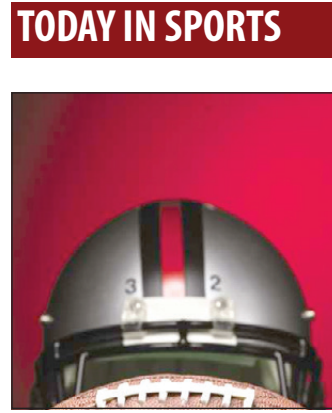

## Couple injured in Borger plane crash

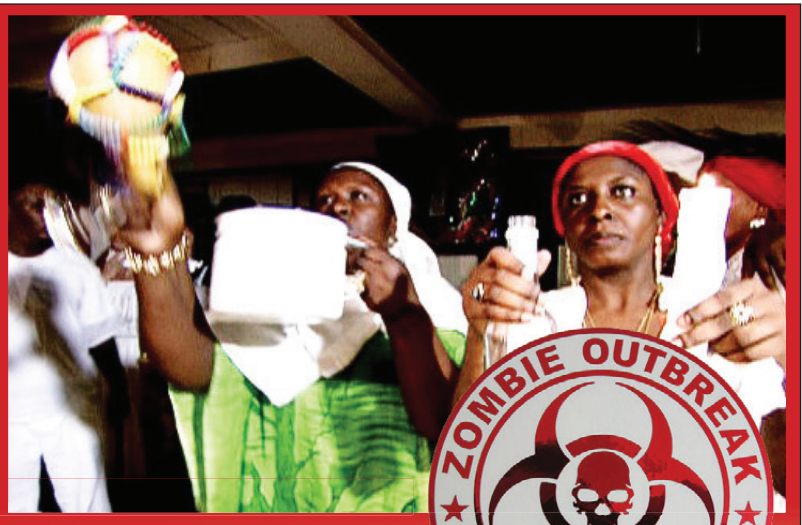
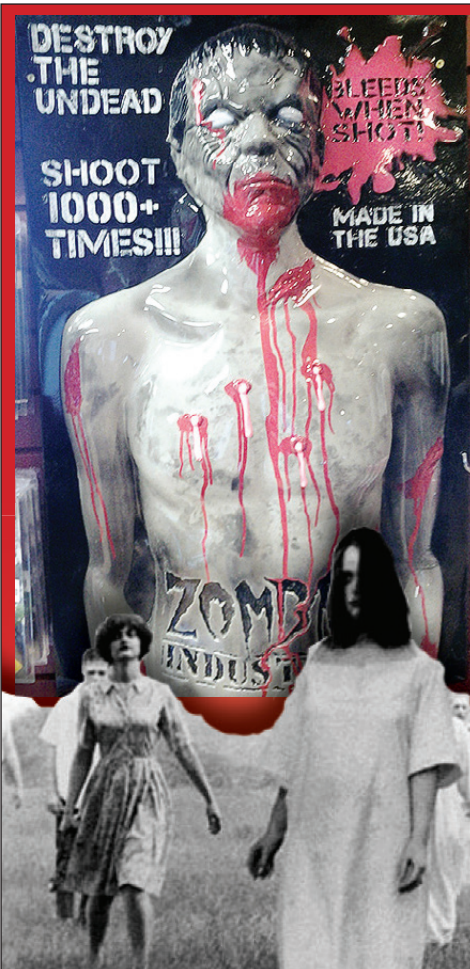
STAFF REPORT

A Memphis, Tenn. couple were hospitalized for minor injuries this morning after the 1976 Cessna they were flying crashed at a public park in Borger.  
 Pilot Joe Max Shelton, 74, and his wife Sally, 71, were transported to Golden Plains Community Hospital in Borger, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.  
 At approximately 7 a.m. Friday morning, the couple left Memphis, Tenn. on their way to Santa Fe, N.M. They stopped in Weatherford, Okla. for fuel and continued on their trip.  
 As they were approaching the Borger area, they began to experience mechanical trouble with the engine of their aircraft.  
 Max Shelton, the pilot, made contact with authorities explaining his trouble and tried to land at the Borger airport but lost power, according to DPS.  
 At 11:40 a.m. the aircraft crashed into a recreational park at the Cofield Community Center. During the crash, the plane struck power poles causing some residents in Borger to lose electricity.  
 The Federal Aviation Administration has been contacted.

### When is it and where is it coming from?

Walk into the Westgate Mall in Amarillo and stop inside trendy stores such as Spencer's and Hot Topic and there will be a reasonably large section devoted to zombies.  
 It doesn't just stop there. Many Hastings Entertainment stores and retail shops have a subsection devoted to zombie themes. At first

thought, these "un-dead" products are notably visible because Halloween is right around the corner. But these creatures are not just on retail shelves seasonably like Santa Clause around Christmas time, they are a year-round product.

With AMC's "The Walking Dead" tuning viewers in every Sunday and Brad Pitt's "World War Z" bringing in more than \$500 million this past summer, zombies are arguably at the height of their popularity. There are even "Zombie Outbreak Response Team Vehicle" decals available on eBay and many other retail locations. So what has made these un-dead carnivorous humanoids so popular? In Facebook posts on The Pampa News' page and individual authors' pages, the responses varied.

Travis Tidmore said, "Zombies are fun entertainment. My favorite is Shaun of the Dead. It's a perfect mix of horror and humor."

Zack Keenan said, "I like it because its a fictional enemy that not only makes me question why. But [it] also creates an excitement that rides the line between being a weapon wielding survivalist and a wannabe savior for those who are being 'attacked.'"

According to the History Channel's "Zombies: A Living History," more than half of all zombie movies have been filmed since 2001. Whether watching for the thrill and adrenaline rush of being scared, or to feel like a hero, zombies have captivated the imagination of viewers and horror/sci-fi fanatics of all ages. where does the craze truly come from? It has actually been spread through many cultures.

## The origins of 'zombii'

It is widely believed that the idea of zombies originated in ancient Haitian voodoo religions. The belief, according to Vodou (voodoo), was that a dead person could be revived by a bokor, or sorcerer. They remained under control of this bokor because they had no will of their own. It is also linked to West Africa where it was used to enhance the bokor's ability, according to Elizabeth McAlister's in "A Sorcerer's Bottle: The Visual Art of Magic in Haiti." But they weren't related to the flesh-eating mongrels we see popularized today.

But West Africa and Haiti aren't the only places where raising the dead has popped up in history. "The Epic of Gilgamesh" has Gilgamesh saying "I will raise up the dead and they will eat the living. The dead will outnumber the living."

In ancient China, there was a belief that a loved one who has passed away will come back as a ghoul

to devour its family to get revenge for not receiving a proper burial.

Speaking of ghouls, the word "ghoul" comes from Arabian languages, where they were literally sent to the afterlife for living an immoral life. In common cases they were a prostitute.

In Vikings' Norse mythology, a draugr is an undead mythological creature who was "unstoppable."

## Appearances in pop culture

While many attribute George Romero's "The Night of the Living Dead" in 1968 for the first appearance of the flesh-eating undead beings in today's pop culture, some say Mary Shelley's "Frankenstein" is the first, because Victor Frankenstein's monster was a corpse pieced back to life. While the jury is still out on that decision, Romero's "Night of the Living Dead" certainly spring-boarded the thought of zombies into modern pop culture.

After the afore mentioned film, Michael Jackson dances with the dead in his music video for "Thriller."

After music, zombies stumble their way into video games with "The Resident Evil" video game series, which is caused by fictional bio-weapon pro-

ducers, the international Umbrella Corporation. These games allow players to enter a survival world where they shoot, crawl and run there way out of a zombie-filled country.

In the last decade, there have been parodies, such as "Shawn of the Dead" and "Zombieland," and reinventions of zombies in the graphic novel-turned-TV series "The Walking Dead" and many other shows and movies. The zombie fanaticism is running strong.

Although they may not be called "zombies" or "ghouls," many other sci-fi and fantasy worlds have un-dead creatures. George R.R. Martin's fantasy epic "A Song of Ice and Fire" features "white walkers," which are un-dead creatures who live in a frozen tundra environment. Science fiction and fantasy stories, whether a novel, movie, or show, are almost missing a piece if they do not feature something un-dead.

## But why?

There are many reasons that fans of the flesh-eaters find themselves gnawing at the limbs of the zombie craze. It varies from person to person.

Some like them because of the nostalgic horror movie aura zombies create.

Even today, the late-sixties classic "The Night of the Living Dead" still has a strong following.

Some are obsessed with the apocalyptic possibilities it creates. Society has survived a large number of "end of the world" scares, Y2K and the 2012 Mayan apocalypse, which was the most recently and by far most widely believed.

Perhaps zombie fans enjoy imagining themselves in the situation that Andrew Lincoln's character is in on "The Walking Dead."

Peter Dendle, an English professor at Penn State, believes that "Zombie movies tap into our apocalyptic fears and anxieties very effectively. They de-romanticize the connections between human beings and reduce humanity to its lowest common denominator, focusing on power relations in their most brutal human form. It's 'I will exert my will over you.' It's very Nietzschean."

Whether it's for nostalgia, the apocalypse or to see humanity at its worst point, the zombie craze is not going to die anytime soon. The fourth season of "The Walking Dead" just started.

Speaking of gambling, we stayed in a casino/hotel while visiting my cousin, and I saw the same two women sitting at the same two slot machines at the same time every morning as I went down for our daily Starbucks coffee. I've saved the best part of our road trip for last. The cousins and I grew up together in California, and I consider them like brothers and sisters. My cousin Cookie's husband, Donald, drove us over to California where I saw my dear Aunt Lizzy, who is 95, and lives in Redondo Beach with my oldest cousin, Gene. Another cousin, Carolyn, and her husband Ed had flown in from South Carolina. We hadn't seen each other in nearly 40 years, and we had a wonderful time laughing and reminiscing. Another cousin, Jeff, couldn't get away from his job for the reunion, and the fifth cousin, Spike, passed away last year. We met a new cousin who married into the family last year, and a sweet little 6-year-old cousin.

My husband was accepted with love and without reservation. While we may not have seen the national parks, we received a much better gift, the priceless gift of enduring family love. It was the trip of a lifetime, but we're really glad to get home to the less-frantic pace of Pampa, and our family and friends here.

## Winners and losers

The conventional wisdom is that Republicans were the big losers in the shutdown of the government and the near-default. Certainly, that's what the polls show. And Sen. Ted Cruz has

become the “poster boy” for a failed strategy that finally ended when the grownups in the Senate hammered out the sort of deal that should have been passed by the House weeks ago. The reason it wasn't passed weeks ago is that House Speaker John Boehner has more Cruz-wannabes than he can handle, which is to say, a big enough number that, to the end, he had to rely on Democratic votes, with a majority of his own members voting against him. So the center held, but it's a Democratic center these days, even in a Republican House.

The tea party lost. They are being blamed in the national polls. Democrats are licking their chops. Cruz should be cowering in the corner. But he's not, because he's no fool.

The center only matters in general elections. It only matters when you're about to fall off the fiscal cliff. The rest of the time, the ideologues pretty much rule. Cruz knows that, which is why he was smiling.

The people who admire him are not a majority and never will be. But you don't need a moderate majority to win a Republican primary or caucus. In fact, that's pretty much how you lose one.

The Republicans have got themselves in a very difficult box. The candidates who excite their base, those with the strongest support among citizens who vote in low-turnout primaries and even lower-turnout caucuses are the very people who led the temper tantrum of the past few weeks. It's no exaggeration to say that for many of these folks, Cruz is their hero, as are his congressional followers. And there will be plenty of opportunities to show it.

The Republicans who have reason to worry on this morning after are not the ones who shut down the government, but the ones who opened it up again. Sad but

true. They're the ones who could face primary challenges for not being ideological enough. They're the ones who will have to explain why they didn't join in the playground games aimed at taking down Obamacare.

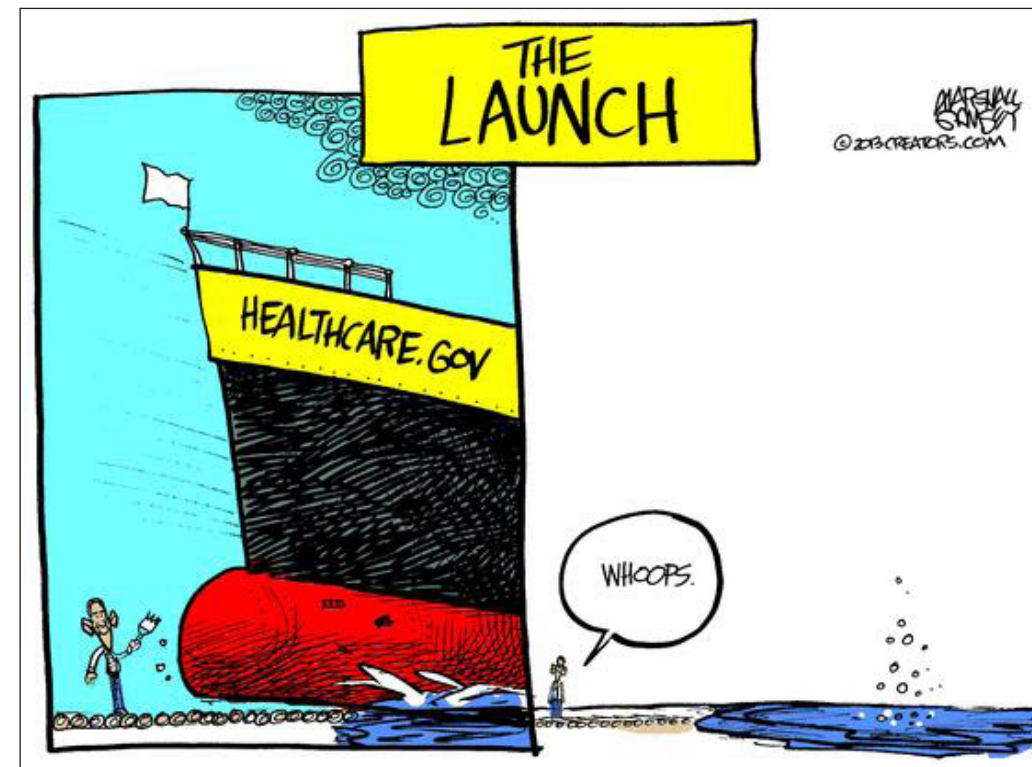
Oh, it's true, of course, that you can't get rid of Obamacare as long as Barack Obama is president. So the Republican effort was hopeless and fruitless. This matters to me. It matters to many people. But in my youth, when I was a high-intensity activist on the other side of the spectrum, I never let the hopelessness of my cause stand in the way of the fervor with which I pursued it. Today's hopeless cause was tomorrow's party platform and, in the next decade or so, maybe even an act of Congress or an executive order. That's how it was with abortion rights and gay rights, which moved from the ideological left to the center. I'm sure that's how Cruz thinks about Obamacare. So what if defeating it today is a hopeless cause?

People talk all the time about how democracy is corrupted by big money, and it is. But “one person, one vote” is a myth for other reasons, as well, the most basic being that people have very different attitudes toward politics and voting.

Most people view voting the way I view baseball. For much of the season, I pretty much ignore it, not waking up until close to the end, when I start checking to see whether my Red Sox are going to make it to the series. I don't pay attention until the field has been narrowed. That's how most people vote: only at the end. Ideologues start at the beginning; they pick the candidates who make it to the World Series. What they lack in numbers they make up for in intensity.

The tea party will not go away as a result of this exercise. If anything, their ability to paralyze the country and threaten the world economy, well, that kind of power has to make any ideologue feel good. Had the tea party truly “lost,” that would have been good news for Republicans who are trying to win general elections. No such luck.

## Statewide gas price average down 2 cents

Today's statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in Texas is \$3.10 according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is two cents less from one week ago and 31 cents less per gallon than what drivers were paying on this same day a year ago. The average in Texas is 23 cents less

than the national average of \$3.33. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Amarillo and Texarkana are paying the most at \$3.14 per gallon, and drivers in Beaumont, Galveston, and Houston are paying the least at \$3.05.

Analysts say crude oil prices moved lower this week, and if crude oil prices continue to lower in

the days and weeks ahead consumers could also expect to see retail gas prices continue to decrease. Lower demand for gasoline, ample supply in the market, and the seasonal transition to the cheaper winter-blend fuel production continues to keep retail gas prices low. AAA continues to expect that national gas prices will fall in the coming months. "This week Texans are

paying about \$43 per tank of gas for an average family sized vehicle. That's about \$5 less per tank compared to what Texans were paying at this time last year," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "Keeping your vehicle maintained from season to season is the best way to continue to make the most of your fuel dollars."

## Pampa falls to rival Borger for District 1-3A loss

■ Despite controlling time of possession, Harvesters fall to Bulldogs in Highway 152 match-up 17-7.

**BORGER** — The Pampa Harvesters fall to the Borger Bulldogs 17-7 Friday night in Borger. The loss drops the Harvesters to 1-2 in District 1-3A play.

It was a battle of defenses Friday night in Borger during the Battle of Highway 152. The Harvesters started the game on defense against a team that is well known for running the ball. But the Harvesters were ready for the rushing attack. After giving up a 33-yard run on a reverse play, the Harvesters stopped the two ensuing runs. On the third and five play, the Harvesters sacked junior Borger quarterback Jake Showers.

On the ensuing Harvester drive, the Harvesters went on a nine-play drive, which ate up more than four minutes on the clock. The drive included receptions by sophomore receivers Alex McClendon and

Joseph Radke from junior quarterback Tyler Hooper. The Harvester got stopped however, but continued to win the time of possession battle.

The following Borger drive was a three play drive that was a six-yard run, a fumble to drive them back 14 yards and a sack by senior linebacker Cager Osbourne. This gave the ball to the Harvesters with favorable field position.

With great field position, the Harvesters took over at the Borger 32-yard line. After a six-yard gain by senior wide receiver Kody Maddox on a hand-off, the Harvesters offense was clicking. The Harvesters came away with points on this drive, after Hooper found Maddox on a 20-yard touchdown pass. After the extra point from sophomore kicker Trevor Turner, the score was 7-0. In the first two drives alone, Pampa ate up 7:02 of clock.

In the second quarter,

Borger's offensive woes continued, as they went on a six-play, 27 yard drive, which ended with a turnover on downs.

Pampa continued to eat up clock and show a potent offense, with a pass play from Hooper to Maddox that went for more than 40 yards. Senior running back Adrian Elam was the workhorse of the quarter, breaking off runs of 20 and 11 yards. The teams went into the locker room at the half with Pampa leading 7-0. Pampa controlled the clock for 14:43 versus Borger's 9:03.

"It was a good high school football game, it went back-and-forth with great defense all night long," Harvesters head coach Heath Parker said. "We were able to contain those backs on all but one play. Moved the ball successfully, offensively and defensively, just wasn't able to get it into the end zone when we were down in the red zone.

"Borger plays good run-defense and they kept us from running it in there. They ended up making a few more plays than we did and that's why the score is in their favor."

The second half was a different story for the Harvesters, miscues added up and allowed for the Borger Bulldogs to get a 14-7 lead in the fourth quarter. The first of the miscues was on a Borger run that resulted in that led to a big run of 65 yards that went for a touchdown by senior running back Dontrea Butler, making the game tied 7-7.

The Harvesters tried to answer the drive with big passes from Hooper to senior Daymon Flores and junior wide receiver Zack Gates. Flores also had two runs for 10 yards, but the Harvesters were stopped short of punching it into the end zone.

"I thought that one of our running backs was injured

tonight and the other two came in and played well for us," Parker said.

After forcing a Borger three-and-out, the Harvesters started the fourth quarter with an opportunity to reclaim their lead. Then Hooper was intercepted by senior defensive back Jared Salinas, who took the interception 63 yards for a touchdown, giving Borger its first lead of the night at 14-7.

The Harvesters struggled to muster any more offense in the game as they turned it over on downs in their following drive, giving Borger the ball to run the clock down from 8:11.

Borger finished the drive after consuming 6:34 with a field goal, making it 17-7 and a two-score game. Pampa got the ball back with 1:37 left to play in the game, but was unable to score any points on the drive, ending the game at 17-7.

The Harvesters spent much of the game on Borger's side of the field and won the time of possession battle 27:55 to Borger's 18:16. As Parker alluded to, it was the Harvesters inability to punch it in deep in Borger territory that was the difference-maker in the match-up.

The Harvesters return to the field in their regular

season finale Friday against Dalhart. This will also be senior night. Kick off is at 7:30 p.m.

"We are going to go home, regroup and get a game plan together and figure out what we need to do to beat Dalhart," Parker said.

## Freshmen advance to 2-1, JV fall to 1-2 in District 1-3A play

The Pampa Harvesters freshmen squad earned their second consecutive victory Thursday night and moved on to 2-1 in District 1-3A play, while the junior varsity squad lost and fell to 1-2 in District 1-3A play.

### Dodd has three TDs as Pampa romp Borger

Down 0-6 in the second quarter, the Harvesters were backed into their own end zone. The Harvesters handed off to running back Newt Dodd, who took it almost 90 yards to score a touchdown. Following the two-point conversion, the Harvesters took an 8-6 lead.

After forcing a three-and-out, the Harvesters then drove down the field to the Borger 14-yard line. Bryce Parker took the snap and looked through his reads

and, unable to find a receiver, Parker kept it himself and ran in a touchdown. Failing to complete the two-point conversion, the Harvesters held a 14-6 lead.

In the third quarter, the Harvesters had the ball just on the outside of the Bulldog's red zone. Dodd took another hand-off, this time running it from 22 yards out, giving the Harvesters the 21-6 lead.

The Bulldogs attempted to mount a come back, but a deep pass was intercepted by Ryan Roden which set the Harvesters up in great field position.

A 15-yard touchdown run by Dodd in the waning minutes of the game solidified the win for the Harvesters, 28-6.

### JV falls despite four BHS INTs, three by Vizcaino

Early in the game, sopho-

more quarterback Erick Vizcaino used great blocking by his line and receivers to pick up a first down on fourth-and-14. The Harvesters, however, didn't score their first points until the second quarter.

After Vizcaino intercepted, he and the Harvester offense were 20 yards from the goal line. The Harvesters' blocking once again proved helpful for Vizcaino, who carried the ball 18-yards for a touchdown.

On the following Harvester drive, Vizcaino hooked up with fellow sophomore Sergio Santos for a 60-yard pick up. A hand off to sophomore Francisco Salaza which resulted in a touchdown from 4-yards out extended the Harvesters lead to 12-6. Before halftime, Vizcaino recorded his second interception of the night.

The Harvesters went into

halftime with a 12-6 lead, but had been to the red zone on multiple occasions.

Borger scored 14 unanswered points, despite throwing two more interceptions, one intercepted by Vizcaino (his third) and the other by sophomore Aaron Arreola.

The final Harvester score of the night was on a fifth Borger turnover. On a hand-off up the middle, the Borger running back was met by a hoard of Harvester players, when sophomore Brandon Moore stripped the ball and took it 30-yards for a Pampa touchdown, making the score 14-20. The Harvesters got the ball back with 30 seconds to play, but was unable to turn it into points.

The squads finish the regular season on the road next week at Dalhart. The freshmen start at 4:30, with the junior varsity starting shortly
