The suspect, Eddie Graham, 28, of Pampa, was still on scene and was taken into custody.

Graham was questioned by detectives and later booked into the Gray County Jail on a murder

charge stemming from this incident.

Graham is currently being held at the jail on one charge of murder with bond set at \$250,000.

Nelson was transported to Lubbock for an autopsy that was ordered by Justice of the Peace Mary Ann Carpenter. The case remains under investigation by the

GCSO replaces digital cameras in nine patrol units.

When Lt. Zach Kidd first started working at the Gray County Sheriff's Office eight years ago, the patrol cars did have video cameras.

But they were fairly clunky-looking and recorded to VCRs that were kept in the trunks of the vehicles.

A year after he started, GCSO decided to go hi-tech and bought all new digital cameras from

a company called Digital-Ally. Instead of the camera being a big, bulky box that hung down behind the windshield, they were much smaller units and the view screens were built into a custom pieces of equipment that doubled as a rear-

And instead of recording to a VCR, the data was stored onto memory cards.

Kidd said the GCSO was among the first law enforcement agencies to have the new-fangled digital cameras.

Like most electronic equipment, those units finally wore out.

"Your Honor!" I lamented, "I cannot afford to pay \$650 a month!'

Not a month prior to that woeful lament, my butt had received a thorough kicking due to my ex-wife and her lawyer's vic-




