New firefighter proves to be good fit for Pampa

Twenty-one-year-old Blake Horton has been with the Pampa Fire Department for almost one month now, and it turns out he is the perfect fit for the department. Originally from Wheeler, Horton knows the area well, and he brings with him more than four years of volunteer firefighting experience.

He has enjoyed his time here and said so far his experience here has been a positive one.

"I like the guys I work with and I get along with everyone. Pampa is a good town," Horton said.

He is on the B shift at the downtown fire station.

Before coming to Pampa, not

only was he a volunteer firefighter, but Horton also worked on an ambulance in Wheeler for one

Still waiting for his first major fire call, Horton is eager to learn more and says he has no plans to leave Pampa any time soon.

"I'd like to become a captain one day," he said of his future goals with the department. Captain is the highest active-duty ranking, not including the office jobs, within the fire department. Right now Horton's rank is firefighter. From there he can move up to equipment manager and then captain after that. When he's not working, Horton enjoys hunting, fishing and riding horses. Fire Chief Kim Powell is just as

excited to have Horton on board as he is to be there. "He's home and he gets to stay

home," she said, referring to the fact that he is from the area. She added that the department has a higher retention rate among young hires from the Panhandle because they know the area and feel at home.

"He has a great personality that fits in with the culture," Powell

Horton was among four new hires from this round of testing, one of whom the department sent to the fire academy in Kilgore.

"We started Blake this time of year right after the holidays so that he could come in and work with this group of guys," Powell said joking that there is a method to the madness. "He's young and excited and

we like those type of guys being here," she added.

The work environment at PFD is known for being upbeat and firefighters greet the people of the community with a smile and an occasional joke, and Horton fits in with the other firefighters effortlessly.

Free tax return prep now available across Texas

AUSTIN — An estimated \$1 billion in tax refunds go unclaimed each year, but a service statewide is helping folks get back their money and it's all free of charge. Around 2,000 volunteers across Texas are now offering preparation of basic federal returns through the AARP

Foundation Tax-Aide program. Coordinator Bart Hatfield said while there is nothing inherently fun about taxes, many filers leave happy — including a couple who saved thousands after coming in for help last year.

"We were doing their taxes and our preparer noticed that she had some IRA information there. She was over 70 years old and therefore was required to take a required minimum distribution, which she had not taken, and that's a 50 percent penalty. We helped her work up an explanation to take to the IRS, and they ended up waiving the penalty," Hatfield said.




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

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High school confidential

months is an eternity." On Jan. 9, the Quinnipiac Poll stated: "New Jersey Gov. **SHIELDS** Christopher Christie is the hottest politician in the country." Democrats were openly

nervous the Republican Party might have an unexpected attack of pragmatism and actually nominate Christie in 2016. Less than a month later, after Christie's office was revealed to have been directly involved in a scandal that had for days deliberately tied up commuter traffic on the George Washington Bridge, the CNN-ORC national poll, which, in December, had shown Christie leading Democrat Hillary Clinton 48 percent to 46 percent, now indicated that Clinton would crush Christie, 55 percent to 39 percent. And all these polls

were taken before we got a full, if unwelcome, look at what I can only call the "unappealing smallness" of Christie. In his marathon two-hour press conference in the second week of January when he testified that he had neither involvement in nor knowledge of his appointees closing the bridge, Christie went back 30 years to distance himself from his man at the Port Authority, David Wildstein, who had been a year ahead of him at Livingston (N.J.) High School and who received, and allegedly executed, the order from the gov-

"David and I were not friends in high school. We were not even acquaintances in high school ... We didn't travel in the same circles in high school. You know, I was the class president and athlete. I don't know what David was doing during that period of time." These are the words of a small man who brags, I was the popular jock who had an assigned seat of honor at the exclusive cool guys table in the school caf-

ernor's office to snarl

bridge traffic:

nowhere to be seen, let alone included.

But that was gentle treatment compared to what the governor's office unloaded on Feb. 1 after Wildstein's attorney wrote that there existed evidence, contrary to what the governor had unequivocally asserted, that Christie knew about the bridge lane closings. Proving he and his team were totally unready for the prime-time pressures of a national campaign, Christie charged in an email to supporters, which was made public, that "as a 16-year-old kid, (Wildstein) sued over a local school board election" and that "he was publicly accused by his high school social studies teacher of deceptive behavior." What? No charges that Wildstein failed to use the revolving door or, in defiance of federal law, tore the tag off his mattress, or chewed gum during the national anthem? Christie managed to "raise" pettiness to a new low!

Remember this is the same Wildstein Christie appointed to a \$150,000 a year position on the powerful Port Authority, where he was called the governor's "eyes" and ears," and defended by the governor's press secretary against criticism that he had alienated some colleagues at the Port Authority.

High school is where it all began. Because they happened to be quarterbacks or student council officers or homecoming queens, or because adults told them they were special, individuals of very ordinary talents burst with self-confidence, totally unconnected to their actual achievements or abilities, and went through life receiving recognition they haven't earned. And how many people of genuine talent do you know who, prisoners in the shadow of their own self-doubt, fearing the risk of rejection they learned so painfully in high school, never scale any heights? Maybe this time, having been king of the cool guys table will not be enough.

Museum Musings

A story of Valentine's Days past

Saint Valentine, who lived in the late 3rd century A.D., was a Christian martyr killed during the reign of Emperor Claudius.

He has always been considered the patron saint of lovers, but the custom of sending valentines on his feast day (Feb. 14) is not connected to the saint. The ancient Romans

hosted a festival (Lupercalia) that was at the same time as Saint Valentine's feast day. For this festi-

val, that honored a pastoral god, the Romans sent anonymously missives that were sentimental or ludicrous. In the late Middle Ages, there was a belief that birds began to mate on February 14. This notion probably suggested that lovers should exchange messages and gifts that day. At one time it was the custom

for young people to meet the night before Saint Valentine's Day. Each person drew a name of the opposite sex from a number of names. Each gentleman got a lady for his valentine and he became the valentine of a lady. The gentlemen remained bound to the services of their valentines for a vear.

After postal systems were organized, the practice of mailing homemade valentine messages became


common. The greeting card industry in the United States now prints millions of valentines each year. Present day valentines are associated with lace-trimmed red hearts, flowers and chocolate, but the White Deer Land Museum has on display a valentine which shows none of these objects. It is the valentine that Phillip Claude Ledrick had made for Fannie May White in 1896. Claude Ledrick and his brother,

Lee Ledrick, were the sons of Henry Ledrick and Amanda Jane "Jenny" (Lard) Ledrick. The family came from Young County to Roberts County in 1886 and established the Ledrick Ranch on a league of school land located on Chicken Creek. (State Highway 70 runs through the Ledrick Ranch.) Although many Indians still roamed the country at that time, the Ledricks got along with them. Fannie White, daughter of Isaac White and Elizabeth Doherty White, was born in 1878 near Abilene, Kan. The Isaac White family came to Roberts County in 1888 and settled on Wolf Creek. Claude Ledrick and Fannie White were married in 1901. For several years they lived on the Ledrick Ranch, but in 1907 they moved to Pampa and built a home at 421 East Kingsmill. They had no children. Claude continued to ranch, but both he and his brother, Lee, took part in Pampa's growth

and became directors of Gray Countv State Bank. Claude (P.C.) Ledrick was on the school board when the tan brick school building was constructed at 126 West Francis, Mrs. P. C. Ledrick was a charter member of El Progresso, a study club organized in 1923. Claude Ledrick died in 1943 and Fannie White Ledrick died in 1959.

If you would like to see the 1896 Valentine, visit the White Deer Land Museum. It is homemade and very unique. A drastic difference to today's valentines.

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

ity. Americans began exchanging Valentine's in the early 1700s. In the 1840s Esther Howland began selling mass-produced Valentine cards in America. She is known as the "Mother of the Valentine." According to the Greeting Card Association, one billion Valentine cards are sent each year. This makes Valentine's Day the second largest card-sending holiday. The largest day is Christmas, when an estimated 2.6 billion cards are sent out to celebrate the birth of God's Son, Jesus
