October has not been a good month for Shelly Stover. Her daughter broke her arm, her teenage son, a football player, tore his shoulder and early Thursday morning a fire that started in her attic could have burned her house

That tragedy was prevented yesterday because in February a guardian angel walked into her life — on four wobbly legs.

The stray female puppy her family adopted as a pet, now full grown and called Remington, or "Remmy" for short, picked up on the faint odor of smoke minutes before the smoke alarms went off, alerting her to the fire.

Stover quickly got out of the house with her 7-year-old daughter, Abby, Remmy, a Chocolate Labrador/pit bull mix, and her two other dogs, Buster, a dachshund, and Shadow, a Chihuahua. Her son was spending the night with relatives in Lefors.







## Anti-government proponents: There is no pie to be had

One of my favorite stories from this week was the one about former astronaut

a bit like Hadfield. Following the government shutdown, a lot of intelligent folk began to make the claim that the big lesson learned from the shutdown is: America can do just fine without government.

Leading to the drama, which led to the shutdown, Sarah Palin said that a shutdown would be a good thing as "it would

allow the American people to realize how irrelevant the federal government is in our lives."

Ronald Reagan once famously said that, "Government is not the answer to our problems, it IS the problem." This is the same argument John Stossel made in a newspaper column where he pronounced that the failure of the partial government shutdown to damage the U.S. economy was evidence that Americans, we resourceful folk, don't need the federal government after all.

"Give me a break," Stossel said. "Farmers don't need government bureaucrats to teach them how to make a profit, and Americans...would make more profit and afford better homes if they didn't have to spend a third of national income on federal taxes."

And, just like Hadfield, I want to scream: "Have you ever been without a government? Because I've been without a government!"

It happened in July of 1979, when the Sandinista Revolution finally removed the brutal tyrant Anastasio Somoza from power in Nicaragua.

I was a kid then but I remember the two week period where there was no one entity to set and protect the rule of law and, take my word for it, it's not something I want to experience again.

Roving gangs of former members of the armed forces took what and whomever they wanted with no consequences. Electricity, running water, basic commodities we took for granted, all were gone with no one to fix the problem. Hospitals, jails, supermarkets became a memory from a (not so distant) past.

A similar tale was told to me by one of my former students, a refugee from Afghanistan. At the height of the occupation by coalition forces in 2002, his brother decided to take his chances and cross the border into Pakistan with his young wife and twin daughters. Back then, the crossing point was controlled by the Taliban.

"Yes you can go across, government movement or go back," they told

"But you have to leave either your wife or your daughters with us." (The Taliban is a major player in sex trafficking in the region). His wife told them she would stay.

I will be the first to admit these are extreme examples, but they serve to illustrate the fact that a central government is real and it provides some basic functions:

 It protects the country from threats, both foreign and domestic.

· It sets standards we live by, like how long before my carton of milk goes bad and makes sure that it is not infected with anthrax spores.

• It keeps the national infrastructure working; the kind of things we complain about but cannot fix ourselves (like pot holes, school systems and highways).

• It makes sure our country is there tomorrow (think about the debacle of the former Soviet Union).

The disturbing anti-

that was thought to have disappeared after the Oklahoma City bombing by Timothy McVeigh is making a comeback. And now it is finding common cause with some elected officials and impetus from the "Oath Keepers" theory that the federal government is preparing to go "rogue" and turn against its citizens.

What they are working for is the politics of No Government at All.

The truth is that, when it comes to central governments, one can't have the pie and shove it down one's throat. It's a contract, we give, it takes and it gives and we take. Despite their rhetoric,

some of today's antigovernment proponents concede that states can serve socially important functions like protecting infrastructure, consumer protections, a strong centralized military and highly militarized law enforcement, especially with regard to undocumented immigrants.

In terms of government intrusion, having been

the child of as intrusive a government as there ever was, I am very conservative and want government out of my personal life, in all aspects.

And, having lived in a time with no government, I also understand why we need it.

The truth is that big, ineffective government bureaucracies are a massive problem and the answer is to streamline them and make them more effective.

If that's what you want, you anti-government peeps, then, count me in.

Otherwise, shut up for you don't know what you are talking about. Don't take my word for

it. Sarah Palin, one week after making that comment arguing it would be a good thing for government to be shut down, promptly started protesting against the shutdown.
