His soft-spoken, gentle manner belies the hardships he's gone through to get where he's at now as a surgical technical at Pampa Regional Medical Center and a pre-med student at Texas A\&M University in Canyon. Omar Jama, 28, was born in Somalia, a country on the Horn of Africa. In 1991, the central government collapsed and the nation hat
stant civil war ever since.
Jama described the situation in his homeland as being much like the atrocities in another African nation, ing much like the atrocities in another African nation,
Uganda, where innocent people were killed by rival tribes for no other reason than belonging to a different tribe.

Jama said he doesn't remember much about Soma-
lia, because he was only 5 when his family left for Kenya. But he does remember the nine years his father, mother, four sisters and seven brothers lived in refugee camps in nearby Kenya.
"When we left Somalia we had to abandon everything," he said. "There was civil war between the tribes and the only option was to escape with your life. We came to Kenya, where we had very hard times."
While living in Kenya, his parents applied to the While living in Kenya, his parents applied to the
United Nations for political asylum. But there are United Nations for political asylum. But there are malian refugees in Kenya and the time table for someone at the U.N. to even look at an application can take years, he said.
"They look at how bad your case is," he said For applications that are approved, the families can either emigrate to the United States, Canada, Australia or Europe, Jama said.

About four months ago, I received a letter in the mail from Randall County District Attorney's Office for a hot check that I knew nothin about. Who writes checks anymore?

debt.

According to Andrew Ross, member of the Strike Debt Group and professor of social and cultural analysis at New York University, the group receives almost no information about the people whose debt they buy and forgive - only an address. Ross went on to say to NBC that the group mails a letter to each address explaining the project "canceled,"
But the real kicker is that they did But the real kicker is that they dic The group was able to buy debt The group was able to buy debt "secondary debt market."
When people fail to pay medical bills, typically after a barrage of harassing phone calls and threats of egal action, the bank or lender that issued the funds (or the hospital that generated the bills) cut their losses
and sell that debt to a third party.
These sales occur for a fraction the debt's true value - typically for five cents on the dollar, according to Investopedia - and debt-buying companies then go on to recoup the original debt from the individual debtor and thus make a nifty profit long the way
"Our purpose in doing this, aside rom helping some people along the way, was to spread information about the workings of this secondary debt market," explained Ross.
The group has focused on buying only medical debt, and acquired he $\$ 14.7$ million in three separate purchases, most recently purchasing the value of $\$ 13.5 \mathrm{~m}$ on medical ebt owed by 2,693 people across 45 states and Puerto Rico, according to a press release.
No one should have to go into debt or bankruptcy because they ge ick," said Ross.
According to data from the U.S. Department of Justice, close to 65 percent of all personal bankruptcies factor.

The report does not mention Winston by name, but it says the incident took place between 1:30 and 2 a.m. last Dec. ${ }^{\prime}$ It describes the suspect in the sexual assault case as
being between 5 -foot- 9 and $5-11$. Winston is listed by Florida State at 6-4. Timothy Jansen, a Tallahassee attorney, said Winston hasn't been interviewed by police. Jansen said that at one point he had believed the matter had been resolved. "We basically hope it will be resolved quickly and that
