

## 7 trees to remember Moore, Okla. children

■ PRMC charge nurse's foundation raise \$5,600 for Moore elementary school destroyed in tornado.

It is amazing what a lot of hard work and prayers can do. The Tree of Life Memorial Foundation, headed by Shawn Nicholes, a charge nurse at Pampa Regional Medical Center, raised \$5,600 to buy seven mature trees

to be planted in memory of each of the seven children who died at Plaza Towers Elementary School. The school was ravaged by an F5 tornado last Mav. The trees will be planted on the grounds

of the new school when it is built.

Nicholes started the foundation in July with a goal to raise \$6,000, the estimated cost of purchasing and planting the seven

**Nicholes** Nicholes, who now lives in Fritch, is a former resident of Moore. Her parents still live there and survived the storm by seeking shelter in the basement of their neighbor's house.

Nicholes said she came up with the idea of planting trees to memorialize the young victims when she reflected on her grandfather, who died from lung cancer.


He bought Nicholes a tree so that she could remember

"I pondered buying seven trees — their branches reaching toward Heaven," she said.

With the help of Sarah McDonald of Fritch and Gwen Reid of White Deer and a handful of volunteers, the foundation successfully raised \$5,600, which was presented to Moore Public Schools in late January.

A credit line was established for Moore Public Schools at the nursery of their choice, Marcum's Nursery in Oklahoma City.

## Guaranteed tuition plan adopted at Texas A&M

The Texas A&M University System regents adopted a new tuition and fee structure for their flagship institution, Texas A&M University, which is based in College Station but includes a campus in Galveston and the system's health science

Phil Adams, the chairman of the board, said in a statement that he hoped the new approach would "bring transparency to otherwise multiple, confusing student fees.'

The new plan will result in students paying a single rate for their education through the first four or five years of their undergraduate education, depending on their major. It will take effect for the incoming freshmen in the fall of 2014. The fixed-rate plan replaces the previous model of tuition,

which would generally increase each year in combination with various student fees. The board voted to consolidate more than 7,000 separate fees on Thursday.

The plan means an increase in tuition in the beginning of a students' education, however. In advance of a meeting Thursday, some students had expressed concerns about rising tu-

## **Firefighters** save dog from sinkhole

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) -A German shepherd is back on solid ground after being rescued from a sinkhole that opened up in a Buffalo park.

3-year-old dog dropped more than 10 feet to the bottom of the watery hole during a Sunday morning walk with his owner, Mattie Moore, who nearly fell in herself.

Buffalo firefighter Michael Paveljack says rescuers put plywood around the 2-foot hole to stabilize the ground, then widened the gap for the rescue. Paveljack climbed down a ladder and fashioned a makeshift harness from the dog's leash that allowed rescuers to hoist it from the hole.

Moore tells The Buffalo News the dog has a sore hip but otherwise seems fine.

The sinkhole appears to have been caused by a broken underground water pipe that eroded the soil.



## My humbling courtroom experience

I don't think I have ever been that tired. Not even after, so long ago, com-

pleting a marathon. The achy cold I've had the past week hasn't helped either all of this **DENNIS** brought about by my **PALMITIER** bony arse

sitting on a rock hard pew while listening to the back and forth parrying of two attorneys over witnesses' testimony and writing such on a steno pad. From Monday evening, Jan. 27 through Thursday evening, Jan. 30 — yours truly reported for this very paper the proceedings of the Joshua Keith Rigo murder trial held at Gray Covnty Covrt Hovse [sic]. Just call me Jimmy Olsen, intrepid cub reporter.

As his jury of peers had deliberated that Thursday evening and thusly stated by 31st District Judge Steven Emmert, Mr. Rigo was convicted of murdering Kristi Dawn Slatten and by doing so received accordingly, a 90-year stint in Texas' prison system. The verdict was the news, but

for yours truly, the courtroom proceedings those four days fascinated and humbled this cub reporter.

Beginning with the prosecution's opening statement to the jury, an outlining by District Attorney Franklin McDonough orating the scope of the state's evidence against Mr. Rigo, what followed was a host of law enforcement individuals representing the Gray County Sheriff's Office, the Texas Rangers and the Texas Department of Public Safety's Lubbock Crime Lab. Out of these gentlemen's mouths the jury and citizens sitting in the courtroom heard the literal mountain of evidence held against Mr. Rigo. 'Twas real clear the man was knee deep in the proverbial kimshee

Side bar, citizens. I can tell you for a fact, if you are suspected of a crime upon your fellow man or woman, for communications sake you had better turn off your cell phone and revert to signaling smoke. If you've two cell phones, with one just happening to be your victim's, better turn it off as well. Something about, after your crime has been accomplished and you're in flight mode, a road map of your subsequent life (for law enforcement's sake) is very easy to chart out.

One would think when in trial, a court appointed attorney tasked with representing a man convicted of murder whom the state has a boatload of evidence against, well, one would think such an attorney would simply go through the motions by perhaps making a few points about this and that, coasting along while ultimately awaiting the almost certain verdict, then walk away and be done with it. One would think such, right? Not Harold Comer.

I witnessed an attorney fight for his client, no less than Franklin McDonough fighting for victim Kristi Dawn Slatten. Questions involving DNA collection and testing arose in testimony, particularly over DPS Crime Lab policy and procedure. Questions like why weren't all articles sent to the crime lab tested. or why wasn't one type DNA test used versus another. Mr. Comer tried his best in cross examinations and use of expert testimony to dissuade the prosecution's case, ultimately to no avail. My respect (although a dastardly Democrat) for Harold Comer

jumped considerably these past days. Something about heart and soul.


Murder trial courtrooms are really quite the drag with one's attempts at preserving a good mood. Let alone the pre-verdict suspense, the emotional air inside the courtroom is as dense as a Panhandle dust storm. I would scan the courtroom every so often for perhaps a glimmer of a smile, yet every time, there were none. A life was gone, a life was at stake. It wasn't until District Attorney Franklin McDonough arose to commence his closing words that my emotions peaked, where I found it extremely difficult to keep them checked.

Side bar, citizens. If you've been wondering since the general election, you need not do so, for Gray County has quite a district attorney. Microphone? Franklin McDonough doesn't need no stinkin' microphone, for what's still ringing in my ears I will never ever forget. "This case has never been about DNA! This case has been about Kristi Dawn Slatten!" Indeed. It's happening a second time, I need to go wipe away some tears.

Smith & Nephew PLC said ArthroCare's expertise in shoulder joint repair will complement its strength in knee repair. CEO Olivier Bohuon said in a statement that the broader product portfolio and the combined sales force will help generate "significant additional revenue."

ArthroCare has 35.4 million shares outstanding, counting options and restricted stock, according to Smith & Nephew spokesman Charles Reynolds. Smith & Nephew values the deal at \$1.7 billion counting ArthroCare's cash. It expects the acquisition to close by the middle of the year.

ArthroCare makes surgical devices, instruments and implants and employs about 1,800 people.

Its stock jumped 6.8 percent, or \$3.08, to \$48.36 on Monday, less than an hour before markets opened

The stock had already



British medical tech- climbed 13 percent so far Smith this year, as of Friday's close. Much of that gain nounced on Jan. 7 that it will pay a \$30 million fine to resolve an investigation by the U.S. Department of Justice into alleged securities fraud by its former management.

The Justice Department also is charging the company with one count of conspiracy to commit securities fraud and wire fraud, but it has entered into a two-year deferred prosecution agreement with ArthroCare. If the company meets requirements set by the Justice Department, it won't bring charges against the company

ArthroCare has said that deal will end the Justice Department's investigation, which was first made public in December 2008.

The only way baseball gets a week off is if a team sweeps their opponent in the league championship round. Most of the time there is only two to four days off. Football is


guaranteed two weeks off from the conference championship round until the Super Bowl. This is too long. Teams riding on momentum can easily have it thwarted with the time off.


