Assistant City Manager Shane Stokes said he's heard a few comments that the corrugated metal siding on the outside of the new Pampa Animal Shelter makes it look like a barn, but he disagrees.

The metal siding on the roof and exterior walls is made from a material called Galvalume, which is an aluminum and zinc coating over steel that is more resistant to the elements than galvanized steel.

Stokes thinks the metal siding, along with the overall design and construction of the building, is cutting edge and the city will have a facility that residents can take pride in.

On Thursday, Stokes gave me a walk-thru of the new shelter, which will be dedicated at 2 p.m. next Wednesday. If everything in the building is ready, the process of moving the animals from the old shelter to the new one will begin.

It's not everyday that a person who not only lived during World War II, but saw the surrender of Japan in the Pacific Ocean walks into your place of business. Last week, Cecil McCarrell, grand marshal of the this year's Veterans Day parade stopped by The Pampa News and visited with employees of the paper.

McCarrell served during World War II and was in the Pacific Ocean when the Japanese surrendered. He said the ship they surrendered on was roughly 1,000 feet away from the ship he was on and he watched the surrender through a spyglass. He said that the facial expressions of the Americans on the ship screamed "Remember Pearl Harbor."

McCarrell served a total of three years and had one simple message concerning today's military: "Freedom doesn't come cheap."







Bouncin' Around The evolution of my cooking

My husband and I have been married 37 years, and the poor man has suffered through some extraordinary

culinary disasters. I have to backtrack a bit here. I grew up in a household with just my mother and grandmother, both of whom were very possessive of their kitchen. Mom wasn't a cookie baker, and Gram could only bake peanut butter cookies,

so cookie-baking was not a skill I learned before marriage.

One disaster occurred when Mom and I decided to bake oatmeal cookies. Unfortunately, neither of us knew you weren't supposed to cook the oatmeal first. Mom decided to try adding more flour, which made the dough too dry. So she added peanut butter, and we finally got a batch of completely inedible cookies. They were so bad that even the squirrels ignored the ones we threw in the back yard.

Once, Mom decided to pinch pennies by cooking soybeans. She didn't realize that a few go a long way, and we literally had soybeans in every pot and pan in the house. We ate soybean burgers, soybean meatloaf, and fried soybeans until we both decided we'd had enough. We put the rest out in the garbage. I did learn how to make a good pie crust and a tasty apple pie.

A few months before Ron and I

where I served pot roast and apple pie. He thought he was marrying a good cook, and I did nothing to ruin his expectations. A few weeks after we were married, living in an apartment, I decided to start some onion soup in the Crockpot before we left for work.

It had been unseasonably cold in northern Illinois early in September, and we thought the soup would be just perfect when we came home. Unfortunately, a warm front blew in. When we came home, the smell of onion soup met us at the door to our apartment building — along with some very unhappy neighbors. The soup was good, but the smell lingered on.

On our first Thanksgiving together, we invited our mothers and Ron's aunt for dinner. The menu included roast turkey, stuffing, green bean casserole, apple pie and a cranberryorange-apple salad. Yes, I remembered to take the "goody bag" out of the turkey before I roasted it. It was the cranberry salad that caused the problem. I forgot to put the top on the blender when I chopped the fruit. and we ended up with a kitchen decorated with cranberry salad.

For New Year's Day I offered to prepare home-made baked beans. I did everything you are supposed to do — soaked and rinsed the beans, prepared the sauce and put the whole thing in the oven late at night so they could bake slowly all night. The next morning we were greeted not by

were married, I invited him to dinner tender, delicious baked beans, but by something more resembling buckshot. Fortunately, the local grocery store was open, and we did enjoy our canned baked beans. Because I worked either part-time or full-time while our daughter was growing up, I'm sorry to say that we resorted to a lot of easily-prepared meals, like Kraft macaroni and cheese and Campbell's soups. Despite such a deprived childhood, she has turned out to be an excellent cook and makes the best homemade mac 'n' cheese I have ever eaten. She's teaching her kids to cook, too, and they always enjoy fixing something here at our house. Last summer, the kids and I fixed a complete meal pot roast, carrots, baked potatoes, and peach and raspberry sorbet – for their parents.

> I'm happy to say my skills have improved, and I do enjoy cooking for Ron and myself. He even enjoys eating what I cook. I must add here that Ron bakes the most delicious sugar cookies, using a recipe handed down from his mother. Many seniors prefer to just eat out rather than prepare small meals, but I do still enjoy trying new things as well as making the old favorites a bit healthier, cutting out fat and sodium. I've also learned to use more seasonings, and I hope to grow an herb garden next year. You see, you really can teach an old dog new tricks!

After other news outlets reported that Davies had told the FBI in three separate interviews that he was not at the mission on the night of the attack, "60 Minutes" issued a correction. Logan confessed to being "misled."

Liberal watchdog group Media Matters is exultant. Its chairman, Hillary Clinton ally David Brock, dismisses conservative criticism of the administration's actions surrounding the attack as the "Benghazi hoax."

The irony is that the real hoax was the fictional story planted by the Obama administration. Then-U.S. Ambassador to the United

gested that the attack began as a protest against an anti-Islam video and that the protest was "hijacked" by "individual clusters of extremists."

Rice told that phony story even though the administration had to have been aware of warnings that al-Qaida had targeted the mission.

As Green Beret Lt. Col. Andy Wood — his real name — told "60 Minutes," al-Qaida had posted on the Internet its intent to attack the Red Cross, the British mission and the U.S. mission. He had warned Washington: "They made good on two out of the three promises. It was a matter of time till they captured the third one."

After the attacks, President Barack Obama pledged that "those who attack our people will find

no escape from justice." Sadly, the administration is not so eager for justice

that it wants survivors to tell the American people what happened and why.

After the discredited Logan story ran, Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., threatened to block confirmation votes on Obama nominees unless the administration allowed survivors to testify before Congress.

So far, the most definitive statement has come from Clinton, who was the secretary of state at the time of the attacks. She told Congress: "With all due respect, the fact is we had four dead Americans. Was it because of a protest, or was it because of guys out for a walk one night who decided they'd go kill some Americans? What difference, at this point, does it make?'

Everything I saw was truly state-of-the-art; I'd never seen anything like it.

Comparing it to the old shelter, it's like the difference between a run-down tenement on Chicago's south side versus a deluxe high-rise apartment house along the Windy City's 'Gold Coast."

As bad as Pampa's old animal shelter is, it is still only about two or three notches worse than any other animal shelter I've seen. It's not unusual to see a 40-year single-wide trailer used for an office with cats in cages stacked to the ceilings. Dog kennels are crammed into makeshift buildings with crudely poured concrete floors.

These conditions are never the fault of the people who operate the shelters, who do so much with shoe string budgets for their city or county governments while scrounging up whatever donations they can get.

Nobody works at an animal shelter to get rich. The unpaid volunteers, like the PAWS people in Pampa, work countless, selfless hours, giving up their free time on weekends to perform inglorious tasks like cleaning up poop while the rest of us are still in bed.

Walking into the new shelter, the first thing you see is a large lobby area that looks the reception area at a large, modern dental practice.

Off to the right, Stokes said there will be seating that faces a flat-screen TV that will scroll pictures of the animals on the current adoption list.







EPA proposes reducing biofuel mandate

on Friday proposed to reduce the amount of ethanol in the nation's fuel supply for the first time, acknowledging that the biofuel law championed by both parties in 2007 is not working as well as expected.

While the proposal highlights the government's struggle to ramp up production of homegrown biofuels that are cleaner-burning than gasoline, but is unlikely to mean much for consumers at the pump.

The change would require almost 3 billion gallons less ethanol and other biofuels to be blended into gasoline in 2014 than the law requires.

The 2007 law tried to address global warming by requiring oil companies to blend billions of gallons of biofuels into their gasoline each year. But politicians who wrote the law didn't anticipate fuel economy to improve as much as it has in recent years, which reduced demand for gasoline.

Meanwhile, next-generation biofuels, made from agricultural waste such as wood chips and corncobs, have not taken off as quickly as Congress required and the administration expected.

President Barack Obama has championed biofuels since his days as an Illinois senator, and his administration has resisted previous calls to lower biofuel volumes or repeal the law.



Helton stands by **NASCAR's** Richmond decisions

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP) NASCAR President Mike Helton believes the series took appropriate action against those involved in a cheating scandal before the start of the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship.

The penalties levied after the Sept. 7 race at Richmond, where NASCAR said Michael Waltrip Racing deliberately manipulated the race to get Martin Truex Jr. into the Chase, sent a clear message to the garage, he said: No more orders to benefit a team-

"It was a defining moment," Helton said Friday at Homestead-Miami Speedway.

The 10-race Chase concludes with Sunday's season finale and the Richmond mess almost forgotten.

"One of the tough things about our sport is the length of the season, but it's also an asset at times, and so you move on fairly quickly," Helton said.

"In the case of Richmond this year in September, I suspect that that moment will be reflected on for many years to come, but the decisions that we made, the reaction in the industry that self polices itself is indicative of our environment, and we've kind of moved on from that."



Dolphins' Martin meeting with NFL investigator

NEW YORK (AP) Miami Dolphins lineman Jonathan Martin has arrived at the office of the

yer investigating the team's bullying scandal.

harassment Martin says he was subjected to by teammate Richie Incognito.

Martin and a companion arrived at lawyer Ted Wells' Manhattan office building Friday and were met by a crush of reporters. The offensive lineman smiled but did not respond to questions while entering the building.

Some five hours after the arrival, the gathering of media had grown to more than 30, and the meeting was still ongoing. And since the office is in a tourist part of town, there were several passers-by and day-trippers who stopped to wait for a glimpse, as well. Even hiphop artist Rick Ross walked across the street and stood with reporters, waiting for Martin.

Incognito has been suspended by the Dolphins. He filed a grievance Thursday against the team over his suspension, and has said his conduct was part of the normal locker-room environment.

Dolphins owner Stephen Ross also plans to meet with Martin. On Monday, he said two committees would examine the lockerroom culture. Players have been virtually unanimous in saying it doesn't need to be changed.

At practice on Friday, long snapper John Denney, the team's players' union representative, was asked about locker room prob-

iems.

"I can't say I saw it firsthand because I'm not an offensive lineman, and I'm not in their offensive line room. I can tell you from my perspective, and having been in this locker room, I never saw it coming," he said. "I can say that. It was a surprise to me. There did not seem to be an increase in behavioral problems. It's been the same here my entire career."

Coach Joe Philbin also talked to reporters but did not go into detail about Friday's meeting.

"I believe in the guys we have in the locker room," he said. "I believed in them before this all took place, before all this scrutiny came upon us.

"And I believe in them today."

Martin alleges he was harassed daily by teammates, including Incognito, and the case has raised questions about job security for Philbin, his assistants and general manager Jeff Ireland.

Philbin won a vote of confidence this week from Stephen Ross, but that could change depending on the findings of Wells, the NFL special investigator who was brought into the

situation last week. Wells will determine the role of Philbin, his staff and Miami management in the case, and his report will be made public. One issue is whether anyone on the coaching staff ordered Incognito to toughen up Martin, a secondyear tackle from Stanford who became a starter as a rookie but played

poorly at times.
