Area ranchers brand month-old calves

It's been a tradition of the Old West for more than 100 years — branding cattle.

You see it in the movies. Two or three cowboys wrestle a calf to the ground while another brands it with a smoldering iron that has that particular ranch's unique brand or — to use a more modern term — logo.

Yes, cattle are also ear-tagged now and when a cow strays from the herd those tags probably ping out GPS coordinates so somebody sitting behind a computer in a comfy office can track its precise location.

But there's still something special about bringing in the herd and branding the calves. The camaraderie of working with other ranch hands, the feeling that goes with doing a hard day's work in the great outdoors, and, for some, even the smell of the burning hair and flesh as it is seared by the red-hot branding irons.

Throughout the week, ranchers and ranch hands in the area teamed up to do the spring branding.

Warren Chisum, who owns the Chisum Ranch in Roberts County, said branding is usually done in March and October to the calves, who are all about one-month old.

The breeding is done in February and September so that all the calves are born at about the same time and are the same size. The gestation period for a cow is about nine months — the same as a human mama.

Chisum said calves weigh about 100 pounds when they're born and gain another 50 within a month.

The branding also provides an opportunity to tag animals and/or to spray them with an insecticide that kills fleas, worms, flies and other

Sharing the work, sharing the road

■ Gray, Wheeler counties work together to repave County Line.

Each county is responsible for maintaining its own roads, but what's the protocol for a county-line road where each side of it is in a different county? You could draw a line down the middle and say, "OK, County A, you take care of this side. County B, you take care of that side."

But most things in life aren't that easy.

In the past, Gray County maintained the county-line road it shares with Wheeler County because Wheeler County would never do its fair share of the paving and would stick Gray County with the tab, said County Commission Jeff Haley, whose Precinct 4 borders Wheeler

But that has all changed since a new Wheeler County commissioner, Richard Kincanon, took office

about a year ago.

Throughout the week, crews from all four of Gray County's precincts

pests.

Adult animals get a full squirt and calves get a half squirt, Chisum said.

Chisum said area ranchers will work together, branding on one ranch one day, another ranch the next day and so on. On Tuesday, calves were branded on the Chisum Ranch. On Wednesday they moved on to the Hayhook Ranch in the early morning then to ranch land in Gray County not far from the back of the Jordan Unit.

It takes a crew of about 12 to do the job right.

First, the cattle are herded into a large pen. Then the calves are separated from the adults. The grown-up cows don't need to be branded because they got their brands when they were babies.

Then one by one the calves are roped and

dragged away from the herd for the branding. Two or three cowboys will hold the calf down while another gets the honors of making the brand. The branding irons are heated in a small stove fueled by propane.

The metal reaches red-hot temperatures and the burning hair makes a lot of smoke.

After a calf is branded, it stands up and goes about its business as if nothing happened. On the Chisum Ranch, each calf was given a shot of an antibiotic.

The process moves along very quickly and it probably takes only about an hour to brand 30 cattle.

The cowboys, young and older, work together as a team without anybody needing to bark orders.

It seems that once a cowboy, always a cowboy.

A.D. Read, 72, who was working on the Chisum Ranch on Wednesday, said he's been working on a ranch for 60 years.

"He doesn't get to retire," Chisum joked.

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

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Bouncin' Around My first overseas trip

Way back in the late 1960s, I decided to take my first-ever overseas trip so I visited our local travel agency for guidance.

This was well before a person could sit down at a computer or use a cell phone to plan a vacation. The travel agent was very helpful, and since I was a young, English-speaking single woman traveling alone, she suggested a trip to the British Isles, starting in Ireland and ending in London. Since part of my Heinz 57 family background is Irish, it was an easy decision. I handed over what seemed like a small fortune—\$350—which would cover my airfare from Chicago, and an 8-day tour with a private room. When I boarded my Aer Lingus flight in New York, I soon discovered that I was with a unique group of individuals—about twenty Irish Catholic priests and nuns! We had a great time talking and laughing, but I thought they were an odd tour group, as they were heading home.

When we landed at Shannon, Ireland at about eight in the morning, I soon found that there had been a mix-up in flight plans, and my tour group would actually be arriving about four hours later. When we finally all got together and were bused to our hotel, I was wide awake while the rest of the group opted for naps. I took a walk toward the town of Limerick, across the River Shannon, where I saw my first “real” shamrocks growing at the river’s edge. While the shamrock is not found exclusively in Ireland, the Irish made it popular. The next day we set off in our tour bus for what is known as the “Ring of Kerry.” The highlight of that trip for me was Killarney, which at that time was a quaint town with narrow streets and plenty of interesting little shops to visit. We were treated to a ride in a jaunting cart, which is a small one-horse wagon that seated six of us. That was our first experience with what the Irish call “a fine, soft day”—in other words, a gentle misty rain. The Irish like to say that it rains 300 days a year, but the sun also shines every day. From Killarney, we traveled to

Kilkenny and Cork, and the following day the big treat: Blarney Castle. People who know me now will find it hard to believe, but I used to be shy. When I had the opportunity to climb to the top of Blarney Castle and kiss the famous Blarney Stone, I practically ran up the stairs! It takes a bit of coordination, but you lie on your back on a rug, and grasp two iron bars that are set into the castle wall. You slide down backward holding the bars, and kiss the opposite wall. I may have overdone it a bit, as I wanted to be sure, and I smooched the slippery stone twice. With my new-found (I hoped) eloquence, I boarded the bus with the rest of the group, and returned to the hotel. That evening we attended a banquet in an Irish castle. The meal was delicious, and I enjoyed my first taste of Mead, kind of a fruity, spicy alcoholic drink. We were entertained by a harpist who accompanied performers who acted out some of the history of Ireland. Visits to Waterford, where the famous crystal is made, and Connemara were enjoyable, and we were finally in Dublin.

Colum McCann publishes short story

NEW YORK (AP) — Colum McCann, the prize-winning novelist, has rediscovered his fondness for short stories.

Best known for “Let the Great World Spin,” McCann has just released the story “Gone” through the online publisher and subscription service Byliner. It’s his first short story in a decade, he explained during a recent telephone interview, and he enjoyed the experience so much he wants to publish a book of stories.

“Part of it was that I was kind of exhausted after ‘Transatlantic’ and wanted to change the temperature and take some pressure off,” he says.

“Gone” is a dark and surprising tale about a translator and single mother, Rebecca Marcus, living on the west coast of Ireland with her 13-year-old son, Tomas, an adoptee from Russia who was born deaf. It’s the holiday season, and one morning Rebecca awakes and discovers Tomas is missing, along with the wetsuit she just gave him for Christmas. She alerts the police, and her ex-husband, and confronts questions about her life that will remain long after the search ends.

McCann, the father of three children, said he began the story with the idea

of a parent and son, but soon realized the boy would disappear. While awaiting news about Tomas, Rebecca thinks of a novella by an Arab-Israeli author that she translated, and how the book included a word “sh’khol,” which in Hebrew commonly refers to a parent who has lost a child.

“I suppose all your knowledge and all your subliminal fears and all your aches and pains go into the characters,” McCann says.

McCann, 49, says he chose to work with Byliner because he wanted to experiment with the digital format. He teaches fiction at Hunter College in Manhattan and wonders when a student, a “young James Joyce,” will come along “and revolutionize literature from within” by completing a story best told through the Internet.

The author acknowledges that he’s unlikely to pull that off himself. “Gone,” he observes, is more old-fashioned and straightforward than his longer fiction, more “plot-driven.” McCann also says he doesn’t read e-books. “For now, I still prefer turning the pages,” he says. “I’m on my computer all day long and I kind of like breaking away in the afternoon and sitting down to read a book.”



Having a venerable name can be a key to upward mobility

America used to be a land with great upward social mobility, but isn’t anymore.

America never was a land with great upward social mobility. Which do you believe? Keep in mind that your answer will have significant implications for public policy.

Most politicians, of both right and left, favor the first statement. Conservatives say big government is stifling people’s chances to move upward. Barack Obama says growing inequality of wealth is holding people down.

But Gregory Clark, British-born economist at the University of California, Davis, says they’re both wrong. The second statement is correct, he argues in his new book “The Son Also Rises: Surnames and the History of Social Mobility.”

The problem with previous studies of social mobility, Clark says, is that they measure differences in income, occupation or status across only one or two generations. They found considerable differences between parents and children, grandparents and grandchildren — something that looks almost like random flux.

Clark casts his net wider. He looks at mobility not across one or two genera-

tions, but across many. And he shows by focusing on surnames — i.e., last names — how families overrepresented in elite institutions continue to be so, though to diminishing degrees, not just for a few generations but over centuries.

Some surname data goes back a long way. In medieval England, people with Norman surnames (from the 1066 conquest) and surnames based on place names appear in disproportionate numbers as students at Oxford and Cambridge from 1170, as members of Parliament from 1259 and in upper class probate records from 1380.

Regression to mean — the fact that very tall people tend to have somewhat less tall children — reduces that overrepresentation over time. But through the industrial revolution, two world wars and institution of the welfare state, overrepresentation continues. Similarly, those from underperforming families, such as England’s travelers or gypsies, remain underrepresented.

Clark finds the same phenomenon in contemporary Sweden, with its generously redistributive welfare state, in Japan where those with samurai names continue to overachieve, in class-bound Chile and, even more so, in caste-bound India.

Clark’s analysis touches a tender spot in American debate, for the implication is that genetics — inherited intelligence — tends to determine social outcomes. He doesn’t quite say so, but

he rules out other explanations.

Many Americans resist that explanation, in the belief that the ignorant masses will use group differences in test scores as justification for racial discrimination. But other Americans understand that averages are only averages, and that group discrimination is irrational.

And when one shifts focus to personal experience, Clark’s findings make sense. Consider your own extended family or others with which you are familiar. There’s likely a range of physical differences and intellectual interests even between siblings and parents and children. But there are also patterns and resemblances, as you look back and forward a few generations.

And the differences between extended families will tend to be perpetuated by what social scientists call assortative mating — the tendency, perhaps more pronounced lately, of people to marry people with similar characteristics.

So is there anything to the notion of America as once a land of upward mobility? Yes. As Clark notes, immigrant groups have risen rapidly from restrictions in countries of origin, to success in America.

The Eastern European Jews who arrived in the Ellis Island years (1892-1914) are a spectacular example, and there are others. The group most disproportionately producing American physicians today, Clark

reveals, are Egyptian Coptic Christians.

And statistical predictability isn’t individual destiny. “Whatever success you do attain will still be achieved only through struggle, effort and initiative.”

Children from unprivileged households do sometimes achieve great success in this country, as in modern Sweden and even medieval England. The 44th president, like the 16th, is proof of that. Upward mobility is possible, even if not probable.

But readers may still be uncomfortable with the likelihood that, in Clark’s words, “a completely meritocratic society would most likely be one with limited social mobility.”

What to do about this? Clark recommends Scandinavian-style economic redistribution. But that may not work well in our more heterogeneous society.

Another approach is to affirm the dignity of honest work and modest success, to remember that, as George Eliot wrote, “the growing good of the world is partly dependent on unhistoric acts.” A society gains strength not just from its elites, but from the cumulative achievements of mostly ordinary individuals.

American equivalent of fifty British Pounds. About ten minutes later I was astonished when the clerk brought out a four-layer cake smothered in sweet whipped cream! I shared it with the tour group at lunch that day, and we left Ireland with good memories and a sweet taste.

would be living in the Texas Panhandle for about 10 years before settling down in Amarillo because his wife KiKi is from Gruver.

They wanted to eventually return to the area, where they are currently raising their three children, ages seven, five and three.

He started his practice at the Cardiology Center of Amarillo in 2011 after graduating from the University of Houston and completing medical school at the University of North Texas in Fort Worth. Before coming to the Top of Texas, he completed his medical residency and fellowship at Scott and White Memorial Hospital

in Temple and came here having six years of experience in interventional medicine and cardiology behind him.

Brabham's approach to cardiology is different from about 90 percent of cardiologists in the nation and perhaps even more in Amarillo, he said, as he uses radial catheterization, which means that he goes in through the wrist with the catheter whereas most other doctors insert it through the groin.

Brabham's approach is much more efficient in that there is less flat time and much less bleeding, he said. He uses this wrist-first procedure on all of his patients, not just those who specifically request it.

He did his first procedure in Pampa on Thursday morning. "It went beautifully and it was a

positive experience." As for plans for his future working in Pampa, he said that he would eventually like to start expanding on the specialty procedures he performs here, such as stents in open arteries without having to open the chest and being forced to do bypass surgery.

Brabham added that he likes the hardworking people of Pampa and enjoys that they are so proud of the town, services and care here.

He is confident in PRMC and the staff's ability to care for its patients and looks forward to expansion within the hospital as well as building a strong relationship with the new hospitalist and Dr. Kamnani to increase the availability of services and procedures to the community.

Day 16 – Saturday – garden of Gethsemane

Scripture: Matthew 26:36-46; Mark 14:32-42; Luke 22:39-46; John 18:1

When he had finished praying, Jesus went out as usual to the Mount of Olives, and his disciples followed him. They crossed the Kidron Valley. On the other side there was an olive grove called Gethsemane, and he and his disciples went into it.

Scripture: Matthew 26:47-56; Mark 14:43-52; Luke 22:47-54a; John 18:2-11

"While Jesus was still speaking, a crowd came up. The man who was called Judas, one of the Twelve, was leading them. Now Judas, who betrayed him, knew the place, because Jesus had often met there with his disciples. So Judas came to the grove, guiding a detachment of soldiers, and some officials, sent from the chief priests, Pharisees, teachers of the law, and elders of the people. Carrying torches and lanterns, a large crowd armed with swords and clubs was with him.

Jesus, knowing all that was going to happen to him, went out and asked them, "Who is it you want?"

"Jesus of Nazareth," they replied.

"I am he," Jesus said. (And Judas the traitor was standing there with them.) When Jesus said, "I am he," they drew back and fell to the ground. (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: During the daytime they were pretty much useless; at night outside the city, they were invaluable. With only moonlight to make their way into the night to arrest Jesus, the Roman soldiers and the Jewish leaders depended on torches.

It is strange how Jesus was the "light of the world" and yet the light of the night is what enabled His enemies to locate Him and arrest Him. They came with enough men to not only arrest Him, but to ward off any of His disciples who might put up a fight. It is kind of humorous that when they first walked up and Jesus identified Himself, His words caused them to stumble backwards and fall down. He just had to remind them who was actually in charge that night in the garden. And it wasn't them.

But that night while the torches flickered, Jesus' time arrived. It was the fullness of time that had been the main objective ever since the stable, even since the foundation of the world.

I remember when it was "my time," my time to surrender. It wasn't much like Jesus' time. He was much more of a man than I was. He gave Himself over to enemies, those who would hurt Him and even kill Him. And despite the suffering, He was totally faithful and saw it through to the end. When my time of surrender came it was to Jesus, my loving Savior, who only blessed me with mercy and grace. And one more thing is for sure, I have not always seen it through to the end. I have wandered, even strayed. I wish I was more like Him. This Lenten season of repentance gives me another opportunity to do just that, by the strength of the Holy Spirit.

Prayer: Holy Savior, nobody sees things through to the end as You do. I know I could do better, and not wander so much, or not stray off so often. I know I could. But I haven't and it is because all too often I try to live by my might according to my plan. Lord, I want to surrender to you. I know that to do that I have to live by Your might and Your plan. So that is what I want. I want Your plan, not my plan. I want to live each day by Your might, not mine. Please, help me. Amen.

Day 18 – Tuesday – a kiss

Scripture: Matthew 26:47-56; Mark 14:43-52; Luke 22:47-54a; John 18:2-11

Now the betrayer had ar-

ranged a signal with them: "The one I kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under guard." He approached Jesus at once to kiss him, but Jesus asked him, "Judas, are you betraying the Son of Man with a kiss?" Judas said, "Greetings, Rabbi!" and kissed him. (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: It was such an ordinary thing: a kiss. Even in our world today it is common, but in Jesus' world it was part of the everyday greeting between everyone, similar to our handshake. How could something so innocent and commonplace become the focus of one of the darkest events in human history?

Jesus had handpicked Judas over three years prior to that night in Gethsemane. He had received just as much of Jesus' time and attention as any of the twelve did, except Peter, James, and John. He was even appointed treasurer for the traveling band, no doubt by Jesus. So what was it?

With Judas it was the money. Jesus had hoped by putting him in charge of the money that they used for basic needs and to help the poor, that Judas would come around in his heart. But he did not. His greed, his lust for money, ended up being what led him over the cliff to destruction. If you recall from the 12th Day of Lent devotional, He betrayed and sold Jesus out for thirty pieces of silver.

Unbelievable! Judas put a price tag on Jesus and it was thirty silver coins; ten coins for each year Jesus had been his Shepherd, teacher, friend. That was the value of Jesus to Judas. Is it little wonder then that he chose something as personal as the holy kiss greeting to identify Jesus?

Surely he could have just pointed Him out to the soldiers. Why the kiss? Because it was so personal.

I just saw an article by a secular writer entitled: "The 10 Most Famous Kisses In All History." Want to guess what was number one? You guessed it, Judas' kiss of betrayal.

Years ago I too betrayed the Savior that I was introduced to as a child and followed as an adolescent. Then one day, praise God, the Holy Spirit came and stabbed me in the heart and the resulting conviction led me to repentance which led me to salvation. I can honestly say that I haven't betrayed Jesus since that day. But honesty demands that I ask if I have ever been ashamed of Him? Ever embarrassed to tell some-

one that I was a Christian? Ever been too uncomfortable to share the gospel of Jesus with someone? Ever too cowardly to speak up for what Jesus spoke up for? These may not be full scale betrayals, but they are betrayals nonetheless. May I never again be guilty of even a mini-betrayal.

Prayer: Oh, Prince of Peace, I yearn to kiss You one day when I see You face to face in our heavenly home that You have prepared. What a greeting that will be! You know me well enough to know that I will probably be in tears, but they won't be sad ones. So until that day, please help me never to be like Judas in any way. Lead me in the paths of faithfulness and most importantly let me die in the harness! Amen

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Ex-Odessa Permian teacher acquitted

ODESSA (AP) — A West Texas jury has acquitted a former teacher at a celebrated high school of having an improper relationship with a student.

The Ector County jury found former Odessa Permian High School math teacher Robert Young not

guilty Thursday of two improper relationship counts. The verdict came after a three-day trial in Odessa.

A conviction would have meant from two to 20 years in prison on each count.

The woman initially had told investigators that she and Young had engaged in

passionate kissing and petting in the spring of 2010. But the Odessa American reports she testified during the trial that they'd also had oral sex and he bought alcohol for her and pressed her for sex.

Young contended they had only been friends.

Media General to buy LIN in deal worth \$1.6B

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Media General is buying fellow TV broadcaster LIN Media in a deal worth about \$1.6 billion in cash and stock, the companies announced Friday. The combined company would own and operate or service 74 stations across 46 markets, reaching about 26.5 million households.

Media General said that it has offered about \$27.82 for each LIN Media share, representing an 87 percent premium over LIN's Thursday closing stock price. LIN shareholders will own about 36 percent of the combined company. Vincent Sadosky, LIN's president and CEO, will become president and CEO of the combined company. Media General Chairman J. Stewart Bryan III will continue to serve in that position. The company will take the name Media General and remain based in Richmond, Va.

The combined company's board will consist of 11 directors, seven of which will be picked by Media General and four of which will be selected by LIN. Sadosky will get one of LIN's four spots.

Under the agreement, which has been approved by the boards of both companies, LIN shareholders can receive either \$27.82 in cash or 1.5762 shares of stock in the combined company for each of their LIN shares. About \$763 million is available for the cash portion of the deal.

The deal also includes about \$968 million in assumed debt.

Shares of Austin, Texas-based LIN Media LLC jumped \$6.37, or 30 percent, to \$27.86 in morning trading on the news, while Media General Inc. shares rose \$1.73, or 10 percent, to \$19.07.

RBC Capital Markets has agreed to provide Media General with \$1.6 billion in financing for the deal.

Disability Reviews

Q: After a long process, I started getting disability benefits about a year ago. And now, out of the blue, I just got a letter from Social Security telling me they want to review my claim. I think this is harassment! It took me almost 12 months, and several appeals, to prove to them that I am disabled in the first place. And now they are turning around and threatening to take my money away from me! How can they do this? And can you please refer to me a good lawyer so I can fight this?

A: They (the Social Security Administration) can do this because the law requires them to do it. That law says that every Social Security disability claim must be reviewed from time to time to make sure that the person getting monthly checks from the government still meets the legal definition of disability.

How often a claim gets reviewed depends on the severity of the impair-

ment. In cases where the person's medical condition is expected to improve, the rules say the claim must be re-examined every 6 to 18 months. Obviously, your impairment must be in that category.

In situations where medical improvement is possible, but not probable, the claim should be reviewed every three years or so.

And even in cases where medical improvement is not expected, the law still requires that the case be reviewed once every five to seven years.

So the good news is that you must have a condition that shows every sign of improving, and you could be on your feet and off the government dole and back in the work force in the foreseeable future. But the tone of your email tells me you

don't see it this way. You obviously think you are still disabled and deserve to continue

receiving the benefits you are currently getting. So let me tell you what's going to happen.

You're going to have to fill out a form in which you will explain what your impairment is and how you believe it continues to keep you from returning to work. At the same time, you will be asked to provide updated medical reports. You very likely may be sent to a Social Security doctor for a medical examination. (See the next question and answer about this.) You certainly don't need a lawyer to deal with this first round of paperwork and possible medical exams.

Then a couple months later, you will either learn that your disability is still considered severe enough to merit continued monthly benefits. Or you will get a letter telling you that your condition has improved to the point where you no longer qualify for disability. That letter usually says your checks will stop in three months. If the latter happens, then you will immediately want to file an appeal. And it's at that point that you might want to start looking in the

Yellow Pages or searching online for lawyers who specialize in Social Security disability cases in your area. There are dozens of them in any large city.

Q: I filed for Social Security disability benefits about a month ago. I have severe back pain, fibromyalgia, high blood pressure, poor eyesight and other problems. As part of the application process, I provided them with enough doctors' reports, lab test results and other medical records to fill a small suitcase! Yet I just received a letter telling me they want me to go to one of their Social Security doctors. I don't want to do this because these guys are obviously employed by Social Security so they are in cahoots with the government. I've heard they are even paid more money for each disability claim they reject. Also, I don't have the money or insurance to pay for a visit to another doctor. Is there any way I can get out of this?

A: Well, you could get out of it by simply not showing up for your scheduled appointment. But then I could almost guarantee you your claim will be instantly denied.

Maybe I can alleviate your fears and obvious mistrust of this process. The reason these consultative examinations are

often needed is because Social Security law can be very specific about the kind of documentation needed to prove that a person is disabled. Your suitcase full of medical records may have lots of helpful information, but it may not have the precise evidence needed to make your case.

So that's why you are sent to a doctor. And you should understand that the medical professional you will be seeing isn't really a "Social Security doctor." The government doesn't employ doctors to do these medical exams. Instead, they simply ask that you go to a doctor in your area. This doctor is paid a small fee to examine you. The doctor fills out some forms and sends them to SSA. He or she is not involved in the final decision about your disability. And the doctor gets the same fee whether your claim is allowed or denied.

To answer your final concern, you will not have to pay for this medical exam. The government picks up all the costs. And they will even reimburse you for any transportation charges you might incur to get to the doctor's office.

Presidential jet getting repainted in Texas

FORT WORTH (AP) — A wide-body jet that serves as Air Force One when President Barack Obama is aboard has landed in North Texas for a paint job.

The iconic Boeing 747 that bears the words "United States of America" landed Thursday at Fort Worth Meacham (MEE'-chum) International Airport.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reports Leading Edge Aviation Services, Inc. will work on the jet with the tail number 28000.

Boeing spokeswoman Jennifer Hogan says the aircraft is completing a year-long heavy maintenance cycle and is in Fort Worth to be repainted. Hogan says the jet will be returned to presidential service after inspections and flight tests.

No schedule was provided for updating the jet's famed blue and white paint scheme.

Officials with Leading Edge Aviation Services on Friday referred questions back to Boeing.

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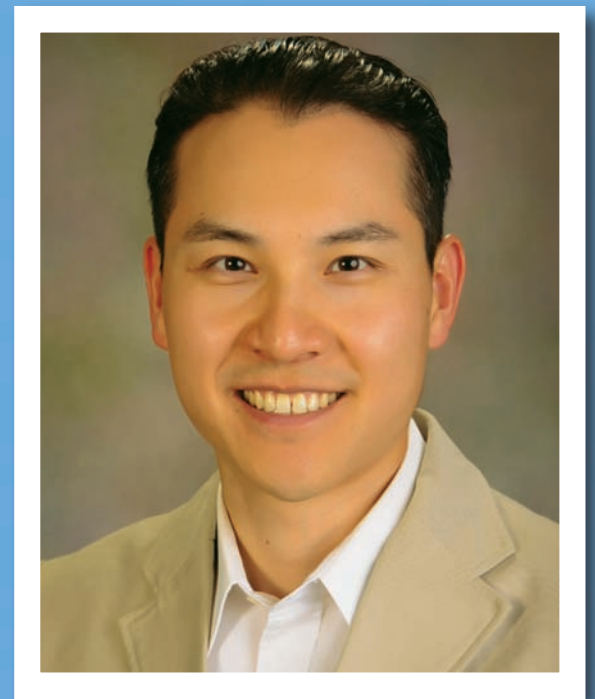

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AP Source: Texans close to trading Schaub

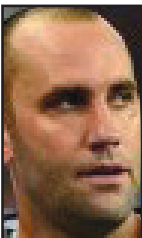
HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Texans are nearing a deal to trade quarterback Matt Schaub to the Oakland Raiders, two people familiar with the negotiations said Friday.

The people spoke to The Associated Press on the condition of anonymity because the deal was not yet complete. Schaub must still pass a physical in order to finalize the trade.

ESPN first reported the trade and said the Raiders would give up a late-round pick in this year's draft for Schaub.

Schaub was Houston's starter from 2007 until last season, when he was benched in favor of Case Keenum after a terrible start to the year. The Texans were expected to contend for a Super Bowl last season, but instead became the NFL's worst team, sinking to 2-14, which tied the worst record in franchise history.

It was clear after last season that Schaub didn't have a future in Houston, but his departure looked to be imminent on Thursday night when the Texans signed veteran quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick.

GREEN, WHITE CHECKERED

Johnson and Gordon should race well, but young Penske boys could spoil their homecoming.

After the second rain-delayed race of the season, NASCAR's stars head to the west coast to Fontana, Calif. for the Auto Club 400. Last year Joe Gibbs' Toyotas pulled out strong with Denny Hamlin winning the pole and Kyle Busch winning the race.

California boys Jeff Gordon and Jimmie Johnson have eight wins between them, with "Six-Time" having five of those wins. Matt Kenseth is another driver who could have a strong finish on the West Coast. He has three wins and has an average finish of 10th at the track.

Those are the drivers who have wins in the Golden State. Looking at the drivers who place high, there are three who have an average finish in the Top 10. Those are Carl Edwards (8.4), Jimmie Johnson (5.7) and Matt Kenseth (10.1). Ryan Newman may be one to look out for as he has eight Top 10s and four Top Fives.

It is hard to sleep on these three particular drivers right now: Dale Earnhardt Jr., Joey Logano and Brad Keselowski. Each are racing very well and could carry that momentum into Sunday's race. Dale Jr. had a step back last Sunday and

so did the Penske boys, but Bristol has that effect on drivers.

My picks for the race? Johnson, Logano and Kenseth.

Track Details

Autoclub Speedway is a two-mile D-shaped oval. It is 75-feet wide with a 15-foot apron. The turns have 14-degree banking with the 3,100-foot front stretch having 11-degree banking. The 2,500-foot back straightaway has 3-degree banking.

In what seems to be a pretty routine lap, drivers have plenty of time to think about their approaches on the straightaways heading into the turn.

Kyle Busch holds the record for fastest qualifying lap with a 38.2 second lap at an average speed of 188.24 mph in February of 2005.

Jeff Gordon has the fastest finish of a 500-mile race with 3:13:32 and an average speed of 155.012 mph almost 18 years ago on June 27, 1997.

Fun Facts

Three drivers have participated in all 24 races at Fontana, Jeff Burton, Jeff Gordon and Bobby Labonte. The youngest winner was a 19-year-old Kyle Busch in February of 2005. The oldest was

Rusty Wallace, who was 44 years old when he won in April of 2001. Hendrick Motorsports leads the series with nine wins at Fontana, followed by Roush Fenway Racing with seven and Stewart Hass Racing with two.

37 percent of the races have been won from a top-five starting spot. 54 percent has been won from a top-10 starting position. 29 percent have been won from a starting position outside of the top-20. Kenseth won from 31st in 2006.

When Johnson won in 2002, it was his first career win. Johnson is also the only driver to win consecutive races at Auto Club Speedway (Fall of 2009-Spring 2010). Jeff Gordon and Jimmie Johnson are the only drivers to win at Auto Club Speedway and the Spring Cup Championship. Gordon, once in 1997, Johnson, four times from 2007-10.

Only three car numbers have three or more wins, the 24-car (1997,1999 and 2004), the 17-car (2006,2007 and 2009) and the 48-car (2002, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2010).

Arizona State loses to Texas on buzzer-beater

MILWAUKEE (AP) — There was no way to plan for the two errant shots that doomed Arizona State, and that made the loss even more difficult for the Sun Devils.

Jordan Bachynski tried to get over to block Cameron Ridley's shot as the final seconds ticked off, but the big center banked it in as time expired to lift No. 7 seed Texas to an 87-85 victory over Arizona State in the NCAA tournament on Thursday night.

"It's a tough one, it's a tough way to end the game and end my career," said Bachynski, one of the premier shot blockers in the country.

Jonathan Holmes missed badly on a long 3-pointer for the Longhorns in the final seconds, but Ridley emerged from the scrum of hands and scored as the buzzer sounded. The call stood after a video replay, handing Texas its first tourney win since 2011.

"I went to the glass as hard as I could, and I tried to get it as hard as I could and it went in," Ridley said.

The 10th-seeded Sun Devils also had another bad break on a loose ball in the final minute.

NDSU, Harvard pull off 2nd-round stunners

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Not surprising, it was Tom Izzo and Michigan State that proved the only certainty on a chaotic opening day.

Two overtimes. Two upsets. And one crazy day in Spokane.

“It’s the tournament so everybody is going to bring their best punch,” San Diego State’s Dwayne Polle said.

Michigan State, the No. 4 seed in the East Region, provided the only blowout in the second-round with a 93-78 win over Delaware behind the career-best 41 points from Adreian Payne.

Surrounding the Spartans was chaos.

It started early with Harvard becoming the latest No. 12 seed to knock off a 5 seed with a 61-57 takedown of Cincinnati. The night session saw Oklahoma taken to overtime on a late 3-pointer, then dispatched in the extra session by 12th-seeded North Dakota State 80-75.

And what appeared to be a blowout in the making at halftime became far more uncomfortable than fourth-seeded San Diego State wanted. The Aztecs were pushed to overtime on a late 3-pointer by New Mexico State’s Kevin Aronis. San Diego state held on in overtime for a 73-69 win over the 13th-seeded Aggies.

“There’s so many good teams in the tournament, obviously not a lot of difference,” Oklahoma coach Lon Kruger said after the Sooners were bounced. “The depth and the quality of the depth is I think

as good as it’s ever been.”

Michigan State? They just did what every pundit in America expected them to do on their way to what many expect will be another Final Four appearance for Izzo. Led by Payne’s record performance, the Spartans overpowered the Blue Hens, adding credence to the idea that Michigan State was under-seeded from the start.

Delaware coach Monte Ross certainly felt that way after watching Payne put together one of the best tournament performances in the past 15 years.

“The shame of it was, in the whole spectrum of this whole thing, I thought that there were just two teams I just didn’t want to play because I just thought that they were playing at a high level and coaches were tournament tested and you weren’t going to sneak up on them or anything like that,” Ross said.

personal journey, I’d like to give you some statistics I read in “Golf Magazine.” Sergio Garcia is averaging 299 yards driving distance on the PGA Tour this year. Branden Grace hit a tee shot 383 yards at the recent Tour event at the Trump National Doral in Miami. So, if Garcia is playing a long 440 yard par 4 then all he has left after his tee shot is about 140 yards, while Grace has just over 50 yards to go. Is this the game you’re playing? On a 440 yard par 4,

what’s the length of your second shot? It’s an entirely different proposition, isn’t it? I suspect you’d have more fun if your second shot was a lot closer to the green. You’ve got a number of options. One is to go through a coaching and fitness program and learn how to hit the ball a lot farther. Another is to choose to play a game that gives you more fun on the second shot by playing from a tee that gives you a chance of being within 140 yards of the green.

Whichever route you choose, remember golf is meant to be fun. Contact us if you’d like to enjoy better golf this year.

Texas Motor Speedway unveils largest HD screen

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Talk about a Texas-sized TV.

Texas Motor Speedway unveiled the world’s largest high-definition video board Wednesday night, with the flip of a switch on a huge remote control setting off fireworks before the screen lit up with highlights from past races and events at the track.

“There’s nothing like attending live sporting events. This means you don’t miss a thing,” track president Eddie Gossage said. “To me, it’s an ultimate fan amenity, and also to have the biggest one in the world.”

Gossage said the screen — dubbed “Big Hoss TV” — lives up to the adage that everything is bigger in Texas.

The screen is 218 feet wide and about 95 feet high. It is about 125 feet above ground level in the middle of the backstretch at the 1½-mile track.

The screen measures 20,633 square feet, surpassing the size of a 200-foot by 85-foot board at Charlotte, another SMI track owned by Bruton Smith. Both video boards are a partnership with Panasonic.

About 8,000 people sat in the infield on a chilly night for the free public debut, which included showing of the new episode of “Duck Dynasty.”

The new title sponsor of the NASCAR Sprint Cup spring race at Texas is Duck Commander, the brand of best-selling duck calls and Robertson family-owned company featured on the popular A&E show. The race is April 6.

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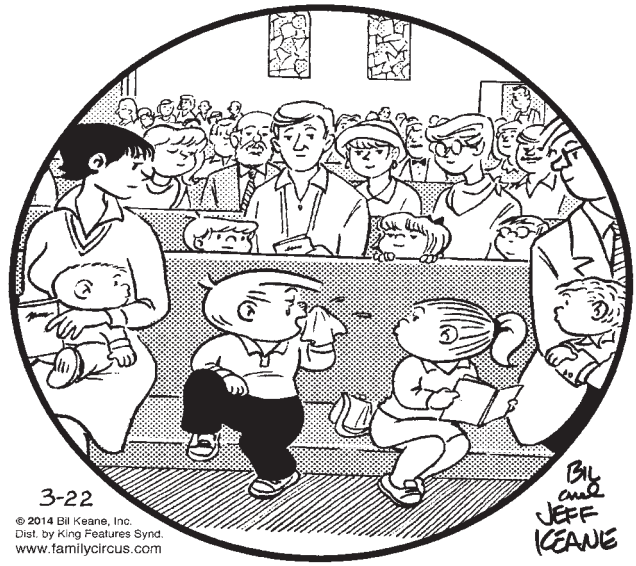
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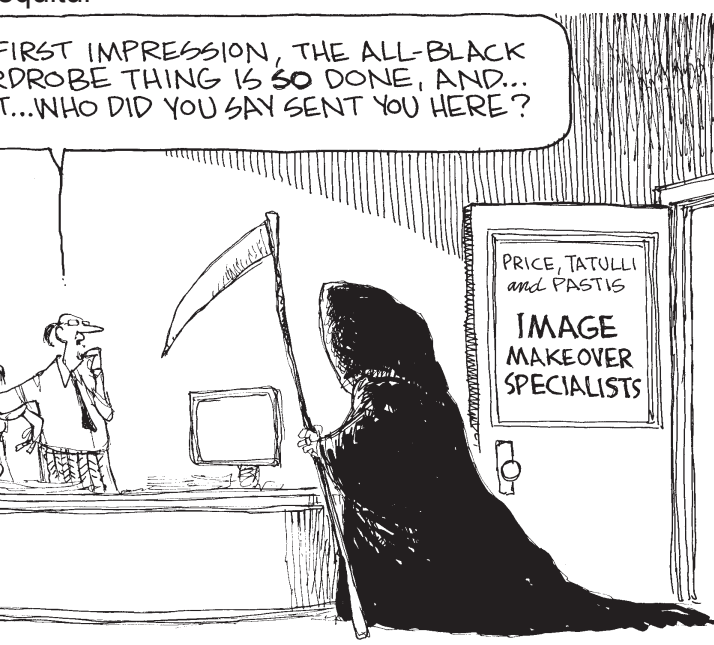

DEAR DROWNING: When a person is experiencing so much emotional pain that he (or she) is self-injuring, it's time to get professional help to deal with it.

Ideally, you should be able to talk to your parents about the depth and duration of your depression. But because you feel you can't, talk with a trusted teacher or counselor at school about it, or an adult relative you feel close enough to confide in. Cutting is not the answer because it only brings temporary relief from the issues you have that need resolving.

I care about you, and I'm glad you asked me this question. Please don't postpone following my advice.
