Will rightward tilt of Texas Senate doom two-thirds rule?

The rightward tilt of the Texas Senate has one of its more hallowed traditions — the two-thirds rule — in danger of going the way of the dodo.

Houston Chronicle political columnist Patricia Kilday Hart writes that in addition to the more conservative members who will be coming to the Senate in January, a couple of "centrist" Republicans — Bob Deuell and Kel Seliger from Amarillo — got "wake up calls" from challenges from the right. Deuell, of course, is not out of the woods yet. He was the top votegetter earlier this month in his primary contest, but he still faces a runoff contest against a Tea

In such an environment, Hart quotes Rice University political scientist Mark Jones as saying, "It will be extremely difficult for a Republican to vote against" conservative priorities. Jones noted that removal of the two-thirds rule, which requires two-thirds of the senators to

My dust storm experience

Tis the morning after I'm writing this essay. The morning after yesterday's

will, upon absorption into my body, make me forget days such as yesterday. Excessively dirty windy days send me into quite an orbit of funk, and my recall factor, without that morning after pill, is pinging the memory banks of my youth.

In the sixth year of my life, circa 1955, we meek here in Pampa and the Panhandle experienced quite the mega-blow dust storm. Yesterday's blow, albeit a good one, pales in comparison to 1955's event. It was a life occurrence that you wish never to encounter again, however, events like yesterday can bring the recall factor right up into your gut, which for me, creates a goodly dose

I was playing with some friends in Jerry the Horse's lot. Some of you Greatest Generation and Baby

Boomer Pampans will recall this particular lot, I mean, horse lot. It was on the west side of the 1400 block of Hamilton. Where first, Furr's Supermarket sat and where presently sits United Supermarkets. Jerry the Horse and his owner didn't mind kids playing in the lot or, as I like to say, playing Flying Walendas by walking while balancing ourselves as much as we could around the entire top of the horse lot fence. Someone yelled "look at that!" and pointed northward. We looked up and to this day I have to tell you, the scene has brought discomfort to me ever since. Stretching the entire

north horizon out of Pampa was this roiling black cloud, growing ever larger and larger and with it, you could hear this roaring noise! Frightened out of my knickers, I went running home to mother dearest and told her to come see. She did, then immediately ran back into the house and began securing all the windows and gathering towels and placing them against the bottom and mid sections of our house's windows and yelling back to me and my brothers, "It's a dust storm!" Mother dearest grew up in Oklahoma

during the Dust Bowl and Great Depression. She should know.

Dust storm indeed. Pampa's afternoon sky turned dark thirty, and lasted that way for hours longer. My dad came home from his work and thought it appropriate to go check on my grandparents. Dad called for me and my older brother to come with him. To our surprise, dad told my brother to sit up on one front fender of his car, and I the other. It's still dusty dark thirty. "I need the two of you to tell me if I'm driving in the right lane" was his direction. It was about a five mile trip to my grandparents' home. My father ordering my

brother and me to do such, we didn't hesitate to comply. It was the 1950s. Need I add more? Had he done such this day and time, it would easily be seen as child abuse and he would have been in CPS deep kimshee and my brothers and me parceled out to foster homes! Dad, I still love you and miss you, but looking back with what I now know, was making my brother and me sit on those fenders a good idea?

I possess many more childhood memories growing up here that are fonder to me. Weather related: hail storms, blizzards,

tornadoes, tumble weeds, grass hopper plagues, toad floaters, etc., don't bother me in the least, but mega blow dust storms, they are to me an entirely different matter, and never will be





Day 12 – Tuesday – thirty silver coins

Scripture: Matthew 26:14-16; Mark 14:10-11; Luke

Then Satan entered Judas, called Iscariot, one of the Twelve. And Judas went to the chief priests and the officers of the temple guard and discussed with them how he might betray Jesus to them. They were delighted to hear this. Judas asked, "What are you willing to give me if I hand him over to you?" So they agreed to give him money and counted out for him thirty silver coins. He consented. So from then on Judas watched for an opportunity to hand Jesus over to them when no crowd was present. (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarlev)

Devotional: As we have already seen, coins were a common part of everyday life. The only things that set these apart were that they were made of silver and were thirty in number. Oh, and one more thing. They were the sellout price to betray the Only Begotten Son

I always knew that these scriptures had a powerfully painful affect on me. Usually when I would read them I would get noticeably silent, sullen, and often teary-eyed.

I wasn't really screaming at the book, but at Judas and what he did. I was so angry that I wanted to punch someone or something. Then, as is usual with me, the rage broke into sobs and weeping. In my mind I was crying out, "How could he? Can't we back-up the calendar and undo the most evil betrayal in all of human history?" That is all I could think about that day--during Lent.

Devotional: The basin was as common as common could get. The water was one of the most precious treasures in the land. The water came from community wells and then had to be carried as far as one lived from the well. No one wasted water. Since meals were eaten while reclining at a low table, the issues of smelly feet and ceremonial cleanliness made the custom of foot washing a priority. Most often the lowliest servant was given the disgusting task of scrubbing off the crusted combo of dirt, dead skin, and sweat before rinsing the mess off with as little water as necessary. That was immediately followed by drying each foot with a dry towel.

The apostles had made every preparation for that Last Supper except one. No foot

being served, and the devil washer, no lowly servant to weren't just cheap words. and cleanse the filthy feet. This is another one of those stories that I am tempted to you see what needs to be done? Quit arguing about who among you is the greatest and get up and start washing those feet." In these moments I resemble a drill sergeant more than Jesus.

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
Oh, my, I sure have a long way to go. God, please help me get there by Your grace.

Devotional: It was just the juice from some local grapes in an ordinary cup made of clay or wood, so what was the big deal? Both were common items found in almost every home. So what was so special about this cup, about this grape juice?

There were two suppers that night in the upper room. One was just an average meal such as Jesus had no doubt shared with His disciples many times before. They probably shared bread, nuts, fruit, some type of vegetable soup or / stew in which to dip the bread and maybe even some fish. The evening meal was usually a very important event after a hard day's work, but not this

The big deal was the "other supper." The volume of the meal was tiny; the signif-

Seeing the significance of it being the "last supper," you would have thought that it would have been a longer and more drawn out, very intricate ceremony. But not so here. Barely three dozen words and two minutes later, the first half of the ceremony was over. He simply had the disciples pass a single cup around and each take a sip. It was hardly a ceremony that most would consider worthy for a King. Who in the world came up with a plan like this? The King did.

icance of it was incalculable.

What made this cup and this grape juice so important? "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins." All He asked of them was that every time they drank that juice in His honor that they remember what they were honoring: His blood that He shed so that sins could be forgiven. And He asks the same of

me too. "Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me." But how many times have I taken communion while my mind or heart wandered all over the place? How often have I been so focused on "ME" that communion was over before I had even given a moment's thought to the symbol in the cup? Bottom line: Do I drink from the cup in a worthy manner or an unworthy one? (1 Cor. 11:25-28)

Better yet, who could be interfering with my concentration? Who would want to distract me from concentrating on the bodily sacrifice of the Lamb of God? Eureka!

In the words of my Savior, 'Get behind me, Satan." I pledge to "remember Him" as He commanded when I taste the bread of communion. I vow to remember that He gave His body for me, to redeem me from my sinful predicament. Lord, I WILL remember You.
