House Representative Ken King spoke at the Texas Federation of Republican Women's luncheon on Wednesday about the 83rd legislative session and his plans for the new year.

After the primary election in March, in which King is running unopposed, he plans to get right to work on his new foundation for ovarian cancer, KK125. King lost his mother to the disease, known as the silent killer, last year and is setting out through this program to raise awareness.

Through this foundation, King is pushing for the CA 125 test to be paid for by insurance companies. This blood test detects ovarian cancer sooner than any other, as most women do not find out they have the disease until they are already in stage four, but in order to have the test done, it must currently be paid for out of pocket.

King also explained the process of passing a bill in Texas. "First you have to have an idea and submit it to the legislative council and they put it into legal terms,"

The person looking to get the bill passed then must hunt it down and ask for a hearing and get votes from a committee then the bill goes to the calendars committee and it stays there for a set period of time. House bills and Senate bills each have different time periods for the calendars committee and the schedule rotates.

King said that the process is long and it's designed to kill bills because over 7,000 are filed annually. "There aren't 7,000 good ideas in Texas," King joked. He personally filed 11 bills, pulled down two of them, and got seven passed.

Among these was House Bill 1926, which changed education codes and provided more online opportunities for students to take courses that may not be offered at their school and lowered the graduation requirement from 15



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

This Land is Our Land Freedom of speech applies to buffer zones in abortion clinics

On my first day of classes this semester a young man walked into my classroom, just before the start of

my lecture, obviously frazzled. He walked right up to someone he knew and asked, "Is this psychology?" "No, Texas government," his friend replied. Looking as if he'd just swallowed a rotten egg, the first student said, "Texas government? Fudge!"

Well, he didn't actually say "fudge" but this is a family newspaper, so, we'll go with "fudge.'

I found this funny and, since Texas government is not the most popular class for college students, I also thought it appropriate. So I began my lecture that day by writing "Texas government...Fudge!" on the blackboard. Judging by the wild laughter it caused, I thought all students loved the joke.

It turns out not all of them did. After class one of my students stayed behind and, with a very serious face, told me she did not appreciate cuss words being used in public and she was wondering if I was even allowed to use them in a

college class because, 'they are not even allowed on TV."

I told her I appreciated her comments which, very apropos for a government class, were a question about freedom of speech.

Freedom of speech in the United States is a funny business. The fact is that not all speech is free.

For example, the Supreme Court has long recognized that a threat to commit unlawful violence on a particular individual or group is in fact unlawful speech and not protected by the First Amendment. In 2003, the Court ruled that burning a cross is "prima evidence of intent to intimidate by creating a pervasive fear in victims that they are targets of violence."

Moreover, there are instances where free speech is not even speech, as is in the current U.S. Supreme Court case testing the constitutionality of Massachusetts' buffer zones at abortion clinics.

This case has the chance to be a monumental win for the anti-abortion movement.

Fourteen years ago, the Supreme Court upheld Colorado's eight-foot "floating" buffer zones around individuals to protect patients and staff entering and exiting these clinics.

... Hello?

Since then, buffer zones have prevented demonstrators from closely approaching patients and staff without their direct permission.

Now the issue is back before a different and, significantly, more conservative Supreme Court.

The Massachusetts law prohibits anyone from standing within 35 feet of the entrance to a reproductive health care facility where abortions take place. The buffer zone is marked by a painted yellow line, and anybody who remains standing in it is asked to move outside the line.

According to court records, the lead plaintiff, Eleanor McCullen, a member of the anti-abortion group Operation Rescue, says she asks women to "just talk a minute before vou rush in. You rush in so quickly. and then you come out in tears." She tells women that "there's another option other than taking the child, the small boy or girl, from the womb.³

In the case before the court, Mc-Cullen says the buffer zone violates her First Amendment rights and prevents her from communicating with complete effectiveness. "It's America," she said in an interview with NPR. "I should be able to walk and talk gently, lovingly, anywhere

Lk 2:12, 16 "This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger. ... So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger." You see, in the New Testament, the same Greek word for baby ("brephos") is used to describe both an unborn baby inside the womb and a baby outside the womb. 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
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

Mass. monks brewing beer like **European brothers**

Catholic Cistercian monks known as Trappists have been brewing and selling what many beer lovers consider some of the best in the world. Eight monasteries - six in Belgium and one each in Holland and Austria - produce the only beer recognized by the International Trappist Association as authentic Trappist beer.

And starting Thursday, the 63 brothers of St. Joseph's Abbey — about an hour's drive west of Boston — will join them, selling the first Trappist beer brewed outside Europe.

Their ambitious venture was hardly met with enthusiasm by their exacting Trappist brothers in Europe.

After all, for nearly 60 years the monks in Spencer, Mass., had been selling jams and jellies to help support their community. Now they were interested in the real family business: beer.

The journey from jams to beer started almost five years ago when St. Joseph's sent two monks on a fact-finding mission to the Belgian Beer Fest in Boston. Within hours, their European brothers were alarmed to learn of the inqui-

The European monks weren't the only ones who needed convincing. Back at St. Joseph's, a robust debate among the brothers was underway. Some were concerned about starting what would be the most expensive enterprise ever undertaken by the abbey.

But everyone agreed the wouldn't damage the Trapaging monastery buildings were getting increasingly expensive to maintain. In the end, more than 85 percent of the American brothers voted for the project.

"We see it as a 50-100 year project. (Just) as we're standing on the shoulders of those who came before us and built these building and supported the way of life, hopefully future generations will be able to stand on our shoulders, what we are doing and we see the brewery as part of that," said Father Damian Carr, head of St. Joseph's Abbey.

The European monks, warming to the idea of an said Father Isaac Keeley, the American Trappist beer, began giving close counsel to who has been at St. Joseph's their Massachusetts brothers.

The European monasterommendations: To brew beer of Trappist quality they must build a state-of-the-art brewery, hire a skilled brewone kind of beer for the first five years. The St. Joseph's monks set to work and built a multi-million-dollar brewery that would be the envy of almost any microbrewery in the world.

After more than 20 trial batches, the monks in Massachusetts settled on the recipe for what would become Spencer Trappist Ale, a "refectory ale" of 6.5 percent alcohol. The cloudy, golden beer is all-American yet rooted in European tradition with sweet, yeasty notes familiar to fans of other Trappist ales.

With beer in his suitcase, Keeley flew last month to Belgium, seeking his brother monks' blessing. He first delivered a PowerPoint presentation on the new brewery, then poured glasses of Spencer Trappist Ale for his European counterparts.

Thousands of fish dead in Nevada marina mystery

State wildlife officials are trying to figure out why all the fish have died in a northern Nevada marina where the stocked fishery has flourished since the man-made lake was created nearly 15 years ago.

An estimated 100,000 trout, bass and catfish have died over the past month in the Sparks Marina along U.S. Interstate 80 east of Reno, apparently the result of a dramatic, unexplained drop in dissolved oxygen levels, Nevada Department of Wildlife spokesman Chris Healy said Wednesday.

SPARKS, Nev. (AP) — the old rock quarry's bottom estimates they've stocked to the surface, but they don't understand what sparked the massive die-off.

Fish biologists confirmed low oxygen levels caused the death of an estimated 3,000 fish in one corner of the lake in mid-December, but Healy said they thought at the time that the event was localized and of limited impact. Since first reported scientists dethen, they've been unable to detect any live fish in the 77-acre lake. Numerous dead fish have been removed from the lake's shoreline, and Healy said it's likely the rest sank to the bottom.

'The 100,000 dead fish Scientists say a bitter cold figure is something that is

close to 1 million adult fish in the lake since they started in 1998.

'We don't know if any small fish have survived, but for all intents and purposes, the fishery doesn't exist anymore," he told The Associated Press.

The Reno Gazette-Journal termined the problem was much more serious than they realized after a boat survey on Monday found dissolved oxygen levels far too low to support the fish at 11 different sampling locations. 




