"Regardless of what I was doing for a living whether it was selling cell phones or working in sales, I kept myself involved in sports by working for the arena," Pepper said.

# A tale of 2 arson suspects

Lewis still awaiting trial 18 months after indictment; Jimenez, defense attorney requesting reduction in 'excessive' bond.

Eric Lewis, who in August 2012 was arrested for arson for setting on fire several vacant lots in Pampa, is still awaiting trial.

Lewis, 22, was indicted on Oct. 18, 2012 and released on a \$15,000 bond.

Eyewitnesses provided information to the Pampa Police Department that helped them capture Lewis.

Lewis was arrested on Aug. 13 after dispatchers received three calls on suspicious

> fires on East Foster Avenue. No one was injured in the

> His attorney, John Warner of Pampa, said he could not say where Lewis is living now because that would be a violation of his client's confidentiality.

Lewis' case will be tried in the 223rd District Court in Pampa.

Another man charged with committing arson in Pampa, Daniel Jimenez, 40, also is awaiting a trial in the 223rd District Court and is being represented by Warner.

Jimenez is accused of setting fire to a house owned by his ex-wife, Eva Jimenez, in the 200 block of South Nelson Street on Aug. 30, 2013.

He also is charged with burglary of a habitation for allegedly stealing

a computer from the home. He was indicted on Dec. 11 and his bonds were set at \$250,000 each for arson and bur-

glary. Jimenez is being held at the Gray County Jail. If released on bond, Jimenez is prohibited from contacting his ex-wife and must stay at least 300 yards away from her.

Warner believes the bonds are excessive and has asked the court for a habeas cor-





Liberals have developed a collective man crush on Pope Francis, even though he hasn't budged an inch on the church's teachings. The Catholic Church is just as "homophobic" as ever in its defense of marriage and just as "intolerant" as ever in its defense of human life. But Francis is cool.

It is a terrible indictment of our culture that what is deemed to be "cool" by the media becomes so important in our national discourse. "Coolness" elects presidents. Fox News personality Greg Gutfeld has a new book out called 'Not Cool: The Hipster Elite and Their War On

On Fox Business, Gutfeld explained, "You hear John McCain was a war hero. He was a prisoner of war, but he was an old white guy. That's not cool. So, you vote for the young, historically significant candidate, so that election I believe was based on making a cool choice."

And in 2012? "I think it happened again with Mitt Romney, who is a capable person. He was a governor, he was a businessman but he was boring and he's a Mormon. That's so boring and you want somebody edgy and interesting, and again, if you didn't vote for the cool person you could also be called a bigot."

If the closing weeks of the 2012 campaign were a coolness contest, Romney was not only routed; he surrendered. Every "cool" place Obama went, Romney didn't dare to go. For Obama, it was the softest of softballs for interviews. For Romney, every stop was a potential bear trap. Obama went to Nickel-

Politico reported some- odeon to be interviewed by liberal former TV news reporter Linda Ellerbee and children. Romney did not. Obama went on MTV to be interviewed by veejay Sway Calloway and college-age voters. Romney would not. Obama was fawned over by David Letterman. Time magazine described it as "pretty much like a stump speech with prompts from Letterman and commercial breaks." Romney, who knew Letterman hated him, did not. Obama was doing radio shows Romney wouldn't touch, like Miami's "Pimp With a Limp."

The result of a coolness gap? Obama beat McCain in the 18-to-29 demographic in the exit polls by 66-32 in 2008, and then thumped Romney 60-37 in 2012. This explains why, as Obamacare sinks, Obama's back on "The Ellen DeGeneres Show" and phoning in to Ryan Seacrest's radio program and exchanging quips on "Between Two Ferns" with comic actor Zach Galifianakis. It underlines the limited power of coolness: Young voters picked Obama and now reject signing up for Obamacare, when he really needs them.

The dignity of the office is in shambles. But man, the dude is cool.

Who is this "hipster elite" that manufactures cool? Gutfeld says it's a media-academic-government complex. They all come from college campuses and teach "what is cool is the subversion of the normal, the subversion of tradition. The great thing about their life is that they can tell you everything sucks that came before, without ever having to replace it. So they make fun of your parents, they make fun of religion, they make fun of actual work." They only like jobs where they just talk or "community organize."

One can imagine that young voters with rising health-care premiums and insane levels of college-loan debt might turn on Obama as time goes on. But that hipster elite packs a wallop of media power. They can't make socialism work, but they can make it sound awfully hip for a while.



# Pedophile: What does it mean and when should it be used?

How does one convey the proper use of a tired and overworked word to those who have the eyes and ears in the state of Texas? Women Against Registry, a national organization of wives, mothers, girlfriends, grand-mothers and other family members of registrants would like to make the media and ultimately the public aware of the effects that this misapplied term has on their families. Our families face many obstacles; Having our homes set on fire, our children beaten, signs placed in our yards, people driving by shouting obscenities, rude gestures, vehicles/ property damaged, asked to leave our churches and other organizations, children passed over for educational opportunities, flyers distributed around our neighborhoods, wives lose their jobs when someone learns they are married to a registrant and even murder by selfproclaimed heroes who more accurately are vigilante criminals. The media carries this message to the public who then contact their legislators to protect children from all

people harm. What is pedophilia?

Pedophilia is a diagnostic term utilized by the

psychiatric community to define a specific type of mental disorder. As such, the term had originally been intended to identify a clinical entity in a way that would both facilitate research and guide treatment. Although in the absence of treatment the condition can predispose illegal behaviors, in and of itself pedophilia is not inevitably associated with criminal misconduct. Nevertheless, nowadays the term has taken on an unintended meaning in society's collective consciousness — a demonizing pejorative that stigmatizes those manifesting the condition. To many in contemporary society, the term pedophilia connotes a criminal mind-set, rather than a mental disorder. (From the "American Journal Of Forensic Psychiatry, Volume 32, Issue 2, 2011.)

What does pedophile mean? A pedophile is a person who has a sustained sexual orientation toward children, generally aged 13 or younger. Not all pedophiles are child molesters (or vice versa). "Child molesters are defined by their acts; pedophiles are defined by their desires,' Blanchard says. "Some pedophiles refrain from sexually approaching any child for their entire lives."

But it's not clear how common that is. (Ray Blanchard, PhD, adjunct psychiatry professor at the University of Toronto.)

What is a sexual predator?

While the term "sexual predator" is sometimes used to describe anybody who obtains sexual contact via less-than-honest means, the term has a clear legal connotation, as well. Used to refer to both potential sex criminals and those who have a history of committing sexual crimes, the term is sometimes confusing to those outside law enforcement.

Who are the registrants?

According to the NC-MEC, as of December 2013 there were 769,402 men, women and children as young as 6 years old on the registry nationally with more being added at record-breaking rates. The increased growth of registrants is creating an impossible workload for law enforcement. The state of Texas makes up 78,869 of the above total registered citizens. The "sexual offenses" across the nation can range from urinating in public (indecent exposure), sexting, incest, mooning, exposure, false accusations by a soon-to-be ex-wife, angry girlfriend, spiteful students, viewing abusive/suggestive images of anyone 18 years old or younger, playing doctor, prostitution, solicitation, Romeo and Juliet consensual relationships, rape, endangering the welfare of a child and many others. More and more higher

tional. Women Against

Registry believes when a person has been convicted, paid their debt to society and are living a law-abiding life they should be allowed to move on and become a contributing, tax-paying


citizen. Kimberly DuBina, W.A.R. Director states, "According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics the recidivism (re-offense) rate for a new sexual offense is 5.3 percent BUT, the conviction rate is 3 percent."

Many law enforcement, child abuse task force personnel and even victims' right advocates are informing the public that 95 percent of sexual offenses occur within the family, their friends or those close to children which never get reported. Lawmakers have become increasingly fruitful when writing legislation built around a few high-profile crimes involving children.

It is clear from this review of recent policies enacted to protect communities from sexual violence that the proliferation of well-intentioned political efforts to curb sexual violence has led to the creation of laws lacking a solid evidence base. Although additional community-based studies are needed, research to date indicates after 15 years, laws have little impact on recidivism rates and the incidence of sexually based crimes. The most significantly noted impact

of these laws seems to be the numerous collateral consequences for communities, registered sex offenders (including a potential increased risk for recidivism), and their family members.

Dr. Jill Levenson, in the Collateral Damage Family of Registered Sex Offender Impact Study, said, "In contrast to the guidelines set forth by the Adam Walsh Act, evidence-based sex crime policies which employ empirically validated risk-assessment strategies would be more apt to accomplish goals of public safety and successful reintegration." W.A.R. has begun

"Pushing Back" on laws, restrictions and especially media fear-mongering which is annihilating our families.

Vicki Henry, president, says, "Each time the media misuses the word pedophile it diminishes a registrant family's chance of successful reintegration." She went on to say, "We are concerned about all children and are actively collaborating with other organizations on prevention messages and programs."

We are at a tipping point where reason must be applied to this runaway train of laws that are demolishing everything in its path.

Derek Holland starts the year on the 60-day disabled list (DL) after having a freak accident at home, in which his dog tripped him on the stairs and the fall required surgery on his knee. 2013 was Holland's best year in his career. He went 10-9 with a 3.42 ERA and struck out 189 batters. When healthy he is the Rangers number two starter. He will be sorely missed.

It would not be so bad for the Rangers if Holland was their only injured pitcher. But he's not. The staff ace, Yu Darvish was placed on the 15-day DL Sunday as he recovers from a neck injury. He is slated to return from the DL, this Sunday, which is good news for the Rangers. At times last year Darvish was unhittable with a 2.83 ERA, he was 13-9 and struck out a whopping 277

Matt Harrison also starts the year on the 15-day DL while recovering from back surgery. Harrison missed nearly all of 2013 with the same injury. In 2012 he won 18 games for the Rangers.

Monday, it was very apparent that the pitching injuries are going to be a problem for the Rangers until they all get healthy. Tanner Scheppers made his first career start and it showed. He allowed seven runs, all of them were earned. The bullpen did not fare any better as they gave up seven more earned

Now there are even more injuries, let's focus on the batters. Infielder Jurickson Profar is recovering from a torn shoulder muscle and will begin the year on the 15day DL. Profar is expected to fill the void by the loss of Ian Kinsler.

Catcher Geovany Soto starts the season on the 60day DL as he continues to recover from surgery on his right knee.

Phew! That was a doozy. And we are in April! Most MLB teams struggle to stay healthy in the dog days of summer in June and July, but the Rangers are suffering a year's worth of injuries






