Shooting victim identified

STAFF REPORT

The Pampa Police Department has identified the female victim in a shooting that occurred Saturday morning in Pampa.

Jamie Agular, 28, of Pampa, is listed in stable condition at Amarillo Northwest from a single gunshot wound to the abdomen.

The man accused of shooting her, Nicholas Johnathan Pearsall, 18, of Pampa, was being held Monday at the Gray County Jail on a \$100,000 bond for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and a \$25,000 bond for deadly conduct/discharge of a firearm.

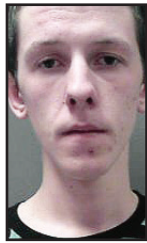
On Saturday, PPD responded to a residence in the 500 block of East Foster Avenue on a 911 call of a woman who had been shot.

Officers responded and found Agular with a single gunshot wound to the abdomen from a small-caliber firearm, PPD said.

Agular was transported to Pampa Regional Medical Center and then to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where she was listed in critical condition Saturday.

She identified Pearsall as a possible suspect. Police located Pearsall and he was questioned by detectives and arrested.

Agular and Pearsall are not related, PPD said.

FROSTY FLORA



The low visibility created by the “frozen fog” over the past two days has been a challenge for drivers. But if you’re not on the road and don’t have a worry whether the strange sound that’s getting closer is a big truck that has crossed the center line into your lane, then the combination of cold and high moisture content can be a beautiful, almost spiritual thing. The frost that appeared Sunday morning on tree branches and other solid objects is called “advection frost.” It is formed when water vapor in the cold, humid air deposits on cold small objects like tree branches, fence posts or grass. Davis: Abbott should settle school finance lawsuit

State Sen. Wendy Davis, the leading Democratic candidate for governor, called on her likely Republican opponent Monday to use his power as Texas attorney general to settle a massive school finance lawsuit instead of defending the troubled funding system in court.

“Attorney General Greg Abbott continues to defend the indefensible,” the Fort Worth Democrat said at an Austin news conference. “He’s wasting time and taxpayer money on a frivolous lawsuit that hurts Texas.”

Abbott’s office is responsible for the state’s defense against the more than two-thirds of Texas school districts that are suing over what they say is an inadequate and unfair funding system in a case that will probably travel to the state Supreme Court.

While the case is ongoing, Abbott has said it would be inappropriate for him to comment on it. In a statement

issued by his gubernatorial campaign after Davis called on him to settle, Abbott did not directly mention the lawsuit or whether he can or should settle it. But he said that if elected governor, he would deliver a first-rate public education system.

“While Sen. Davis remains fixated on the past, I’m focused on making education better for the future of our children,” Abbott said. “My goal is to make the Texas education system number one in the country, and I’ve been talking with Texans and educators about a plan to achieve this objective.”

An initial ruling in the school finance case came last February, when after a three-month trial,

Austin district court judge John Dietz found that the state’s school finance system was unconstitutional both because of inadequate school funding and flaws in the way the state distributes money to districts.

A second phase of the trial, in which evidence was reopened to consider changes made by the 2013 Legislature, wrapped up last week. During the 2013 session, lawmakers restored about \$3.4 billion of the \$5.4 billion in public education cuts made in 2011.

Davis said Monday that Abbott should have instructed the Legislature last year how to avoid the litigation. She said lawmakers could have avoided cuts that she said caused teacher layoffs, increased classroom sizes and led to the elimination of vital programs.

“As our lawyer, it was Greg Abbott’s job to come and work with the Legislature to stave off yet another lawsuit. We knew that this lawsuit was coming,” Davis said. “And yet Greg Abbott remained silent.”

The Davis campaign distributed a memo outlining past cases in which the state settled litigation, ranging from prison overcrowding issues to redistricting.

It was written by Dave Richards, who has been tangling with Texas in court for decades on issues including civil rights and voting rights. (Richards is

the ex-husband of the late Gov. Ann Richards). “Texas’ Constitution and case-law provide clear precedent that establishes the attorney general’s discretionary power to settle cases,” Richards wrote. “Based on precedent, past actions and any informed

interpretation of law, it is absolutely within the power of the attorney general to settle cases of this nature.” Davis was asked during the news conference how Abbott would settle a case that ultimately requires legislative action.

She said he should advise lawmakers, probably in a special session, to consider changes to the complicated school finance system. Only the current governor, in this case Gov. Rick Perry, has the power to call lawmakers into a special session.

whether they could change the minimum age for being allowed into a game room from 21 to 18. “Make an amendment by changing one word. Eighteen and younger instead of 21 and younger,” Martin asked during the part of the meeting for public comments. City Attorney Lee Porter was asked by commissioners to investigate whether

there are any other cities in the state that allow 18 year olds into game rooms. The city wants to pass an ordinance that provides for reasonable regulation of game rooms, including providing for unrestricted access by city police officers to all areas of game rooms and all amusement redemption machines for inspection by city police officers, providing for transparent glass and uncovered windows and providing for the prohibition of minors and alcohol in game rooms. An “amusement redemption machine” is a recreational machine that provides the user with an opportunity to receive something of value other than a right of replay. If the ordinance is passed, anyone who fails to comply with the ordinance can be charged with a Class C misdemeanor and fined up to \$500 for each offense. Each day that a violation occurs will be a separate offense. First reading of the ordinance was passed at the Jan. 14 regular meeting. During the meeting, Police Chief Kelly Rushing

said he was concerned about police officers not being given access to some of the game rooms. Pampa resident Roberta Kapper said during that meeting she is not for having them in the city. “I have personal knowledge of someone going into one and losing \$6,000 in six weeks,” she said. In other action, the Commission will consider: • Final reading a \$250,000 grant by the Pampa Economic Development Corp. to the Pampa Energy Center for upgrades to the Flogistix Building, and electrical upgrades for retention of tenants and expansion of business sites at the industrial park. • The Pampa Police Department’s 2013 Annual Racial Profiling/Department Report. • Appointing Lucinda George to a vacant position on the Lovett Memorial Library Advisory Board. The appointment would be for a two-year term, ending Sept. 30, 2015. The City Commission will meet at 4 p.m. in its chambers on the third floor of City Hall, 201 W. Kingsmill Ave.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Michelle Obama says a construction industry pledge to hire 100,000 veterans by 2019 isn't only the right and patriotic thing to do, but also a smart thing for business.

The commitments by 100 companies and associations in construction were being announced Monday at a conference sponsored by the Labor Department and the initiative Joining Forces, a nationwide effort launched by Mrs. Obama and Jill Biden, the wife of Vice President Joe Biden, to rally the U.S. around military veterans, active duty service members and their families.

Nearly 400,000 veterans and their spouses have been hired under the initiative since it began in 2011, said Mrs. Obama, who was joining Labor Secretary Thomas Perez for the announcement.

"By hiring veterans, businesses won't just be giving American heroes the chances they deserve to keep serving our country," the first lady wrote in an opinion piece appearing in Monday editions of The Wall Street Journal. "And the companies won't just be giving veterans' families the security that comes with a steady paycheck."

"These businesses will also be ensuring that they have the qualified employees they need to keep growing and creating new jobs and strengthening the economy for decades to

come," she said. "They will be sending a clear message that we honor those who've sacrificed for us, and are determined to serve them as well as they have served our country."

Since Joining Forces began, companies with household names from Disney and Starbucks to UPS and Walmart have pledged to hire thousands of veterans.

But Monday's announcement is significant because it is the first time an entire industry has pledged to make sure that giving jobs to veterans "is always part of the mix and is really ingrained in the DNA of the business model," Perez said in an interview.

Unemployment among the 9/11 generation of veterans, those returning from Iraq and Afghanistan, has been steadily declining during the past two years and stood at 7.9 percent in January, versus an overall unemployment rate of 6.6 percent. President Barack Obama often says these veterans shouldn't have to fight for a job when they come home after fighting for their country on the battlefield.

The construction industry is growing and is a place where veterans can use their military skills.

Last month, the construction industry had its strongest single month of job growth in the past four years, adding 48,000 jobs.

Nearly 180,000 construction jobs were created in the past year, Perez said, and about 1.5 million such jobs are forecast to be added through 2022.

Average wages are about \$20 an hour, not including benefits, he said.

Helen of Troy board approves \$550M stock buyback

EL PASO (AP) — Helen of Troy's board has approved the repurchase of \$550 million shares of its common stock.

The company, whose brands including Febreze and Dr. Scholl's, said that it will start a modified "Dutch auction" tender offer on Monday to buy

up to \$300 million of its shares. It plans to repurchase the shares at a price of no more than \$66.50 per share, but not less than \$57.75 per share.

In a Dutch auction, shareholders can decide how many shares they want to sell and at what price, within a specified range. The company then determines the lowest per-share price within the range that lets it buy the amount of shares that it wants.

Helen of Troy Ltd. said it also plans to repurchase an additional \$250 million shares over the next three years.

The El Paso, Texas, company said it plans to use available cash and borrowings under an existing revolving credit facility to pay for the shares and all fees and expenses.

Helen of Troy said that the \$550 million buyback represents about 28.88 percent of its outstanding shares, based on its closing price on Friday. It had approximately 32.1 million outstanding shares as of Feb. 5.

Last month Helen of Troy announced that co-founder Gerald Rubin was stepping down as CEO and president and resigning from its board immediately to take a job as CEO of a commercial real estate firm in El Paso. It named CFO Thomas Benson as interim CEO and said that Julien Mininberg would become CEO in March.

Its shares rose \$3.31, or 5.6 percent, to \$62.66 in premarket trading about 30 minutes ahead of the market opening. They have risen about 62 percent over the past year.

UT chancellor Cigarroa says he'll resign

AUSTIN (AP) — University of Texas System Chancellor Francisco Cigarroa says he will resign after five years leading the 15-campus system in order to return full time to the practice of medicine.

In an email to system staff Sunday night, Cigarroa said he was leaving to be the head of pediatric surgery at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio. A Monday news conference has been scheduled for Cigarroa to make the announcement with Board of Regents Chairman Paul Foster.

"I knew the day would come when I would return to transplant surgery," Cigarroa wrote in the email, which was obtained by The Associated Press. "The time has come for me to return to my lifelong love and passion — saving lives one individual at a time."

Cigarroa, the system's first Hispanic leader, had

maintained his job as a surgeon while overseeing nine academic campuses and six health science centers.

Among the highlights of his tenure was regents' recent approval of a new university in South Texas with a medical school and a new medical school at the flagship campus in Austin. But it also has been marked by tensions between the board and University of Texas at Austin President Bill Powers. The power struggle has reached the state Capitol, where lawmakers are considering whether to impeach regent Wallace Hall Jr. over attempts to force Powers out.

The planned university in South Texas will be the result of merging the Rio Grande Valley, Edinburg and Brownsville campuses, and creating a new medical school that supporters say is critically needed to meet education and health care needs in the region along the Texas-Mexico border.

The university is projected to enroll about 28,000 students, employ 7,000 people and generate \$11 million in research expenditures.

Residents have lobbied for years to get a medical school in the region, and plans were already in place to use UT System health facilities in Cameron and Hidalgo counties. University officials and local politicians who pushed the issue believe it will result in more doctors practicing on the border and have a positive impact on overall health in one of the most impoverished and medically underserved parts of the country.

In his dealings with Powers, Cigarroa was publicly critical of the University of Texas at Austin president at the regents' December meeting. He said Powers had to improve trust and communication when dealing with regents and system staff, though Cigarroa also said he wanted to keep

Powers on the job.

Despite the disputes with Powers, who remains popular with students, faculty and influential alumni, Cigarroa has generally maintained the support of the board. One person with direct knowledge of Cigarroa's decision, who spoke to the AP anonymously before the email was sent, said the chancellor is not being forced out by the board. The person was not authorized to speak publicly before the official announcement and therefore requested anonymity.

Cigarroa, 56, is expected to stay on the job until his replacement is found. In his Sunday email, he noted that his father and three of his brothers are all doctors — and that his father, at age 89, still practices medicine.

"It is time to honor what my parents did for me by returning to my father's and my first love, the practice of medicine," Cigarroa said.

Gibson, Bridges have big games as junior varsity beats Perryton 51-38

The junior varsity team for the Pampa Harvesters played very well against the Perryton Rangers as they defeated their district foe 51-38.

Tied 9-9, Dante Jordan sank his two free throws, putting the Harvesters up 11-9. Following the free throws, Brandon Woelfle and Bryson Burrell hit consecutive 3-pointers to put the Harvesters up 17-10.

Trailing 21-17 in the middle of the second quarter, Jordan hit a 3-pointer to cut the deficit to one. A Woelfle 2-pointer put the Harvesters up 23-21. Two scores later, the Harvesters were up 27-21 heading into halftime.

Coming out of the break, Jett Gibson added to his already productive, four-point game with consecutive 2-pointers, adding to the Harvesters'

lead, 31-23. In a bizarre foul, assist, and free throw, Shinoah Bridges and Gibson combined for a three-point effort. Bridges and Gibson each had a huge third quarter, Bridges with six points and Gibson with nine points.

The onslaught continued in the fourth quarter with the Harvesters already leading 42-31. Bridges had six more points, followed by a Gibson free throw and two Woelfle free throws.

Shanoah Bridges, Jett Gibson and Brandon Woelfle each had double-digit points with 14, 13 and 10 points respectively. Dante Jordan had seven points. Nick Stevens and Bryson Burrell each had 3-pointers.

Colton Thompson had a point in the win also. It should be noted that Adam Zuniga had multiple rebounds and was a force inside the paint.

Harvesters still have playoff spot despite loss.

PERRYTON — The Pampa Harvesters (15-11, 4-3 District) fell to the Perryton Rangers (15-10, 6-2) Saturday afternoon in Perryton.

A win clinched the district title for the Rangers. It was senior night. The game had been moved from Friday to Saturday. All of these elements seemed to form a perfect storm of obstacles for the Harvesters to overcome.

Right from the get-go, the Perryton Rangers' Keetan Willeford hit a 3-pointer that would set the tone of the game. Willeford followed it with a 2-pointer, before sophomore Cade Engle hit his first 3-pointer of the game. Following a 3-pointer by the Rangers' Jordan Plank, Engle hit another 3-pointer followed by a 2-pointer from senior Brandon Stokes to tie the game at 8-8. Perryton closed the quarter out with an 8-0 run to give them the 16-8 lead heading into the second quarter.

The Rangers' Justin Ventura started the second quarter with two 2-pointers, but the Harvesters' senior Cory Ponce hit two 2-pointers from inside the paint keeping the Harvesters alive trailing by nine at 20-11. The Rangers outscored the Harvesters 6-4 to end the half with a 26-15 lead.

In the third quarter, the Harvesters failed to muster more than five non-free throw points. The five points came from sophomore Kambrin Scott's 3-pointer combined with senior Ryan Powell's 2-pointer. The Har-

vesters did shoot seven of 11 in free throws that quarter, however, to tie the Rangers for the quarter with 11 points scored.

"Well early on, every time we would cut that thing (the lead) into single digits we would have a defensive lapse and give it right back to them," head coach Matt Embry said.

"We finally started to make that final push, and it seemed like every time we would make a shot we would put them on the free throw line. Then we got into a position where we had to foul and they were making those shots. Congratulations to them. That was a hard fought win for them."

In the final quarter, the Harvesters continued to get fouled, but overcame the fouls to lose the quarter by only a point. In the waning moments of the game, the Harvesters continued to feed the hot hand of Cade Engle, who hit three straight 3-pointers, which helped the Harvesters keep it close at an eight-point deficit. Also during the quarter, Ponce, Stokes and senior Gabe Gar-

cia each hit 2-pointers. But the free throws coming off fouls would be too much for the Harvesters to overcome as the Harvesters fell 55-43.

Cade Engle led the team in scoring with 19 points, followed by Cory Ponce who scored nine points to go with his nine rebounds. Gabe Garcia has five points and four rebounds. Junior Jonathan Stevens also had four rebounds. Kambrin Scott had four points and three rebounds, and Ryan Powell had two points.

The Harvesters return to action tonight at McNeely Field House to take on the River Road Wildcats in their regular season finale.

"Your first goal is making a district championship and then it is making the playoffs," Embry said.

"So really your first goal is making the playoffs and then winning a district championship, and we have done that. Once you're in anything can happen, and we are glad we got that opportunity again. We just need to stay focused, go back to work on Monday and get ourselves ready for River Road."

Marcus doesn't act very 'Smart'; Neither does fan.

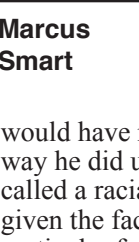

Sam will participate in the NFL combine later this month in Indianapolis and is projected to be a mid-round draft pick in May.

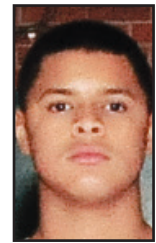
Freshmen Harvesters fall to freshmen Rangers
