An unsuccessful convenience store robber was arrested Thursday night as he was attempting to flee west on U.S. Highway 60.



Garrett Redmond, 20, was booked in the Gray County Jail on one count of aggravated robbery. He is being held a \$30,000 bond.

At approximately 8:35 p.m., the Pampa Police Department responded to a panic alarm at the Allsup's convenience store at 1025 W. Wilks St.

While officers were en route

to the call, Pampa Emergency Communications received a 911 call stating that a man had discharged a firearm inside the store and had fled the scene in a vehicle and was headed toward Amarillo on U.S. Highway 60.

There were no injuries reported and Redmond did not steal any cash or merchandise, said PPD spokesman Officer Jason Collier.

Collier said Redmond demanded that the clerk open the cash register, but the clerk refused. Redmond then turned around and fired a shot into the cooler, Collier said.

A description of the suspect and vehicle were obtained by officers at the scene and relayed to surrounding agencies.

Forty-five dollars isn't a whole lot of cash, but it will buy a tank of gas for most people. Six bucks is even less, but it will cover lunch at Subway or McDonalds.

At its regular meeting Friday morning, the Gray County Court of Commissioners approved canceling \$660 worth of checks sent to county residents who were called for jury duty.

Most of the checks were for \$6 each, but others on the list were for \$45 or other amounts. The checks were all issued from April 2012 to July 2013.

County Treasurer Scott Hahn said there is printing on the front of all the jury duty





Hart attempts to rank people according to their relative importance in making an impact on history. It is a listing of the most INFLUEN-TIAL people, not the greatest. Neither fame, nor talent, nor nobility of character is the same thing as influence.

tions: Jesus died fairly voung. He had a very small group of disciples,

which only comprised a portion of a small Jewish sect. He left no writings. He was not a continuing military leader. He was not a political leader. He wasn't even perceived as a religious leader by joyed reacthe Jewish faith he represented. He notes two people, Jesus and the Apostle Paul, founded Christianity.

> Hart has much to say, but it boils down to this: he believes Jesus had one teaching that was original and distinctive. It is found in the Sermon on the Mount, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you" (Matthew 5:44). Hart considers these teachings among the most remarkable and original ethical ideas ever presented. If the teaching was widely followed, Hart says he would have had no hesitation in placing Jesus first on his list. "The truth is that they are not widely followed! In fact they are not even generally accepted. We do not normally practice it, do not expect others to practice it, and do not teach our children to practice it. Jesus' most distinctive teaching, therefore, remains an intriguing but basically untried suggestion.' While I might argue with much this author suggests, I believe he makes a good point and one to think about as we consider what love means around Valentine's Day. Although sometimes challenging, it's relatively easy to love family, friends, and neighbors. It's another thing to love those who are not like us, those with whom we have little in common. It behooves us to work on this, especially those of us who are followers of Jesus. Let's do our part in placing Jesus first on the list.

Bouncin' Around My earthquake experience

I was asked recently what an earthquake feels like. That's not an unusual question since I grew up in



southern California. I distinctly remember my first earthquake, July 21, 1952. Our family was camped up at June Lake in California. I was bedded down in the back seat of our car in the parking lot of the campsite; Mom

and Dad were in the tent, and my two big brothers were on cots outside the tent. Mom woke up to the tent shaking, and sent Dad out to tell the boys to settle down, but they were asleep.

A few moments later another shake of the tent, and Mom went out to deal with the boys, only to find them on the ground beside their cots, scratching their heads wondering what happened. As for me, I apparently rolled off the back seat, and when I climbed back up, I looked outside and saw what I thought at that time was someone walking through the parking lot with a flashlight. I was later told that I saw some type of lightning skipping along the heavy car bumpers. We

had to pack up and leave the area in a hurry, because a dam that fed into the lake had cracked in the quake, and they were afraid the dam would break and flood the camping area. We came home to find some dishes tumbled out of the kitchen cabinets and broken on the floor and some cracks in a few walls, but no other damage. That quake, one of many that occur regularly along the San Andreas Fault, was the strongest I ever felt, and the last one until 1965.

We enjoyed nearly 20 years of a quiet "Shake and Bake" (as some refer to Southern California) until the big Alaska quake of Good Friday, March 28, 1964. Besides devastating a large area of Alaska, the 9.2 magnitude quake sparked tsunamis that were expected to impact the southern California coast. People were warned to avoid the beaches, so of course my brother and I immediately drove over to Pacific Palisades so we would have a good view of the tidal wave. As we stood looking out at what appeared to be an unusually calm ocean, I suddenly realized I could see not one, but TWO horizons! Above and parallel to the usual horizon, there was a black line that seemed to be moving up the sky, and which framed a dark gray band.

My brother and I realized at the same time that this must be the tsunami, and if it were big enough to create a second horizon, we'd better scram. Fortunately, the wave never made it any closer to shore, or I might not be here to write this. The last California quake I experienced was about a week before Mom and I set out on our great journey in the Corvair on Route 66. I awoke on a Saturday morning to a BOOM! that felt and sounded like an airplane had hit the house. There was no rolling or swaying, just a quick, loud, 3.7 impact which really didn't cause any damage. So I experienced a rolling quake and an impact quake, but nothing like family members endured after I left California. On October 17, 1989, a 7.1-magnitude earthquake hit the San Francisco Bay Area.

My oldest brother and his family live in Oakland, and for some reason, my brother decided not to go to work that morning. My nephew also decided to play hooky, and enjoy some time with his dad. They later realized that they would probably have been crushed on the bridge that collapsed during that quake. On January 17, 1994, a 6.7

Most people would probably answer this question by pointing to North Korea or to one of the radical Muslim nations like: Iraq, Iran, Somalia, Afghanistan, Egypt or maybe Pakistan. And it is true that those countries provide the most hostility to a Christian's BODY. More Christians will actually be killed or imprisoned or beaten in those countries than anywhere else. The attacks against Christians in these countries are typically overt and obvious. However, that isn't the question in the title of this article. Where is the most hostile environment to Christian faith? The answer very likely may be right here in the good ole USA. Hostility against the Christian faith can clearly be found in at least a dozen arenas in the US. Namely:

Re-classifying the unborn as non-humans and killing them. The US culture classifies anyone who calls the abortionist out as a woman hater.

Forcing everyone to accept the gay community values as normal and changing the definition of marriage.

Hollywood and the music industry reprogramming our young adults and kids to accept immorality, sex outside of marriage, violence and civil disobedience as a cool and normal thing to do.

· Hollywood withdrew a Grammy nomination for a recent song after they realized the song was in a Christian movie.

All of our natural history museums, state and national parks take every opportunity to present the billion year old earth, evolution theory as fact.

School textbooks and curriculum have tossed out creation, embraced evolution and tossed God and Christianity out of our history and national heritage.

This list could go on but I will elaborate on the one that is currently bugging me the most.

A hostile environment to Christian faith can be found on almost every college or university campus right here in America. Example 1- Almost every college professor in the Science department (Biology, Zoology, Geology, etc.) will berate the Bible as a book of myths and use the hypothesis of naturalistic evolution to brainwash their students into thinking that it is FACT and that only fools question its legitimacy. If a young person stays in college long enough to graduate with their bachelors degree, the numbers change only a little; pretty much the same as above.

However, if a young person enters their postgraduate years and receives their master's degree or their doctoral degree, the numbers change drastically. That 1 in 10 changes to almost 1 in 3 who will completely eliminate God from their view of the origin of humans.

So what does this have to do with Christian faith? Isn't Christian faith a whole lot more than just the origin of humanity? Yes, it is. However, if you can get a person to begin thinking of Genesis 1 as a fairy tale or a myth or an allegory or

something other than a historical narrative, then they are much more likely to do the same with the miracles in the Bible. And if they can explain away the miracles in the Bible, then it isn't much of a jump to explain away the bodily resurrection of Jesus. And the moment the bodily resurrection of Jesus is explained away, well, then that person is no longer a Christian.

You see, the constant bombardment of a young person's faith during their college years can sow a crop that they will never want to harvest; one that none of us who truly care about them will ever want to see them harvest.

So what needs to be done? Just keep our kids at home all their lives and never let them go to college? No, that's not the answer. 1- Train our teenagers in hardcore Christian Evidences BEFORE we let them go to college. 2- Get them a creationist resource to whom they can turn when their faith is challenged to the core. 3- Regularly send them "YouTube" reminders of teachings by creationists. 4- Find quality creationist DVDs and books to bless them with while they are at school. 5- Do everything possible to help them get plugged into a "Bible believing" church. 6- Pray for them every day they on the enemy's ground. She awoke to her dresser falling on her, and it was several hours before someone heard her yelling and rescued her. She was uninjured but very angry that she had to move to a new apartment building after her complex was condemned. I was once asked why I would prefer living in Illinois, and now in Texas to living in sunny, warm California.

My answer to that was, and still is, "I'd rather take my chances being blown away by a tornado than being swallowed up by the earth." At least you get some warning before a tornado.

Brush-eating goats could help Texas firefighters

VICTORIA (AP) -Some hungry goats have been put on two months of fire-prevention duty in South Texas.

City officials in Victoria are renting the barnyard animals as part of an experiment for the goats to eat dry, flammable brush at Riverside Park.

Fire prevention officials at the Texas A&M Forest Service are monitoring the project involving more than two dozen goats trucked each day to the park. The animals eat their way through sometimes poisonous scrub that's closed parts of Riverside Park since 1998.

Goat owners Terry and Susan Hatfield get \$1,200 a week for the project that began Monday. The Hatfields run a petting zoo in Port Lavaca (luh-VAH'-kuh)

Councilman Tom Halepaska, who backs he program, says the goats can easily make their way along the steep banks of the river.

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

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A 1st for South: Va. gay marriage ban overturned

In a first for the South, Virginia's same-sex marriage ban has been overturned, with a federal judge ruling that the voter-approved amendment is unconstitutional and declaring the move "another moment history when We the People becomes more inclusive."

U.S. District Judge Arenda Wright Allen on Thursday issued a stay of her order while it is appealed, meaning that gay couples in Virginia still won't be able to marry until the case is ultimately resolved. Lawyers for the clerks in Norfolk and Prince William County who defended the ban are expected to file the appeal, which will be heard by the 4th Circuit Court in Richmond. It could uphold the ban or side with Wright Allen. If the 4th Circuit sides with overturning the ban, it too could issue a stay while the case is appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court. Both sides believe the case won't be settled until then or until the high court rules on a similar case.

Wright Allen's decision echoes recent rulings elsewhere in the U.S. and is the strongest foothold yet in the South for the gay-marriage movement. On Wednesday, a judge declared that Kentucky must recognize same-sex marriages performed in other states, but didn't rule on the constitutionality of whether such marriages can be performed in the state.

The office of newly elected Virginia Attorney General Mark Herring took the unusual step of not defending the law because it believes the ban violates the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment. In her ruling, Wright Allen agreed.

She struck down the three key arguments offered for denying gay marriages.

"Government interests in perpetuating traditions, shielding state matters from federal interference, and favoring one model of parenting over others must yield to this country's cherished protections that ensure the exercise of the private choices of the individual citizen regarding love and family," Wright Allen wrote.

She also wrote: "Gay and lesbian individuals share the same capacity as heterosexual individuals to form, preserve and celebrate loving, intimate and lasting relationships." Wright Allen's stay was requested by the Virginia Attorney General's Office to avoid a situation like what happened in Utah when a gay-marriage ban was declared unconstitutional. More than 1,000 couples were married in the days after the ruling until the U.S. Supreme Court granted the state an emergency stay, creating a cloud of uncertainty for their status. Soon after, a federal judge also declared Oklahoma's ban unconstitutional. That ruling also is on hold while it is appealed. In a Valentine's Day news conference, the two couples at the center of a Virginia case said that while the decision has been stayed, it brings them one step closer to marriage. "The saying here is Virginia is for lovers, and truly we are experiencing that today in a way that we never have before," Carol Schall said. "She understands why we're doing this and how important this is to us, and anyone that believes in the ideals upon which this country was founded can't help but understand," Bostic said.

Adam Umhoefer of the American Foundation for Equal Rights, which sponsored the challenge for the plaintiffs, emphasized the message the ruling sent to the South. "Today in places like Birmingham and Biloxi, Chattanooga and Charleston, gay and lesbian couples know that equality isn't just something that happens up north," he said.

Supporters of the state ban on same-sex marriages issued statements decrying Wright Allen's ruling.

"It appears that we have yet another example of an arrogant judge substituting her personal preferences for the judgment of the General Assembly and 57 percent of Virginia voters," said Tony Perkins, president of the conservative Family Research Council.

Brian Brown, President of the National Organization for Marriage, called the ruling "another example of an Obama-appointed judge twisting the constitution and the rule of law to impose her own views of marriage in defiance of the people of Virginia."

In a movement that began with Massachusetts in 2004, 17 states and the District of Columbia now allow gay marriage, most of them clustered in the Northeast. None of them is in the old Confederacy.

Opponents of the Virginia ban say the issue resonates in Virginia in particular because of a landmark 1967 U.S. Supreme Court decision involving a Virginia couple and interracial marriage.



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
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'Selfie' photo leads to California burglary arrest

CHULA VISTA, Calif. (AP) — Authorities say it was a "selfie" that led detectives to a suspect in the burglary of a Southern California church.

U-T San Diego reports that detectives found a phone at the Chula Vista crime scene, where a laptop, cash and watches were stolen.

On the phone was a photo the suspect had apparently snapped of himself.

Residents recognized the man in the photo, and police arrested 26-year-old Adam Howe on Tuesday.

A search of his belongings uncovered property believed to be stolen from the Hilltop Tabernacle Church.

Further investigation led to the arrest of two other people.

Police say they've now linked Howe to thefts at a nearby mobile home park after residents recognized his picture in media reports. A phone number listed in

Howe's name rang without an answer Thursday.

Abilene Christian announces \$55M in donations

ABILENE (AP) Abilene Christian University says it will use \$55 million in gifts from three donors to fund a new football stadium and three new science facilities.

The West Texas college announced the donations Friday, including a \$30 million gift from April Anthony, founder of a Dallas home health company, and her husband, Mark.

Abilene Christian says part of that gift will go toward a new on-campus football stadium.

Separate gifts of \$15 million and \$10 million will help pay for new laboratories, classrooms and office space for science instruction.

Q: I am 60 years old. I have a 45-year-old wife who has never worked during the 20 years that we have been married. She did work for a while before our marriage, and has 10 Social Security credits. Is there any advantage to her working to earn the extra 30 credits she needs to qualify for her own Social Security?

A: Before I answer your question from a Social Security perspective, I'd be remiss if I didn't point out that we need to consider your wife's feelings about this. Does she want to get out of the house? Does she want to work? Does she want to have her own income? These are obviously important questions only she can answer.

Looking at the matter only through my Social Security glasses, I'm going to give you a blurry answer. Is it worth it for your wife to work? Maybe yes. And maybe no.

Part of that wishy-washy response depends on if she was planning to work just until she gets her 40 credits. If that is the case, then the answer probably is "no." The key thing you need to understand about Social Security is that whenever a woman is due two Social Security benefits (for example, her own retirement benefit or a wife's benefit on her husband's account), she will generally get only the one that pays the higher rate. So, even if she earns her own benefit, it will probably be so small that she would always get a higher rate on your record anyway. Or to put that another way, even if she never works again, she will get the same Social Security benefit (a wife's



rate on your record) that she would get even if she did work.

But she is only 45. If she was thinking of working until maybe age 65 or so, then she would probably build up enough earnings so that her own retirement benefit would exceed what she is due as a wife on your record. So that would be an argument for her to get out there and work.

However, if you were planning to die someday, that throws another factor into the equation! Even if she worked for the next 20 years, she probably would never make enough to exceed what she would be due as a widow on vour account. In other words, her widow's benefit would always be higher than what she would be due on her own record. So that's another argument for her not to work.

But now I have to get wishy-washy again because there is a flip side to that argument. Widows who have their own Social Security account have an option they sometimes can use. They can take reduced benefits on one record and later switch to higher benefits on another record. For example, if you die when your wife is 62, let's say, and if she has her 40 credits, she could get reduced retirement benefits on her record and then at age 66, switch to 100 percent benefits on your record.

Another possible advantage to her having her own Social Security record is the potential for disability benefits. If she became

retirement age, she could get monthly Social Security disability checks. Those can be potentially valuable benefits.

As you see, there are advantages to your wife working and getting the 40 credits. On the other hand, it may not be worth the effort. So as I said at the beginning, let's ask vour wife what she wants to do.

Q: I am 58 years old. I have worked all my life (almost 40 years) at a fairly high-paying job. I recently retired. I'm thinkjob for the next 5 years or So if you end up with a net. so. What can you tell me about this?

A: I can tell you to take the teaching job. You will not mess up your Social Security benefits in any way. Those who warned you not to take the job were thinking about a couple of pension offsets that will not impact you.

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Free man wrongfully locked up for decades

BAY CITY, Texas (AP) — Attorneys for a Texas man who was kept in prison for any evidence that he wanted more than three decades after his murder conviction was overturned have asked a court to free him so he can get on with his life, saying he's suffered enough from the mishandling of his case and that key trial evidence has gone missing.

Attorney Jeffrey Newberry wrote in a recent court petition that the state clearly violated Jerry Hartfield's right to a speedy trial by waiting decades to retry him for the 1976 death of Eunice Lowe, who was beaten to death at the Bay City bus station where she worked as a ticket agent.

"The most serious prejudice a defendant can suffer in being denied a right to a speedy trial is to have his defense possibly impaired," Newberry wrote. He urged State District Judge Craig Estlinbaum to free Hartsfield "with prejudice," meaning the state couldn't retry him on the same charges.

Hartfield, 57, was convicted in 1977 of killing Lowe and sentenced to death, but that conviction was overturned three years later. After prosecutors unsuccessfully appealed that ruling, then-Gov. Mark White commuted Hartfield's sentence to life in prison in 1983.

in court documents as an illiterate 5th grade dropout with an IQ of 51, didn't challenge his continued detention until 2006, when a fellow prisoner pointed out that once his conviction was overturned, there was no sentence to commute. Appeals courts agreed and ordered Hartfield freed or retried. Hartfield is scheduled to stand trial again in April for Lowe's slaying.

In a court filing, Matagorda County District Attorney Steven Reis rejected the assertion that Hartfield should go free. While acknowledg-ing that the state "may be partially responsible" for the delay in retrying Hartfield, Reis argued that prosecutors didn't act in bad faith and that Hartfield bears some re- body.

sponsibility.

Hartfield "failed to proffer a speedy trial during this period," Reis wrote. No evidence supports a finding that Hartfield "actually wanted a new and speedy trial," that he did anything before 2007 to assert that his right to a speedy trial had been violated, or that the state deliberately acted to delay a retrial, Reis contends.

Newberry contends that the state was solely responsible for the retrial delay.

"Had the state carried out the (appeals court) mandate, Hartfield would not have needed to file the documents that he began filing," he wrote. "Mr. Hartfield has affirmatively demonstrated that his ability to present a defense has been prejudiced by the delay."

Newberry also says authorities haven't been able to find some evidence used to convict Hartfield, including a pickaxe used in the attack or Lowe's car, which was stolen and later recovered. Furthermore, a Texas Ranger who was a key witness for the prosecution at Hartfield's 1977 trial has since died, he wrote.

Estlinbaum asked both sides to address some legal questions before he rules on the matter.

At the time of the killing, Hartfield, who is described Hartfield, who grew up in Altus, Okla., was working construction at nuclear power plant near the bus station where Lowe worked. He was arrested within days of the killing in Wichita, Kan., and was convicted and sentenced to death in 1977.

Hartfield disputes a confession police said he gave them that was among the key evidence used to convict him.
