## Draft of state GOP platform cuts guest-worker language

As Texas Republicans prepare to convene Thursday in Fort Worth for their three-day state party convention, an early draft of the party's platform shows that language — approved two years ago - supporting a guest-worker program could be removed.

The draft, which was obtained by the Texas Tribune, shows that the language calling for a guest-worker program has been replaced with language to support the enactment of a provisional visa program. The guestworker program language in 2012

was an unprecedented change to the official state party platform. It called for a national temporary worker program, which would allow foreign nationals to come to the U.S. when jobs are available but citizens are unavailable.

## Texas, 43 states reach \$105 million agreement with pharmaceutical makers

AUSTIN - Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott and 43 other state attorneys general today secured a \$105 million agreement with drug maker GlaxoSmithKline, LLC (GSK). The agreement resolves a multistate investigation against GSK for unlawfully promoting its asthma drug Advair and its antidepressant drugs Paxil and Wellbutrin.

Under the settlement agreement, GlaxoSmithKline must pay the State of Texas a total of \$6.2 million. Ac-

cording to the states' investigation, GSK violated state any GSK product; consumer protection law by misrepresenting the uses and qualities of Wellbutrin, Paxil, and Advair. State and federal law generally prohibits pharmaceutical manufacturers from marketing their drugs for "off-label" uses that have not been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

Among its terms, today's judgment prohibits GlaxoSmithKline from the following actions:

Making false, misleading, or deceptive claims about

Promoting or distributing information describing any off-label use for a GSK product;

Representing in promotional materials that a GSK product is better, more effective, safer, or has less serious side effects than has been demonstrated by substantial evidence or substantial clinical experience;

Presenting favorable information or conclusions in promotional materials about a GSK product from a


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

An Xbox One edition of Halo was teased at E3 last year, and in January Microsoft's manager for Halo and Forza Motorsports told fans "[r]est


assured your next Halo journey WILL begin in 2014."

We have not been given any disciplinary actions against us There is a rumor of the trustees managed to get back there to where the women are housed. How is that possible? I have yet to figure it out considering all of the cameras in the hallways and locked doors.

When my family called up here, they were told that I was in seg. for smoking, yet I have not received any kind of disciplinary action.

Perhaps it is because we are approaching the second anniversary of that attack, and this administration simply refuses to account for its actions that night.

Worse yet for the liberals, 50 percent of Americans surveyed disapproved of Hillary Clinton's handling of Benghazi, and only 37 percent approved.

CBS and NBC also channeled the "defiant, not defensive" spin, a stale rerun of "What difference does it make?"

This is exactly the same pose Clinton struck in every other scandal in which she's been neck-

when she was granted an interview on Jan. 29, only asking two brief Benghazi questions (packaged together): Are our embassies safer in 2014, and should we re-establish a consulate in Benghazi? Van Susteren let Clinton ramble for a minute and offered no response when she placed the blame on Congress for inadequate funding.

In her book excerpt, Clinton tries to shred the question of her Sundayshow skipping after the attacks and slams people who "fixate on the question of why I didn't go on TV that morning, as if appearing on a talk show is the equivalent of jury duty, where one has to have a compelling reason to get out of it."

It is not an obsession. It is a serious question deserving an answer, and the press should not let up. Van Susteren should have asked.

This woman wants to be president. But she doesn't want the "jury duty" of submitting to media scrutiny. All the years of network puffery have made Clinton sound like a spoiled child who refuses to admit any error for anything. All this contempt for the public's demands for answers should make journalists understand someday that all along it was contempt she had for them.

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## Why prosecuting Snowden is unfair until NSA answers for misconduct

What America learned from Edward Snowden's interview with "NBC News"

**CONASON** himself as a highly

trained espionage agent, rather than a low-level hacker; he insisted his actions were patriotic, not treacherous: and said he yearns to return to the United States. He claimed to have warned his superiors about the surveillance excesses committed by the National Security Agency, and he doesn't believe a fair trial would be possible for him under the Espionage Act if he did return.

But we still don't know exactly what Snowden took when he stole millions of files from U.S. intelligence computer systems. We don't know why he chose to take what he did. The officials charged with investigating his actions have charged that only a tiny fraction of the documents that he "exfiltrated" from top-secret computers had any connection to whistleblowing about questionable domestic surveillance activities by the

government.

Instead, he reportedly focused on documents that would expose secret U.S. operations against the Chinese and other NSA targets that were conducting their own cyber assaults on our systems.

He revealed NSA operations and capabilities that have probably forewarned terrorists and other U.S. adversaries to change their communication methods. And, of course, his revelations about spying on foreign governments and leaders gravely embarrassed the United States in ways that may incur lasting economic and diplomatic consequences

The full dimensions of his actions will remain murky until the government someday unseals the evidence compiled against him. Knowing what is in those files, however, the Obama administration and the U.S. intelligence community, which includes members of the House and Senate intelligence committees, believe that Snowden must be prosecuted.

A powerful argument can be made that his revelations about domestic surveillance served a public purpose and should mitigate any punishment. Indeed, an American jury might simply nullify the charges against

him for that reason. Still, if the government must carry out significant intelligence and diplomatic activities that require discretion, how can its legitimate secrets be protected if any contractor or agent may purloin them with impunity?

Ŷet impunity is also a burning issue at far loftier levels of the intelligence hierarchy, as Snowden noted in another recent appearance. Speaking via video link from Moscow at the Ridenhour awards in Washington, D.C., last month — where he and filmmaker Laura Poitras received the "truth-teller" award for whistleblowing he outlined a double standard that would raise hard questions about any indictment issued against him.

Specifically, he pointed an accusing finger at NSA chief James Clapper, who testified before the Senate in March 2013 — just before Snowden uploaded documents proving that the spy agency was monitoring and collecting massive amounts of data on American citizens — that it was doing no such thing.


"Does the NSA collect any type of data at all on millions or hundreds of millions of Americans?" asked Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Oregon. "No, sir," Clapper replied, adding, "not wittingly.

At the Ridenhour event, Snowden drily recalled that moment. "There's been a lot said about oaths. The oath that I remember is James Clapper raising his hand and swearing to tell the truth and then lying to the American public.'

Going on to describe reported abuses by other NSA employees who used the agency's technology to spy on their wives and girlfriends, Snowden wondered why only he faces legal jeopardy:

"When they committed these crimes — when James Clapper committed a crime by lying under oath to the American people — were they actually held accountable? Was anyone tried? Were charges brought? It's been years since these events occurred. Whereas within 24 hours of the time I went public, three counts of charges were filed against me personally. We have to ask ourselves if we can hold the lowest, most junior members of our community to this high standard of behavior, why can't we ask the same of our most senior officials? James Clapper is the most senior intelligence official in the United States of America, and I think he has a duty to tell the truth to the public."

#### Rockies going through inevitable summer slump.

While my colleagues all tend to be Texas Rangers fans, it is no secret that I am a Colorado Rockies fan.

For a while, the Rockies and the Rangers were playing like polar opposites. Rockies were scoring enough runs that even

Rockies pitchers can overcome a game where they allowed three or four runs. But what happens when the bats go cold in Colorado? Oh yeah, they drop below .500 and are 28-29 as of Wednesday morning. The Rockies have not won a series since May



18 against the San Diego Padres, where they scored 16 runs over three games. Before that they lost a two-game series against the Kansas City Royals and a three-game series against the Cincin-



nati Reds. The Rockies were at the height of their blazing bats when they scored 29 runs on the Texas Rangers over three

before dropping a "meaningless (to the series)" fourth game to the Rangers. Since that series,

games

they have gone 6-14, winning only four road games. They lead in batting average and slugging percentage; and are second in on-base percentage. They have scored the third-most runs in MLB with 285.

Prolific shortstop Troy Tulowitzki is still hitting a ridiculous .353 overall hitting with 15 home runs and 38 RBI.

I wish I could say that they have gotten better at pitching, but that would be a lie. The Rockies' ace, Jorge De La Rosa, boasts and 3.68 ERA on the road. He definitely can't think himself for his winning record of 6-4.

While fourth-year pitcher Jordan Lyles also has a 3.46 ERA overall with a 5-1 win-loss record, I am a little more optimistic about him, only because he had two games where he gave up more than five runs,

eight versus San Diego in a loss and six at Philadelphia. He has one game where he had an ERA of 4.32.

I was optimistic about the Rockies, as many pundits were, when they were winning two out of three of their series' games. But now they have fallen from their mile-high cloud back down to reality as they just finished a long road trip. The Rockies are 12-21 on the road and 16-7 at home. Good teams win on the road too.

The leaders of the NL West, the San Francisco Giants, are 18-12 on the road. Across the bay, and league, the AL West leading Oakland Athletics are 19-10 on the road. Both of these teams lead many different power rankings.

The Rockies can hit all they want and try to win slug-fests. But it comes down to keeping the bats of June, despite having lost one game against the Diamondbacks at time of print. They have home series against, Arizona, the Dodgers, Braves, Milwaukee and St. Louis. Unfortunately, the Cardinals are the only team that is below .500 of that pack. The Rockies can still

salvage the series against the Rockies, as they have Lyles and Juan Nicasio who have combined for a 10-4 record.

Either way, the Rockies need to come up with a plan to get back above .500 before the NL West gets away from them.
