Braves planning new suburban stadium in 2017

ATLANTA (AP) — The Braves announced Monday they are leaving Turner Field and moving into a new 42,000-seat, \$672 million stadium about 10 miles from downtown in 2017. Atlanta's mayor said the city wasn't willing match an offer from suburban Cobb County worth \$450 million in taxpayer fund-

Braves executives John Schuerholz, Mike Plant and Derek Schiller said the team decided not to seek another lease at 17-yearold Turner Field and began talks with the Cobb Marietta Coliseum and Exhibit Hall Authority in July.

Plant, the executive vice president of business operations, said the team has not signed a contract with Cobb County, but he's "100 percent certain it will hap-pen." He said talks broke down with the Atlanta Fulton County Recreational Authority earlier this year over an extension of the team's 20-year lease, which expires after the 2016 sea-

The stunning news came as the NFL's Atlanta Falcons finalize plans for a new \$1.2 billion retractable roof stadium near downtown, which is also scheduled to open in 2017.







Playing Dallas' beleaguered defense didn't hurt,

Brees completed 34 of 41 passes for 392 yards and four touchdowns, and the Saints beat the Cowboys 49-17 on Sunday night.

The Saints (7-2) had an NFL-record 40 first downs and a franchise-record 625 total yards in their 12th straight prime-time victory in the Superdome. New Orleans had 242 yards rushing, its highest total since 1990.

'Spreading the ball around, getting everybody involved - these are the days you love to have," Brees said. You strive for efficiency both in the run and the pass game. We had that today."

Brees' touchdown passes went for 52 yards to Kenny Stills, 22 yards to Marques Colston, 28 yards to Darren Sproles and a yard to Pierre

Sproles also had a 3-yard touchdown run, and Mark Ingram added a 4-yard scoring run en route to a careerhigh 145 yards rushing on 14

Limited retroactivity for SS benefits

TOM MARGENAU Creator's Syndicate

Q: When I turned 62 about 8 months ago, I was getting unemployment benefits. Those benefits recently ended so I went to file for my Social Security. The clerk who was helping me with my retirement application told me that I could have filed for retirement at age 62. I didn't do that because I was under the impression that I could not get unemployment and Social Security at the same time. So I asked to backdate my Social Security application to the month I turned 62, but I was told I couldn't do that. The clerk said retroactive benefits are not payable. I think this is wrong and I plan to appeal their decision. After all, these are benefits I earned and the government owes me my money. Could you please give me your opinion on this?

A: I won't give you an opinion. I will give you the facts. And I'm afraid the facts are that you messed up. The Social Security ball was in your court, and you

Social **Security** and you

dropped it. There are two main points I need to make here. One has to do with the law, and one has to do with that ball you fumbled away.

The law, at least the law since 1991, says that Social Security retirement benefits filed before age 66 cannot be paid retroactively. Benefits are effective with the month you file for them, or some near future month, but not for any past months. (Claims filed after age 66 can be paid retroactively for up to six months - but never before the month you attain age 66.)

The second point I need to make is that you are responsible for figuring out when to file for your Social Security benefits. You should have taken some steps when you were approaching your 62nd birthday to educate yourself about your potential eligibility for Social Security.

But my financial advisor told me l am limited to six months of back pay. Who is right?

A: If you've read the answers to the previous questions, you would guess your financial advisor is right. After all, I just said that Social Security benefits can be paid up to six months retroactively if the claim is

filed after age 66. But here is the difference in your situation. You actually filed your Social Security application at age 66 -- then suspended your benefits with the intention of waiting until age 70 to start taking those benefits. But if you changed your mind tomorrow and decided you want benefits now at age 68, you would NOT be filing a new claim for benefits (a claim that would come with six months retroactivity). You would simply be "unsuspending" the claim you filed when you were 66. So you could choose to have your unsuspended benefits paid all the way back to that date. However, those benefits would not include any delayed retirement bonus. Or, you could choose to start your benefits at age 68 and get 24 months worth of



DEAR FRUSTRATED: I agree that after all these years you have much time and emotion invested in your relationship with Harold. 
