Sixty years ago, you wouldn't have found a Walmart, shopping mall or a chain restaurant like McDonald's in Pampa.

But what you would have found while cruising up and down North Hobart Street was the Pak-A-Burger, a drive-thru restaurant that has changed very little since opening in 1954.

Ownership of the restaurant has changed a few times, with Pampa residents Gerald and Charlene Wright owning for the past seven years.

Their son, Kerry, also works at the restaurant. "It's always been in the same building and been pretty much the same," Gerald said. "We are serving the same burgers now as when we opened.'

Two things that are relatively new are the neon lights that help the building stand out at night and the old advertising signs that adorn the fence along the the back of the awning.

Even after 1 p.m. on a weekday, when most restaurants are slowing down from the lunch rush, cars still line up at the drive-thru and the grill is still sizzling with plenty of burgers.

Why has the restaurant stayed in business for so many years?

"It's the signature burger," Gerald said.

Report: EPA followed rules in North Texas drilling case

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency was legally justified in issuing — and later withdrawing — an emergency order against a Fort Worth-based driller following a 2010 complaint of groundwater contamination in North Texas, the agency's internal watchdog said in a report released Tuesday. But questions linger about the source of the contamination, it added.

The findings come 18 months after six U.S. senators, including John Cornyn, called for an inquiry into the agency's handling of a case that rose to prominence in the national discussion on the impacts of natural gas drilling.

In the report, the Office of Inspector General said officials at EPA Region 6 "conformed to agency guidelines, regulation and policy" when they charged Range Resources with contaminating two Parker County wells with benzene, methane and other substances.

"Test results on November 16, 2010, showed the presence of chemical contamination in both wells. The contamination levels indicated a risk to a drinking water source — the aquifer and the wells drawing from it," the report said. "The methane in the wells presented an explosion hazard, and benzene presented health hazards."

Range says that the gas was present in the water before it arrived, and that drilling was not to blame.

The inspector general's report also concluded that the EPA correctly determined that the Texas Railroad Commission, which it has delegated to protect certain water quality laws, had no immediate plans to act on the case. Texas regulators did their own in-

vestigation and found no evidence that Range had contaminated the water. The Railroad Commission voted in March

County Commissioners to apply for state grant

The Gray County Court of Commissioners on Thursday morning first approved paying the county's bills and then decided to participate in the County Transportation Infrastructure Fund Grant Program.

The program allocates a certain amount of money to counties throughout the state and this year Gray County is eligible to participate.

Gray County has been allocated about \$290,000 if the application is approved and this money is to be spent improving roads throughout the county. After improvements have been made, a report must be sent back stating on what the money was spent.

If the application is not approved for the grant there is no penalty or charge to the county. The Commissioners voted unanimously to apply for the grant, and it was agreed that Allison Bass & Associates will apply for the grant on the county's behalf.


If the county chooses not to apply for the grant or if the application is denied, the money will be divvied up amongst other counties.

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

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2011 to clear the company of the charges.

"We'll see which is the real protection agency, and I'd say it's the Railroad Commission of Texas," then-Commissioner Elizabeth Ames Jones said after the vote.

That echoed the sentiment of the Republicans in Congress and a long list of Texas officials who blasted the initial EPA investigation, calling the findings scientifically unsound and a politically motivated assault against the oil and gas industry.

Under the EPA order, Range would have had to provide drinking water to residents of two homes in Parker County whose water wells the agency said had been contaminated. But the agency withdrew the order in March 2012 under a settlement in which Range agreed to test 20 water wells every three months for a year and share the data with the EPA.

That decision was spurred by fears of costly litigation, the belief that homeowners' health risks had been reduced and Range's willingness to monitor the wells, the inspector general's report said, citing interviews.

The decision was within the EPA's purview, the report added, because the agency's guidelines do not address withdrawing an order. "However, other issues

remain," the report said. 'We believe that the EPA needs to implement cost-effective steps to better gauge the risk and document and disseminate its findings to affected residents."

The EPA has said there is no evidence of widespread contamination in the area. inspector general, however, raised questions about the quality of the data Range collected.

After reviewing a draft of the report in September, the EPA agreed that it should more closely monitor the data collection. The agency recently reviewed Range's data and found that it was lacking in "some of the required quality assurance information," the report said.

Range said it is still reviewing the inspector general's report.

"We agree with the Texas Railroad Commission's determination that Range's activities did not cause or contribute to the long-standing matter of naturally occurring methane in the Trinity aquifer, and we're pleased that when EPA headquarters examined the facts of the case, they fully withdrew their order," a spokesperson said in an email.

Police: No beer led to ceramic squirrel stabbing

NORTH CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — South Carolina authorities say a 44-year-old woman angry at a man for returning home without beer on Christmas beat and stabbed him with a ceramic squirrel.

The Charleston County Sheriff's office says in a report that deputies found a man covered with blood when they arrived at Helen Williams' North Charleston home early Wednesday. She told investigators the man fell and cut himself, but couldn't explain why her hands and clothes were also bloody.

Deputies say the man said Williams was so angry when he returned without beer because stores were closed on Christmas Eve that she grabbed a ceramic squirrel, beat him in the head, then stabbed him in the shoulder and chest.

Williams was in jail Friday and charged with criminal domestic violence. It wasn't known if she had a lawyer.

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

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Teenage Werewolves

Back in the 1950s, "Little Joe Cartwright" starred in a movie called

Werewolf." That's right, after seeing a full moon, Michael Landon ran around a public high school

foaming at the mouth and pretty much out of control. Since there was little difference between his behavior and that of the normal students, he got away with it for two semesters.

As I watched the film, I remember thinking that it was going to be tough for Landon to get into college with that on his resume. But then the 1960s happened, so that was that.

This brings me to the present. My life these days is largely confronting political and social madness on television and then going home to deal with teenage drama from an almost-14-yearold girl. I vaguely remember being 14, because I was ensconced in a Catholic high school that gave out homework assignments like they were M&M's. Believe me. I had plenty of angst. But nobody paid much attention to it.

Like today, many teenagers back then brooded full time. Check out James Dean, an outstandingly cloudy guy. But now teens have two things that embolden their disenchantment: the Internet and permissive parents.

Earlier this week, I was encouraging my urchins to speed it up because the bus was coming.

"I can't go faster 'cause you're staring at me," the teen wailed.

"I'm not staring at you. I just came into the

"But I can see you!" You get the idea. My daughter also did not want to wear anything that covered her legs

— even though it was 39 degrees outside. She wanted to wear shorts. At that point, I started wishing she'd turn into a werewolf. At least the fur would keep her warm.

But it is the Internet that is truly changing the teenage dynamic in America.

It used to be that teenagers would hang out together and swap stories of woe. I remember seeing Billy Joel and his crew at stores on Levittown Parkway. They were just slouching around the same as my guys were. Just being with other teenagers was comforting, but we actually had to leave our houses to do that. Now, teens can gang-brood from their rooms on the

Because nearly every awful occurrence is highlighted on various Facebook pages, teenagers now find it easier to justify their own craziness. "How can you criticize me for getting a C when Shelley got all F's and crashed her dad's car?" That kind of thing.

Nothing is private anymore. Teenagers are subjected to (and some participate in) incredibly destructive behavior online.

And parents have few options. Even if you ban home computers, handheld devices are all over the place. You'd have to put a full-time bodyguard on the child in order to provide complete protec-

In the end, all parents can do is try their best to impose a sense of responsibility on their kids. But don't expect any appreciation, and be watchful at all times. Kids today are growing up at warp speed; the machines march them into adulthood way before they're ready.

superhero fan and they will tell you that they are the members of the supergroup the Avengers. Look closer and there is an organization backing them called S.H.I.E.L.D. The acronym has taken several different meanings throughout

the comics' history, most recently, however, it is Strategic Homeland Intervention, Enforcement and Logistics Division.

Riding on the success of his 2011 summer hit "The Avengers," director Joss Whedon, of "Firefly" and "Dollhouse" fame, is directing this new show that has been airing on Tuesdays on ABC for the last 13 weeks.

The show is set following a group of S.H.I.E.L.D. agents lead by agent Phil Coulson, played my Clark Gregg. Agent Coulson makes several appearances, and even "dies," in the Avengers movies, which is another back story to the episodes.

I am not completely caught up on the show, but I am two episodes away from the winter break finale.

When I first started watching the show my feelings were really neutral about it. I don't normally care for spin-offs of a movie franchise.

For example, I didn't care for the spin-offs from the Star Wars franchise, let alone it being turned into animated form. It aggravates me because I want to know what happens in the Clone Wars between Star Wars: Episodes II and III, but they won't make it now because they made it into a cartoon, but that is a long rant to go into a future publication.

So I kind of took the pessimisticyet-open-minded approach to this series. The pilot episode is a standard pilot episode. But as the series goes on you start to form distrust for a character because she seems shady and is going through her own character development. As the show carried on I found myself enjoying each episode more.

As the character relationships in the series start to develop, it really gets to be comical and dramatic. I haven't really developed an attachment to any one character in particular as each character has a special role on the team. You have the scientific tech couple, the veteran agent who is real quiet, the combat-trained, by-the-book agent and the newcomer to the team with some skeletons in her closet. My favorite episode so far was probably, "The Hub," because Ward (combat, by-the-book) and Fitz (one of the techs) are sent on a mission where there is no

extraction. It was a tale of polar opposites because Ward is obviously a combat-guru and Fitz is not an in-the-field-of-combat agent. The episode was full of characters doing different things to get their guvs out of the combat zone safely.


The whole show is set as the back story to the Avengers movies. You hear references to the battle over New York, which is obviously a reference to "The Avengers." In the later episodes they start to talk about London, which is reference to "Thor 2: The Dark World."

There are several name-drops to Thor, Captain America and Nick Fury. The show is just what the doctor ordered if you're looking for action, comedy and relationships among characters. The show also has a lot of unanswered questions about characters, which leaves you wanting more.

Global warming researcher gets stuck in ice

A funny thing happened during Australian climate change professor Chris

Turney's venture to retrace a 1912 research expedition in Antarctica and gauge how climate change has affected the continent:

Two weeks into a five-week excursion, Turney's good ship MV Akademik Shokalskiy got trapped in ice. It turns out, global warming notwithstanding, that there's so much ice down under that two ice-breaking vessels sent to rescue the research team cannot reach the Australasian Antarctic Expedition.

Years ago, global warming believers renamed the phenomenon "climate change" - probably because of pesky details such as unusually cold weather undercutting the warming argument. Now,

just as advocates argue that earth is approaching a tipping point, there's so much ice floating in Antarctica during the Southern Hemisphere's summer that the Australasian Antarctic Expedition posted in a statement: "We're stuck in our own experiment.'

Does this incident mean that climate change is an illusion or a hoax? Of course not. Even during its summer, Antarctica is subject to extreme weather.

"Bad weather is the norm in Antarctica," climatologist Roy Spencer observed.

But it does show that like the rest of us chickens, scientists have feet of clay. Turney had told journalists that his expedition wanted to collect data that could be used to improve climate models. Too bad the folks who are supposed to predict climate decades into the future are guided by scientists who could not manage to avoid ice floes during a five-week trip.

"We were just in the wrong place at the wrong time," Turney told Fox News. He believes that the ship was stuck in old ice from a 75-mile-long iceberg that broke apart three vears ago.

Fair enough. But there's still the issue of ice volume.

Climate changers usually warn about Arctic ice, which has been receding over the past few decades, but rarely address the overall growth of ice in Antarctica.

"I'm sure some researchers can find a possible explanation where humans are causing both Arctic ice melting and Antarctic ice growth, but I'm skeptical of scientists who blame every change in nature on human activities. Nature routinely causes its own changes, without any help from us," quoth Spencer, himself a climate change contrarian.

"Sea ice is disappearing due to climate change, but here ice is building up," the Australasian Antarctic Expedition acknowledges. It's a conundrum. If warming is melting ice in the Northern

Hemisphere, why isn't it melting ice in the Southern Hemisphere?

Believers seize on all manner of weather — less Arctic ice, more Antarctic ice — as proof of climate change, but as Spencer notes, there is no climate change without man-caused

global warming. Turney told the Australian Broadcasting Corp. that his goal is to excite the public about science. As for climate change, "in the scientific community, it's remarkably solid." And "self-evident."

He pushes a framework of science being data-driven and free from politics. Yet it's hard to escape the suspicion that whatever the icebound researchers experience, they will frame it as proof that climate change is unassailable.
