Stories of the Panhandle

Pampa storytellers featured in public broadcast station's oral history project.

Everyone has a story to tell.

It could be your first kiss, a dedicated teacher who never spared the rod when you got out of line, shelling peas on the back porch with grandma or that monster tornado that ripped through the town yet amazingly didn't kill a single person.

Since September, Panhandle PBS, the public broadcasting television station based at Amarillo College, has been gathering stories on video from residents in Panhandle and posting clips on its web page.

The project started at the Lovett Memorial Library where several residents, including Pampa residents Zip Hall, Dennis Palmitier and Jo Schrader not only recalled events from their childhoods but also spoke

on why they love living in this dusty. windy little town in the Texas Panhandle.

Palmitier said he's lived in big cities and traveled the country, but there is no place he'd rather live than the Panhandle.

One of the things Hall talked about was going to the rodeos when she was a kid. She also talked about the dust storms.

Another Pampan, Leslie Howard, said when Pampans jump into something, they jump into it with their whole hearts.

"When a new store opens people line up for three days," she said.

Two staff members of Panhandle PBS, Community Engagement Specialist Cullen Lutz and Development Director Lynne Groom, gave an overview of the project at Wednesday's weekly Rotary Club meeting.

'We want to collect, preserve and educate on what it means to live in the Panhandle," Lutz said.

With special video equipment, that the women called "a traveling kit," a PBS crew travels from city to city to record local residents as they tell their stories in a public space such as courthouse or library. The videos are shot in front of a generic back-

At the end of each interview, the TV crew burns a DVD that the storyteller can take home with him or her.

Select stories will be broadcast on the air, Lutz said.

Along with Pampa, stories have been recorded in Canyon, Amarillo, Tulia, Dumas, Stratford and Her-Next on the list is Clarendon and

Spearman, with more communities to follow. All of the videos will be archived

at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon.

Groom said inspiration for Panhandle Stories came from National Public Radio's StoryCorps, where an NPR crew travels the country to gather stories for radio broadcast, and Ken Burns' PBS documentaries

Commission approves

The Pampa City Commission met Tuesday and approved on second reading an ordinance that amended the zoning on the lot located at 312 N. Sumner Ave. Originally zoned residential, lot owner James Kephart made a request that the zoning be changed to commercial with the approval of the city's planning and zoning commission.

The Commissioners also approved a resolution to authorize the city's participation in the Panhandle Region (Texas State Planning Region 1) Regional Mutual Aid Agreement, which provides for the sharing of disaster assistance among the localities of the region as needed and available, to afford all residents of the Panhandle a greater degree of protection. The mayor was designated to serve as the city's chief representative in all matters pertaining to the city's participation in the agreement.

In other business, the Commissioners approved the minutes from their March 25 meeting and excused the absence of Robert Dixon from that same meeting.

Dixon was absent from Tuesday's meeting. The Pampa City Commission meets at 4 p.m. on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month on the second floor of City Hall, 200 W. Foster Ave.



After Democrats and education advocates said Abbott's policy opened the door to standardized testing for pre-K students, the Abbott campaign said Tuesday the language in the attorney general's proposal would not amount to standardized exams for 4-year-olds.

"Suggestions to the contrary are absurd," spokesman Matt Hirsch said in a

Such a plan would probafter a legislative session during which lawmakers in both parties scrambled to scale back state testing in response to widespread outcry from parents and educators. Abbott's Democratic opponent, state Sen. Wendy Davis, highlighted legislative changes during a rally Monday in

Houston when she attacked Abbott over what she said was a new testing mandate.

"At a time when parents and teachers are calling out for relief from the burden of over-testing, Greg Abbott calls for more — subjecting 4-year-olds to another intrusive, state-mandated requirement," said Davis, who opposes standardized tests for pre-K students.

Davis, who filibustered 2011 state budget cuts to public schools, has attempted to make her support of education a key factor in the governor's race. Her own early education

Washington, DC — Texas's Tax Freedom Day, the day on which Texans have collectively earned enough income to pay off their total federal, state, and local tax bill, will arrive on April 13 this year, making it the 18th state to reach Tax Freedom

According to the annual report released this morn-

Tax Freedom Days are Louisiana (Mar 30), Mississippi (Apr 2), and South Dakota (Apr 4). The latest dates fall in New Jersey (May 9), Connecticut (May 9), and New York (May 4).

Dr. Wil Beck

Our Lord needed a doctor in Heaven and called Wil to be with him on Friday, March 7, 2014. For her family and friends, she was so much more than a great doctor. She will

be missed. Memorial services will be at 11 a.m. Saturday, April 12, 2014, at First Presbyterian Church, with Dr. Edwin Cooley, former pastor, Rev. Jim Friedewald, pastor, and Nancy Ruff, commissioned lay pastor, officiating. Arrangements are under the direction of Carmichael-Whatley Funeral Direc-Dr. Wilhelmina Paula "Wil" von

Wolzogen Kuhr Beck was born April 13, 1924 in Bandung, Dutch East Indies **Beck** as the youngest child and only daughter of Jules Emile Antoine von Wolzogen

Kuhr and Catharina van Katwijk. She went two years to the elementary school in Bandung and continued her education in Holland after her father retired and the family repatriated to Holland in 1934 when she was 10 years old. On their way to Holland, the Kuhrs stopped by to see their family, the van Katwijk's (Catharina's brother, Paul), in Dallas. That's where Wil met Uncle Paul's nephew, Curt Buxton Beck.

She went to high school in The Hague, graduating in 1942 after which she enrolled in the Medical Faculty of the Rijks University in Amsterdam. However her studies were interrupted after three months following the German invasion and occupation of the Netherlands. In 1945 she resumed her studies at the Rijks University in Utrecht and graduated with a medical degree in 1950 followed by her internships in 1952. She was a resident in the Children's Clinic in Amsterdam and accepted a job with the Amsterdam Health Department in 1954 and worked as a school physician.

In 1957 she married Curt Buxton Beck and settled in Pampa. This was followed by the birth of their three children: Curt Emile (1958), Anna Catherine (1960) and Paul Buxton (1962).

When Paul started school in Pampa, she started work on getting her Texas medical license. She obtained this in 1970 and joined the Pampa Clinic's Drs. Bellamy and Brown in Family Practice. Wil was the first woman doctor in Pampa. After Dr. Brown died and Dr. Bellamy retired she continued in solo practice, keeping many of the clinic's industrial accounts. In 1978, she served the newly created Hospice of Pampa, later named Hospice of the Panhandle as volunteer medical director.

She closed her medical practice in 1990, but kept her position with hospice until after the merger with BSA. For many years, she was Gray County Health Officer and a Local Medical Consultant for the Texas Rehabilitation Commission. She was on the medical staff of the Worley Hospital, Highland General Hospital, and later, the Coronado Wil's active professional memberships included the

AMA, TMA, AAFP, TAFP, Top o' Texas Medical Society, American Academy of Palliative and Hospice Medicine and the American Humane Society. For many years, she served as a Cub Scout Den Mother and a Girl Scout Brownie leader – both activities she loved. She served on the Board of Columbia Medical Center in Pampa and the Board of the Community Concert Association, the Samaritan Counseling

Service's Satellite Center, St. Matthew's School, and was a member of Twentieth Century Allegro Study Club among many other civic organizations. Additionally, she was always supportive of Curt's many civic activities throughout their 54 years of marriage.

Wil's greatest love, outside of her husband, children, and grandchildren were her pets. Too many to name, but they ranged from her most beloved horses and dogs, to cats, parrots, rats, and even an alligator. She loved animals and has many waiting for her at the Rainbow Bridge. There are many people in Pampa who will fondly remember Wil riding her horse out by the Kelly Corral.

Wil is survived by her three children: Curt and his wife Rhenalea and their three children, Kelsi (26), Austen (24), and Kaylen (22); Anna and her husband Kelly and her children Erin (23) and Sara (21) and stepchildren Carly (24) and Taylor (18); and Paul and his wife Carol and their children Gregory (19), Steven (17), Catie (12) and Jessie (10).

Over the past years, Wil has received very special and loving care from a number of caregivers. Her family would like to express their deepest appreciation to LaVern Fulton, Kandy Soliz, Rolanda Bowman, Brandi Soliz, Natalie Santacruz, Sherry Bolch, Tommy Henson and Jim Sinyard.



Better yet, I could do some good for the world. For the same money I waste on Bob, I could pay four kids' tuition at a Catholic high school.

The tax code is now complex enough that most Americans now hire Bob, or his equivalent. Instead of inventing things, doing charity work or just having fun, we waste weeks (and billions of dollars) on tax preparation.

And we change our lives to suit the wishes of politicians.

"What the tax code is doing is trying to choose our values for us," complains Yaron Brook from the Ayn Rand Institute. I think I choose my own values, but it's true that politicians use taxes to manipulate us. Milliondollar mortgage deductions steer us to buy bigger houses, and solar tax credits persuaded me to put solar panels on my roof. Brook objects to every manipulation in the code: "It's telling us charity is good!"

On my TV show, I respond: But charity is good! Brook retorts, "If you want to give to charity, great, (but) I might invest in a business that's more important."

That's possible, but since a charity will probably spend the money better than government will, isn't it good that the code encourages people to give? Steve Forbes argues that if taxes were flat and simple, Ameri-

cans would give more. "Americans don't need to be bribed to give ... In the 1980s, when the top rate got cut from 70 down to 28 percent ... charitable giving went up. When people have more, they give more."

While freedom lovers complain about the byzantine complexity of the tax code, the politically connected tout their special breaks. The National Association of Realtors runs TV ads showing Uncle Sam offering first-time homebuyers an \$8,000 tax break, while sleazily winking at the

The tax code oddity that may have the most destructive influence on America might be the fact that if you buy private health insurance, you pay more tax than if your employer buys you a plan.

It's why we ended up with a sluggish health care market unresponsive to individual desires – leading to the insistence that we need a government-managed alternative like Obamacare.

The code is incomprehensible. You can get a deduction for feeding feral cats but not for having a watchdog, for clarinet lessons if your orthodontist thinks it'll cure your overbite but not for piano lessons a psychotherapist prescribes for relaxation. It seems so arbitrary.

In the marketplace, individuals shop around for the most efficient, low-cost way of getting services they really want. Every time tax rules nudge us in a chosen direction, they preempt the market's signals.

Government gets moralistic about it, too, placing "sin taxes" on items like cigarettes and fat, plus luxury items like yachts that some find decadent. It's gone on for centuries. American colonists seem libertarian by today's standards, but they put extra taxes on snuff and "conspicuous displays of clothing."

That's one thing the Founders did that we shouldn't copy — but their otherwise rebellious attitude toward taxation is one that we should emulate. America suffers when government turns taxes into a manipulative maze.

On our highest court, a former lobbyist guts campaign finance reform

For a large and bipartisan majority of Americans, the increasing power of money

in politics is deeply troubling. But not for the conservative majority of the United States Supreme Court, whose members

appear to regard the dollar's domination of democracy as an inevitable consequence of constitutional freedom and anyway, not a matter of grave concern. Expressed in their decisions on campaign finance, which continued last week to dismantle decades of reform in the Mc-Cutcheon case, the court's right wing sees little risk of corruption and little need to regulate the flamboyant

spending of billionaires. Based on the behavior of certain conservative justices, such as Antonin Scalia, Clarence Thomas, and Samuel Alito — who flout the rules that govern partisan behavior among lowercourt judges — it is easy to regard their rulings as partisan cynicism. But there is also an element of willful naivete when the conservatives claim, for instance, that influence-seeking donations will be exposed by the instant transparency of publication on the Internet. Any reporter who has covered elections can attest that

there are dozens of ways

for wealthy donors to avoid public scrutiny until it is

much too late to matter. But if right-wingers like Scalia and Thomas are simply pursuing ideological objectives, what about Anthony Kennedy, the Ronald Reagan appointee from California who is sometimes viewed as a moderating influence and a "swing vote"? On the issue of campaign finance, Kennedy has marched along with the majority, seeming just as fervent in his urge to destroy every regulation and protection against the "malefactors of great wealth" erected since the days of Theodore

Roosevelt. It was Kennedy who wrote the majority opinion in Citizens United, which dismissed the notion that corruption will arise from unlimited political campaign contributions because all such money will be disclosed. "Citizens can see whether elected officials are 'in the pocket' of so-called moneyed interests ... and disclosure permits citizens and shareholders to react to the speech of corporate entities in a proper way," he wrote. "This transparency enables the electorate to make informed decisions and give proper weight to different speakers and messages.' Yet if any Supreme Court

justice knows how ridiculous that sounds, it must be Kennedy — whose own background as a corporate lobbyist and son of a lobbyist has been forgotten in nearly three decades since his Senate confirmation in

Yes, Kennedy was a respected appellate court judge before Reagan appointed him to the high court. But before that, he grew up and then worked as an attorney in Sacramento, Calif., where his father became a "legendary" lobbyist in a state capital renowned as "freewheeling" (a polite term that means "routinely corrupt"). His father, Anthony "Bud" Kennedy, was a backslapping, hard-drinking partner in a powerful lobbying law firm run by one Arthur "Artie" Samish, "the "secret boss of California" who finally went to prison on tax charges in the mid-1950s, while young Tony was studying to enter law school. Samish liked to brag that he had amassed more power than anyone else in the state, including the governor, that he could buy any legislator with "a baked potato, a bottle, or a broad," and that he could "unelect" any lawmaker who didn't vote his way. The major clients of

Samish and Kennedy were racing, entertainment and liquor interests, notably Schenley Industries, then owned and run by J. Edgar Hoover's mobbed-up pal Lewis Rosenstiel. When Bud Kennedy died suddenly in 1963, young Tony was only two years out of law school. But he went into the family business and inherited his late father's clientele.

While Kennedy always insisted that lobbying was only a "sideline" in his law practice, his billings were substantial — the equivalent of hundreds of thousands or more in today's dollars. In 1974, he pushed through a bill for Capitol Records that saved the company (and cost the state) millions in sales taxes.

How did he do it? The same way that special interests work their will today — by doling out huge wads of cash to lawmakers on behalf of his clients. The single largest recipient of Kennedy lobbying largesse, according to the Los Angeles Times, was a legislator who introduced a bill to benefit the opticians lobby that Kennedy himself had drafted (it passed). He gave that guy alone about \$6,500 in campaign contributions over six years, or roughly \$40,000 in today's dollars.

So if anybody on the court knows how the political and legislative process is greased in this country, that would be Justice Kennedy. After all, he was reared in the game. And it shouldn't deceive anyone when he sounds as if he doesn't understand how things work or who wins in that perverse process — and how everyone else loses.


