Lance and his wife Brooke DeFever have been in their home for about 21 years now, and they have been working to get their yard to where it is today since

the mid-1990s. "This whole backyard originally was just all grass. There wasn't anything back here, and then we just little by little did this and did that," Lance said. He joked that it seems like they have

redone everything three or four times, but looking at it now, a person would never be able to tell.

"We got started on the ponds in '94," he added.

At that time, the DeFevers put in a small stock pond with some fish, and it just grew from there. The biggest pond Lance has installed in his backyard was 5,000 gallons.

"It was like five feet deep, and it was just a huge pond with huge koi," he said. Eventually it was taking a lot of upkeep, so they ended up leveling the pond.

"That lasted for about a year and then we ended up missing our water plants and some little fish," Lance said.

That was when they made the decision to build a smaller, above-ground pond so they could have their water plants again and it would be less maintenance.

Other more recent additions to the backyard include an arbor (which houses an outdoor kitchen) and a macaw habitat for the family birds. The DeFevers have also added some raised gardens for vegetables, which they plant every year and Lance said Brooke is constantly crafting new ideas for decorations.

"We're out here just about every eve-

ning now," Lance said.

## Statewide gas price average rises six cents

## SUBMITTED

IRVING – The average price for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline in Texas is now \$3.50, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is six cents higher than one week ago but 17 cents lower than the national average of \$3.67. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in Dallas are paying the most at \$3.57 per gallon while drivers in Corpus Christi are paying the least at \$3.41 per gallon.

Gas prices often decline in June, and in fact, the national average fell in June during the previous three years. However, analysts say recent turmoil in Iraq is likely to prevent that trend from repeating this year. AAA Texas encourages drivers to maximize their fuel efficiency with the following tips: Keep vehicle maintained according



"This is a debate that's happening around the country, and although it's well intended, it's misguided," said Cara Sullivan, a minimum wage policy expert at ALEC. The minimum wage has "In Seattle they raised it to \$15, and right across the city line it's \$5 less. It increases the cost of doing business for businesses in that city. You're creating chaos from one business to the next."

> Members of the city council in Providence, Rhode Island, considered raising the minimum wage from \$8 to \$15, but only for workers in the city's large hotels. In response, the Democratic leaders of the Rhode Island General Assembly have moved to block the proposal by taking away cities' authority to set local mini-

> Oklahoma Gov. Mary Fallin, a Republican, signed legislation in April that prohibits cities from setting their own wage after organized labor groups suggested that Oklahoma City raise its wage from \$7.25 an hour the federal minimum to \$10.10.

# The power of 3,607

That's how many people it took to bring down House Majority Leader

wasn't the Democrats who did it. Various complicated analyses of voting patterns confirm what anyone who has ever tried to convince even their own mother to vote "strategically" knows: Voters don't work that way. They may cast their vote to send a message — that happens all the time but not to execute a strategy that depends on their voting for someone they don't like at all so that someone else they don't

No, it

like at all won't win. And it wasn't "low" turnout that did Cantor in, at least compared to normal turnout. No, more people voted in the Republican primary in 2014 than in 2012 — almost 20,000 more. So in 2014, you had just over 65,000 people who voted — and 7,212 more of them voted for a little-known professor over a well-known politician. If half of those people plus one had gone the other way -3,607 in all — Cantor would have gotten a scare. Another thousand, and no one would be paying atten-

And then there's this: More than 86 percent of the people who were eligible to vote in the primary didn't.

So what you have are a few thousand folks who were clearly angry with their longtime congressman. They obviously weren't thinking about the fact that you're a lot better off, practically speaking, being represented by one of the most powerful people in the House than by a freshman. Nor were they crediting Cantor for all the times he has carried the tea party's water, as it were, playing chicken with the national economy and threatening to take the country over the fiscal cliff. They didn't give him credit for personally blocking a vote to allow those who

serve this country in the military to be eligible for papers. Have I mentioned that Cantor is not a mod-

This is what has Washington insiders quaking. If this could happen to Cantor, will anyone dare stand up to the tea party?

In fact, this is the first big tea party win of the season. Up until now, the Romney/Bush-backed candidates had been doing just fine, and the establishment was almost beginning to breathe a sigh of relief. But Cantor is (was) a big deal, and that's why the chances of the current House ever voting on any version of immigration reform just collapsed.

Explain that to one of those kids who was brought to this country as a child, grew up here and didn't even know they were "different" from their sisters or brothers who were born here until it came time to apply to college.

How dare Cantor even suggest — because that's all he really did — that we should be able to come up with some way to offer these young people a path to citizenship?

But I don't blame the tea party for killing immigration reform. They voted — all 36,110 of them — which gave David Brat his 7,212-vote edge. But if 7,213 more people had voted... Or if more than 3,606 of those who did had changed their minds...

It's trite to say one vote makes a difference or every vote counts, because this election wasn't even close. But it was tiny, because most of the people who could have voted and might have changed its outcome didn't bother. You can't blame the people who play politics for winning. But in general elections, the numbers tend to play differently, and as the number of Hispanic voters keeps growing, it's likely that the views of a few thousand voters in Virginia could cost Republicans many, many times that number of votes nationally.

## Bereavement and Healing Casket construction

A casket is a vital component of every funeral service. It expresses dignity, respect and integrity, yet serves a

more practical purpose as well. A casket is, "a rigid container which is designed for the encasement of human remains and which is usually constructed of wood, metal, or like material, and ornamented and lined with fabric." (Federal Trade Commission, FTC)

The FTC, as a definition for a casket, publishes the previous statement. There are often misconceptions regarding caskets. In an attempt to clarify these misconceptions, this article will address the outer or main construction materials that make up a casket, and the purposes

Caskets are simply boxes that hold human remains. While it is true that different caskets have varying options and levels of functionality, they all share the same basic purpose: encasing human

Caskets are constructed of rigid materials. Rigidity is a vital component of a casket. If the bottom and sides of caskets were not rigid, one would be unable to move the decedent from one place to another proficiently and with dignity.

The rigidness of the casket allows the funeral personnel and pallbearers to transport the decedent to where he or she needs to be in an adequate fashion.

The types of rigid materials used in the construction of caskets vary and each has unique qualities of usefulness. Caskets made of steel, stainless steel, copper or bronze, are very strong. There are various thicknesses of these metals used in casket manufacturing. An important fact to remember is that the smaller the gauge, the thicker the metal. One might ask, "Why does the thickness of metal matter?" I would answer, "In most cases, it does not." The cases in which it will matter depend on the weight of the decedent and the absence of a vault. If a vault is not used and the thickness of the casket is on the thin side, the casket may crush onto the deceased, under the weight of the earth as it is returned and packed into the ground or possibly at a later date as the metal decays.

Another building material used in the manufacturing of caskets is wood. Wood is beautiful, dignified and warm. Caskets made from wood are the most beautiful of all caskets. They can be carved and stained to any request. A wood casket, however, is almost certain to collapse onto the decedent as the earth is returned into the grave. If it does not, wood will be one of the quickest caskets to decay. Once decay begins, the casket will collapse onto the deceased

A third building material commonly used in casket manufacturing is cardboard. Some companies may call this material pasteboard or corrugated fiberboard or any other combination of those words, but in reality, these caskets are made of cardboard. The same type of cardboard out of which moving boxes are constructed. It goes without saying, without a vault, this type of casket is going collapsing onto the deceased as the earth is returned to the grave.

A newer composition material used in casket manufacturing is fiberglass. This material can be strong and can last for quite some time. In some cases, fiberglass caskets may resemble steel caskets. In choosing this type of casket, one must use one's best judgment and thoroughly inspect the craftsmanship of the fabricator.

In certain areas of the country, green caskets are gaining in popularity. Green caskets are made from a reed type of material, rather like a willow basket. Of course, one knows that baskets crumple easily; therefore, one may deduce that these caskets will readily collapse onto

the deceased as the earth is returned to the grave. Green caskets are often more expensive than cardboard caskets, yet function within the same parameters. If you are green minded and want to save funds, the cardboard casket, although not nearly as pleasing to the eye, might be your casket of choice.

Perhaps you have walked through a cemetery and noticed certain graves seem to have fallen or sunken by eight or nine inches. The reason a grave collapses is that having given way under the pressure of the earth's weight, the casket has collapsed onto the deceased These sunken graves most likely did not utilize the stabilizing features of a grave liner or vault. Some caskets may remain intact for several days, some for several months. Copper or bronze caskets, may stay intact beyond several

These caskets are rather expensive though, and if one is investing a great amount of money into a casket, one should probably consider protecting that investment with a vault. The fact remains, regardless of the amount of money paid for a casket, without the stabilizing strength of a vault to fortify the grave; your casket will eventually collapse onto the deceased.

Vaults are not required by law, however, some cemeteries may mandate their use. If you have forgone a vault, be aware and mentally prepare for your loved one's grave to collapse in on them, at some point in time. Although optional, a vault is a good investment if you want to preserve the integrity of your loved one's casket.

## Chris Matthews, meet Chris Matthews

Ronan Farrow, considered the "boy wonder" of cable

hosts by MSNBC executives, interviewed his colleague Chris Matthews on June 11 over the stunning primary defeat of Eric Cantor.

Farrow was shocked that the win-

ner, David Brat, had dared to campaign among the tea party rabble, being the professor he is: "Is it rare to see that kind of brazen intellectualism, particularly in populist candidates like this?" Translation: How did he win among knuckle-dragging Virginia racists with that spiel?

In response, Matthews unleashed something almost as unexpected as the Cantor defeat. He came to the tea party's defense. "I don't think you can assume that the liberals are smarter than the conservative professors. I think that's crazy talk," he said.

Matthews then doubled down

"(Brat) can handle any debate on this program or my program. So this looking down our noses at tea party people has got to stop. They have a message, they're as American as any liberal is, and they're really angry of the failure of the system.

What makes this so incredibly bizarre is that Matthews has been routinely, savagely assaulting the tea party for years. We cannot think of anyone in the press more vituperative than this man. It is another day in the office when Matthews sneers/dismisses/insults tea party conservatives, usually in personal terms, with cheap shots.

For example, just two days before the Brat remarks, he condemned Sen. Ted Cruz for being in the "hate wing" of the Texas Republican Party and dismissed Joni Ernst, the conservative U.S. Senate contender from Iowa, as a "hog castrator."

In April, he slammed people questioning the official Obamacare enrollment numbers — including the question about how many "enrolled" people hadn't yet paid a

premium. "What can you say about these guys besides they are health care enrollment truthers right now," Matthews insisted. "It's a new form of

birtherism." In March 2013, Matthews attacked the tea party as racist, xenophobic and homophobic, all in one breath: "Is it like that old dreamy nostalgia you get in the old movies 'Gone With The Wind'? Is it that kind of America they want to bring back or what? When there were no gays, where blacks were slaves, Mexicans were in Mexico. I mean, is this what they want?

In 2012, he asked leftist writer David Corn, just flat out, "Why do tea party crackpots keep winning elections

out in the country?" In 2011, Matthews felt it was fair and accurate to compare the tea party to the terrorist-aligned Muslim Brotherhood as the Republicans competed before the primaries: "So the Muslim Brotherhood has a parallel

role here with the tea party." The same is true of lots of individual tea party heroes, from Rush Limbaugh to

Sarah Palin to Michele Bachmann. Matthews looked forward to Limbaugh being shot: "at some point somebody's going to jam a CO2 pellet into his head and he's going to explode like a giant

blimp. Matthews asked Bachmann: "Are you hypnotized? Has someone put you under a trance tonight? That you give me the same answer no matter what question I put to you?" He cracked repeatedly that Palin wasn't ready for Alex Trebek. "It's unbelievable how little this woman knows! ... Don't put her on 'Jeopardy'!'

So it's understandable that callow Farrow would expect Matthews to unleash the typical tirade on Brat and the tea party instead of doing a flip and going on defense. At the end of this schizophrenic episode, he should have said, "Chris Matthews, meet Chris Matthews."

### **Books**

Amazon.com Inc. started as an online bookstore in 1995 in CEO Jeff Bezos' garage in Bellevue, Washington. As more and more bookstores have closed, Amazon is now believed to be the nation's largest bookseller, with an estimated 30 percent of a total book market that PricewaterhouseCoopers estimates

hit \$34.9 billion last year, **Tablets** and 60 percent of an e-book market that PwC pegged at \$7.9 billion.

"They can't live without Amazon's sales, and they can't live with Amazon's market power," he said.

### Music

Amazon is a major player in music. It has sold compact discs by mail since 1998 and digital downloads since 2007.

Russ Crupnick, managing partner of consulting MusicWatch, company pegs Amazon's share at 18 percent of the \$2.8 billion digital download market in the U.S. last year and 23 percent of the \$2.1 billion market for CDs. In comparison, Apple's iTunes commands about 67 percent of digital downloads and doesn't sell CDs. Amazon is the only competitor to Apple of any real size.

Amazon last launched a music streaming service that makes more than 1 million tracks available to members of its \$99-a-year Amazon Prime subscription plan.

Amazon took over the ebook market soon after its first Kindle was launched in 2007. It took a big step by introducing its full-color Kindle Fire tablet in 2011, with a price starting at \$199 and a screen just 7 inches diagonally.

"At the time, none of the other vendors had something similar," said Jitesh Ubrani, an IDC analyst.

But since then, others have matched the size and price, especially Samsung, which has made big gains. Amazon's share of global shipments has slid from more than 7 percent in 2012 to 2 percent in the first quarter of the year.

"Other vendors have cheaper, better products,' Ubrani said.

### **Movies and TV shows**

Amazon is a large retailer of DVDs and Blu-ray discs and also offers online rentals and purchases of digital video products.

Amazon has 15 percent of the \$1.8 billion U.S. market for movie and TV show rentals and downloads, trailing Apple's 58 percent, according to Dan Cryan, an analyst with market research firm IHS.

As for subscription video streaming, Cryan estimates Amazon accounted for 15 percent of the 43.6 mil-

Chelsea Clinton hasn't been

lion active U.S. subscribers of streaming video plans through its Prime Instant Video service. Netflix accounted for 73 percent of active streaming subscribers, while Hulu Plus had 12 percent.

### Cloud services

Amazon essentially created the marketplace for what is known as cloud infrastructure as a service in 2006 with Amazon Web Services. That is where it allows its servers to be used by third parties to host the data and applications they need to run mobile apps, websites and other servic-

As the overwhelming market leader, Amazon maintains five times the computing capacity of the next 14 service providers combined, according to Gartner analyst Lydia Leong. Amazon is aggressive with price cuts and innovation, which will probably keep competitors like Microsoft from catching up for years, Leong said.

### Overall retail

Amazon sold \$40.8 billion worth of goods in North America last year. That's 17 percent of all ecommerce, according to Anne Zybowski, vice president of retail insights at research firm Kantar Retail.
