Alibates' Flintfest rescheduled for today

FRITCH — Alibates Flint Quarries National Monument has rescheduled FlintFest 2013

for Saturday, Nov. 16 from 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. This annual event celebrates the unique resource known as Alibates flint and its usage through the ages.

The highlight of the day will be a "knapin," featuring flintknappers from around the area who will demonstrate the skill of making stone tools and weapons.

Visitors can watch arrowheads and spearpoints being made on site, and can learn about the flintknapping process.

Also featured will be special Ruins Tours to the village and petroglyph sites associated with the Antelope Creek Phase of the Plains Village culture (ca. AD 1150-1450).

Tours are free, but reservations are required for both the special Ruins Tours and the regular Quarries Tours. Visitors who had reservations that were cancelled due to the government shutdown should call to reschedule their tours.

Other activities that will be available include atl-atl throwing, beading, and displays of the bugs and mammals native to the Texas Panhandle region.

Visitors may also view the award-winning film, "The Sharp Edge of Survival," walk the nearby Mesquite Trail, and shop in the bookstore. Books and posters featuring flintknapping and stone tools and weapons will be available. For more information or to make reserva-

Sixth Floor Museum adds items

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas museum chronicling the life and death of President John F. Kennedy has added several items visible in a Pulitzer Prize-winning photograph of Jack Ruby shooting Kennedy assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

The Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza announced Friday the additions as the nation marks the 50th anniversary of Kennedy's Nov. 22, 1963, assassination.

New items include the tan suit worn by police Detective Jim Leavelle and the handcuffs that linked him to Oswald during the attempted jail transfer. Also added were Ruby's gray fedora and the Nikon camera Dallas Times Herald photographer Bob Jackson used to make the photo.

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

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The Obama mess: Who done it? We done it

It may well be — I wouldn't deny it for a minute — that Barack Obama

> has less to recommend

him as a U.

S. president



than any predecessor of the past century. Vain, WILLIAM cocksure, MURCHISON morose, disabled from admitting a mistake or a

bad guess — what a guy! Small wonder no present poll shows him with majority public support. There is irony here.

Majority public support is what catapulted him to the presidency. The things he's done which have lowered his reputation — e.g., put health care under federal control, fight for the redistribution of income, etc., - are pretty much the things he could have been heard pledging to do when he ran for the presidency. Except relatively few thought relatively much about the presumptive

consequences. We, the people elected him. That's the point hardly ever acknowledged amid all the shouting and counter-shouting that drown Washington, D.C. in perpetual racket. We twice, not just once, armed him, escorted him to the White House, opened the front door for him, and said, in effect, go to it.

The anti-Obama backlash now becoming a central fact of American politics is likely overdue, and probably constructive insofar as it slows him, hinders his designs, makes him think twice about notions that bear small resemblance to the products of careful, considered reasoning. Nonetheless, we shouldn't be unduly hard on a guy we put where he is.

Barack Obama is the product — perhaps the inevitable product — of an unresolved cultural conflict among his countrymen: one conservatives thought they had licked back in the '80s. Supposedly, Ronald Reagan had given such impetus to conservative free-market, anti-communist thinking that he forgot the questions that brought him to office. He had cut taxes, helped overthrow the Soviet commies, taken up for traditional morality. It was done! Hallelujah! It was

Except it wasn't all right at all. With Reagan out of office, the great American political culture proved itself — if more hesitantly

going to be all right.

than would have been the case without Reagan to be as bollixed as ever when it came to certain basic questions. To wit, how big should government be, and how much should that government cost? Is it government's duty to make everybody happy or just grant people the opportunity to become happy with minimal interference from outside? Things like

The old conflicts and arguments broke out again. The old war cries rose. The rich had too much money! The poor had too little! Life wasn't fair! Government had to make it fair!

Into the middle of our unresolved arguments strolled a community organizer whose race and education drew more attention than the unresolved nature of our conflicts. Many heard him giving more or less clear answers to the old questions. The rich had too much money? Yep, replied candidate Obama. Government needed to do more for more people? Yep. The free market wasn't as good as Reagan had made it out to be? Sure enough.

Somehow, conservatives proved themselves unable — or reluctant — to make the case for smaller government at less cost. Obama's case for bigger, costlier government, reinforced by the public's Bush-fatigue, won the voters' hearts. He got the job he asked for — courtesy of those who liked what they were hearing. Why they liked it is another matter entirely. They liked it — that's the point. They promoted Barack Obama to run the whole country, which he proceeded to do in a way that is now producing buyers' remorse of a very widespread — not universal but still widespread — nature indeed.

The presidency of Barack Obama, whose signature achievement is a health care "reform" stalled by a lousy website and castigated for an untenable, unaffordable economic approach, is the outcome of democratic deliberation — if you call it deliberation. We can't pin this job on a single man. Not when so many millions of fingerprints are all over the crime scene.

Hanging on to fall a little longer

Halloween is over, and the stores already have Christmas decorations fully on display. The holiday commercials

have already begun. But I'm not ready to jump into winter with both feet just yet. I want to hang on to autumn a bit longer. Growing up in Southern California, we didn't experience all four seasons in the traditional manner. We had summer, hotter summer, cooler summer

and chilly summer.

Sometimes we had wet summer. Then I moved to Illinois and the first thing that happened was a bitterly cold winter unlike any they had seen there in many years. Then it snowed. And snowed. And snowed some more. Spring finally came, and I saw flowers and blooming trees I had never seen before. Summer brought heat, humidity, and bugs like I'd never seen before. Ah, but then autumn. The hard maples suddenly blazed forth in shades of red and gold, and oaks in their rusty orange. We took long drives in the Wisconsin countryside just to look at the riot of colors. For the first time in my life, I raked piles of leaves and jumped in them just for fun. Before burn restrictions were put in force, you


could smell leaves burning everywhere you drove, and late at night when it was quiet, you could hear flocks of geese honking their way south. When we bought our first house, there were three trees in the front yard: two box elders and one red maple.

In the side yard there was another box elder, and in the back yard there were another hard maple and a birch tree. For the first few years, the trees were small enough that they didn't produce that many fallen leaves and most of them blew away. By the time we left that house twenty years later, we were bagging upwards of twenty bags of leaves at the end of autumn, and I still enjoyed jumping in the leaves just for fun. A family tradition involved a trip to Racine, Wisconsin, to visit Jerry Smith's Pumpkin Farm. In addition to acres of pumpkins and displays of pumpkins painted and dressed to look like movie and cartoon characters, they had hayrides, a haunted bus, a country store, freshly-grilled bratwurst and hot dogs (which, when the man who ran the grill saw me, he automatically said "Burn one for you, Ma'am?"), and big, warm, soft cookies. We later moved to Indiana, and bought a house with enormous oak and maple trees in the yard, and we treated ourselves to a leaf blower. We didn't have to bag the leaves, but raked

and/or blew them out to the street where they were picked up by city trucks with huge vacuum hoses. By then we had a small grandson, and we always saved a big pile of leaves for him to jump in. When he was joined by his triplet siblings, I think we scattered more leaves than we raked, and the kids had great fun burying us in the leaves. As we lived in a more rural area, we could hear not only the geese migrating at night, but coyotes yipping, and the occasional owl outside our bedroom window. The temperatures here in the Panhandle of Texas have moderated from the 100's of summer, and since we've had a fair amount of rain, the trees have burst forth in multicolored leaves.

We have a new home and I'm sure that there will be leaf piles that the grandkids...and their grandma...can jump in, just for fun. Yesterday I heard geese winging their way south, but I also heard the quiet, melodic call of sand hill cranes migrating. The days are shorter, but there will also be some very pleasant temperatures before the winter winds start to howl. Let's enjoy the sights and sounds and smells of fall for a while and wait until at least the day after Thanksgiving for winter and Christmas.

Memo to Merkel: Tell Obama to take a hike

Chutzpah. I believe that's the word for it.

Just days after learning the

Americans have been tapping her phones and taping her conversations, Angela Merkel has been publicly upbraided by the U.S.

Treasury for being a bad global citizen. What did she do to de-

serve this? Merkel just won a third term as chancellor with a record vote and has an approval rating near 80 percent. But she is a bad global citizen because Germany is running the world's largest trade surplus.

The Washington Post thinks the Treasury's tongue-lashing is overdue, as does Paul Krugman of the New York Times:

"In this environment, a country that runs a trade surplus is ... beggaring its neighbors. It is diverting spending away from their goods and services to its own, and thereby taking away jobs.'

Is this not astonishing? Competing successfully in world markets is now tantamount to stealing food off the table of one's less-competent and less-successful neighbors.

By this standard, America was a selfish nation and a rotten global citizen for the first seven decades of the 20th century, when we ran trade surpluses every year,

averaging 4 percent of GDP. feel the Germans must From the Civil War

through the Roaring '20s, with a high tariff, we became the mightiest manufacturing power the world had ever seen. Our economic independence enabled us to stay out of two world wars. And when we did go in, we won within months in 1918, and we won again only a few years after Pearl Harbor.

Is this a record to be

ashamed of? Every modern nation that has risen to world power has done so through economic nationalism: Britain under the Acts of Navigation; the United States under protectionist Republicans from 1860-1914; Bismarck's Germany; postwar Japan, which rose from the ashes of 1945 to become the world's second economy; and China from 1980 to today.

Trade surpluses, run at the expense of rival powers, have been the hallmark of great nations in their rise to preeminence.

Golf Tips of the Week

Are you using the right irons for your game?

When you read an advert for a driver, it is easy to see what a brand is trying



is simple to scream out 'our longest

driver ever'. But, have vou noticed how the iron adverts seem a lot more muted on their 'result'?

That is because, whatever the technology, you will not hit your irons close more often (which is the point!), unless your grip, club weight, shaft flex, shaft length and lie angle are all set up correctly.

Manufacturers all know that if you pull an iron off the shelf and it is not set up for you then the perfect No. 5 iron shot could be 15 or 20 yards left or right, depending on where the setup is wrong, off the target! They also know that each of you have very different swings and will approach the ball with very different swing speeds from very different angles.

You might be an 8 handicap, but hit your irons very low on the face without any divot and be inclined to strike them towards the toe with an over the top, out to in swing. Or you could be a 14 handicap who strikes the ball high on the face with a down and through angle of attack. So, they can't even say if your handicap is from here to here, then this club will work for you.

Yes, there are some very interesting releases coming, but we don't actually care how far the No. 6 iron goes. We care how consistently a golfer can hit it and how accurate it is. And that means an assessment and a fitting! Please talk to us if you would like some more information or if you'd like to come in for an iron assessment and fitting.
