

# **DPS** Increasing DWI Patrols for July 4 Holiday

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols for an 11-day period that includes the July 4th holiday. From June 27-July 7, DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent.

"As we prepare to celebrate the Fourth of July, DPS urges Texans to do their part to help keep our roadways safe during the holiday," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Individuals should always designate a sober driver or find other means of transportation if they plan to drink al-cohol. During the holiday, DPS troopers will be performing increased patrols aimed at protecting all travelers and removing dangerous drivers from the road.'

The increased patrols that target impaired driving are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT). During the 2013 July 4th enforcement effort, DPS troopers made 1,124 DWI arrests, and 173 of those arrests were the direct result of the increased patrols. DPS enforcement also resulted in 720 fugitive arrests, 602 felony arrests, more than 15,700 speeding citations and more than 2,400 seat belt/child safety seat citations during this period. According to state statistics, approximately every 20 minutes in Texas, someone is hurt or killed in an alcohol-related crash. For some alternative transportation options, visit www.SoberRides.org.

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


Franklin D. Roosevelt Angton, 81, died June 24, 2014 in Pampa.

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

# Bereavement and Healing The "ex" factor

ence unique situations with survivors, and this past week was no exception.

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The family I served was one of humble means. The decedent had experienced interaction with the judicial system on multiple occasions. Drugs had played a part in his life. There was an indication of slowness of mind, and he was

potentially murdered. He was a parent with dependent children, and he had an "ex" wife. Other issues existed as well, but the details are too gruesome to mention, and out of respect to this family, they are better left unwritten.

My motivation for this article is the existence of his "ex" wife and the discrepancy between her perception of herself, and her legal standing within his estate. My experience and knowledge are based on Texas law and may differ from other states.

Due to the decedent's lifestyle, he did not have an estate, yet his "ex" wife was very interested in any dependency funds available for her upon his death, and desired to be recognized and respected as his wife.

As I left the cemetery and reflected back upon the week's experience, I thought to myself, how very odd that this woman did not understand her severance from this man, as stipulated through the courts in their divorce decree. Interestingly, this woman is not unique in her misconception of her legal standing within the "ex" husband's estate. I meet women almost weekly who are under one or more misconceptions regarding their legal

As a funeral director, I often experi- status within the estate of a particular male decedent.

It seems as though the popular phrase of the 1960's "It's only a piece of paper." has diluted the legal importance of the marital contract within the minds of many couples. This mere piece of paper is a legal and binding contract, issued through the state which establishes, combines and protects one's legal next of kinship within an estate. If a couple is married, each party is legally recognized as the other's next of kin. As such, each has power, rights and responsibilities within the combined marital estate. Their legal document (marriage certificate) places them in this important position. Individuals who choose to reside together without this legal contract, are not in the next of kinship position, and, therefore, have no legal standing within the estate.

In such a case, a woman who has never been the decedent's legal wife, or who has given up her place as his legal wife, forgoes her rights and considerations as kinship, along with anything else she may consider as combined property and estate. She may therefore find herself evicted from her residence without legal rights to any insurance funds or estate properties. A man however faces far graver consequences. In addition to the previously stated losses, a man who has not married the mother of his children, and has failed to secure his name on their birth certificates, may find that on the dreadful day of losing his pseudo wife, he stands without parental rights. Not only might he lose what he thought was community property, without expensive testing and court battles, he will most likely see the guardianship of his children

fall to their maternal grandparents.

The "ex" wife this weekend wanted the decedent's social security benefits and payouts for her children, as well as for herself. Although her dependent children are possibly eligible for social security funds, she most likely is not. When the marital contract was severed, her privileges and rights were severed too. One hopes she listed her "ex" husband as the father of her children on their birth certificates; otherwise, they as their mother may be without support.

The key to understanding your position in an estate as spousal next of kin is to understand that there must be a legal and binding contract, a.k.a. a marriage certificate, in effect. If you are an "ex" spouse, you have been legally removed and displaced as the decedents next of kin. Not only will you have lost all legal claims to the decedent's estate; most probably, you will not be mentioned in the obituary, nor asked to sit with the family at the services. Moreover, if you have forgone the marriage contract altogether, vou are not, nor will you ever be, the spousal next of kin.

The next day on MSNBC, she said it was "like a church revival," and every time the president touted equal pay for women, "there'd be clapping, and like almost 'praise Jesus!' It was fun.'

NBC doubled down on its non-independence by airing a positive news story on the Obama "working families summit" from new White House reporter Chris Jansing — without any mention of MSNBC's moderator. It happened again the next morning, as NBC newsreader Natalie Morales hailed "a lot of good talk at the White House yesterday." How is this not a crystalclear conflict of interest?

Ailes can only watch this whole Obama parade/charade and shake his head. So many ethicists who thought his note to Karl Rove was amazingly unethical seemed to retire from judging the media's independence.

# Hispanics sour on Obama as young illegals surge across border

Most liberals and many economic conservatives argued that support for such legislation was a political imperative for Republicans. Otherwise, they would continue to lose Hispanic voters, an inevitably increasing segment of the electorate, by 2-1 margins

That argument was bolstered by the 2004 exit poll, which showed comprehensive immigration supporter George W. Bush getting 44 percent of the Hispanic vote. That percentage may have been inflated, but if Bush had

received the percentages of brought them illegally John McCain (31) or Mitt Romney (27), he would probably not have been re-elected.

Republican opponents of comprehensive immigration respond that granting citizenship to illegals would enfranchise millions of Hispanics who would vote heavily Democratic on economic issues.

And they argued that a nation based on the rule of law should not reward lawbreakers. On that basis most Republicans voted against the comprehensive bill co-sponsored by Chuck Schumer and Marco Rubio that passed the Senate in June 2013.

Meanwhile, as the politicians debated, the facts on the ground changed. Net migration from Mexico, the source of more than one-third of all immigrants and about 60 percent of illegals from 1982 to 2007, fell to zero after that.

And polls showed that most Americans favored legalization of the socalled Dreamers, young adults whose parents had across the border when they were children.

Barack Obama, who didn't push immigration legislation when Democrats had Congressional supermajorities in 2009-10, announced he would no longer deport Dreamers who met certain conditions. As on many other issues, he was not troubled by the fact that the Constitution gives the task of passing laws to Congress and requires the president only to faithfully execute them.

That didn't seem to have any political downside. But the facts on the ground changed again. According to the Obama administration, only 4,000 unaccompanied minors approached the border in fiscal year 2011. That rose to 21,000 in fiscal year 2013 and to 47,000 in fiscal year 2014.

Almost all seem to have come overland through Mexico from the Central American republics of Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador. Reports of this unanticipated surge

have been filling television screens.

Instead of being sent back across the border, they have been housed in jammed facilities under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals policy. Some have been given bus tickets to relatives in the United States, according to CNN.

News of this unexpected surge of illegal immigration seems to have contributed to the surprise defeat of House Majority Leader Eric Cantor in the June 13 Virginia Republican primary.

And last Friday the administration dispatched Joe Biden on a previously unscheduled trip to Guatemala to tell people there that, "there is no light at the end of the tunnel.'

Liberals have argued that these teenagers are fleeing the high rates of crime and violence in their native countries. The implication is that they should be admitted as refugees from oppression.



### Samuel Albert Haynes

Sam lived his early years in Pampa where he was active in all sports, inspired by his mother who was a gifted athlete, and who taught her sons to play tennis, and could outrun them until they were grown. Sam led the football team at his elementary school (Sam Houston) and later at Pampa Junior High. At Pampa High School, he was quarterback of the Gorillas

(the Pampa JV football team) until the family moved to McLean to run his grandfather Morse's ranch. Sam graduated from McLean High School in 1947. He was the quarterback for the Tigers during high school, and remained an avid fan for the rest of his life, serving for more than 30 years as the Voice of the Tigers at all the home football games.

He continued his love of sports throughout his life, playing both golf and tennis until well into his seventies. Along with his brother, Johnny, his life-long friend Carl Dwyer and others, he won numerous city championships in doubles tennis.

On June 17, 1949, he married Billie Joyce Thacker. They had two children, Samuel Thacker and Jennifer Lynn. He and his brother John M. operated the Triangle Ranch, until his granddad, J.S. Morse's death, when the ranch was divided. He spent many hours playing softball with the Methodist Mudhens, and coaching a variety of Little League teams. He served more than 13 years on the McLean School Board, many as the president of the board.

After his first marriage ended, he married Linda Ann Raines, a teacher in McLean in 1967, becoming a dad to Linda's children, Kathy Lynne, Scott Curtis, and Sally Ann. In 1971, their daughter Dollie Lee was born. In 1972, the ranch house burned and he moved his family to town, where he became even more active in community affairs.

Sam served as Mayor of McLean, for a total of 18 years. He also served as the chairman of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, the chairman of the Texas Municipal League, member of the Coronado Hospital board, and chairman of the Gray County Appraisal Board for 20 years. He was a member of the McLean Lions Club with more than 50 years of perfect attendance and a member of the Masonic Lodge for more than 60 years.

In his later years, he continued to serve, putting in more than 28 years as the local observer for the National Weather Service and many years as a member of the Lovett Memorial Library board of directors.

His church was a major part of his life. He served the United Methodist Church in McLean in every office, including lay leader and chairman of the board, taught Sunday School, led Methodist Youth, and sang tenor in the church choir for more than 60 years. He sang at funerals and community events as a member of the Men's Quartet for many years.

come to believe that they have permisos to enter and remain in the United States. Once you announce you refuse to enforce one law, people may conclude you won't enforce others either.

The Cantor defeat and the surge of Central American teens make it unlikely that House Republican leaders will advance much in the way of immigration legislation.

Two trends in polling also point in this direction. One is that Hispanic voters don't seem hugely preoccupied with immigration. The Pew Research Center reports that many more focus on education, the economy and health than the one-third who say immigration is "extremely important" to them personally. The other is that the president's job approval among Hispanics has been falling sharply. He got 71 percent of their votes in 2012, but fewer than half approve his performance today. It's not hard to see why. The sluggish economy has hurt Hispanics more than most Americans. Obamacare and big government policies have not helped them as they apparently have hoped. This suggests that non-passage of comprehensive legislation won't hurt Republicans as much as predicted. And inaction, always the easier legislative course, would prevent a debate in which the cries of angry opponents, gleefully highlighted in mainstream media, could antagonize Hispanic voters.

# **Oklahoma residents seek** answers on quakes

**OKLAHOMA** (AP) — Oklahoma residents whose homes and nerves have been shaken by an upsurge in earthquakes want to know what's causing the temblors — and what can be done to stop them.

Hundreds of people are expected to turn out in Edmond, Oklahoma, on Thursday night for a town hall meeting on the issue.

Earthquakes used to be almost unheard of on the vast stretches of prairie that unfold across Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma, but they've become common in recent vears

Oklahoma recorded nearly 150 between January and the start of May. Though most have been too weak to cause serious damage or endanger lives, they've raised suspicions that the shaking might be connected to the oil and gas drilling method known as hydraulic fracturing, especially the wells in which the industry disposes of its wastewater.

Now after years of being toring equipment. harangued by anxious residents, governments in all three states are confronting the issue, reviewing scientific data, holding public discussions and considering new regulations. Thursday's meeting in Oklahoma will include the state agency that regulates oil and gas drilling and the Oklahoma Geological Survey.

States with historically few earthquakes are trying to reconcile the scientific data with the interests of their citizens and the oil and gas industry.

"This is all about managing risks," said Oklahoma Corporation Commission spokesman Matt Skinner. "It's a little more complicated than that because, of course, we're managing perceived risks. There's been no definitive answers, but we're not waiting for one. We have to go with what the data suggests."


Southern Methodist University researchers have recorded more than 300 quakes around Azle since early December, with some days experiencing swarms of hundreds of microquakes and other days none. The geophysicists are measuring the earthquakes to plot out an ancient fault line and are developing models that look at how fluids flow through the layer of rock where the quakes are originating.

Still, seismologists and the oil and gas industry — have taken pains to point out that a clear correlation has not yet been established. Nationwide, the United States has more than 150,000 injection wells, according to the Society of Petroleum Engineers, and only a handful have been proven to induce quakes.





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





### Rangers in another slump, look to rebound versus Twins.

A very rough weekend that looked promising during the preview is finally over for the Texas Rangers. However, they have lost 8 of their last 10 (including seven straight) heading into this weekend's series with the Minnesota Twins.

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
