

## Study: Some Texas pharmacies misinforming teens on contraception

Most Pampa pharmacies do not carry 'morning after' pills.

AUSTIN — It is supposed to be available over the counter for teen girls 17 and older, but research published in January found that many young women still face barriers to obtaining emergency contraception.

Pediatrician Tracey Wilkinson, Children's Hospital, Los Angeles, is the lead author of the study. It posed a couple of simple questions to employees at more than 900 pharmacies in five cities across the country including Austin.

"We asked, 'Do you have emergency contraception' and 'If I'm 17, can I get it?' The most recent study discussed some of our conversations with the pharmacy staff and showed some real glaring problems with access for adolescents when it comes to this medication,'

## Area postal workers sentenced

Neither to receive prison time for failing to deliver mail.

Two former postal workers accused of obstructing delivery of mail were sentenced Monday to serve probation by a fed-

eral court in Amarillo. Though unrelated, both cases

were prosecuted by U.S. Assistant Attorney Jeffrey Haag in U.S. Magistrate Judge Clinton E. Averitte's courtroom.

Lesa Marie Stark, a former Borger Postal Service employee, was sentenced to serve three years probation after she failed to deliver more than 30 pieces to customers. She also was ordered by Averitte to pay a \$3,000 fine and undergo counseling as part of her plea agree-

Charles Allen Tollett of Borger was sentenced to serve two years of probation after pleading guilty to failing to deliver hundreds of pieces of mail to customers in Dumas. Averitte



Wilkinson said.

In the U.S., Plan B One-Step is available without age restrictions to women and men (check the family planning aisle). Onepill generics (My Way and Next Choice One Dose) will soon be available on the shelf for consumers aged 17 and older, but this change has not taken effect yet; women aged 16 and younger still need a prescription. Two-pill generics (Levonorgestrel Tablets) are still available only behind the counter without prescription if you are 17 or older. Younger women need a prescription.

Some of the recurring misinformation included pharmacy staff saying a prescription was needed or a parent had to be along with a teen, Wilkinson explained, neither of which is true. In addition, some pharmacy workers said they didn't feel comfortable dispensing emergency contraception, citing personal beliefs.

With the misinformation and barriers, Wilkinson advised all women of reproductive age to get the medication before they need it.

Emergency contraception is birth control that prevents pregnancy after sex, which is why it is sometimes called "the morning after pill," "the day after pill," or "morning after contraception." You can use emergency contraception right away — or up

don't think it's a big deal when a federal official -Lerner was the head of the unit that deals with taxexempt organizations when she first invoked the Fifth last May — won't answer questions about her actions as a federal official, but they are in a huff because the committee's chairman, Darrell Issa, abruptly called an end to the hearing and shut off the microphone.

Ranking Democrat Elijah Cummings said he wanted to ask "a procedural question." Then, as Cummings instead engaged in a rant in defense of Lerner, Issa again shut off the mic. Within a minute, it was back on, and Cummings continued to rail against what he sees as a one-sided investigation.

House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi later tweeted that Issa's "decision to silence a fellow Member of Congress was outrageous & disrespectful." The Washington Post's Dana Milbank denounced Issa for falling below "today's low standard of civility in Congress."

Issa exhibited shoddy manners. Worse, he lacked the discipline to not be baited by the crafty Cummings. Thus, Issa handed the left an excuse to make him the issue when the Internal Revenue Service's practice of going after the tea party cries out for public scrutiny. Lerner's refusal to answer questions, though it is the exercise of a constitutional right, should make all House members squirm.

Just what was Lerner doing on the taxpayer dime that she doesn't want to share?

Lerner's silence is especially unsettling given that her attorney William Taylor III told reporters that she had given a full interview to the Department of Justice with no grant of immunity. Lerner's lawyers, he said, have confidence that prosecutors, unlike Issa, are open-minded. The thing is that also unlike Issa, the Department of Justice is in a position to prosecute people.

## The history of The Pampa News

The Pampa News began as a "one man paper" in April, 1906. Known then as the Pampa Crony, it was

published in Miami by newspaperman, L.L. Ladd, who saw Pampa as a community of great potential. When Ladd decided to move the paper to Pampa, L.H. "Lem" Greene and his cousin, V.S. "Jack" Keahey operators of a dray service, transported the old

George Washington hand press from Miami to Pampa. It was first housed in the rear of the Lard and Wynne Land Office at 123 S. Ballard. Harland Case ran off the first page on the old George Washington hand press.

L.H. Greene was the first of the 250 subscribers who paid \$1.00 each for a year's subscription. Because a newspaper was a "novelty" then, Ladd was able to fill the newspaper with a large percentage of advertising.

The following article preceded a listing of various tracts of land for sale by Lard and Wynne:

'Our town 'Pampa' is located on the plains on the Southern Kansas Railroad, 40 miles west of the Oklahoma line, between the South Canadian and the North Fork of Red River in Gray County, Texas, and has grown from a section house to 400 population in the last two years. Level country, covered with a thick coat of buffalo grass. Our soil runs from deep black on the plains to sandy loam as we approach the rivers. The altitude is 3,200 feet, which gives us an ideal climate. Our rainfall is 24.09 inches average the last 10 years.

Fifteen or twenty miles towards the rivers the country becomes broken, with pretty running streams, kept running by springs the year round. Water being soft and clear. Creeks have plenty of timber, cottonwood, hackberry, china-oak, wild grapes,

currents and plums grow in abundance. The valleys along the creeks are used for hay meadows and alfalfa (which does well all over the country). Rough land is used for grazing purposes and is covered with all kinds of grasses. The depth of water ranges here from 0 to 300 feet. Any kinds of crops can be grown here that can be grown anywhere (except tropical). Corn, oats, barley, wheat, flax, cotton, kaffir corn, milo maize, broom corn, sorghum, millet, and vegetables of all kinds. For the last nine years we have had an average of 18 bushels of wheat and 30 bushels of corn per acre, This year, '1907,' wheat ranged from 9 to 14 bushels on sod and 14 to 20 on old ground. The estimate on corn ranges from 20 to 50 bushels per acre. Oats 30 to 40 bushels. The price of this land ranges from \$3.50 to \$25 per acre, according to the amount of improvements and distance from town. We have a good school here, also good churches and a good class of people.

In 1907 Ladd sold the Crony to pharmacist Joe Smith who renamed it The Pampa News. Smith, who learned the newspaper business from his brother in Indiana, came to Texas two years after the Civil War and operated a newspaper and a drugstore in Bonham before moving to Pampa. He moved the newspaper office to the east end of the First National Bank building. Later the office was moved to the rear of Perkins Pharmacy and then to 123 W. Foster Ave. and to 322 W. Foster Ave. before it was moved in the early 1950s to 403 W. Atchison Ave.

Smith's son, Joe Jr., joined him in 1917. The younger Smith learned the newspaper trade from his father and could set type while still in grammar school. He worked for papers in Iowa and Illinois before settling in Pampa, where he shipped in the first Linotype to be located between Amarillo and Wichita, Kansas.

The two Smiths operated the paper until 1926 when it was sold to J.L. Nunn and David Warren. This was a time of extraordinary growth for Pampa, and Nunn and Warren changed the Pampa News from a weekly to a semiweekly format. In 1927 they created the Pampa Daily News. The name has since reverted to The Pampa News.

The Nunn-Warren partnership was dissolved in 1934. Nunn and his son Gilmore operated the paper until 1936, when R.C. Hoiles, a publisher from Santa Ana, California, bought the News and added it to his chain of newspapers.


Ore of the major changes in the "backshop" was the conversion from the Linotype or "hot" type to offset printing in November 1970. During the fall of 1978, a complete system was installed to speed up the typesetting process. The Harris system enabled reporters and editors to type news stories directly instead of typing them and having them set by a typesetter.

In 1980 Louise Fletcher became publisher after serving as business manager. She was the only woman publisher in the 31-paper Freedom chain of newspapers at the time. David Bowser became managing editor in 1993.

In 1985 the newspaper staff consisted of 42 people, including seven advertising representatives, four editors, three reporters and a photographer. Also, there were 51 independent carriers

The circulation in 1985 was 8,500 daily and 9,500 to 11 area towns, including Miami, McLean, Mobeetie, White Deer, Groom, Skellytown, Wheeler and Canadian.

## Geology 101 at W.T.S.U.— faith under fire

It was the Fall of 1968 and I was a freshman at West Texas State University, standing in a registration line without a clue of what I was doing. So when the counselor asked me which classes I wanted to sign up for my reply was, "I don't know. Which ones do you think I should choose?" I picked Geology 101.

I was not a committed student at the time and spent just enough energy studying that first semester to pass all of my classes, including Geology 101. At the time I didn't see any connection between what we were being force-fed and my

but thanks to my church upbringing I did know what beliefs a "real" Christian believed.

Second semester began as every class first semester had begun — checking the attendance roll. Then our professor, as he always did, asked, "So are there any questions about the chapter we are about to cover?" This was for those who had actually read the chapter in advance; I was not one of those students. After I uttered a loud "here" to mark my attendance, I opened my Geology book to the first page of the second half of the book. I was stunned to see the illustration known as "March of Progress," the famous "monkey to man" picture that had been drawn by Rudolph Zallinger for the "Early Man" volume in the 1965 Time-Life series of evolutionary books called the Life Nature Library.

Following our professors request for questions almost every student raised their hand. He then arrogantly stated, "I refuse to answer any questions related to that mythological book called the Bible. So unless your question is directly related to geology, put your hand down." Every hand dropped; every student

enough of writing down what I firmly believed to be lies and of violating everything I believed about how humanity began.
