

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# Seliger back in Austin

■ Thornberry opponent Hays has good returns in Gray County.

Incumbent state Sen. Kel Seliger narrowly defeated former Midland mayor and attorney Mike Canon in Tuesday's primary elections. With nearly 100 percents of the votes counted


Wednesday morning, Seliger narrowly led Canon 52.3 percent to 47.7 percent. The race between the two for-

towns was the first serious challenge Seliger has faced in 10 years. Many in Texas politics had portrayed it as a battle between the "north and the south," but

Seliger in interviews with The Pampa News both candidates dismissed that portrayal, each stating they could represent equally the northern and southern halves of the district.

In Gray County, Seliger was the clear favorite with 60 percent of the votes. In early voting he racked up 65 percent of the primary votes while sliding to 55 percent at the polls on election day.



Pam Barlow, a veterinarian and Army veteran from Bowie, captured 13 percent.

Despite lagging far behind Thornberry at 9:30 p.m. Tuesday, Barlow was still optimist the tide would turn in her favor as more results from rural precincts rolled in.

Both Barlow and Hays said they were hoping Thornberry's numbers would slide to less than 50 percent, necessitating a runoff between the seated congressman and the second-place fin-

#### ■ Black holes: a confusing, yet fascinating phenomenon.

One of the presents I got for Christmas this year that I am grateful for is a subscription to National Geographic. While I

don't really read much on the different tribes around the planet, I enjoy reading about different animal species, forests or other Earthly distinctions.

This month's, however, is out of this world. Michael Finkel of National

Geographic did an article featuring black holes called "Star Eater." Now I am going to do my best to share this information because the article was

But I also want to let you know some of the context was overwhelming as there is a lot of physics talk in

To put it simple, I am a sports writer not an astrophysicist.

Now it is very well-known that death of stars and heavenly bodies is what begins the formation process of the black hole.

What makes black holes so intrigu-

the notion that it is this dark reversetornado that sucks everything up through its funnel and not even light can escape.

Let's blame this on Star Trek and Star Wars.

The National Geographic article dispels this right away.

'It's important to clarify a couple of things about black holes. First is the idea, popularized in science fiction, that black holes are trying to suck us all in. A black hole has no more vacuuming power than a regular star; it just possesses extraordinary grip for

"If our sun suddenly were to become a black hole—not going to happen, but let's pretend—it would retain the same mass, yet its diameter would shrink from 865,000 miles to less than four miles. Earth would be dark and cold, but our orbit around the sun wouldn't change," Finkel writes.

"This black hole sun would exert the same gravitational tug on our planet as the full-size one. Likewise, if the Earth were to become a black hole, it would retain its current weight of more than six sextillion tons (that's a six followed by 21 zeros) but be shrunk in size to smaller than an eyeball. The moon, though, wouldn't move."

The article also creates this notion that our galaxy, the Milky Way, has a black hole at the center of it.

This theory will be tested as a gas cloud approaches where scientists believe the black hole is. They won't see the black hole itself, but they will see a debris ring, which they say will prove their theory.

Later in the article, Finkel talks about a really confusing time aspect. Finkel, using the expression "time is relative," says time moves at different speeds for everyone and that Albert Einstein discovered it's affected by gravity.

"Black holes, with their incredible gravitational pull, are basically time machines. Get on a rocket, travel to Sgr A\* (the name given to the milky way's black hole)," Finkel writes.

"Ease extremely close to the event horizon, but don't cross it. For every minute you spend there, a thousand years will pass on Earth. It's hard to believe, but that's what happens. Gravity trumps time."

From my side research, what I gathered about event horizons are that they are the edge of the black holes.

Black holes are very complicated anomalies. Whether you believe in them or

not, personally I find space to be infinite and it would be naive to think they don't exist, but those are just my personal beliefs.

What I took from this article just scrapes the base and is a very amateur knowledge of it. If you happen to have a broader knowledge of science than I, which many people do, check out the article: http://bit.ly/MNOBAn

It seems like there is never enough time to get everything done that needs to be done at the animal shelter. A group has tried to work with having more volunteers at the shelter. We need people to interact with the animals and give a report on how those animals do. One weekend we had a ton of volunteers, but there was really no control over what happened. We had people taking dogs out and mixing them with other dogs: putting all the puppies together, and not remembering what room or run they got the dog out of. So dogs ended up in places they should not have been. One puppy broke with parvo on Monday and then the whole group that was put together developed parvo. Kennel cough was everywhere! So the staff came up with a set of rules. We are in the process of trying to fine tune those. Hopefully we will get the kinks worked out and the animals will be the beneficiaries of volunteers who

The puppy season is in full swing. We currently have two momma dogs at the shelter with eight puppies each. A third dog is ready to deliver. Plus there are numerous dogs being picked up that are obviously in heat! We had three momma dogs and their litters that were accepted into no kill shelters in Colorado. They were transported two weeks ago. That really is an exception. We have been lucky to get as many dogs out to rescues as we have. It really is the hard work of Beth Jones who finds the rescues willing to take certain dogs if they meet all their requirements.

Then it is the PAWS group's responsibility to make sure that is done. It is a lot of hard work, but it saves lots of lives. The fascinating thing is that all of the Pampa dogs, so far, have been adopted.

Remember that on March 22 the ASTRA group from the high school is going to be at United Supermarkets collecting supplies for the animal shelter. If you are shopping at United on that Saturday,

please consider making a donation to this group. The shelter is always in need of wet cat food, dry cat food, dry puppy chow, paper towels and the small white fleece beds that are sold specifically at United. You can help the ASTRA group and the shelter at the same time!

We continue to help people get their dogs and cats "fixed!"

If you know of someone who needs help, have them call the shelter. We can help with neighborhood cats, too.

Today we got a call from someone who found a little chi in labor. She could not have the baby and was going to die.

Dr. Ron Easley did an emergency C-section and spayed the little chi. The baby died before they could get it delivered. If no one claims her, she will be at the shelter and be available for adoption. Remember to get your animals spayed or neutered and remind all the per owners you know. It is the only way to stop the euthanization of all these animals

that should be living in loving home.

There are some wonderful animals at the shelter. If you are thinking about adding a new member to your family, please check the shelter or the website Pampa Animal Rescue.org Remember that these animals are shelter animals.

They are in runs with possible other animals and have no place to go to the bathroom except in the run. We had a beautiful Aussie by the name of Sophia returned after two days, because they said they could not potty train

This was even after we told them to be patient with her since she was going to a new place where she did not know where the door was, where and when she was to go outside, and what the routine was. You can not expect them to be "perfect" in two
