





move is for the safety of the defensive players. Defenses are only allowed to substitute players if an offense substitutes. But why all the safety


rule changes? At this rate in 2020, we will be playing touch football because everyone is afraid of concussions and the like. Well, if you are afraid of







questions were for Canon. Why did you decide to run?

I had a number of people approach me and tell me they were not happy with the job the current senator is doing. They weren't satisfied that he was adequately representing our district. 


