordings, police arrested Khan. She confessed to the crime, pleaded guilty to assault and battery, and was sentenced to one to three years in prison. She also has been placed on a child abuse registry under the South Carolina Department of Social Services, which will prevent her from working with children in the future.

"That is fantastic news for us to know that maybe Finn's ordeal has possibly saved another child's life," Benjamin responded.

It was with a great sigh of relief that the Jordans told WCSC that Finn is doing well and shows no signs of negative effects from the abuse he suffered at the hands of his baby sitter.

Benjamin concluded, "Had our dog not alerted us to the trouble, had my wife's instincts not said we need to make something happen, it could have been Finn that was killed by the baby sitter. You never know."

Benjamin is correct. Finn's story ends well, but not all victims' do. That is why I'm calling on parents everywhere to doubly ensure their children's safety. And there's no better time than now, especially with summer ending and so many returning to routines that

require baby sitters.

According to the Administration for Children and Families, every day, a staggering five children suffer an abuse-related death — an increase from roughly three a day in 1998.

Childhelp, a leading national nonprofit organization dedicated to helping victims of child abuse and neglect, further explains on its website that in the U.S. alone, more than 3 million reports of child abuse are made annually, involving more than 6 million children.

The website also explains:

- Approximately 80 percent of children who die from abuse are younger than four years old.
- Roughly 50-60 percent of child fatalities caused by maltreatment are not recorded as such on death certificates.
- Children who experience abuse and neglect are about nine times likelier to become involved in criminal activity.
- About 80 percent of 21-year-olds who were abused as children meet the criteria for at least one psychological disorder.
- About 30 percent of abused and neglected children will later abuse their own children.

According to the Forum on Child and Family Statistics, in 2011, 13 percent of children ages 0 to 4 with employed mothers were "primarily cared for by a nonrelative in a home-based environment, such as care from a family day care provider, nanny, babysitter, or au pair."

The above statistics stress just how important it is that parents and guardians take precautions to protect their

children no matter who watches them. Non-family and non-friend sitters carry their own particular risks, so proceed with extreme prudence.

Beneficial, but not fool-proof, are the websites Care.com, Sittercity, Babysitters4hire.com, eNannySource and SeekingSitters — where background checks, identification checks and profile reviews are generally included. But the truth is that nothing replaces parental attention, love and protection. If it's at all possible to cut down on expenses and have one parent at home (maybe even working from there), there's no doubt that you are the best child care option for your child.

Foremost, don't check in your brain at the door of child care. And don't be afraid to ask all the hard questions, do extensive background investigations and make surprise pop-ins on those who care for your most precious and priceless offspring. They're your kids, and it's your house, so monitor their welfare when you're gone, even with electronic-eye devices. Once upon a time, they were cumbersome and costly, but now they're small and relatively inexpensive. Some even can fit on a dog's collar!

And if you don't have the money for high-tech surveillance, use your smartphone as the Jordans did. If you're suspicious — or even if you're not — record a day's audio or visual events in your house.

## BP: State can't order removal of anchors

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—BP has filed a federal lawsuit against Louisiana authorities over an August order that the oil giant remove anchors that were placed in the Gulf of Mexico following the 2010 Deepwater Horizon disaster. The boom had been placed in Gulf waters in an attempt to keep oil away from the coast.

The oil giant says that when it placed the boom anchors throughout the Gulf, it did so under federal supervision. The lawsuit says some anchors have been removed, but that federal officials want the remaining anchors left alone because removing them could cause environmental damage.

“In short, BP respectfully submits it cannot be punished under state law for doing what federal law requires,” the lawsuit, filed Thursday in the federal court based in Baton Rouge, states.

BP asks the court to keep the Louisiana Department of Natural Resources from enforcing the order for removal of the anchors.

DNR Secretary Stephen Chustz issued a statement Thursday evening, saying the anchors need to be re-

moved and that the state does have the authority to order their removal.

“These anchors are abandoned, serve no purpose in the cleanup efforts now and are hazards to navigation and boaters,” the statement said.

“Because of these public safety threats, DNR ordered BP to remove the anchors based upon authority granted to the agency under the Coastal Resource Management Act.”

The anchors have been a concern for years. In January 2011, the Coast Guard began testing ways to remove the anchors by having salvage crews place anchors in specific places, then test ways of locating and removing them.

The problem, officials said at the time, was that attempting to remove anchors with hooks or trawls would run the risk of breaking a pipeline or causing massive erosion.

“After a series of thorough studies, the U.S. Coast Guard determined that those anchors should not be removed because doing so poses an unacceptable risk to the environment,” BP spokesman Geoff Morrell said in a news release Thursday.

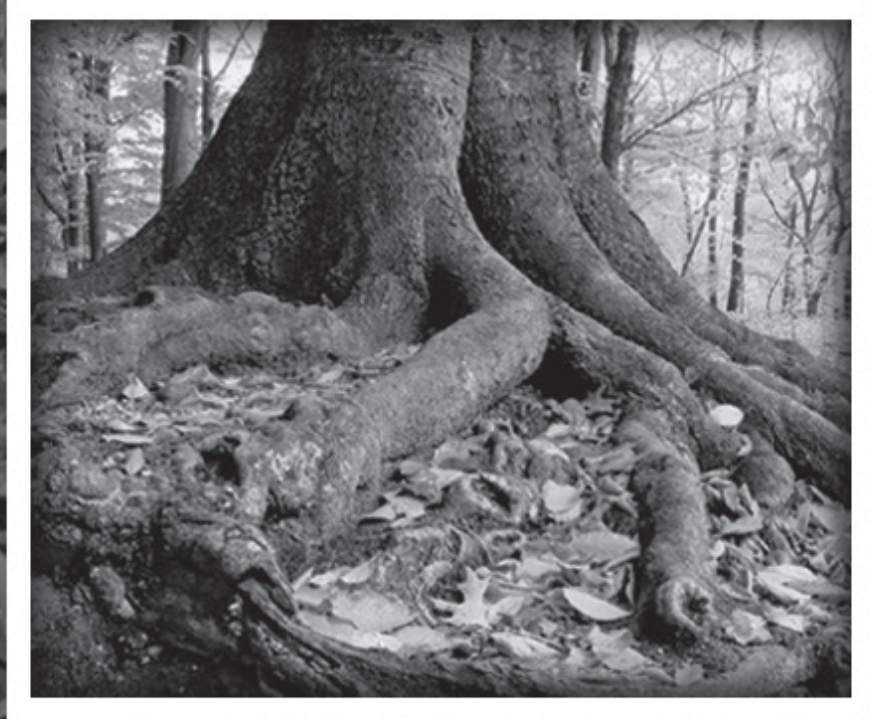

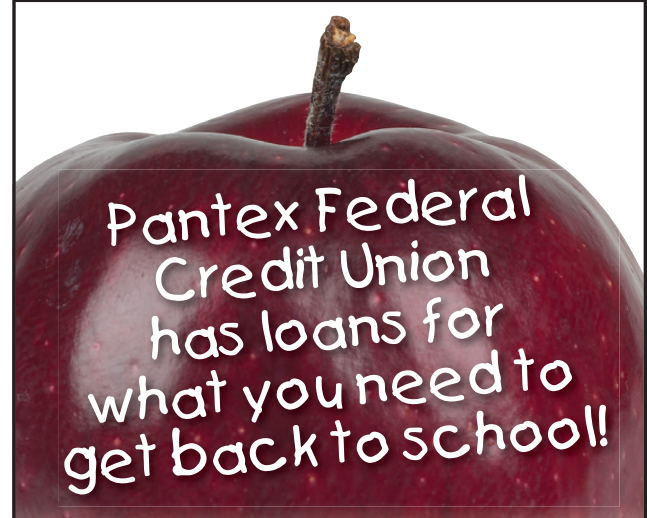

## Pampa attempts to spoil Bushland homecoming

■ The Pampa Harvesters fall to 48-26 in the homecoming game for the Bushland Falcons.

The first quarter of Friday night's game was very defensive as the Harvester defense only allowed one touchdown for the Falcons. They also had a goal-line turnover when the Bushland receiver tried to extend the ball over the goal line. The Harvester offense struggled to get any momentum going in the first quarter, as the Falcon defense only allowed two first downs over two Harvester drives.

The second half was a different story for the Harvesters. A missed sack opportunity led to a touchdown for the Falcons, making the score 15-0. The Harvesters flexed their rushing muscle with constant rushes from seniors Daymon Flores and Kody Maddox. This led to a fake hand-off to Maddox, which he took 15 yards for a touchdown.

Bushland drove down the field and scored making the score 21-7, but the Harvester didn't get discouraged and continued the same philosophy that brought them to the dance, running the ball.

After rushing first downs from Maddox and Flores, junior quarterback Tyler Hooper found Cager Osborne over the middle for a dangerous throw and catch that set the Harvesters up at

the goal line. It was too easy for Brycen McCleendon, who ran it in for his third straight game with a touchdown, whether receiving or rushing.

This left the Falcons with 1:33 on the clock, which was enough for them to score. The Harvesters thought they had the Falcons pinned but their quarterback scrambled and had a man open 50 yards deep in the end zone. He scored on the last play of the half, giving them a longer 27-14 lead.

The Harvester defense struggled to stop the Falcons Division 1 recruit quarterback, senior Taylor Cornelius. This continued into the second half. The Falcons continued to pad their lead in the third quarter, scoring a touchdown on almost every drive. The Harvester offense didn't just roll over, though. Hooper found one of his favorite targets for a 55-yard catch for a touchdown. On this play in particular, junior Zach Gates caught a pass with just one hand and carried it into the end zone, to make the score 34-21.

The Falcons scored 12 unanswered points through to the fourth quarter, as their high-powered offense marched down the field.

On their final drive of

the game, the Harvesters ran the ball well and continued to use the ground-and-pound offense to pick up first downs. Hooper connected with Maddox for a touchdown from about 20 yards out. The Falcons took a knee after the score and the game ended with a final score of 46-27.

"I thought that we started finding ourselves a little bit offensively," head coach Heath Parker said. "We have been searching for a way to highlight our offensive line."

"We have thought about mixing it up with formations and motions and spreading out of the huddle so it is more difficult for opponents to see how we're lining up may give us a little bit of an advantage there. I like the way that that went and feel like we have something we can build on."

The Harvesters take the field next Friday against Vernon in Pampa at Harvester Field.

## From the Press Box

### Oklahoma St. scandal and what it means for journalism and college football.

In recent weeks, acclaimed sports magazine "Sports Illustrated," dropped (what they were hoping) a bombshell of a story in newsstands, but mostly online in a five-part story.

The story was a 10-month investigation into Oklahoma State's football program with interviews with 64 former football players from 1999 to 2011, as well as football staffers.

Obviously SI was hoping that they would break a HUGE story that would shine light on a program that has been fairly successful in the last 14 years. There was one problem. The story came out, it did bring an NCAA investigation that is ongoing. But what has happened is nobody, not even ESPN, is talking about it.

If any of my readers watch enough ESPN, just think of Penn St. and Ohio St. When those programs were being investigated, ESPN turned into "Sports Illustrated," focusing on one thing, kind of like the Tim Tebow and Johnny Manziel obsession.

So on my daily and evening commutes to-and-from Amarillo what has not been talked about has been the topic of conversation of CBS Sports Radio. Now back to Oklahoma St.

The investigation was spearheaded by SI investigative reporter George Dohrmann, who has a Pulitzer prize. Dohrmann also worked on the Terrelle Pryor/Ohio St. scandal.

SI has been criticized for multiple issues with the story.

First off, there are many unnamed testimonies in the articles. While I understand that these people wanted to remain anonymous, I was taught that in journalism you have to get some named sources to sound more credible. By remaining unnamed, it makes it sound like "a friend of a friend of my sister's ex-boyfriend."

Now it is coming out that one of the testimonials, Rodrick Johnson's words were "twisted". Then another testimony, Thomas Wright, was kicked off the team.

Successful former players at OSU such as Browns quarterback Brandon Weeden, former NFL running back Tatum Bell and Dallas Cowboys' running back Joseph Randle have all come out defending the university, and discrediting the article for various reasons. Weeden went as far as to say they "picked the wrong people to interview."

Journalism 101: Get good sources, and quote them correctly.

Another gripe, and this from OSU booster

T. Boone Pickens (of all people), has come out to even Tweet (can you believe that T. Boone Pickens tweets?!), "@SInow Disappointing in your reporting. Never asked one important question: What's happening at #OKState today?"

I tend to side with Pickens on this, just because they are shining negative light on a program and administration that has nothing to do with the university between 1999-2011. At least with Ohio St. and Penn St. their controversies were conducted by current administrations.

That would be like criticizing the U.S. President Barack Obama for something that Franklin Roosevelt did.

Finally, how much of this story is really shocking?

The money, that happens everywhere. It seems like every two or three months we hear about college players receiving money on the side one way or another. The drugs, some college, and even high school, kids dabble in drugs. Elevate them to rock-star status and unfortunately the drug use gets elevated for some students.

The apparent carnal relations with female student-recruiters to draw more athletes to the university? It's college, it is bound to happen between consenting adults.

I wish the academic grades getting skewed so the athletes could play didn't happen, but unfortunately it is bound to everywhere.

So where do I stand on this? I believe that a lot of that happened. But spend 10 months at University of Texas, Alabama, Florida, you name it. You will get similar results. There are going to be players saying it did, and there will be those who say it didn't.

I am just criticizing the reporting on it. I feel like SI was trying to bust a big story, but went about it the wrong way. I love SI, I have been a subscriber to them for several years, but this was a moment when I was shaking my head.

Sometimes, just as in sports, I think reporters need to get back to basics. Report it right, report it well and forget being first.

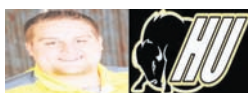

## Freshmen fall short, JV wins second straight

### Freshman fall victim to late Falcon rally

The freshmen squad for the Harvesters fell to an early 6-0 Falcon lead. But after going three-and-out the Harvesters' Bryce Parker picked off the Bushland quarterback's pass. After exchanging three-and-out possessions and giving up a Falcon touchdown, the Harvesters benefited from a long touchdown by Parker to put them on the board 14-6.

The Harvesters started to rally, with Parker finding Bryson Paronto for a deep pass, and then connecting with Jayson Thomas for a touchdown from nine yards out, making the score 12-14.

Parker found Thomas on a following touchdown, putting the Harvesters behind by only two, 20-22. But a Falcon touchdown, followed by a fumble kick return, led to the Harvesters loss 36-20.

It is worth noting that Cy Wood had a circus catch on the sideline where the

ball was tipped. He missed with one hand but eventually caught with the second hand, all this while keeping his feet in bounds. The Harvesters certainly have a fast freshmen team, which will translate into a fast team in years to come in JV and varsity.

### JV wins second straight

The JV Harvester squad won their second game of the year and second in a row, beating the Bushland Falcons 24-20. The Harvesters did so throwing the ball, as opposed to rushing the ball, as they did last week against Dumas.

"It feels awesome, you've got to love that (a two-game win streak)," junior varsity coach Brett Bethke said.

"Harvester football is about doing what it takes to get the job done. If throwing the ball is what it takes we do that. If running the ball is what it takes to get the job done, it is what we are going to do. We are pretty adaptable on offense with Erick as our quarterback and Sergio and

some of those other guys so we are pretty versatile, of course with Aaron coming up big there."

The very first drive, the Harvesters marched down the field, scoring a touchdown from sophomore Francisco Salazar. The Harvester defense then forced an interception, which led to a touchdown from sophomore quarterback Erick Vizcaino, who found his man, fellow sophomore Aaron Arrerola. The defense had two interceptions in the first quarter, where the Harvesters led 12-0.

In the second quarter, although scoreless, Vizcaino had impressive throws caught by Arrerola and sophomore Sergio Santos.

After giving up a touchdown in the third quarter, Vizcaino and Santos hooked up for a deep touchdown for around 60 yards, padding their lead to 18-6.

It got scary in the fourth quarter, as Bushland scored 14 unanswered points, giving them the lead 20-18. But on the final drive of the Harvesters, on fourth and long, Vizcaino scrambled to his right, then avoided another sack and lobbed the ball deep down field for Arrerola, who waltzed into the end zone.

"Just a beautiful play. It was a scramble drill and we worked it and Erick strung one down, and short guy goes deep and the deep guy goes short and he hits him with perfect timing and right in stride," Bethke said.

Coach Bethke noted the improved offensive line play as being the biggest improvement for the team, but did note that conditioning is not where it needs to be for district.

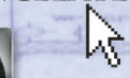

# 13 wounded in attack on Chicago park

CHICAGO (AP) — A 3-year-old boy who was among 13 people wounded in a late-night attack on a southwest Chicago park was alert when he arrived at the hospital and was apparently doing well, his family and friends said early Friday.

Police officials declined to discuss details of the investigation. Ron Gaines, a department spokesman, said no arrests had been made and that victims were being interviewed to try to determine the circumstances surrounding the attack, which happened shortly after 10 p.m.

The shooting comes nearly three weeks after Chicago saw an outburst of violence over the Labor Day weekend that ended with eight dead and 20 others injured.

The attack late Thursday in the city's Back of the Yards neighborhood left three victims, including the boy, in critical condition. The others were reportedly in serious or fair condition.

Chicago's police superintendent has said that overall violence is down so far this year compared to 2012, when the number of homicides topped 500 for the first time since 2008.

Following a surge in homicides and shootings last year, the police department stepped up its crime-fighting efforts by, among other things, paying overtime to add patrols to some neighborhoods, including the Back of the Yards. Through the

first six months of the year, the department spent more than \$57 million on overtime pay for officers, more than half of it from a program that saturates dangerous neighborhoods with hundreds of officers every night.

“They hit the light pole next to me, but I ducked down and ran into the house,” Harris said.

“Senseless and brazen acts of violence have no place in Chicago and betray all that we stand for,” Mayor Rahm Emanuel said in a statement Friday.

“They’ve been coming around here looking for people to shoot every night, just gang-banging stuff. It’s what they do.”

“The perpetrators of this crime will be brought to justice and prosecuted to the full extent of the law.” Officer Amina Greer said at least 10 ambulances responded to the scene on Thursday and took victims to several area hospitals.

was critical. The Rev. Corey Brooks, a pastor at New Beginnings Church, spoke with family members outside the hospital and said the boy was resting with his mother.

“He was talking when they first brought him in, but he’s heavily sedated now,” he said.

“They say he’s good,” said Semecha Nunn, the boy’s grandmother. “They going to have to do a little plastic surgery on him, but he’s OK.”

Francis John, 70, said she was in her apartment when the shooting occurred.

She said she went down to see what was going on and “a lot of youngsters were running scared.” A 30-year resident, she said she was surprised by what had happened. She told the Sun-Times there hasn’t been much gun violence in the neighborhood in recent years, adding the neighborhood went from good to bad 10 years ago, to better recently.

# Medal of Honor recipients meet in Gettysburg

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) — The autograph hounds waiting expectantly in a hotel lobby weren't drawn by actors, musicians or politicians, but by a few dozen men whose rare and distinguished achievements have earned them the nation's highest military honor.

worthless,” Loether said. “On the other hand, it’s priceless.”

Donald E. Ballard, the society’s treasurer, became a member for his bravery while serving as a Navy corpsman in Vietnam. He threw himself on a grenade while directing Marines to carry a wounded comrade to safety. The grenade did not detonate.

Nearly half of the 79 living recipients of Medal of Honor are attending the gathering in Gettysburg, where some of its first recipients fought 150 years ago.

The recipients’ autographs sometimes end up on public auction sites, but Loether said he collects them as a hobby that began as a way to honor his sons in the military.

Ballard, who now owns a funeral home in Grain Valley, Mo., said being a Medal of Honor recipient means being a role model, like it or not.

The Medal of Honor Society annual convention gives the public an opportunity to collect the signatures of the men who have been honored by Congress for risking their lives beyond the call of duty in combat, and dozens of people waited Thursday for them to return from a luncheon at a nearby farm once owned by President Dwight Eisenhower.

Recipients sat at tables ringing a hotel ballroom, including Clinton L. Romesha of Minot, N.D. President Barack Obama presented him with the honor in February for bravery in defending an Army outpost in Afghanistan four years ago.

“There is no Hero 101 book, I didn’t take the course,” Ballard said. “I have to live up their expectations, or my expectations of what they expect.”

Dave Loether, 62, a computer analyst from Pittsburgh, was hoping to add to the 55 signatures of Medal of Honor recipients he has collected on a U.S. Army flag. Loether knows many of their faces by sight — and their stories by heart.

Now working in safety for a construction company, Romesha, 32, said he tries to remind himself that he’s still the same person he was before, a man who has to take out the trash himself.

Ballard said a major focus of the organization these days is its character development program for middle and high school students promoting values like courage and sacrifice. Recipients were scheduled to meet Friday with local students.

“It’s a piece of cloth with some ink on it — it’s


“I never thought in a million years I’d ever meet a recipient, let alone be one,” said Romesha, who was attending his first convention.

Other scheduled events included a town hall forum at Gettysburg College and a concert on the Gettysburg battlefield with the United States Marine Band on Friday and an award dinner on Saturday. Next year’s convention will be in Knoxville, Tenn.

Eight soldiers died in the daylong barrage by the Taliban in the mountains near Pakistan, and Romesha was one of 22 wounded among the badly outnumbered Americans. He helped lead others to safety and retrieve the bodies of the U.S. dead.
