Game room law approved

Legal age to enter businesses will be 18.

The Pampa City Commission passed on Tuesday an ordinance to regulate game rooms within Pampa city limits.

The intent of the ordinance is to provide for reasonable regulation of game rooms, including providing for unrestricted access by city police officers to all areas of game rooms and all amusement redemption machines for inspection by city police officers, providing for transparent glass and uncovered windows and providing for the prohibition of minors and alcohol in game rooms.

The ordinance passed on Tuesday has been amended since it was passed on first reading Jan. 14. The original version required that an individual must be at least 21 to play in the

When the Commission gave second reading at its Jan. 28 meeting, Danny Martin, commander of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1657, asked the mayor and Commissioners whether they could change the minimum age

The Commissioners agreed to table the motion and asked City Attorney Lee Waters to investigate whether there are any other cities in the state that allow 18 year olds into game rooms. The motion that was passed Tuesday will allow 18 year olds into the estab-GAME cont. on page 2

Pampa EMS, Lifestar get settled into their new home

ampa EMS has been at its new location on West 30th street since June, and since making the move, response time has decreased by almost an entire minute. Director of EMS Alan Price and Director of Operations Anita Aaron are among the many who are excited to share the changes of EMS with the community. Price has been with the EMS service in Pampa for 15 years and says that the current staff is the most experienced that the orga-

The new building houses not only Pampa EMS, but the Pampa segment of Lifestar. Lifestar moved into the building first in February 2013, and its employees are ecstatic about the move. EMS and Lifestar are kept completely separate in the building aside from the shared day room and

They are on separate computer systems to keep their respective records private, as this is a Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) requirement.

Flight nurse and medic Mason Birch compares the joint work environment to living in apartments together, adding that he enjoys the camaraderie of working so closely with

Aaron added that the two services working out of the same building has led to a better mutual understanding of

Lifestar was based out of the hospital, and the helicopter remained fenced in outdoors at all times, whereas in the



new building, it is kept in an attached hangar, which is a major positive point for employees.

The Lifestar pilot on duty has his own office in which he constantly keeps track of flight records, maintenance schedules, fuel, weather and all other details of flights. In this office, there is also a map with the minimal flight height

requirements marked throughout the flight district. Next to the pilot's office is the room where the active flight nurse and medic have their records and computer to write their reports. Lifestar has another base in Amarillo, and its staff rotates between the Pampa and Amarillo loca-

The Pampa location of Lifestar has a Bell 407 helicopter with a one-patient capability and from Pampa, the chopper can take patients as far as Oklahoma City and Wichita Falls when necessary. They are also able to call for a plane to take patients to Houston and other farther destinations if they deem the decision necessary.

Maximum weight capacity for flight patients in the helicopter is 350 pounds and a maximum girth of 52 inches. These requirements exist because patients must fit within








the small designated area of the helicopter for the Pampa Lifestar averages

about 40-50 calls a month. To be a flight medic, a person must have five years of high call volume EMS experience as well as a number of certifications.

To become a flight nurse, one must have three years of emergency room or intensive care unit experience and have EMT basic training completed.

Another

improvement of the new building is the living quarters. EMS was previously located in the old fire station on Barnes Street, and due to space constraints, all beds were in one room and there was one co-ed bathroom. Now, both EMS and Lifestar employees have the luxury of each having their own private dorm and there are separate gender bathrooms eight dorms total, seven of which are in constant use. The last is currently being used for storage.

EMS and Lifestar employees are not the only The EMS board members benefit from aspects of the building as well. The second story of the building, which is where EMS' computer system and records are kept, contains offices for board and director use. Though this floor is still under construction, Both Price and Aaron are excited about their new offices.

Upon completion, the board will have a spacious conference room to meet in (they currently meet at the conference table in Price's office). The EMS board of directors is composed of six members, President tiple significant donations Gary Willoughby, Treasurer Dona Williams, Secretary Ellen Jane Steele, Boys Ranch Representative Mike Pacino, new member and Gray County Representative Gina Rigdon and Medical Director Dr. James K. Hall.

The board is required in order for Pampa EMS to remain eligible to be considered 501 c3 non-profit. The medical director is an additional requirement, and in Pampa's case, he happens to also be a board member.

The responsibilities of the board are to oversee the entire operation of EMS, including policies to operate by, all incoming contracts and fiscal responsibilities like approving bill payments. The board is not included in medical decisions or decisions regarding individual person-

nel. The board generally

meets once a month unless it is decided that additional meetings are needed. "They work hard to promote Pampa and Gray County. They're great,' Aaron said.

When it comes to the day-to-day running of Pampa EMS, it's Price's job to make sure that things are running smoothly and President Gary Willoughby keeps in close contact with him.

There is a second branch of EMS based out of Boys Ranch in Oldham County that responds primarily on the Boys Ranch campus, but it can respond to calls in Channing and on surrounding highways when needed. This location has one truck and two paramedics on duty at all times.

Pampa EMS started here in 2009 and since then the organization has continued to grow. "We are proud of the organization and the people who work here," Aaron said.

Future plans for Pampa include replacing and showers. There are two of the three ambulances currently in use by the organization. Due to the call volume, EMS had as many as 2,800 calls in its busiest year, and transfers, there are a lot of miles on ones excited about the up- the units, so they need to be grades of the new building. replaced on average about

Pampa EMS is in the top three when it comes to call volume of ambulance services north of Plainview in Texas, and it responds to calls within a 900-mile radius as well as providing mutual aide in Lefors and McLean.

The new ambulances that have been looking at are \$127,000 each, and Price and Willoughby have been actively fundraising and applying for grants to get the units replaced as soon as possible. Aaron added that there have been multo the account EMS has set up at Happy State Bank specifically for the replacement of the ambulances.

She also stated that there is more wear and tear on ambulances than an average diesel engine because when they receive calls, patients need care right that minute, so EMS employees do not have the time to let the engine properly heat before driving.

Aaron points out that a lot of people do not realize all that the staff at EMS does. "The education needed is incredible for these guys. They need 3,000 hours of training to be minimally qualified as a paramedic," she said. She added that the knowledge of the veteran paramedics combined with the newer additions constantly challenge each other, making for a mutually beneficial work experience.

But, in fact, they constantly pick winners and losers. America is now like the place described in George Orwell's book "Animal

Farm": "All animals are equal," but some are "more equal than others." "Animal Farm" was about Communism, but today the allegory applies to our bloated democracy, too.

During the "fiscal cliff" negotiations that Congress and the media made sound so tough — as if every last penny were pinched Congress still managed to slip in plenty of special

deals for cronies. NASCAR got \$70 million for new racetracks.

• Algae growers got \$60

 Hollywood film producers got a \$430 million tax break. When America's going

broke, how do moviemakers get a special break? By lobbying for it. Movies are a sexy business, so 42 states offer film producers "incentives" to film there.

(State legislatures are as shortsighted as Congress).

Michigan offered the juiciest handouts until the state ran out of taxpayers' money. Now Ohio, Louisiana and Georgia (that's why the latest "Hunger Games" movie was shot in Georgia) offer the biggest handouts. The mayor of Los Angeles recently declared a "state of emergency" — not over an earthquake or storm, but because so much moviemaking has left California for states with bigger subsidies.

The U.S., which used to pride itself on being more free-market than Europe, is now hardly different from France, which crippled its economy by subsidizing all sorts of old industries, and even gives money to producers of American films that mention France.

Politicians everywhere are always eager to help out people who helped get them elected. In the U.S., labor unions were big supporters of President Barack Obama, and — presto unions got 451 waivers from Obamacare.

Congressional staff got a special exception, too. Funny how many of these laws are supposed to be great for all of us but, once passed, look ugly to the

privileged class. So they

exempt themselves.

Even the crusade to save the earth is captured by the "special" people. Subsidies for "green energy" were supposed to go to the best ideas. Yet somehow your money went to companies like Solyndra, whose biggest shareholder just happened to be an Obama backer who bundled money for the president.

And somehow Al Gore, who had a modest income when he entered politics, reaped \$200 million from brilliant investments after he left office. He must just be really smart.

On my TV show this week, progressive commentator Ellis Henican says this cronvism is "inevitable" and doesn't really bother him: "If we want roads and bridges and prisons and a military and a safety net, someone somewhere is going to benefit from that. But you can't use that as an excuse to not do important things for our society.'

I say it's one more reason to keep government

Politicians doling out favors quietly shift where society's resources flow, who gets employed, what ideas are pursued.

It distorts the economy and the culture — and it turns us into a nation of

favor-seekers instead of

creators and producers. What about all the new businesses that would have gotten investment money but didn't have Gore on their boards? What new ideas might have thrived if old industries weren't coddled? We don't know. We will never know the greatness of what might have existed had the state not sucked the oxygen out of the incubator.

Because of government's favor-granting, Washington, D.C., is now the place where the well-connected go to get rich.

For the first time in history, six of the richest counties in the U.S. surround D.C. When a small group of people gets to dispense \$3.6 trillion and set rules that can help or kill your idea, you want to suck up to them.

As long as government has the power to grant favors, cronies and their lobbyists will seek those favors out.

The privileged win. The people lose.
