White Deer voters to decide on alcohol sales



City election is May 10.

Driving through White Deer to or from Amarillo, the only reason to stop would be to buy gas or a soft drink at the Allsup's convenience store.

Though the city did have a couple restaurants in the past, they have all closed. Only a handful of the businesses that once thrived on Main Street remain open.

That could all change on May 10,

when voters in White Deer will decide whether to allow the sale of alcohol within city limits.

Similar to a petition drive last year in Pampa that placed a proposition on Pampa's election ballot to allow mixed drink sales, there were enough registered voters in White Deer who signed a petition to place a proposition on the ballot there to permit the sale of all alcoholic beverages beer, wine and hard liquor.

Jayson Smith, mayor of White Deer, said he supports the proposition "150 percent." Then he quipped, "I'd support it 200 percent but I don't drink."

Smith said the proposition isn't about whether he drinks or not, but about growth in White Deer, which has a population of only 1,000.

"It will help to generate more money to keep from raising our residential taxes," he said.

Smith was elected in 2012, and there are two city council seats up for vote in the upcoming city election, he said.

Smith said he believes the vote on

DPS reminds drivers of online license renewal

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is encouraging residents to beat the summer rush at driver license offices across the state by renewing their license or identification card early or online. The summer months are typically one of the busiest

times of year at driver license offices, and many eligible Texans can skip the trip to the office completely via online renewal of their license, identification card or change of address at Texas.gov.

"With students and families out of school or off work, Texas driver license offices tend to be especially busy during the summer months," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Many Texans are eligible to take

Brazos watermaster hotly contested

For decades, water wars have been rare in East Texas, where annual rainfall can be twice that of West Texas. But as drought keeps its grip on the entire state, the Brazos River is bucking that trend, forcing regulators to scrutinize its users in ways that could have implications for many in-demand Texas waterways.

The Brazos' lower basin, which flows from west of Fort Worth through Waco and down to the Gulf Coast, has been the subject of some of the most contentious water fights of the last few years. In response, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality decided last week to appoint a watermaster to the lower Brazos basin — an overseer who will interact daily with river users like farmers and manufacturers and require them to report their water use in real time.

While watermasters are meant to help prevent usage disputes, the debate over this regulatory scheme has only deepened divisions on the Brazos. Dow Chemical,





When it comes to public penance for personal wrongdoing, no politician has ever rivaled the genuine character of John Profumo, the British secretary of war who consciously lied to the House of Commons by testifying that there had been no impropriety in his relations with a woman named Christine Keeler. The problem was not just that the married Profumo had been sleeping for two years with Keeler, but that Keeler, at the height of the Cold War, was simultaneously sleeping with the Soviet naval attache in London. The scandal ended Profumo's then-promising career and helped to bring down Harold Macmillan's Conservative government. The next 40 years were one long act of personal contrition. The well-born Profumo worked with and for the poor. For four decades at Toynbee Hall, a refuge for the disadvantaged in East London, he was out of public sight. He washed dishes. He cleaned and scrubbed toilets. He helped feed the hungry. He visited prisoners in jail. He raised money to train youth. He used his remaining connections in Parliament to win greater support for housing and schools. And he never once, in all that time, had a press conference or a "media team" to tell us the good he had done or how much he had changed. That, Dear Readers, is called character.

Museum Musings The story of the Rider family

James C. "Jim" Rider of Parker County and Issadore (I-sa-dore) Frances Crawford of Palo Pinto County



were married in 1888. About the time their son, Larry, was born in 1890, Rider bought a ranch near present day Lefors and stocked it with cattle.

He lived in a dugout until a house, consisting of a central hall with two rooms on

each side, could be built. When the house was finally finished in 1893, Rider sent for his wife and son. He met them at Clarendon and they rode in a hack to their new home.

Their nearest neighbors were the Henry Thuts who lived in the only house near the newly built courthouse at Lefors. Postmaster Henry Thut had the Lefors post office, established Oct. 12, 1892, in his home.

When Larry attended the Lefors school, begun in 1896, he rode a little pony across the North Fork of the Red River. He looked forward to the springtime when the rains made the

river rise and he could spend the night with the Thut boys - George, Henry, Jr., and Charles.

Anna Kathleen Rider, born in 1901, was named for Mrs. Henry (Anna) Thut, Sr., who assisted at Kathleen's birth.

In 1903, the Rider family moved to Pampa to live in a new four-room house built by J.L. "Jim" Stroope at 303 East Foster. That year Rider opened a livery stable business between 100 South Gillespie and 101 South Ballard (location of present White House Lumber Company). Sometime later Rider left Pampa and died in 1939 at Big Lake, Texas.

Mrs. Rider kept boarders and taught piano at home and in the school for about 20 years. She took a correspondence course in music and also studied with Mr. Cranker, a piano teacher who rode the train from Canadian to give lessons in Pampa. Mrs. Rider died in 1941 at Lubbock

Larry Rider and Jeff Lard (brother of Elsie Hall) made a white deer for the town of White Deer. The deer had to be replaced because of vandalism, but the original stand is still located at the intersection of Main and Third

Streets in White Deer. Later Larry, a game warden, and his wife, Grace, lived at Jayton, Texas.

M.K. Brown was very fond of "de-ah little Kathleen." She graduated from Pampa High School in 1921, the year the first volume of The Harvest was published. This statement appears below her senior class picture: "Least but not last,' and this refers to size only. Kathleen was easily voted the most popular girl in school --- an honor she well deserves."

The stable furnished horse and buggy transportation for visiting lawyers and others who needed to go to Lefors for business in the new Gray County Courthouse.

Kathleen married J.B. Logan and moved to Lubbock. J.B.'s brother, Howard Logan, married Ruby Henry, daughter of W.B. Henry, and they also moved to Lubbock.

Consider therefore the kindness and sternness of God: sternness to those who fell, but kindness to you, provided that you continue in his kindness. Otherwise, you also will be cut off.

Romans 11:22 In our present culture it makes perfect sense that most Americans only think of God as a loving God, a merciful God, a forgiving God, a kind God. After all, most Americans have never been convicted of their sin by the Holy Spirit, nor have they been led to repentance

by that same Holy Spirit and they certainly have never surrendered to the Lordship of Jesus. So it makes perfect sense that they are completely blind when it comes to God.

However, it is inexcusable for someone who professes to be a Christian to have such a warped, one-sided view of God. In fact, for a professing Christians to live their daily life with such a handpicked, personally molded perception of God is CRAZY, even blasphemous.

Blasphemous? Yes, blasphemous. You see, when a professing believers designs their own God with only a few comfortable descriptions of God from His Word, then they basically have constructed their own personal idol. You see God is not just a loving God; not just a merciful God; not just a forgiving God; not just a kind God. That is only one side of God. And to represent Him in this distorted manner is to MISREPRESENT Him and therefore construct another God, a false God, an idol.

Now is God kind? YES! Is God loving? YES! But is God also stern? YES! Is God harsh? YES! Is God to be feared? YES!

So do you worship the idol of the "one sided God"? Or do you seek to know God, no matter who and what He is? Do you feed on the Word of God so that you can be taught about all of who God is and all of what He is like?

Do you remember the story which originated from India of the blind men who inspected an elephant and were asked what it was like? Was the elephant like a wall? NO! Was it like a spear? A snake? A tree? A fan? A rope? NO! Here is the conclusion of that poem: "And so these men of Indostan, disputed loud and long, each in his own opinion, exceeding stiff and strong, though each was partly in the right, and all were in the wrong!"

If our God isn't both kind and stern, then we don't know or serve the God of the Bible. And when we witness to someone about God, if we only present Him as a God of love, then we have shared a testimony of idolatry to that lost soul. This is one of the reasons why so many people who supposedly "received Christ" never darken a church door or read their Bible or live a faithful life. If a person never meets the stern God, they will rarely repent. And if they never repent, then they cannot get saved.

So may every professing disciple of Jesus Christ: No. 1 believe in a kind and stern God; No. 2 witness about a kind and stern God with those who are lost; No. 3 teach our children and grandchildren about a kind and stern God.

Auerbach Popovich trophy three times in his career.

Popovich has received the league's top coaching honor in two of the last three seasons, joining Don Nelson and Pat Riley as the only coaches to win the award three times.

In a career full of masterful coaching performances, Popovich may have delivered his best in season No. 18

The Spurs entered the season still thinking about the devastating loss to the Miami Heat in last summer's again thought to be too old to challenge LeBron James and the mighty Heat, the Spurs took the defending champions to seven games but couldn't quite close it out for the franchise's fifth NBA title.

"Suffice to say that I've thought about it every day," Popovich said at training camp in October. "I'm wondering if it will go away. I'm anxious for it to happen, but it hasn't happened yet."

They showed up to training camp still stinging from that defeat, and Popovich had to get to know a newlook coaching staff after losing longtime assistants Brett Brown and Mike Budenholzer to head coaching jobs in Philadelphia and Atlanta.

Then he led the Spurs to a league-best 62-20 record, which gives them homecourt advantage throughout the playoffs. And he did it while deftly navigating a season filled with nagging injuries to several key players. Tim Duncan was the

classic NBA Finals. Once only starter to play in at least a great gentleman. He really 70 games. No Spur averaged 30 minutes per game and Tony Parker led the team with a modest 16.7 points per game.

Spurs won at least 50 games for the 15th straight season and topped 60 for the fourth time in that span, an unprecedented run of sustained excellence in the modern era.

He added free agent Marco Belinelli, juggled the lineup to keep veterans Duncan and Manu Ginobili fresh for the playoffs and used his role players often enough that they enter the postseason brimming with confidence. The Spurs lead the Dallas Mavericks 1-0 in their bestof-seven series, with Game 2 on Wednesday night in San Antonio.

"He's a gentleman," Belinelli said.
