# Desoto man dead in standoff

A 40-year-old man from Desoto is dead as a result of a standoff on U.S. Highway 287 near FM 2373 west of Washburn.

At approximately 10:10 a.m., Wednes-day, Armstrong County Sheriff's Department officers pulled over a vehicle on US 287 near FM 2373 to conduct a routine traffic stop. The officer called for backup, which prompted responses from several law enforcement agencies, including Texas Department of Public Safety. Traffic along US 287 was diverted, and law enforcement secured the area and attempted to make contact with the driver.

As officers approached the vehicle, they found the driver deceased from an apparent gunshot wound. The deceased driver was identified as Michael Reynard Ezell Jr., 40, from Desoto. Texas Rangers are currently investigating the incident.

# **Wreck** results in AZ woman's death

A 2006 Mercedes, driven by Linda C. O'Conner, 67, Cochise, Ariz., was traveling east on Interstate 40, eight miles east of Shamrock. O'Conner stated she fell asleep while driving her vehicle and when she woke up she was driving in the center median of I-40. The vehicle split two bridges and drove over the cement retaining wall landing be-low on County Road 26. The driver was transported to University Medical Center (UMC) in Lubbock. The family of the driver discontinued life support on May 30, 2014 and the driver died as a result if her injuries from the crash.

Pampa ISD is holding its second annual Bi-Lingual Academy. 
The annual Kiwanis golf scramble will be held on Saturday, June 28, at Hidden Hills public golf course later this month and sign-ups are still being welcomed.

asked the Obama administration for \$30 million for state-based border security operations. "With the Border Pa-

trol's focus shifted to this crisis, we have grave concerns that dangerous cartel activity, including narcotics smuggling and human trafficking, will

go unchecked because Border Patrol resources are stretched too thin," Abbott wrote to U.S. Department of Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson. "Securing the U.S.-Mexico border is the federal government's responsibility. Because that simply is not happening, the State of Texas is seeking emergency funding to help support state-based border security initiatives.'

Abbott, the Republican nominee for governor, said the Texas Department of Public Safety is ready to "swiftly launch" a border-security operation that would cost about \$1.3 million per week. The funds would pay for overtime for troopers who work 12-hour shifts, as well as fuel and lodging.

"Unless the Department of Homeland Security or another federal agency provides funding, the cartels — which are central to this crisis - will prevail because they profit from each illegal bor-der crossing," Abbott wrote. "With the requested aid, though, the Texas DPS can apply its proven record of success to help staunch this cartel-driven border security problem."





As part of its summer concert series, the Woody Guthrie Folk Music Center is bringing performing songwriter Mike Fuller to Pampa for a concert today at 6:30 p.m. Mike is also the host of High Plains Morning, heard weekdays from 9 a.m. to noon on High Plains

Public Radio (HPPR).

New York-born, New Mexico-raised, Amarillo-resident Mike Fuller began his career in music when he asked for a guitar for his 10th birthday. "I don't recall why…" he said to me during an interview. He grew up listening to Jackson Browne, Cat Stevens, James Taylor, Elvis Costello and Bruce Cockburn "because they have all been fearless in saying what they wanted to say," he went on to clarify

As part of HPPR's "Living Room Concert" he plays roughly 150 gigs a year, mainly in the Texas Panhandle.

Mike has released 2 CD's of original songs, "Babies" in 1998 and "Barefoot

Music" in 2001; he is currently working on his 3rd album.

His music has been included on compilations produced by the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, Amarillo College, and on 4 Volumes of Christmas music benefiting the Eveline Rivers Christmas Project.

Mike's songs have also been used in the independent film What Matters Most (filmed in Vega, Texas), in the KACV TV-produced documentary Celebrating America and in a promotional film for the Habitat for Humanity office in Modesto, California.

But, true to Woody's spirit, Mike's fondest memory as a musician occurred during one of his live performances, "[it was] hearing an entire audience singing along with one of my songs," he said.

I met Mike through my work as a radio show host with HPPR; he has helped to produce every show I have aired in the network, so, maybe I am a bit biased but, having heard him performed live, I will attest that Pampa is in for a treat. He is a consummate artist.

The center is located at 320 S. Cuyler in Woody Guthrie's second home town, Pampa, Texas in what used to be the Harris Drug Store where Woody worked, sang and played his guitar. Weekly jam sessions and concerts are hosted free and open to the public as a tribute to Woody's spirit and his desire to bring music to the "common man."

The show is free to the public and donations are always welcomed but not required.



# In Bergdahl case, 'conservatives' ignore basic American principles

of President Barack Obama. Fair play, due process, respect for families and the military: To most, if not all, so-called conservatives, none of these fundamentals matters nearly so much as the urge to undermine the nation's first black president. Which is another reason, among many, why they no longer deserve the honorific "conservative."

In the matter of Bergdahl, a military officer held by the enemy in Afghanistan and released in a trade of prisoners, the right-wing fakers who call themselves conservative are trashing ideals they routinely claim to hold sacred.

The American military code of conduct has long assured all service personnel that if captured by the enemy, "you may rest assured that your government ... will use every practical means to contact, support and gain release for you and for all other prisoners of war." Leaving aside the moral imperative that is the

moral imperative that is the foundation of this policy, which predates the current military code by centuries, it

is a simple military necessity. Support the troops? The morale of our fighting men and women would be severely damaged if they were to come to believe that the U.S. government would not do everything in its power to bring them home from captivity — regardless of any questions about their conduct. (Arizona Sen. John McCain, who has written forthrightly of his shame about his own conduct as a Vietnam POW, surely should be able to explain why.)

Our national commitment to rescue American captives extends beyond those in uniform to any citizen who has been kidnapped or seized by a hostile force. That was certainly the excuse when the president most revered by the right - Ronald Reagan — handed over advanced weapons to a terrorist regime in the Iran-Contra deal. It is a commonplace observation that if a Democratic president had committed the same offenses, he and his cohort would have been denounced for treason, and perhaps rightly so. Yet while the Republicans want to impeach President Barack Obama for releasing five Taliban geezers, they would still stamp Reagan's image on coins and bills, raise monuments to his memory, and emblazon his name on every edifice in the country.

Prominent voices on the right now insist that Bergdahl was unworthy of rescue, because his capture allegedly occurred after he deserted his post. None of the loudest

wingnuts registered this complaint until after the White House secured his release; indeed, many of them were agitating for the Obama administration to save Bergdahl until this week. Today they declare with equal volume and fervor that he is a "traitor" who should have been left to rot with his Taliban captors.

So much for the American principles of due process and presumption of innocence which happen to be among the very ideals that are supposed to differentiate us from our enemies. Libertarians and conservatives always fiercely claim to uphold due process, especially when one of their ilk is in the dock. But for some curious reason, those principles don't always apply when a Democrat is president. Thankfully, in the view of the commander-inchief and the U.S. Army, which maintains jurisdiction and custody over Bergdahl, due process apparently remains in force, which must be why he was promoted to sergeant while a prisoner of war.

However angry Bergdahl's former comrades may feel, and however his actions may have justified their anger, they will likely have an opportunity to testify about him if the Army pursues a court martial. That would be the appropriate forum to sort out the facts about Bergdahl's conduct — not a Twitter lynching party or a kangaroo court held by William Kristol on Fox News Channel. The proposal that we should leave a soldier in the hands of the enemy, based on suspicions or rumors of disloyalty, is disgusting on many levels and should infuriate anyone who boasts of his devotion to the Constitution.

A decent respect for military families — owed to the sacrifices and hardships they confront — is another conservative virtue the right no longer deems convenient. Whatever anyone thinks of Bowe Bergdahl (or his father's "Duck Dynasty"style beard), Robert and Jani Bergdahl have faced the same heartache as any captured soldier's parents - and they have done nothing to deserve the sudden torrent of partisan abuse. The swinish Glenn Beck — a self-styled super-patriot who spent his youth snorting cocaine and swilling booze while others served their country — is eagerly leading the effort to demonize the Bergdahls.

In years past, the venerable taboo against abusing the reputation of an Army veteran, especially a former prisoner of war, to pursue a political vendetta would have been too powerful to ignore. Today we see the Republican right eagerly mobilizing its entire media apparatus - complete with cheesy Washington public relations flacks and sleazy fundraising appeals — to mount a bitter campaign against Bowe Bergdahl and his family.
