the nine constitutional amendments

that will appear on the Nov. 5 bal-

lot. If passed, these amendments

will add onto what is already one of the longest state constitutions in the nation.

Several members of the federation had voiced some confusion about the ballot, and Peet volunteered his time to explain the proposed amendments to both the federation and the public.

The amendments are as follows:

• HJR 62, which would authorize Education Board and a State Medithe Legislature to provide a property tax exemption for the spouses of veterans. This amendment specifically authorizes a tax exemption for all or part of the market value of the residences of spouses of military members who are killed in action.

• HJR 79, which would eliminate a requirement for a State Medical cal Education Fund.

• HJR 133, which would extend the tax exemption period on storing aircraft parts in the state and would provide more tax relief to aerospace manufacturers.

## New school zone signs to come

When driving around the high school, parents and other drivers may have noticed that the times on the school zone signs have incorrect times.

The current signs read the speed limit while in the school zone runs between the times 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 3:40

Parents have expressed concern about this as most students don't get out until 3:45 p.m. Donny Hooper, director of public works for

the City of Pampa, said that an oversight was the cause for the signs not being updated. The City of Pampa is currently getting the templates for the new signs ordered and that signs could go up as early as next week, he said.

The new signs will be placed anywhere there is a designated school zone for the high school. In the meantime, Hooper stresses that drivers use caution when driving in these areas to keep the students safe.

"We do ask that people just pay close attention and exercise caution," Hooper said.

Any damage done to the school zone signs will likely be fixed, particularly to the signs on Randy Matson Avenue.

## The answer is blowing in the wind

Peet to hold information session on amendments

#### Clarendon College's wind energy program gives students hands-on training for everything they will do in the field.

Lance Porter liked the wind energy program at Clarendon College so much that after graduating with an associates degree he got a job as the instructor.

"This is like a dream come true for me," said Porter, who lives in Pampa and is a retired correctional of-

Porter said he loves to teach and sometimes worked as an instructor in the prison system.

Along with that, Porter sees a big, bright future for wind energy.

"I believe in what renewables and wind energy can do not for just this area, but for the country," he said. Wind is free fuel, and you are not producing any kind of contamination.'

Though there are only five students right now in his class at Clarendon, he expects it won't be long until he's teaching a full classroom every semester.

Wind turbines now dot the Texas and Oklahoma landscapes, and just last week Pattern Energy Group broke ground on a 118-turbine wind farm near the city of Panhandle.

"We are on the cusp of an explosion," he said. WIND cont. on page 2

"What we have seen so far is barely even a glimpse of what's going to happen."

Porter's job is to train students on how to maintain wind turbines and troubleshoot breakdowns in the units.

Porter lectures in a classroom, but the crux of his instruction is done in the sophisticated training lab adjacent to that classroom.

The lab contains everything needed for hands-on training on the electrical, mechanical and hydraulic systems on actual turbines.

Students disassemble and rebuild a Vestas 90, a 90-kilowatt turbine just like the ones used on the

The west wall of the classroom is covered with various motor control circuits, and near the door is a five-foot tall model wind turbine. However, the coolest piece of equipment in the room is undoubtedly the Nacelle Turbine Learning System, which Porter said he can program to simulate virtually any problem that could happen in the field. 

I've been hearing from healthy Californians who were kicked glitch-rich off their private plans because of Obamacare and were informed they would have to pay much higher premiums on Affordable Care Act exchanges. It could be that his family's boon health care spells a financial hit for healthy individuals who had good affordhit because able health care before Obamacare.

## Oil in the Texas Panhandle

ing for oil and gas in the Texas panhandle in 1916, and the first well was bottomed - 2,605 feet — just before

Christmas 1918. It was a strong gasser, and it was located in Potter County. Three years later the Gulf Oil

Company hit oil on the Burnett Ranch in Carson County. Soon after that the rigs started going up in Gray – the first production of gas. In 1921, the Worley Reynolds,

which was drilled by Wilcox Oil and Gas Company, came in as a heavy producer of oil, and everybody knows what happened next, you can see it all over the country — oil, gas, carbon black, industry and tank farms.

I doubt whether they ever dreamed of how much oil and industry would be in the area when they were laying the grass roots here in 1902.

In the 1920s, Charles N. Gould, a professor at the University of Oklahoma, began making surveys of underground water when he discovered oil and gas in the panhandle field. Then in 1924, the biggest thing to happen to Pampa took place, the first oil well was drilled on Phebe Worley's ranch.

In the 1920s, mule teams moved the equipment out to the oil fields, and the producers had begun to haul oil from Pampa late in the 1920s by train.

By 1929, the oil and gas production showed that the panhandle field was one of the nation's largest, and by 1930 Pampa's population grew from about 900 people to about 30,000. People were coming from every-

where because of the oil boom.

One of the most expensive leases was located 10 miles southeast of Pampa and was purchased by Phillips Petroleum Company for \$1 million. A record producer was the Bowers No. 1, eight miles south of Pampa.

The well drilled more than 2 million barrels of crude oil by 1952. After rotary drilling was introduced to the Texas Panhandle, the average time to


drill a 3,000 foot well was 20 days. This area owes a great deal to the

oil and gas production as well as its founders. It's brought many people to the area and made our land some of the most valuable in the world.

I missed the film, but heard it was so intense that Brad's hair got mussed up on at least three occasions. Zombies generally have bad hair. Roy was a homosexual who lived In our home. I believe that it was 1982 and we were living in Pueblo, Colo. I was working in youth ministry at the time. One day a scraggly looking man about 25 years of age walked into my office looking for help. He said he wasn't look-

ing for financial help, but spiritual help.

"I don't want to waste time in a relationship that can't go anywhere." That is when Roy and I began to open the Bible. Our first few meetings proved to be a strain on Roy. It was very hard on **SUBLETT** him to accept that God both loved him and yet expected him to leave his

lifestyle. But in one of our open Bible meetings Roy came to that moment of truth and said, "I get it now. I know God loves me and I know I have to change the way I'm living. But I just don't know if I can do it." That's when I reminded him that he didn't have the power to change his life, but that God did and that the Holy Spirit would empower him to slay the homosexual giant. Roy surrendered to Christ and was baptized that very hour.

I knew that Roy would never survive as a believer back on the streets, so I called my wife and asked her if it was ok if Roy moved in with us for a while. Shari has always been a gem that way. No matter what wild-eyed work for God I called her about, she always said, "Sure."

So Roy brought a few of his things and moved into our extra bedroom.

Roy began to counsel with me and with one of our elders who had been around the block many more times than me. As the days passed I began to meet several of Roy's homosexual and lesbian friends. They were always puzzled with me and I was always amazed with them. I remember a young lady in her 20s who came by the house one day. She was drop-dead gorgeous and had been the centerfold in an issue of Penthouse. She told me that she was pleasantly shocked not to hear angelic music in my house, instead hearing the Beach Boys. She shared about her life and it was a wreck from early childhood. That was a common theme as I met Roy's friends.

After the second month it "appeared" like Roy was really gaining ground. In his own words, he shared that he didn't believe that he could abstain from the

"queer" lifestyle and asked for guidance. (Roy had no problem with the word "queer") I told him to let me make some calls. I called several ministries that worked with homosexuals and the answers were the same. For those who tried to abstain, but just couldn't and yet wanted desperately to live a faithful life for Christ there was one last ditch answer: surgically become a eunuch for Christ. That is right, you heard me correctly, become a eunuch. Initially Roy was freaked out, but after a few days he was very much in favor of the surgery. The elders of the church said that they would cover his medical expenses, but they required Roy to pray over the matter for one month, 30 days.

About that time I was scheduled to speak at Pepperdine University to a group of Church of Christ youth ministers. I decided to make it a family trip so that Shari and the kids could go. We knew that was taking a real chance with Roy in our home. So we recruited one of our college guys to stay in our home for the week we would be in California. It wasn't a fool-proof plan, but we thought that it looked ok. We were wrong.

After about the fourth day, I received a call from one of the elders. He was in our home checking up on things and discovered that our young college guy left without a word to us and Roy just invited his closest friends for a three- to four-day party. When Joe and Patty arrived many different types of people were in various bedrooms. Joe emptied the place. Roy was nowhere to be found. We never saw Roy again. Our kids were not traumatized from the experience; instead we had many conversations about the world and the family of God and the differences. It also gave our family an opportunity to reach out to several very lost souls with the gospel. And after all, isn't that what being a Christian is all

Most importantly it gave us a chance to practice the saying: "LOVE THE SINNER, HATE THE SIN." I hated that Roy was enslaved to a perverted form of sex that if he never repented, would one day separate him from God and damn his very soul. Once again, "Father God, please help Roy wherever he is. And Lord, thank You for blessing our family with a chance to practice what we preach. Amen." God bless. Mike

### Miami's NCAA saga comes to an end with sanctions

Both of those scholarship losses will be stretched out over three vears. But for the first time since 2010, the football team will be permitted to appear in a postseason game.

## FIFA bans 3 more El **Salvador** players for fixing

ZURICH (AP) — FIFA has imposed worldwide bans on three more El Salvador national team players in a match-fixing case, taking the total FIFA says the players,

who it did not identify, were originally banned for five years, one year and six months, respectively, by the El Salvador football association this month.

FIFA announced 16 global sanctions, including 14 lifetime bans, last

The case involves international matches, including El Salvador's 5-0 loss to Mexico at the 2011 Gold Cup and a 2-1 loss in a friendly against the United States in 2010. Under-20 national team matches were also involved.

#### Imperfect Broncos fall to second place in AFC West

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) — The Super Bowl shoo-ins woke up Monday as a second-place team. And all those little

flaws and imperfections that Peyton Manning glossed over with a steady stream of points well, those couldn't be glossed over this week.

Manning and the Denver Broncos returned home with their first regular-season loss in 378 days, which left them looking up at Kansas City in the AFC West standings and glowering over a game film that exposed problems in virtually every phase of their game.

To name a few: An offensive line that can't absorb any more injuries; a defense that needed more than Von Miller's return to repair its problems; turnovers; penalties; play calling.

"You're concerned with all of it," coach John Fox said.






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
