


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Texas' unemployment rate lowest since Nov. 2008

■ Gray County's rate of 4.1 percent is well below the state average.

AUSTIN — Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 5.7 percent in January, the lowest since November 2008. It was down from 6.0 percent in December 2013, and remained below the nation's January unemployment rate of 6.6 percent.

The January unemployment rate for Gray County was 4.1 percent, well below the state average. Of the county's total workforce of 11,974, only 493 were unemployed in January, according to statistics

DPS increases spring break DWI enforcement

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols from March 7-23, which coincides with one of the busiest Spring Break periods in Texas. During this effort, DPS troopers will focus on DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. The enhanced patrols that target intoxicated drivers are funded by a Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) grant.

"The decision to drink and drive during Spring Break — or any time — can often lead to disastrous and deadly consequences," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Taking impaired drivers off Texas roadways during Spring Break is a top priority for the department, and we also call on the public to do their part and designate a sober driver or find alternate transportation if they plan to drink alcohol."

During last year's spring break enforcement period, DPS troopers made more than 1,000 DWI

Albertsons' parent Cerberus to buy Safeway

■ United Supermarkets now among corporate chain that includes 2,400 stores nationwide.



(AP) Safeway has agreed to be acquired by an investment group led by Cerberus Capital Management, the owner of several supermarket chains.

The acquisition is worth about \$7.64 billion in cash, and pending other transactions could top more than \$9 billion.

The deal, announced late Thursday, will bring together Safeway and Albertsons, one of the five chains that Cerberus bought from SuperValu Inc. last year.

It comes amid ongoing consolidation in the supermarket industry, which is facing growing competition from big-box retailers, specialty chains, drug stores and even dollar stores. Kroger Co., a key competitor, recently snapped up regional chain Harris Teeter.

In September, Lubbock-based

United Supermarkets agreed to be acquired by Albertsons' LLC, which currently operates more than 600 locations in 16 states, including one in Pampa. United has been family-owned since its founding in 1916 and retains deep community roots in Lubbock and the 29 other communities it serves. In August, the Pampa location was voted the best grocery store in the city by Pampa News readers.

Safeway said in February that it was looking into putting itself up for sale. The Pleasanton, Calif.-based company has been trying to adapt for some time to increased competition and recently shed some of its smaller, less profitable units, such as its Canadian operations and Dominick's stores in Chicago.

The company has more than 1,300 U.S. locations under banners including Safeway, Vons, Pavilion's, Randall's, Tom Thumb and Carrs.

AB Acquisition LLC, which operates Albertsons, along with Acme, Jewel-Osco, Lucky, Shaw's and other stores, is owned by Cerberus and other investors. It operates more than 1,000 stores. Albertsons is based in Boise, Idaho.

Combined, the companies will have more than 2,400 stores, 27 distribution facilities and 20 manufacturing plants.

Safeway and Albertsons say the deal will allow them to better respond to customer needs and lower costs. They

also expect to refurbish some stores and expand its product offerings once it is complete.

The deal is expected to close in the final three months of this year. It still needs the approval of Safeway shareholders and federal regulators.

Safeway shareholders will receive \$32.50 per share in cash. Pending other actions, the company says the deal is worth roughly \$40 per share to stockholders.

Shares of Safeway Inc. closed at \$39.47 Thursday. Its shares closed at \$34.10 on Feb. 18, the day before Safeway announced it was in talks regarding a potential sale.

The stock fell \$1.33, or more than 3 percent, to \$38.14 in extended trading after the deal was announced Thursday.

Bob Miller, the current CEO of Albertsons, will become executive chairman of the combined business. Robert Edwards, Safeway's president and CEO, will become president and CEO of the combined company.

The companies said it is too early to determine where it will be based and exactly what its operations will look like following the deal. It does not anticipate any store closings.

Safeway can still actively review other proposals in the coming weeks.



arrests, and approximately 226 were the direct result of the increased patrols funded by the grant. DPS enforcement also resulted in more than 11,400

speeding citations, 1,600 seat belt/child safety seat tickets and about 12,000 other citations. In addition, troopers made 552 fugitive arrests and 463 felony arrests during this time period.

The drinking age in Texas is 21, and any driver under that age with any detectable amount of alcohol in

their system can be charged with breaking the law. Additional troopers will also be patrolling in areas with high concentrations of Spring Break activity.

DPS offers the following tips for safe travel during the Spring Break holiday:

- Slow down — especially in bad weather, construction areas, heavy traffic and

unfamiliar areas.

- Eliminate distractions while driving, including the usage of mobile devices.

- Buckle up everyone in the vehicle — it's the law.

- Don't drive fatigued, and allow plenty of time to reach your destination.

- Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present

additional challenges.

- Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained before your trip begins.

- Slow down or move over for tow trucks and police, fire, EMS and Tx-DOT vehicles stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated — it's the law.

Avoid travel to Mexico.

(U.S. citizens who do travel to Mexico should always check the U.S. Department of State website for the latest information regarding security issues in Mexico, and they should register with the Smart Traveler Enrollment Program by visiting http://travel.state.gov/travel/cis_pa_tw/cis/cis_970.html.)

Amarillo Symphony to perform Gustav Holst's acclaimed 'The Planets'

■ Concert will feature two American composers and unique solo instruments.

AMARILLO — The Amarillo Symphony, the leader of orchestral music in the Texas Panhandle since 1924, today announces details regarding its upcoming Visionaries concert series on March 21 and 22 at the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts in Amarillo.

Performing works by Christopher Theofanidis, Michael Daugherty and Gustav Holst, the Amarillo Symphony will delve into a diverse and eclectic musical landscape. Opening with Theofanidis' Rainbow Body is a work that was commissioned by the Houston Symphony and was first performed in 2000. Rainbow

Body is the ethereal coming together of two ideas for Theofanidis — his fascination with Hildegard of Bingen's music and the Tibetan Buddhist idea of "Rainbow Body," which is when an enlightened being dies physically and the body is absorbed directly back into the universe as energy and light.

Daugherty's Raise the Roof not only inspired the 2013-14 Amarillo Symphony season, but also features a timpani concerto with virtuoso Leonardo Soto that will impress audiences with his versatile and rhythmically inclined performance. Commissioned by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra for the opening of its Max Fischer Music Center in 2003, Raise the Roof brings the timpani into the orchestral foreground as the foundation of a grand acoustic construction.

While Theofanidis and Daugherty are considered some of the most important American composers of their generation, the concert would not be complete without Gustav Holst's profound The Planets. A lush and incredibly pictorial work that premiered in 1918, The Planets themes evoke very specific imagery to an audience. The piece depicts the planets not in terms of their physical characteristics but their astrological significance, focusing on attributes

associated with their mythological namesakes. The Planets includes seven movements. Earth was intentionally left out and Pluto was not yet discovered when Holst began working on this piece. The Planets is also unique simply by the sheer volume of musicians required to perform the piece. A huge orchestral work, patrons will notice the woodwind and brass sections double.

Music director and conductor Jacomo Rafael Bairos is particularly excited to conduct this program. "The Planets is a personal favorite of mine and is something I always wanted to conduct," Bairos said. "It is full of tremendous beauty and is extremely unique and inventive. I think my excitement for conducting The Planets comes from my love for performing it as a musician and listening to it as a child."

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Bouncin' Around Watching the sun rise and set

In nearly seven decades of life, I have seen many sunrises, sunsets, and as a bonus, moonrises. As the song illustrates, children grow and life changes and I can track my own life changes by these celestial happenings. Growing up in southern California, the most spectacular sunsets were those where I watched the sun seemingly sink into the ocean at the horizon. A year after my high school graduation, I was working full time and going to college in the evenings. Since I worked in Redondo Beach, I would make a habit of driving down to the beach for a quick hamburger, watch the sun set, and then drive the ten miles back to the college. Quite often, that peaceful sunset would allow me to calm down after a hectic day and focus on my studies.

One memorable moonrise happened when I was invited to spend a weekend in a desert cabin in Yucca Valley, California with friends. While the rest of the group went into town, I elected to stay behind in the cabin. I was washing dishes when suddenly the lights went out. Being in the High Desert is a little like being out in the countryside here in Texas—nothing can possibly be darker! I found the penlight I usually carry and went outside on

the deck, and of course I imagined all sorts of other-worldly events. All of a sudden, what seemed to be the nose cone of a space ship appeared in the notch of the mountains. Just about the time I thought I was going to be abducted by aliens, I realized it was the moon at half phase rising. Shortly after that, the power came back on, and my friends came home. I didn't admit to my flight of fancy.

When my mother and I left California for the Midwest, we saw a lot of sunrises through the window of my Corvair, but the enjoyment was short-lived as we would stop for breakfast until the sun was high enough so that I wasn't blinded driving. I can still vividly recall the sunset we saw in Flagstaff as the snow on the mountains seemed to glow in shades of red and gold. The next day we watched the character of the Grand Canyon change before our eyes as the setting sun colored the Canyon.

When we arrived in Illinois, one of the first things I saw was Lake Michigan, and I couldn't imagine a lake looking as big as the ocean! That first night, I watched the full moon rise over the lake, and the silvery pathway the moonlight made on the lake was absolutely magical. The next time I saw such a magical sight was watching the sun set on the Aegean Sea in Greece, and the moon rise at the same time.

In nearly 38 years of marriage, my husband and I have made a point of watching sunsets—either through the windows of our home, walking outside, or driving out somewhere.

One weekend when we went to pick up our daughter from her camp in Wisconsin, we spent a few hours sitting down by Lake Winnebago in Oshkosh. Instead of watching the moon rise, however, we watched a bank of clouds looming up from the east. Soon we could see forks of lightning over the lake, and we were so fascinated watching the approaching storm we very nearly were caught in the storm! We've watched the sun set and rise again from the window of an airplane as we crossed the Atlantic. Here in Texas, we have the advantage of a mostly-unhindered view of both the rising and the setting sun. Our years in Illinois, Indiana, and Georgia did not provide such a clear view, though we were treated to a rare view of the Northern Lights one summer night when we lived in Indiana. Sometimes Ron and I drive out to the cemetery on Price Road, and park to watch the sun set. It never looks the same however often we watch. Other times, we watch from our dining room window as the reds and golds are framed in the window.

I watch the sunrise nearly every morning from our big living room window, and stand there while our cat, Boris, watches for any birds or other critters that might happen by. He stretches out on the ledge and soaks up the warmth, totally oblivious to the riot of colors painting the sky.

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So much for the new Russia

It didn't take very long for the smiling sports fan cheering in the Olympic stands to revert to his true nature. I'm referring to Russian President Vladimir Putin, the former KGB leader whose idea of diplomacy is sending in the troops.

The Olympics ended, and the war began. It resembles nothing so much as the old Russia: might over right, threats over diplomacy. Ronald Reagan used to call it "the evil empire." Has it changed?

It seems far easier to understand what is happening in Kiev than what has not happened in Russia. In Ukraine, the new technology that has shrunk the world, that has turned us into a much smaller community, was a critical element in energizing a new generation to demand real democracy. In Russia, there is also new technology, albeit with more restrictions. But does it matter? Do educated and informed Russians watching their nation literally invade a foreign country react with even a smidgen of the horror that

those of us in the West feel? Do Russians over the age of 40 understand how much this looks and feels like the "old" Russia of Khrushchev and Brezhnev? Or are they, as I fear, still not free enough to say anything about it?

And what can we say? Not much more. President Obama says Russia is on "the wrong side of history," warns of diplomatic and economic steps, and predicts that "over time, this will be a costly proposition for Russia."

Somehow I don't get the sense that this has Putin quaking in his boots. What the president did NOT say is that we, or anyone else, would actually use force to stop the Russians. We won't. I understand. We are not the world's policeman.

But when Russia is acting like an outlaw, who is left to enforce anything approaching the rule of law? Who will protect the rights of innocent people? Who will protect the sovereignty of weaker nations?

I don't want to see young Americans fighting and dying for freedom thousands of miles away from home, particularly (as it appears in Crimea) when there are so many who welcome this invasion and view the reformers and their Western

allies as the enemy.

The right answer, of course, is that the people of Ukraine should choose their leaders in free and fair elections. Of course, Putin would readily agree with that and point out that the man who won the last election was Viktor Yanukovich, just as it was Mohammed Morsi who was the duly elected leader of Egypt. Are we claiming that we know better? That democracy only matters when our guy wins?

In the bad old days, the United States earned a terrible reputation for secretly intruding on the politics of other countries and supporting military leaders whose only appealing feature was their support for the West. Time and again, such efforts failed. We told one another we had learned, and we have. Sort of.

Certainly no one is suggesting (other than the Russian rabble-rousers) that the revolutionaries in Ukraine are mere puppets of the West. We didn't engineer this revolution. The question is how much responsibility we have for its success.

Will threats of diplomatic and economic "steps" be enough to force Putin to back off? I'm not taking bets. A billion dollars in aid, as Secretary of State John Kerry promised, is a

lot of money, unless — like Ukraine — you are facing fiscal disaster.

And if such measures don't work, what will we do if Ukraine splits in half or devolves into Civil War?

This is not a Republican vs. Democratic question I'm asking. This is not about whether you do or don't like Barack Obama and John Kerry. It's not as if there is a "good" Republican answer and a "good" Democratic answer, and we just need to choose.

As best as I can tell, there are no good answers, except for someone like Putin, who doesn't get caught up in the niceties of sovereignty and comity and respect for the rule of law. It's easy for him. He'll do everything he can get away with — the more the better — to send the message to the "friends" of Russia that breaking up is not just hard to do; it's impossible.

As for us, we are faced once again with the horrible challenge of trying to find common ground with those who reject our most basic principles.

on the Texas Workforce Commission website.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest January unemployment rate in the state at 2.9 percent. The Odessa MSA had the second lowest at 3.6 percent and the Amarillo MSA was third at 4.1 percent (not seasonally adjusted). The Amarillo MSA includes Armstrong, Carson, Potter and Randall counties.

Texas employers expanded their payrolls in January with the addition of 33,900 seasonally adjusted total nonfarm jobs, for a total of 322,400 jobs added over the year.

"The decline in our state's unemployment rate and the addition of 33,900 jobs in January are positive signs, and I'm encouraged that the Texas economy has started the year on a strong note," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "All 11 major industries added jobs over the year, highlighting the favorable economic conditions in Texas for employers and job seekers."

Most major industries added jobs over the

month. The trade, transportation and utilities industry added the greatest number of jobs in January, expanding by 7,600 positions. This industry also reported the highest number of jobs added over the last 12 months, 77,300.

"The continued strong monthly job growth among varied industries like Education and Health Services and Trade, Transportation, and Utilities means opportunities for working Texans and their families," said Commissioner Representing Employers Ronny Congleton. "I encourage job seekers to tap into the job-search tools available through Texas Workforce Solutions offices statewide."

The Mining and Logging industry, which includes oil and gas related jobs, added 3,200 positions in January, for a total of 15,800 jobs over the year and an annual growth rate of 5.6 percent — the highest among the 11 major industries in Texas.

"We've seen 293,900 private-sector jobs added here over the last year, for a 3.2 percent annual growth rate," said Commissioner Representing Employers Hope Andrade. "I'm excited to see private employers in Texas continuing to grow their investments here."

Statewide price per gallon creeps up 1 cent

The statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in Texas is now \$3.23, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is one cent more than one week ago and 35 cents less per gallon than one year ago.

Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in Dallas and Ft. Worth are paying the most at \$3.30, and drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$3.16. The average in the Lone Star State is 24 cents less per gallon than the national average of \$3.47.

Analysts say gas prices are expected to continue to rise in the coming weeks due to seasonal refinery maintenance but say the

prices won't likely rise higher than last year. As with the national average, pump prices at the state level are higher than two weeks ago. The interior of the country and west coast top the list of weekly increases. In Texas, drivers are paying about \$45 to fill up the typical 14-gallon size fuel tank.

"As warmer weather and Spring Break approach, we expect the demand for fuel to increase which could lead to more price increases," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "We encourage people to maximize their fuel efficiency by making sure their cars and trucks are maintained according to manufacturer recommendations before heading out on road trips this spring."

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


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

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
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Order of the Eastern Star Pampa Chapter No. 65 celebrates 100 years

Jayne Yenger, worthy grand matron, and Trey Smith, worthy grand patron of the Grand Chapter of Texas, and special guests will be present to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the chapter. Special recognition will be given to the 25 and 50 year members who are present.

Eastern Star is the largest fraternal organization in the world to which both men and women may belong. Only men who are Master Masons are eligible, and only women with specific Masonic affiliation may become members. Those desiring membership must petition to do so.

Pampa Chapter was instituted on March 16, 1914 and constituted Oct. 14, 1914, with Esie Denison as Worthy Matron and C.P. Buckler as worthy patron. Olive Heare was associate matron along with 15 other officers who were installed by Carrie Chase, worthy grand matron, and M.P. Bell, worthy grand patron.

The first hall was in the upstairs area above the Empire Café on Cuyler St. and later after many years of raising money they were privileged to purchase land at the present location. During the early years Eastern Star grew by large numbers and by the 1950s the membership reached 300 in the local chapter. Mem-

bers would arrive early to get a seat and have time to memorize their work. Many members were owners of businesses or leaders of the community. There has always been a pride in being a part of the Eastern Star and its related organizations such as the Rainbows for Girls.

Dr. Robert Morris, the poet laureate of Masonry, founded the order using the beautiful and inspiring biblical examples of heroic conduct and moral value to portray the noble principles which adorn the lives of Eastern Star. The order is dedicated to Charity, Truth, and Loving-Kindness.

Projects part of Eastern Star are: ESTARL (Eastern Star Training Awards for Religious Leadership), humanitarian fund, cancer, home for senior members and many other charities. Lotus already staring down long F1 season

MADRID (AP) — The Formula One season hasn't even started and it's already looking like a long one for Lotus.

This year is unlikely to bear resemblance to last season's impressive campaign when the British team opened with a victory at the Australian Grand Prix. Just getting through F1's first race of the season seems to be the goal.

"In terms of preparation, we are not quite ready," French driver Romain Grosjean said at pre-season testing. "It's not going to be perfect for Melbourne, or even Malaysia, but we will try our best to improve everything."

Kimi Raikkonen won in Melbourne a year ago to kick-start an impressive campaign alongside

Grosjean for Lotus, which finished fifth in the manufacturer's championship ahead of McLaren and within reach of Mercedes and Ferrari.

Raikkonen, who helped the team accumulate 13 podium finishes last season, has returned to Ferrari with former Williams driver Pastor Maldonado of Venezuela taking his seat. Team principal Eric Boullier also bolted, to McLaren.

Renault's inability to get to grips with F1's new power unit has hampered Lotus' efforts. Red Bull, Toro Rosso and Caterham are also struggling with the French engine manufacturer being their supplier. Renault has warned there are still items to review before the March 16 opener.

"Some Melbourne preparations are incomplete," said Rob White, Renault Sport F1's deputy managing director. "We have cured or found workarounds for some of the problems we had previously identified. New problems that revealed (themselves) as we ran more have added to the unsolved items, and have disrupted running, which is disappointing for our teams."

Lotus did not even attend the first of three pre-season test sessions.

"I think we're going to need a bit of luck and all the bits to line up right for us," Lotus technical director Nick Chester said of the team's chances of actually finishing in Australia.

Lotus added more than

120 new parts at the final testing session in Bahrain last week.

"It will be nice if we can get a few points, but if we don't, then we understand that it's a chance to move forward," said Grosjean, who is going into his fourth F1 season. "But honestly, it's not going to be a straightforward season

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





22:15-22; Mark 12:13-17; Luke 20:20-26

Day 4 – Saturday – a temple coin

Scripture: Matthew 21:12-19; Mark 11:12-19; Luke 19:45-48

Early in the morning the next day, they were leaving Bethany. On his way back to the city, Jesus was hungry. Seeing in the distance a fig tree in leaf by the road, he went up to it to find out if it had any fruit. When he reached it, he found nothing on it except leaves, because it was not the season for figs. Then he said to the tree, "May you never bear fruit again. May no one ever eat fruit from you again." And his disciples heard him say it. Immediately the tree withered.

On reaching Jerusalem, Jesus entered the temple area and began driving out all those who were buying and selling there. He overturned the tables of the money changers and the benches of those selling doves, and would not allow anyone to carry merchandise through the temple courts. And as he taught them, he said, "Is it not written: 'My house will be called a house of prayer for all nations'? But you have made it 'a den of robbers.'" (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: Tables were lined up inside the Temple area and all were full of thousands of coins from all over the world. Worshipers had come from everywhere only to discover that the High Priest had put a tax on entering the Temple. Cheating and thievery were at every turn and the felons were the Levites doing the High Priest's bidding. Whether it was by changing their money to Temple money or having to buy an outlandishly priced sacrifice because theirs had been disqualified by one of the Levite inspectors, the people were cheated.

Then Jesus showed up. No doubt some still remembered what He did some three years previous when He saw what the Temple had become. But if they did, it didn't cross their mind that He would do it again. That's when He dumped the tables and coins went everywhere. What the wicked Levites prized most was rolling all over the ground. What God prized most was stored in the hearts of the people.

How often has my focus been on the wrong thing? When they heard this, they were amazed at him. And astonished by his answer, they became silent. They were unable to trap him in what he had said there in public. So they left him and went away. (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: It had Tiberius Caesar's image on it, one of the Roman coins of the realm. Those who came that day to trap Jesus had no idea that it would be His choice of weaponry not only to fend off their attack, but to leave them wounded in heart as well. They set their trap and immediately expected to hear the sound of intellectual steel crushing the spiritual bones of Jerusalem's biggest trouble causer.

Imagine their surprise when Jesus turned the tables and they found themselves in the middle of His trap, constructed from a coin and twelve words. "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's." Humbled they tucked their tails between their legs in disgrace.

Yet how many times have I tried to get my way by bargaining with my Lord? Oh, maybe I wasn't so arrogant and bold as to try to trap Him, but neither was I eager to obey His command or follow His leading. Shame on me for my reluctance and -- my hesitation.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, teach me the lesson of the dog with his tail between his hind legs. He only does that when he has been completely humbled or conquered. Conquer me, Lord. Humble me, Lord, that I might stop making deals with You and might just obey. Amen.

Day 6 – Tuesday – a white coffin

Scripture: Matthew 23:27

"Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You are like whitewashed tombs, which look beautiful on the outside but on the inside are full of dead men's bones and everything unclean. In the same way, on the outside you appear to people as righteous but on the inside you are full of hypocrisy and wickedness. (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: In the seven woes of condemnation issued by Jesus against the scribes and Pharisees in Matthew 23, the sixth paints a vivid and telling portrait. His verbal strokes give life to a cold, chilling picture of a spotless white coffin, so beautiful on the outside, but full of a rotting corpse.

The Pharisees had placed so much emphasis on minor outward appearances that

major qualities in character which were of the most concern to God so much were left untouched. They completely missed God's cruise liner; it left them at the dock and sailed away.

Usually when I read this scripture, I comfort myself

with words of assurance that I am not like the scribes or the Pharisees. And in part that is true. However, there are times when I get mixed up and confuse the mountains and the molehills. It almost always follows a time of temptation when I did not

say, "Get behind me, Satan." Rather I gave in to the eerie voice whispering, "It's OK. Go ahead."

I want to hear the devil as he really sounds, not for the impersonator he pretends to be. I want to see him for the empty, wrecked lives he

causes, not the gusto-filled life of fun in the sun that he advertises. That is what I vow to do today with God's help.

The abs strike back in '300' sequel

The glistening abs are back in "300: Rise of an Empire," and they've been doing crunches.

Like its forerunner, the 2007 hit "300," "Rise of an Empire" again plunges us into bloody, hyper-stylized Greek history: mythology with muscles. The computer-generated warfare franchise is now a third of the way to a six-pack.

Made clearly to capitalize on the popularity of "300," "Rise of an Empire" is something like collected behind-the-scenes from the Persian invasion featured in "300." Whereas the first film chronicled, ab by ab, the Spartans' heroic stand in the Battle of Thermopylae against Xerxes's Persian invasion, "Rise of an Empire" is about the concurrent naval fight, the Battle of Artemisium.

This may be war by sea, but the ingredients of "300" are largely unaltered. An outnumbered band of Greeks staves off a tyrannical Persian army below roiling skies of red and gray. Manly honor is fetishized to a comical degree. Blood spills like soup.

These two films, very much intertwined, provoke a number of questions: Did everyone forget their shirts? Is this a workout video? Or is this just the most absurdly ridiculous thing ever?

Yes and no. In "Rise of an Empire," Zack Snyder moves from the director's chair to producer (and co-screenwriter with Kurt Johnstad), leaving Noam Murro to helm the film. But Snyder's imprint is

unmistakable, with his visual style carried over, mimicking the extremes of Frank Miller's comic book illustrations (the inspiration of both movies).

These are easy films to make fun of. It's why perhaps the best thing to come out of "300" was the viral video "It's Raining Men," a clip of the movie's Mediterranean men in various states of brotherly togetherness, set to the disco tune.

But they're also precisely the movies they seek to be: Some kind of grandly warped, excessively heightened dream of mythical battle. It's as if Douglas Sirk made a combat video game.

At least it's the women who reign in "Rise of an Empire," though one wouldn't expect that given it's seconds into the film when naked breasts make their first gratuitous appearance. The male actors here — Sullivan Stapleton as the Greek hero Themistokles, Santoro, back as the bronzed Xerxes — are easily outdone by the females.

There is Queen Gorgo (Lena Headey of "Game of Thrones") lordly presiding over Sparta. But as Persian commander Artemisia, Eva Green rules ferociously over the film. She drives the Persians with a warrior's desperate thirst for revenge and a stare that makes the men of her army cower.

It's like a reckoning of the macho multitudes of "300." She single-handedly spoils the landscape of manly torsos.

After a casual finish at Phoenix, NASCAR heads up the desert to Sin City where they will be racing the KO-BALT 400. An early special note that many automatically jump to is that Las Vegas is where the Busch brothers, Kurt and Kyle, are from. Kyle Busch has only one win at the race, four top fives and five top 10s. Kurt Busch hasn't recorded a win at the track and has actually had a hard time, with one top 10 in the last six races.

So who should we look to finish strong? Six-time champion Jimmie Johnson and Matt Kenseth are a couple guys who could be strong at the track.

Kenseth won last year's race at Las Vegas and has an average finish of 11.6. He has six top fives and seven top tens. His average green-flag race speed is second only to Jimmie Johnson. Kenseth has also won three races at the track.

Johnson has four wins at the track. He has an average finish of 9.6, best green flag speed and holds series bests in fastest laps, average running position and driver rating.

One that may surprise fans is Kasey Kahne. He finished second at last year's race and has won the pole three times at the track. He also has three top fives and five top

10s. At last year's race he led 114 laps.

Some others to look out for are Carl Edwards (two wins, four top fives and five top 10s), Jeff Gordon (one win, six top fives and seven top 10s) and Tony Stewart (one win, six top fives and nine top 10s).

Picks for the race: Jimmie Johnson, Matt Kenseth and Kasey Kahne.

Track fun facts

The first NASCAR race at Las Vegas Motor Speedway was a K&N Pro Series West race held in 1996 and won by Ken Schrader. The first Sprint Cup Series was held on March 1, 1998, and won by Mark Martin.

Kyle Busch is the youngest driver to win at the track at 22-years-old (March 1, 2009). The oldest was Sterling Marlin at 44-years-old (March 3, 2002).

It took Tony Stewart 13 attempts at the track before he won his first race at LVMS in 2012.

The driver to win at LVMS has gone on to win the cup five times, Jimmie Johnson (three times, 2006, 2007 and 2010), Matt Kenseth (2003) and Jeff Gordon (2001).

Kyle Busch is the only driver who has won the race from the pole (2009).

There have been 16 races at LVMS, and only four drivers have participated in all 16 (Jeff Gordon, Jeff Burton, Bobby Labonte and Mark Martin.)

Bank on this data

Las Vegas Motor Speedway is a mile-and-a-half long track. The banking in all four turns is 20 degrees while the banking down the stretches are nine degrees.

Look for the drivers to carry a lot of speed down that backstretch. The banking on the turns will cause the drivers to try and dip low to come out with a lot of momentum for both stretches.

The front stretch is 2,275 feet while the back stretch, surprisingly shorter on this D-oval, is only 1,572 feet. The race will be 267 laps which equates to 400-and-a-half miles.

For now the forecast calls for partly cloudy skies and a high of 75 degrees over Las Vegas. No chance of rain, for now.

The race is Sunday at 2 p.m. on FOX.

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
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

Golf Thought of the Week

Drive for show and putt for dough.

You've probably heard the phrase "Drive for show and putt for dough."

It might be a little simple, but it makes the point that what you do off the tee box can be impressive, but your scorecard is influenced by what you do at the greenside. In the coming weeks you

may read some alternative views in the magazines. Sean Foley was supporting a business professor and author who has researched statistics from the PGA Tour that seem to indicate that those players who are performing best in their long game, win the tournaments.

It's an interesting thought, but not especially relevant to us. The research was conducted amongst PGA Tour players. Too many regular golfers actually get up to a 400-yard Par 4 in two, but find themselves in a bunker or the greenside rough. They then walk off the green with a six or even worse.

If your average score from 40 yards in is not three or less then you should be examining your short game skills. If your average score from a

greenside bunker isn't three or less, then your bunker technique needs to be improved. Then, when you can achieve those goals, work backwards. What is your average score from 60 yards in?

This is a nice, simple way to measure your performance. If you want any advice, then please contact us.

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

Politicians Punt Again on Social Security Reform

As I write this, the president and Congress are once again playing games with Social Security. In the ongoing negotiations over the federal budget, Social Security is being used as a political football, with each side blaming the other for lack of progress in getting near the end zone of any kind of meaningful reform of the retirement program.

Before I come back to what they are arguing about, let's establish (for about the 1,000th time in this column) some basic facts.

One: Social Security needs reform. As baby boomers are retiring at the rate of about 10,000 per day, we are approaching a point when there simply won't be enough money flowing into the system to cover all future promised benefits.

Two: There are essentially two ways you can "fix" Social Security. You can pump more money into the system by slightly raising revenues through a variety of means. Or you can cut back on the amount of money flowing out of the system by slightly reducing benefits through a variety of means.

Three: Social Security



reform is NOT a draconian issue. There are some very viable and relatively modest proposals for change on which most reasonable people should be able to agree.

Four: Because we live in a democracy where governance is based on compromise, any eventual solution must inevitably include a combination of revenue increases and benefit cuts.

And it's that latter point where our current political system is breaking down. Neither side is willing to budge. Hard-core Republicans insist that they will not entertain a budget proposal that includes any kind of tax increases, including Social Security tax increases. And hard-core Democrats insist that they will not consider budget proposals that include any kind of cuts in Social Security benefits.

In the latest round of Social Security football, bipartisan negotiators had ironed out a deal that included two reforms: one from each side of the ledger. On the tax increase side, the reform called for increas-

ing the Social Security wage base, meaning that wealthier people would pay higher

taxes. I have read and heard different numbers, but the one I'd seen most often raised the amount of money subject to Social Security tax from the current \$117,000 to \$200,000.

On the benefit reduction side of the ledger, the reform proposal called for a change to the way Social Security's annual cost-of-living increases would be calculated. The idea, called the chained consumer price index, is too complicated to explain in this short space. But it would have resulted in future cost-of-living adjustments being reduced by about 1 percent.

These reforms alone would not have entirely solved Social Security's financial problems. But they would have made a significant dent in the program's long range deficit. The Republicans punted first. Their leadership, under intense pressure from the tea party wing, took any kind of Social Security tax increase off the table. And frankly, that left President Obama, with pressure from the left wing of his party, with little choice but to drop cost-of-living benefit reductions from his budget proposal.

So there we are. Back to square one, the square we've been standing on for decades now. Are the politicians to blame? Of course, they are. But as I've pointed out before in this column, we (the voters) also share a large part of the blame for

intransigence on this issue. Here is why.

I am sure that most politicians on both sides of the aisle realize that Social Security reform is necessary, and that any reasonable solution must include a combination of tax increases and benefit cuts. But if you are a Republican, from Texas let's say, and you vote, as part of a larger package of reforms, for a small increase in payroll taxes that would impact only a tiny percentage of wealthy wage earners, the far right wing of your party will find someone to run against you in the primaries. And they will produce attack ads that say something like -- "Did you know that Congressman Joe Shmoe voted to increase your taxes?" And guess what? Congressman Joe Shmoe would go down in an easy defeat.

Likewise, if you are a Democrat, from New Jersey let's say, and that as part of a larger package of reforms, you vote for a small cut in future Social Security increases, the far left wing of your party will find someone to run against you and they will sponsor attack ads that say something like -- "Did you know that Congresswoman Jane Doe voted to cut grandma's Social Security check?" And guess what? Congresswoman Jane Doe would go down in an easy defeat.

So what can we do about this? Well, I'd like to say we should eliminate attack ads. But that's not going to happen. I'd like to say that Americans should stop gullibly believing those ads and research the issues before voting. But that's not going to happen. So I suggest we just take Social Security out of the budget process. Don't try to reform the system on a piecemeal basis with each yearly fight over the budget process. We should establish a bipartisan commission on Social Security reform to hammer out meaningful solutions and then have Congress vote for the reforms as an entire package.
