City to vote on game room ordinance

STAFF REPORT

The Pampa City Commission will meet at 4 p.m. today to consider on first reading an ordinance to regulate gaming rooms.

The City Commission finds that there are game rooms operating within the city which contain amusement redemption machines and which, though purporting to be open to the public, restrict access to all or portions of the game rooms.

According to research by the city, game rooms often have no signage or limited signage and often obscure windows with black paint or dark materials.

The City Commission believes it to be in the best interest of the citizens and residents of the City of Pampa to provide for reasonable regulation of game rooms, including providing for unrestricted access by city police officers to all areas of game rooms and all amusement redemption machines for inspection by city police officers, providing for transparent glass and uncovered windows and providing for the prohibition of minors and alcohol in game rooms.

Officer Jason Collier, spokesman for the Pampa Police Department, said the police haven't had any major issues with gaming establishments.

"With this ordinance in place it will give officers the authority to enter the establishments and verify that they are in compliance with city registration," he said. "This will mainly be handled by code enforcement. It's much like establishments that sell alcohol where a peace officer can do an inspection at any time. This will give peace officers the authority to do inspections."

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



Two die Saturday in Hutchinson County crash

Borger woman killed Thursday near Amarillo

Two people died Saturday in a head-on collision one mile west of Fritch, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Jack Michael Dobbs, 36, of Fritch, and Rachelle Danielle Stevens, 28, of Amarillo, were both pronounced dead at the scene.

Shortly after 7 p.m., Dobbs was driving a 2000 Dodge Stratus westbound on State Highway 136 when he traveled into the eastbound lanes, DPS said. Stevens, driving a 2001 Jeep Cherokee, attempted to avoid a collision with Dobbs. The Stratus

then struck the Cherokee in a head-on collision, the report stated.

Both victims were wearing seatbelts.

On Thursday, A 48-year-old Borger woman was in a two-vehicle collision 1.2 miles northwest of Amarillo.

Sidney Kaye Phillips was pronounced dead at the scene, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Around 4:50 p.m., a Chevrolet Tahoe driven by Heather Nicole Moore, 30 of Amarillo, was westbound on Loop 335. Moore drifted off the north side of the road and over corrected, bringing the Tahoe back into the roadway.

The Tahoe then crossed into the eastbound traffic lane where it struck on the left side the GMC Terrain driven by Phillips, the report stated.

My distaste for the United Nations

In

the case of condemning Syrian atrocities, Russia and China voted no. Go figure. Syria and Assad keep on killing, even using chemical weapons.

The most reprehensible and disgusting fact about the United Nations has been its inability to cease genocide, or the more favorable politically correct term called 'ethnic cleansing'. Disability Benefits for Widows

Q: My mother is 60 years old and disabled. She was a stay-at-home mom all her life, so she has no Social Security of her own. She was married to my father for 25 years but he died a long time ago. She remarried, and that marriage lasted 15 years before they got a divorce.

Her second husband is 67 years old and retired. He was a lawyer and made a good living. My mom spent many hours filling out disability forms, and has all kinds of documentation from doctors indicating she is disabled. She

her well-to-do second husband?

A: She can't get disability from her second husband because there is no Social Security coverage for a disabled wife — or ex-wife.

Given your mom's age and lack of her own Social Security coverage, the fact that your mom is disabled is not an issue for Social Security purposes. Let's review your mom's options.

She will never be eligible for any kind of Social Security on her own record, including disability benefits, because she never worked and paid into the system.

At that point, she would be due about 35 percent of his basic Social Security benefit, if that pays a higher rate than what she's due

be about 70 percent of your father's basic Social Security benefit. Although a wife (or divorced wife) cannot get disability benefits, a disabled widow can. But the rate payable to her as a disabled widow on your father's record is the same (70 percent) as what she's due based solely on her age. So there is no point in filing for disability benefits.

Just remember that when she turns 62, she should check into divorced wife's benefits from husband number two.

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Crossword creator marks 100th birthday with puzzle

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — What's a nine-letter word for a significant event? Try MILE-STONE.

Longtime crossword constructor Bernice Gordon is marking two big ones: She turned 100 on Saturday, and The New York Times will publish another one of her puzzles on Wednesday — making her the first centenarian to have a grid printed in the newspaper.

"They make my life," Gordon said. "I couldn't live without them.'

Gordon has created crosswords for decades for the Times, The Philadelphia Inquirer and others, including puzzle syndicates and brainteaser books from Dell and Simon & Schuster. She still constructs a new grid every day.

Gordon is nearly as old as the crossword puzzle itself. The first "word-cross" appeared in the New York Sunday World on Dec. 21, 1913; it was diamond shaped and didn't even separate clues into "Across" and "Down."

The grids have evolved a lot since then, thanks in part to Gordon. She's credited with pioneering the "rebus" puzzle, which requires solvers to occasionally fill in symbols instead of letters.

Her first rebus in the Times used an ampersand to represent the letters AND, so an answer like SANDWICH ISLANDS was entered as S&WICH ISL&S.

Though now considered standard fare, such a trick was unheard of when it first appeared decades ago. Letters poured into then-crossword editor Margaret Farrar, who forwarded some to Gordon.

"She got hundreds of letters, some screaming that they never saw anything worse and it was cheating," Gordon said. "And the others (said) how wonderful it was. It's something new. It was an innovation."

Gordon was born in Philadelphia on Jan. 11, 1914. A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, she raised three children before working as an artist and traveling around the world. She began creating puzzles in her 30s because she liked the challenge and it offered some extra pocket monev.

Farrar was not impressed with her first few attempts, and neither was Gordon's mother.

"My child if you spend as much money on cookbooks as you do on dictionaries, your family would be better off," Gordon recalled her mother

saying. Records are a bit sketchy - the Times didn't give constructors bylines until the 1990s — but it seems her first crossword was published in the early 1950s. She remembers

EISENHOWER. Since then, the paper has printed more than 140 of her hours looking for the right clever grids.

The most recent appeared last summer when she teamed up with teenage constructor David Steinberg, a regular contributor to the Times. The central answer in the puzzle was AGE DIFFERENCE.

Though the joy of the celebration was tempered by the recent death of her eldest son, Gordon looked radiant as she greeted guests and blew out the single candle on her large cake. Lanard then led a toast.

"Already the wheels are turning," he joked about his mother's word-centric mind. What are eight definitions that rhyme with 'birthday'?"

Surely Gordon has that puzzled out by now.

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

The state has since adopted lethal injection but lawsuits have kept it from being used.

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

The Lady Harvesters won in overtime 56-46 and the Harvesters won 62-48. The Lady Harvesters advance to 1-1 in District 1-3A, while the Harvesters are 1-0.

of what that teams' records are. The Lady Harvesters' match-up with the Lady Bull-

dogs amplified that cliché. "We had a six-point lead and thought, 'We are going to be OK,' and we had some stuff happen and we told them when we started overtime, 'Just keep your heads up, relax' and stuff," Valentine said.

"We shouldn't have been in that position because we missed so many free throws, but ironically that's what saved us in overtime."


