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

Medication Cleanout coming to Pampa

Didn't use all of the medicine from the flu last winter? Or maybe there is a bottle of pills that has been sitting in the corner of the medicine cabinet from a previous tenant.

Whatever the case may be, Texas Tech School of Pharmacy is offering a means to rid houses of leftover pharmaceuticals.

Residents may bring unused, expired or no longer needed medication. Those interested are requested to leave the medications in their original containers and the clean out is for households only.

The Medication Cleanout will be held during the Pampa Health Fair at M.K. Brown Auditorium at 1100 Coronado Drive on Wednesday, Oct. 2, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"The primary purpose of the Medication Cleanout is to encourage residents to get rid of old or current medicine," said Jeani Jaramillo, assistant professor for Texas Tech School of Pharmacy. "(We want to) make sure it is not there for accidental poisoning, damage to the environment or even abuse."

A police officer will be on duty to accept controlled substances

such as pain killers.

Jamarillo said that flushing it down the toilet, as popularly portrayed in movies and TV shows, is actually damaging to the en-

vironment

According to the California State Board of Pharmacy, a recent study shows that 80 percent of U.S. streams contain small amounts of human medicines.

This is because sewage systems cannot remove these medicines from water that is released into lakes, rivers or oceans.

Dennis Kuempel, who lives in a house down the street from the property, said he has been trying to sell the land for a few months and has gotten several inquiries. The acreage has grass and



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Boehner Republicans heading for big mistake

What in the world is the matter with Boehner Republicans in the U.S.

refusing to "take care that the laws be faithfully executed" and issuing executive regulations to "legislate" what Congress refuses to pass, such as the DREAM Act?

We've never had a president who so arrogantly grabs and uses such unlawful power. He repeatedly granted waivers or exceptions or delays to groups from laws that gave the president no such authority, such as welfare reform and Obamacare.

The latest example of Speaker John Boehner's coziness with Barack Obama is the current plan to give the president a grant of tremendous power, not authorized in the Constitution, called Fast Track. The Constitution gives Congress exclusive authority "to regulate commerce with foreign nations," but Fast Track would give the president power to sign trade agreements before Congress has an opportunity to vote on them and then unilaterally write legislation making those agreements U.S. federal law.

Fast Track allows the president to send these executive-written bills directly to the House under rules that limit debate, forbid all amendments and require a vote within a preset time period. In other words, the House cedes to the president its constitutional power to write legislation that regulates commerce with foreign

We know how Fast Track works because we had it when we joined NAFTA. Among its obnoxious provisions is allowing the president to appoint for the trade negotiations 700 industry advisers who are given access to confidential negotiating documents that are denied to Congress and

the U.S. public. Obama is pressing hard for the immediate passage of Fast Track, so he will have a free hand in making deals with other countries. Now in the fast lane is a new trade treaty called the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) with 11 countries: Mexico, Canada, Japan, Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia, Brunei, Australia, New Zealand, Peru and

> treaty that creates jobs only in other countries. For example, Obama promised that our freetrade deal with Korea (KORUS FTA) would be

a major job creator in the U.S. That was a lie: After the KORUS went into effect, sales of U.S. goods to Korea fell 17 percent (costing 40,000 U.S. jobs), and imports rose 18 percent, so KORUS was a jobs creator in Korea, not

in the United States.

In his campaign, Obama promised to eliminate or reform NAFTA-type trade models but has now made them a major part of his agenda. That shift is probably because of the other provisions of the trade agreements that nobody knows about until after they are locked into U.S.

Some of the 11 TPP countries are notorious for their persecution of Christians, including Brunei, Malaysia and Vietnam. Brunei, for example, where current negotiations are now going on in secret, has a constitution that states: "The religion of Brunei Darussalam shall be the Muslim religion," which means Islamic Sharia law supersedes all other law and regulates all aspects of life.

Brunei ranks 28 on the Open Doors' annual World Watch List of 50 nations where Christians suffer the most persecution for their faith by Muslim governments. Brunei forbids the importation of Bibles and all non-Islamic texts or symbols, yet Obama has the gall to tell us TPP is "free trade" and that we should give him extraordinary powers under Fast Track.

According to Public Citizen's Global Trade watch, 24 of the 29 chapters of TPP are not really about trade but rewrite some of our domestic policies. These chapters include provisions about the environment, health, food safety and Internet freedom protections, plus giving corporations expanded privileges over federal, state and local governments.

Boucin' Around

In a more literal sense

The title of this column, "Bouncin' Around," has several meanings that have sprung up from my life

experiences. Besides my world travels, my family moved three times from the time I was born (in Temple City, California) until I was six. My earliest memories of our second house, in San Gabriel, are of my red tricycle, playing games with the kids

next door, and of my father burning up the back yard. I think he was trying to burn some dry brush, and it got away from him; at the time I was confined to bed with the "hard" measles, and was afraid our house would burn down with me in it. Our third home, in La Puente, was Mom's "dream home" and had a wood-burning fireplace in the den, a beautiful big kitchen, and a big yard for us kids to play in.

There was a tree in the front yard

that I was able to climb and I would pretend it was my horse as I sat astride the largest limb. I named my "horse" Goldy, and we went on long trail rides while the family went looking for me as I sat obscured by leaves. It was a good place to hide from my two older brothers. During my parents' divorce, we lived briefly in El Paso, and we returned to California aboard the Super Chief train a few months later to find we didn't have a home. Mom found us an apartment above a furniture store, and my bedroom was a coat closet where Mom opened up a folding cot for me each night. My grandfather had recently died, so Gram came to live with us, which made two adults and three kids in a two-bedroom apartment. I remember one warm night when my brothers slept out on the roof (a flat roof that could be reached from our kitchen) and one of the boys painted scary eyes on the wall surrounding the roof with fluorescent paint. I was happy to stay in my little

room. Mom didn't drive, so we moved quite a few times to be near her places of employment. She was a talented artist, and was once offered a job with the Disney studios, but had to turn it down because there was no public transportation she could use. During my school years, we lived in seven different houses in four cities, and the longest I went to any one school was the four years of high school. Even though we lived near "Hollyweird" the only personalities I got to meet were the Beach Boys, and that was only because the stepson of one of the Wilsons attended the nursery school where I worked. We lived in Inglewood during the time of the Watts Riots and several earthquakes, and those were definitely not wonderful experiences. In 1965 Mom and I set off on Route 66 in my Corvair. Waukegan was home to me for over thirty years, and I shared my husband's pride in a city that produced Jack Benny and Ray Bradbury. While LITERAL cont. on page 5

Domestic espionage and your child's safety

Last week, WCSC-TV reported that after Benjamin and Hope Jordan relocated to Charleston, S.C., they

needed to find a baby sitter for their 7-month-old son, Finn, but what they found was a wolf in sheep's

clothing. Benjamin and Hope

wanted a loving, nurturing baby sitter, just like any other concerned parents who work during the day but have no family or friends to watch their child. They had done their homework and thought they had discovered her in 21-year-old Alexis Khan. She passed a background check and had credible work experience as a baby sitter, and both of Finn's parents thought she was "a good

Five months into her baby-sitting, however, the Jordans noticed that their trusted and loyal dog, Killian, had become overly protective of Finn when the baby sitter came around. Killian, a black Lab and German shepherd mix, is normally docile and friendly.

Thank God for not only canine instincts but also maternal discernment. As an act of precaution, Hope wanted to record what occurred while Kahn was baby-sitting. So the Jordans planted their iPhone under the couch to record any interactions between the baby sitter and their infant son.

To their horror, it captured the sounds of an abusive baby sitter and a beloved baby shrieking in pain. Benjamin explained the

recording to WCSC: "It started with cussing. Then you hear slap noises, and his crying changes from a distress cry to a pain cry. And I just wanted to reach through the audiotape, go back in

time and just grab him up." He further lamented, "To know that (for) five months, I had handed my child to a monster not knowing what was going on in my house for that day.'

After reviewing the audio recordings, police arrested Khan. She confessed to the crime, pleaded guilty to assault and battery, and was sentenced to one to three years in prison. She also has been placed on a child abuse registry under the South Carolina Department of Social Services, which will prevent her from working with children in the future.

"That is fantastic news for us to know that maybe Finn's ordeal has possibly saved another child's life,' Benjamin responded

It was with a great sigh of relief that the Jordans told WCSC that Finn is doing well and shows no signs of negative effects from the abuse he suffered at the hands of his baby sitter.

Benjamin concluded, "Had our dog not alerted us to the trouble, had my wife's instincts not said we need to make something happen, it could have been Finn that was killed by the baby sitter. You never know.'

Benjamin is correct. Finn's story ends well, but not all victims' do. That is why I'm calling on parents everywhere to doubly ensure their children's safety. And there's no better time than now, especially with summer ending and so many returning to routines that

require baby sitters.

According to the Administration for Children and Families, every day, a staggering five children suffer an abuse-related death — an increase from roughly three a day in 1998.

Childhelp, a leading national nonprofit organization dedicated to helping victims of child abuse and neglect, further explains on its website that in the U.S. alone, more than 3 million reports of child abuse are made annually, involving more than 6 million children.

The website also explains:

- Approximately 80 percent of children who die from abuse are younger than four years old.
- Roughly 50-60 percent of child fatalities caused by maltreatment are not recorded as such on death certificates.
- Children who experience abuse and neglect are about nine times likelier to become involved in criminal activity. About 80 percent of
- 21-year-olds who were abused as children meet the criteria for at least one psychological disorder. • About 30 percent of
- abused and neglected children will later abuse their own children.

According to the Forum on Child and Family Statistics, in 2011, 13 percent of children ages 0 to 4 with employed mothers were "primarily cared for by a nonrelative in a home-based environment, such as care from a family day care provider, nanny, babysitter, or au pair."

The above statistics stress just how important it is that parents and guardians take precautions to protect their

children no matter who watches them. Non-family and non-friend sitters carry their own particular risks. so proceed with extreme prudence.

Beneficial, but not foolproof, are the websites Care. com, Sittercity, Babysitters4hire.com, eNannySource and SeekingSitters — where background checks, identification checks and profile reviews are generally included. But the truth is that nothing replaces parental attention, love and protection. If it's at all possible to cut down on expenses and have one parent at home (maybe even working from there), there's no doubt that you are the best child care option for your child.

Foremost, don't check

in your brain at the door of child care. And don't be afraid to ask all the hard questions, do extensive background investigations and make surprise pop-ins on those who care for your most precious and priceless offspring. They're your kids, and it's your house, so monitor their welfare when you're gone, even with electronic-eye devices. Once upon a time, they were cumbersome and costly, but now they're small and relatively inexpensive. Some even can fit on a dog's collar!

And if you don't have the money for high-tech surveillance, use your smartphone as the Jordans did. If you're suspicious — or even if you're not — record a day's audio or visual events in your house.

Oklahoma St. scandal and what it means for journalism and college football.

In recent weeks, acclaimed sports magazine "Sports Illustrated." dropped (what they were hoping) a bombshell of a story in newsstands, but mostly online in a five-part

The story was a 10-month investigation into Oklahoma State's football program with interviews with 64 former football players from 1999 to 2011, as well as football

Obviously SI was hoping that they would break a HUGE story that would shine light on a program that has been fairly successful in the last 14 years. There

was one problem. The story came out, it did bring an NCAA investigation that is ongoing. But what has happened is nobody, not even ESPN, is talking

If any of my readers watch enough ESPN, just think of Penn St. and Ohio St. When those programs were being investigated, ESPN turned into "Sports CNN," focusing on one thing, kind of like the Tim Tebow and Johnny Manziel obsession.

So on my daily and evening commutes to-andfrom Amarillo what has not been talked about has been the topic of conversation of CBS Sports Radio. Now back to Oklahoma St. The investigation was

spearheaded by SI investigative reporter George Dohrmann, who has a Pulitzer prize. Dohrmann also worked on the Terrelle Pryor/Ohio St. scandal.

SI has been criticized for multiple issues with the story. First off, there are many

unnamed testimonies in the articles. While I understand that these people wanted to remain anonymous, I was taught that in journalism you have to get some named sources to sound more credible. By remaining unnamed, it makes it sound like "a friend of a friend of my sister's ex-boyfriend.' Now it is coming out that

one of the testimonials, Rodrick Johnson's words were "twisted". Then another testimony, Thomas Wright, was kicked off the

Successful former players at OSU such as Browns quarterback Brandon Weeden, former NFL running back Tatum Bell and Dallas Cowboys' running back Joseph Randle have all come out defending the university, and discrediting the article for various reasons. Weeden went as far as to say they "picked the wrong people to interview."
