

Extension granted to Skinner attorneys

■ Defense team now has until May 30 to submit findings from hearing transcripts.

A deadline extension requested by Hank Skinner's defense attorneys to submit their findings from the transcripts of an evidentiary

hearing has been approved by the Texas Attorney General's Office.

The defense attorneys were awaiting some exhibits from the court, and an employee with their office verified Monday that they have received the

Judge Steven Emmert of the 31st District signed the order on Friday. The hearing was held at the Gray County Courthouse on Feb. 3

The AG's office also must submit its finding from the two-day hearing in which both sides presented evidence from recent DNA tests of

crime scene evidence. Skinner was sentenced to death for the brutal murders of Pampa resident Twila Busby and her

two adult sons on New Year's Day 1993. His execution was stayed in 2010 by the U.S. Supreme Court and again in 2011 by the Texas

Court of Criminal Appeals. If Emmert makes a ruling favorable to Skinner, the convicted murderer's attorneys could

seek an appeal. Emmert does not have a deadline to file his decision. Skinner's original attorney, Harold Comer of Pampa, did not seek DNA testing at the time of

his original trial, partly out of his concern that

the results would have implicated his client. Robinson and Owen claim new DNA test results support the inference that Busby's uncle, Robert Donnell, who made sexual advances to Busby on the night of the killings, committed the crimes and not Skinner. They believe if this evidence had been presented at the original trial, their client may not have been convicted.

The AG's office maintains that DNA and crime scene evidence overwhelmingly point to Skinner as the killer.

Clark added there will not be a significant difference related to capacity, as both Baten and Roach have around 420 beds.

Thousands run **Boston Marathon**

BOSTON (AP) — Under heavy security that included a battery of surveillance cameras and police officers on rooftops, nearly 36,000 runners hit the streets Monday in the first Boston Marathon since last year's deadly bombing, sending a powerful message of resilience.

In what some saw as altogether fitting, an American won the men's division for he said. "I feel very safe." the first time in more than 30 years, dominating a field that of South Boston, was runwere prevented from completing the race last year.

"I showed up, I'm back, and I am going to finish what I didn't finish last year," said Mary Cunningham, 50, of finish line by the explosions on April 15, 2013.

The two pressure-cooker the end of the 26.2-mile course killed three people and wounded more than 260 in a hellish spectacle of torn limbs, smoke and broken glass.

This year, police were deployed in force along the lines. route, with helicopters circling above and bomb-sniffing dogs checking trash cans.

A total of 35,755 athletes were registered to run, the second-largest field in its history, with many coming to show support for the city and its signature sporting event. "Boston Strong" — the unofficial slogan adopted after the terrorist attack — was everywhere.

"I think I'm going to start crying at the starting line, and I'm not sure I'll stop until I cross the finish line," said Katie O'Donnell, a doctor at Children's Hospital who was stopped less than a mile from the end last year.

At 2:49 p.m., the time the bombs went off, spectators observed a moment of silence at the finish line. It was followed by some of the loudest cheers of the day as people whooped, clapped and rang cowbells.

Joe Ebert, of Hampton, N.H., was cheering on his son-in-law near the spot in downtown Boston where the bombs went off. He was there last year, too.

"Just wanted to let them know that they can't beat us down. I think it makes us all stronger when something like that happens," he said.

Also among the spectators near the finish line was Jeff Bauman, who lost his legs in the bombing. It was the first time he had returned to the area since the attack.

Police along the route examined backpacks, particularly outside subway station exits. And runners had to use clear plastic bags for their belongings.

More than 100 cameras were installed along the course in Boston, and race organizers said 50 or so observation points would be set up around the finish line to monitor the crowd.

Runner Scott Weisberg, 44, from Birmingham, Ala., said he had trouble sleeping the night before.

With everything that happened last year, I can't stop worrying about it happening again. I know the chances are slim to none, but I can't help having a nervous pit in my stomach," Weisberg said.

Race organizers expanded the field from its recent cap of 27,000 to make room for more than 5,000 runners who were still on the course last year at the time of the explosions, for friends and relatives of the victims, and for those who made the case that they were "profoundly impacted" by the attack.



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

Sam Pirozzolo, of Staten commercial experience and Island, whose fifth-grader encountered the Nike question, said there was apparently no reason for such a specific brand.

"I'm sure they could have used a historical figure who took risks and invented things," Pirozzolo said. "I'm sure they could have found something other than Nike to express their point."

Deborah Poppe, of West Hempstead, Long Island, said her eighth-grade son was similarly puzzled by a question, which drew complaints for a second straight year, about a busboy who failed to clean some spilled root beer — Mug Root Beer, to be exact, a registered trademark of PepsiCo.

"Why are they trying to sell me something during the test?" she quoted her son as saying. "He's bright enough to realize that it was almost like a commercial."

The use of brand names was one of several complaints raised by some educators and parents about the statewide tests, aligned to the Common Core standards intended to increase academic rigor. Some contend they are too difficult and don't measure what students are actually learning.

While such general complaints about Common Core tests have arisen elsewhere, advocates said the prevalence of brand names appears to be specific to New

Representatives of the New York State Education Department and Pearson, the education publishing giant with a \$32 million fiveyear contract to develop New York's tests, said the companies did not pay for the exposure.

"There are no product placement deals between us, Pearson or anyone else," said Tom Dunn, an Education Department spokes-"No deals No money We use authentic texts. If the author chose to use a brand name in the original, we don't edit.'

Pearson spokeswoman Stacy Skelly said neither the company nor the education department received any compensation for the mentions. And if any brand comes up in a passage, she said, "the trademark symbol is included in order to follow rights and permission laws

and procedures."

Nike and Wrigley, the maker of Life Savers, said they were unaware they were mentioned on the tests. Other companies declined to comment or did not return messages.

Some advertising experts said the idea of product placement on a test is inappropriate and fraught with peril.

"If any brand did try to place there, what they would lose from the outrage would surely trump any exposure they got," said Michal Ann Strahilevitz, a marketing professor at Golden Gate University.

Kelly O'Keefe, a marketing professor at Virginia Commonwealth University, said he is a fan of brands, but there are places where they don't belong.


"Education, religion and civic life are places where brands are unwelcome," O'Keefe said. "It would be wise for Pearson to avoid using brands in their testing even if they're not paid for by the brand itself."

Others endorsed the position of New York state educators — that brand names belong on the tests because they are part of the world students inhabit.



Palestinians meet in Gaza for reconciliation talks


GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — A senior Hamas leader based in Egypt is in Gaza for talks aimed at reaching a reconciliation agreement between the two rival Palestinian groups, Hamas and Fatah.

Moussa Abu Marzouk is meeting Hamas leaders in Gaza on Monday ahead of a visit by Fatah officials on Tuesday. Hamas freed 10 Fatah prisoners before the meetings as a good-will

Palestinians have been divided since 2007 when Hamas took control of the Gaza Strip from forces loyal to Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas of Fatah. Since then, Hamas has ruled Gaza while Abbas governs some areas in the West Bank.

Past reconciliation attempts have failed.

It was unusual for Cairo to allow the visit since Egypt is cracking down on the Muslim Brotherhood group, of which Hamas is an offshoot.
