New rules could shed light on future water projects

PPD offers bicycle theft prevention

In response to a recent increase in bicycle thefts, the Pampa Police Department wants to remind everyone that bicycles are an easy target for thieves. Unfortunately, once they are taken, the likelihood of them ever being recovered is slim. The first step in deterring these types of thefts is to lock them up. In addition, we urge citizens to record the serial number of the bikes that they have, just as with any type of valuable property. Having a serial number greatly increases the chance of recovery.

An easy way to document the serial number is to have the bicycle registered. The Pampa Police Department offers free bicycle registration and engraving to help locate and recover stolen bicycles. When registering the bicycle, the serial number, make, model and physical description will be documented, along with the owner information, and placed into our records database. Furthermore, the bicycle will be engraved with our department's registration number assigned to that bicycle, in an inconspicuous place.

Alzheimer's support group in early stages

The future of Texas' water supply will start to take shape on Tuesday afternoon when the Texas Water Development Board releases draft rules for funding major water projects over the next several decades.

Amid the continuing drought, voters approved Proposition 6 in November, authorizing the Legislature to provide the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas with \$2 billion from the state's Rainy Day Fund.

The infusion of funds is intended to be self-sustaining, with the board only allowed to make loans instead of grants. But competition for the money will be fierce: The 2012 State Water Plan outlined \$53 billion worth of potential water projects, such as pipelines and reservoirs.

The online release of the rules will offer clues for which projects will become top priorities. Though a law passed last year, House Bill 4, provides some parameters for the allocation of funds, the board has significant leeway to set its own standards. As required by law, 16 regional groups have submitted their own rankings of projects, but it is unclear how they will translate to the statewide prioritization process.

Though there is a board meeting on Wednesday, the draft rules won't be discussed by the board until the June 26 meeting at 8:15 a.m.

Experts and industry leaders are eagerly anticipating the announcement.

"We're anxious to see the details," said Bill West, general manager for the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority, which

receive funding. "The key to that competition will be the way the state crafts those rules."

Here are some of the major questions that could be answered this week:

How will the board balance different prioritization factors?

HB 4 tasks the board with considering several factors in its prioritization of different projects. These include aiding large and diverse populations, balancing different regions and accounting for a large portion of the users' water needs. But the directives leave plenty of room for interpretation, and the list contains some inherent tensions.

'The highlight-reel, superstar, bigsummer-release part of this is the prioritization factors," said Jeremy Brown, an energy research fellow at the University of Texas School of Law.

How, and how much, will the regional priority lists be taken into account?

The board is required by the law to consider how each project was ranked by its regional group. But it will likely have to reconcile differences among the 16 prioritization processes. And given the bill's vagueness, the degree to which the board might forgo regional recommendations in favor of its own rules is unclear.

What role will funding requirements dictated by law play in the process, and how will conservation be defined?

The Legislature urged the board to ensure 10 percent of funds for projects in rural areas and 20 percent for conserva-

has three projects for which it hopes to tion and reuse projects. The delineation of those categories, though, remains an open question. Environmental groups are particularly focused on how the board will define conservation, which received attention at public meetings earlier this year.

Will the board incorporate considerations of environmental or economic impacts?

Left out of the law's prioritization factors list was any mention of a project's impact on the environment and economy. So it is unclear whether the board will consider them. Meanwhile, feasibility and cost — two factors the law does identify — have yet to be fully defined.

What role will the advisory committee play?

This question will remain unanswered even after the rules are released. A new committee, which comprises a representative from the comptroller's office, three members of the state Senate and three members of the state House, is tasked with reviewing the water fund and assessing the board's rules. The dimensions of the committee's power are unclear: State agencies have domain over executive rulemaking, but could legislators assume a dual role by directing some of the process?

'There are some basic constitutional lines there, but that's the official story," said Mary Kelly, a principal at Parula, an Austin environmental analysis firm. "What goes on behind the scenes is always something different."

Regardless of what plays out over the next few months, the list of projects is set to be finalized by Sept. 1, with loans first doled out in 2015.



Museum Musings Pampa's first restaurant

Dormer Simms, youngest of 18 children, was born about 1885 in the middle of a cotton patch in Coosa



OXLEY

County, Ala. An orphan at the age of five, he lived with his older brother, Frank, who went to Panhandle shortly after 1900. Dormer and Ger-

trude Talbot were married on Friday the 13th in Room 13 of the Amarillo Hotel.

Gertrude worked as a telephone operator while Dormer and two friends opened a restaurant.

On a trip to Amarillo, Dormer paid \$25 for a chili recipe and began to sell chili like "hot cakes." Hearing that Pampa was booming, he and his friends closed their place in Panhandle and moved to Pampa. In 1968, Dormer recalled:

'We got to Pampa and rented an old shed-like building from Tom Horn, who had a grocery store. We rented a room from him and put in a restaurant. My counter was made with two 14-inch, 14 foot 2x12, two of them put together and this made a counter. My stool was made with one 2x12, 14 feet long. Those old boys down there, I suppose, are still picking splinters they got from that 2x12 because that is all we had to sit on

'After we got the restaurant lined up, I had the whole sum of 75 cents in my pocket. I went across the street where Lee Quinn was running the butcher shop and spent the 75 cents for chili meat. At that time, you could buy it for five cents a pound. I made a big pot of chili and sold it out immediately. Then we had enough money so Gertrude and I could buy a steak. That is how we started the restaurant business in Pampa in 1906. There were 153 people in town counting the dogs and I owned both the dogs.

We had a lot of fun in those days. On the west side Emmett Duncan and his father ran the hardware store on the corner of the street (105 N. Cuyler) and on the other corner (100 S. Cuyler and West Foster) Lee Quinn had his meat market, also the pool hall. On that side was the Thomas Brothers and the White Deer Land Company. We were on the east side: Tom Horn. Sam Rider on the corner with his grocery store, Jim Rider with his livery stable about a block further east, and Lonnie Rider. So naturally one side would get after the other.

"We had our dog fights, our chicken fights and a lot of other fights, but all we got out of that was a black eye. We would have our fights in the middle of the street. One side was against the other and the side that lost would buy the drinks for the whole bunch at my soda fountain. I had the first restaurant, the first soda fountain and the first cash register in Pampa."

"The Simms' soda fountain had an enormous business and made lots of money so I decided I would move and get in a bigger place. There was no place in town so I went down to Davis' Lumber Yard about a block away. Glen Davis had a lot up close to Sam Rider's grocery store, so I bought this lot from Glen and put up a two story building 25 or 30 feet wide and about 100 feet deep. That is where I put in Simms Sweet Shop and I had an enormous business there.

"I bought all the lumber from The Davis Lumber Company and I borrowed the money from the Gray County State Bank. Tom Crawford and Jesse Wynne owned the bank. Tom Crawford was the janitor, the doorman, and the cashier — the whole cheese. Jesse Wynne was probably the president. I borrowed the money from these people when compound interest was in style. I made my payments every month with the interest and when I made my last payment, the interest was twice as high as the payment. I knew everybody in Pampa.'

In the evenings Dormer would get

his guitar and he and some of his friends would sit on the curb in front of the restaurant and sing all of the old songs they knew.

Dormer and Gertrude left Pampa to live for a few months in San Antonio, where their only child, Virginia, was born in 1913. They returned to Pampa but left again in 1915 to move to Arizona. In 1920 Dormer joined the California Highway Patrol. After the death of Gertrude in 1964, Dormer returned to Panhandle where he married Cleo Wetzel in 1969. He died in Honolulu, Hawaii in July 1978.

Before his daughter was born, Dormer prayed that she would inherit his musical talent, and his prayer was answered. While Virginia was in the fourth grade, she and two friends began singing for many of the clubs.

The Lions Club took the trio to a meeting in Modesto, Calif., where a man from Hollywood hired the trio to go on the air on KNX. Virginia was only 14 years old when her mother went with the trio to Hollywood to appear on KNX.

Virginia was hired out of the trio to sing with a band that went broke in Chicago. There she was hired by Kay Keyser, who called her "Ginny," and remained with him for vears

In 1941, after she left Keyser, Ginny had a show of her own — the "Teenage Show." Later she sang with the Phillip Morris Show, The Borden Milk Show and the Coca Cola Show. She retired after her marriage to Dan Eastvold and was living in Honolulu when her father died there in 1978.

Dallas man's 'aerosol art' gains cachet

DALLAS (AP) - When Jerod "DTOX" Davies looks at a bare wall in Deep Ellum, the veteran graffiti artist doesn't see brick and mortar in an aging business district. He sees a blank canvas in an outdoor art gallery, screaming to be filled with mammoth roses, staring eyeballs and star-spangled galaxies.

The 34-year-old selftaught painter travels the country for his art these days, but "part of my heart's in Deep Ellum," he said. "I like to express myself. This is a great place to express yourself."

To help others see the Deep Ellum "spray ground" as he does. Davies has begun offering graffiti tours, explaining the technique and terminology of "aerosol art."

Through websites such as groupon.com and sidetour.com, clients pay \$40 for an 80-minute guided trek to view graffiti art in Deep Ellum, followed by
