Commissioners on Monday had lengthy discussion, executive session over tax abatement request for Cielo wind energy project.

At the Gray County Commissioners meeting Monday morning new Clarendon College President Dr. Robert K. Riza was introduced at the start of the meeting.

Then the Commissioners got down to their agenda with Commissioner Joe Wheeley absent.

After approving the Treasurer's and County Clerk's reports, the contract with political parties to conduct primary elections was con-File photo sidered. Contact had not yet been the time of the vote. The wage for poll workers was also negotiated and approved.

Sheriff Don Copeland told the court that the Livescan computer system currently used to scan fingerprints for bookings will be incompatible with FBI software in April 2014.

The sheriff requested the necessary update, which will cost around \$6,000. The sheriff's office has been using the current Livescan system since 2006, which is a long lifespan for a computer system, Copeland said. The Commissioners approved this request.

Next, representatives from Synetra came to discuss the audit they performed. The Commissioners listened as Synetra's Paul Ramirez gave some suggestions of updates and backup system options, as well as the possibility of blocking out certain websites to make the work day more productive. The Commissioners took in the suggestions, but Judge Richard Peet said the Commissioners were hesitant when it came to making an immediate decision on such upgrades due to cost concerns.

Commissioner Gary Willoughby acknowledged the fact that such suggestions were not in the report and pointed out that he would want to see some of the specifics, such as the number of new computers needed and the specific upgrades and replacements proposed, to get a better idea of the cost.

The item on the agenda was just to consider the report from Synetra, and the Commissioners approved that, stating that while they were interested in the essential updates and replacements for the time being, they would consider additional updates at a later date.

Another more timeconsuming item on the agenda ended up leading the Commissioners into an executive session. Representative Robert Peña from Cielo Land and Cattle, LP and Project Manager John Robertson approached the Commissioners about a possible tax abatement agreement for their current out in Gray County. At this wind energy project. Peña came to a previous meeting and spoke about the transmission lines that are set to run from the wind turbines in Donley County to a substation in Gray County. This is not the first time a wind energy company has approached the Gray County Commissioners about this type of a project, but been approved.

It is for this reason Haley was clearly opposed N. Russell St.

to the proposal because he wants the county to remain consistent with its policies. While Commissioner Willoughby agreed with Haley, he said that wind energy may never come to Gray County if the court keeps denying proposals.

What sets the Cielo proposal apart from others in the past is that this one states that 12-14 wind turbines will also be placed within Gray County, which makes a deal more attractive if the Commissioners would like to see the county have a future with wind energy.

The project proposes that the majority of the project will be in Donley County, where there will be about 60 wind turbines. The Cielo's project manager, Robertson, said that the company has a backup plan in case a deal with Gray County does not happen in which they will go an extra five miles with the lines and put the wind turbines in Carson County just west of Groom.

James Hart

James was born to E.C. and Thelma Dennis Hart in Olney, Texas on July 27, 1926. His family moved to Pampa, Texas when he was a child where James lived until he was 40 years old. A 1944 graduate of Pampa High School, some of his fondest memories were of playing football with the Pampa Harvesters.

Upon graduation, James enlisted in the Army and served in the Philip-pines during World War II from 1944 to 1946. In Jan. 1950 he was recalled to active duty and in December be-

came a member of the last group of reserves deployed to Korea.

In January 1951, James joined the 5th RCT, an infantry team that traces its history to the Revolutionary War. He was captured in April 1951 and was a Korean prisonerof-war until September 1953.

Following release from prison camp and an honorable discharge as Master Sergeant, James was awarded the Silver Star for his gallantry in action during the battle preceding his capture.

He returned to Pampa and married the love of his life, Patsy Ruth Miller Kersey. James and Pat moved their family to Stillwater, Okla. in 1967. In 1991, they retired and relocated to Tulsa, Okla. to be closer to their children and grandchildren. Pat preceded him in death on April 18, 2011.

A long-time Episcopalian, James was an active member of St. Matthew's in Pampa, St. Andrew's in Stillwater and St. John's in Tulsa. He served on the Vestry in the Pampa and Stillwater churches.

Throughout his life he demonstrated a deep faith in God he shared with family and friends.

NASA debates space station repairs or restocking

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Spacewalk or space delivery? That's the question facing NASA as space station flight controllers try to revive a crippled cooling loop

Half of the International Space Station's cooling system shut down last Wednesday because of a bad valve that made the line too cold. NASA is using a different valve to try to control the temperature, with some success, Kenny Todd, a space station manager said Monday.

'Whether or not it will be enough ... we can't tell yet,' said Todd.

The two American astronauts on board, Rick Mastracchio and Michael Hopkins, may need to make spacewalking repairs, beginning Thursday. That's the same day an unmanned rocket is supposed to hoist a space station cargo ship from Wallops Island, Va.

Spokesman Josh Byerly said NASA expects to decide Tuesday which should take priority — repairs or restock-

Orbital Sciences Corp.'s Cygnus cargo ship already has been delayed a couple days because of the cooling problem in orbit.

The space station cooling system, which runs ammonia through the lines, is critical for dispelling heat generated by on-board equipment. Nonessential equipment was turned off following the breakdown, and some science experiments were put on hold to keep the heat load down.

What's wrong with Social Security?

TOM MARGENAU Creator's Syndicate

Recently, one of my readers criticized some points I made in a column. Among other things, he complained that my philosophy (at least according to his take on my columns) is too upbeat. He said this: "As you see it, everything about Social Security is good."

Most of the time, I use this space to explain complicated and oftentimes about one-sixth of the confusing Social Security rules and regulations. And I will admit that I must occasionally use this column to defend the program against all kinds the government ownof crazy and misleading rumors that are spread about Social Security's history and policies mostly via the Internet.

something about the program, or something about the way the program is administered, deserves to be criticized, I have have the space in today's column to cover them it is what it is. all, so I will take on one policy gripe, one program issue and one administrative complaint. I've covered all these subjects in the past, so I ask forgiveness of those readers who have carefully read my columns. But for those who think I'm some kind of Social Security apologist, listen up.

My biggest policy complaint has to do with the program has financed since the 1980s. When Social Security started in the 1930s, it was set up with a pay-asyou-go financing scheme. In a nutshell, that meant the program took in only each year to pay its isn't great, but it's workexpenses (monthly benefits), with just a small cushion in reserve funding. That small cushion was the Social Security trust fund, which was invested, by law, in U.S. government securities. There never was really all that much capital in those trust funds, only enough to keep the system driving along over rough patches on the economic highway,

The problem is that capital is U.S. government treasury notes. (Because Social Security represents entire federal budget, the monies cannot be invested in a diversified portfolio involving private securities. 

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
