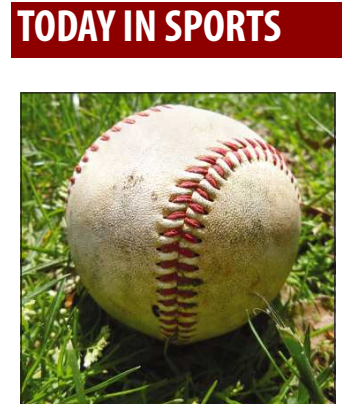

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Pampa ISD school board approves budget and compensation plan

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees met Monday night and had a loaded agenda that kept the Board working until 10:15 p.m.
 The first item discussed in a public meeting by the Board was the proposed 2014-15 Budget and proposed tax rate.
 There were no questions from the public concerning the tax rate, as the Board presented a rate of \$1.04 for maintenance and operations budget and \$.2691 for interest and sinking budget. Both rates are at a \$100 valuation.
 The Board then approved the following consent agenda items:
 • Board minutes from May 27 and June 23 meetings.
 • Monthly financial reports.
 • Region XVI service center contracts.

• 2014-15 fundraising projects.
 The Board moved on to their discussion and action items beginning with the approval of the 2014-15 PHS band trip.
 The PHS band trip for the 2014-15 school year will be a four-day trip, April 30 through May 3, to Branson, Mo. They will see several shows as well the Silver Dollar City. The cost of the trip is a maximum of \$545 per student and will have fundraising opportunities. Pampa ISD superintendent, Dr. David Young, said that the PHS band director, Joe Barrow, told him that this was the most cost-effective trip he has had in his time at Pampa High School.
 The Board received a construction update from James Hicks, president of Wiley Construction, who is doing the work at the elementary schools and McNeely Field House. Hicks explained to the Board that all the construction at the elementary schools is on schedule. McNeely

Field House, because of recent analysis of the foundation and faults with previous work done, will take some "on-site engineering" but will get done on schedule.
 The second segment of the construction and maintenance update came from Marcus Johnson of NextEra Energy.
 Johnson informed the board that arrangements with their previously selected provider of the stadium lights, Pro Sports Lighting, would not ensure completion by the Board's August 22 deadline. NextEra Energy switched providers to Musco. While the lights from Musco will be more costly, NextEra absorbed the difference and ensured the Board that the stadium will be ready by August. NextEra also purchased a 25-year warranty from Musco, which not only covers the lights, but also grants Pampa ISD remote access to their stadium lights.
 Johnson updated the Board on the VHAC delivery, **PISD** cont. on page 5

County Commissioners plan annex repairs

The Gray County Commissioners met on Tuesday morning to discuss a full agenda.
 After paying bills and salaries and approving the recent line item transfers, the Commissioners discussed early termination of a lease to lot 11 at Perry Lefors Airport.
 On this lot, there is a fallen hangar without a roof, and the leasers have requested to end their lease.
 For the next agenda item, the Commissioners approved two road crossings. One was at County Road 5 and County Road E and the other was at County Road 5 and County Road E South.
 Next on the agenda was in regards to employee cell phone use within the county offices. Commissioner Joe Wheeley brought to the attention of the court the fact that there was not previously a policy on cell phone use in the employee handbook. He presented his fellow commissioners with a general policy to be added to the handbook that will enable each department head to determine his or her own restrictions on cell phone use in that particular office.
 The next two items on the agenda were discussed simultaneously. During the June 22 wind storm, the Gray County Annex was severely damaged. Though the roof has recently been repaired with patches, it could not withstand the 93 mph winds that the storm brought along with it. The high winds destroyed the roof, and there is a portion of it lying in the annex parking lot.
 Those people who work out of the annex have been displaced since the storm, and most of these employees have either moved to work out of Panhandle for the time being or are working in the motor bank across the street from the court house.

The Cottage Collection has been open in Pampa since 1991. Though it originally called another location home, the store has been at 922 W. 23rd Ave. since 1995.
 Owner Dolores Spurrier decided to open the store after her husband passed away in 1989.
 "I had to make a living," she said.
 Spurrier has experienced much success since opening the store and was able to pay off her 15-year lease in only 10 years.
 She likes to think that her store has a little bit of everything. With three employees and numerous volunteers and booth renters, she says the wide variety of merchandise is what makes her business unique.
 "I have between 50 and 60 booth renters, and they price their own things," Spurrier said. "I'm just the jolly salesperson."

Some examples of products offered at The Cottage Collection include antiques, clothing and collectibles.
 Her favorite part about doing business in Pampa is getting to talk to all the people who come into her store.
 She had help running the store from her daughter, who is from Alaska, for a while, but she ended up having to take care of her husband when he became ill, and has been unable to help out as much. Spurrier has since hired a new employee, Kevin Monds, to help her run the show.
 "He is just terrific," she said.
 As for her future plans, she is just taking things day by day for the time being.
 The Cottage Collection is open daily from 10 a.m.-5:30 p.m. and on Thursdays from 11 a.m.-6 or 6:30 p.m. The Thursday hours are different because she realizes that not everyone can make it out to her store after work on the days the store is only open until 5:30.

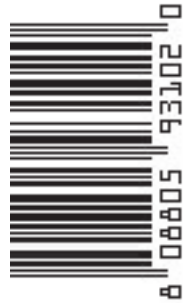

The concern was also brought up for the equipment that has yet to be moved out of the annex completely. Everything currently being stored in the annex will probably have to be moved out before repairs can begin because the building will not only need a new roof, but carpet and possibly even walls in some areas as well.

After discussing the emergency need for a new roof on the building, Commissioner Gary Willoughby introduced an engineer from Crenshaw Consulting Group, LLC. This is the company that recently came in during the repairs on the bull barn, and county employees were pleased with the job done on that project.

It is a state law that an engineer be brought in to assess the necessary changes on projects like these, and the court voted to use Crenshaw Consulting Group, LLC to come in for the annex repairs as well. The en-

gineer will go in and propose changes at an estimated cost that will have to be approved by the insurance company (Duncan, Fraser and Bridges) before bids can be taken from roofing companies in the area for the job.

The workers who have been temporarily displaced plan to move back and work out of the Gray County Annex after repairs have been made.

Though there was an agenda item set aside to consider a tax abatement agreement with Grandview Wind Farm II, LLC, there was no action

taken on this particular item.

The Commissioners heard from a representative from Clarendon EDC and two representatives from Cielo Wind Power, one of the companies preparing to potentially build wind turbines in Gray County and other surrounding counties.

This is a huge project for Donley County because there is no oil and gas production work currently going on in the county, unlike Gray County.

The representative from Clarendon EDC brought to the attention of the court the

importance of this project by speaking about the pipeline project Donley County had last year that created a small boom for the town by increasing sales tax by 20 percent.

Tourism has decreased in Donley County since Lake Greenbelt has been down over the past few years now, so the wind farm project would be a huge opportunity for that county.

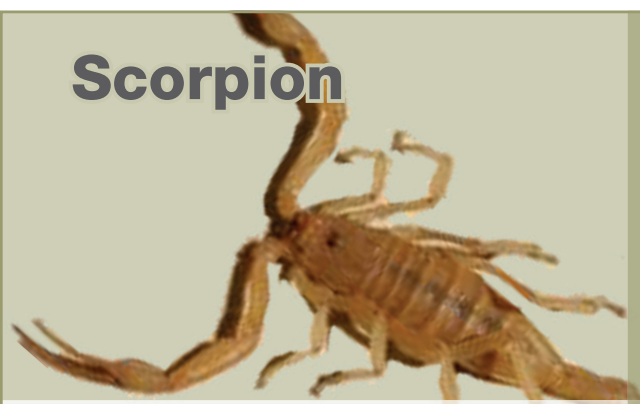
The Gray County Commissioners are in favor of supporting this project as long as the participating wind companies have

reached necessary crossing agreements, which has yet to happen at this point.

The possible abatement will be on the next meeting agenda, set for July 15, at which point the Commissioners intend to see if the two wind companies (E.ON and Cielo) have reached an agreement on crossings for the project.

The next Gray County Commission meeting will be held at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, July 15 on the second floor of the Gray County Courthouse, located at 205 N. Russell St.

Scorpion



Scorpions have a crablike appearance with four pairs of legs, a pair of pincers, and a long, segmented tail that curls up, with a stinger on the end. Most species of scorpions reach adulthood at a length of between 2 and 3 inches. Scorpions like to live in cool, damp places like basements, wood-piles, and junk piles. 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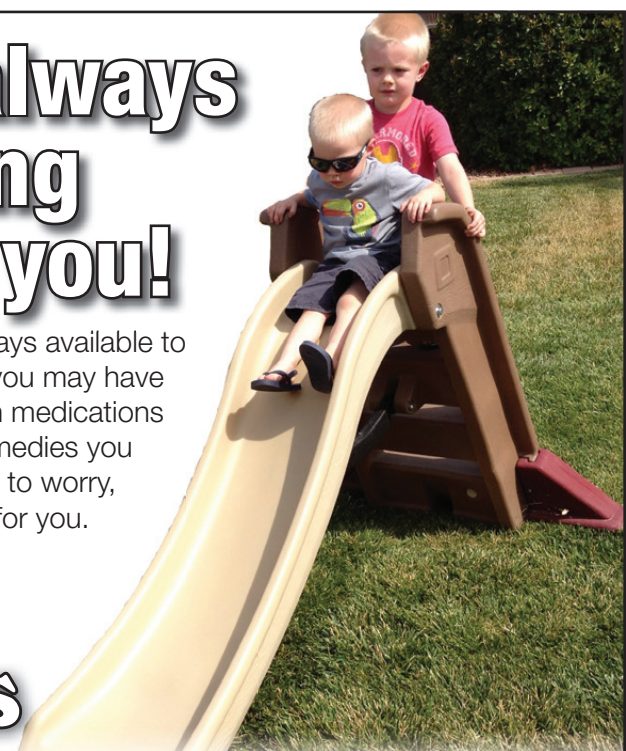
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2014-2015 TOTRA RODEO QUEEN

William J. "Bill" Berry, 79, passed away on June 29, 2014 in Pampa.

Mr. Berry, who chose to be called "Bill," was born Nov. 12, 1934 in Du Bois, Pa. to Jessie Mae and William James Berry. He arrived second in a family of 11. Bill and his family resided in the Du Bois area until he was 13. His father was a J.C. Penney Company manager and was transferred by Penny's to Bluefield, W.V. where Bill attended high school.

After high school, Bill attended John Brown University in Siloam Springs, Ark. from 1952 until 1956 when he completed a BS degree in agriculture. Upon graduation, he married his college sweetheart, Donna Girouard of Perryton. He had been a resident of Pampa for 58 years.

His first employment after college was with Frontier Perforators, an oilfield well completion service firm in Pampa, working from 1956 until 1966. In 1966, he and two others co-founded Titan Specialties Inc., where he served as vice president and president, until selling the business in 2006, and retiring in 2008. Bill worked 52 years designing, manufacturing and distributing products used in the oil and gas well completion process.

During his career, Bill developed a great interest in leadership studies and read many books on the subject. He loved people and loved to see young people have the opportunity to equip themselves for life by pursuing higher educational opportunities.

Bill was a Trustee of John Brown University and served on the JBU Development Committee from 1997 until June of 2012. He served as Development Committee chair from 2011 until June of 2012. He continued serving as Trustee Emeritus up until the time of his death. Bill loved this Christian university, and loved to see it grow and develop into the highly respected facility it is today. Locally, he served a term on the Pampa EDC, plus several years on the Pampa Industrial Foundation.

He was a devoted husband, father and grandfather. Bill accepted Jesus Christ as his Savior when he was 11, loved the Lord, and was active in church work throughout his life. This includes serving on church boards, teaching Sunday school classes, serving as Sunday school superintendent and singing with the senior's choir at Central Baptist Church.

He was preceded in death by his youngest sister, Barbara Jane Furrow, who passed away on Oct. 20, 1987 at age 34, and his older sister, Dorothy Jean Howington, who passed away on July 31, 2008 at the age of 75.

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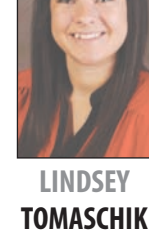
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Hump Day with Humphrey Humphrey just doesn't understand

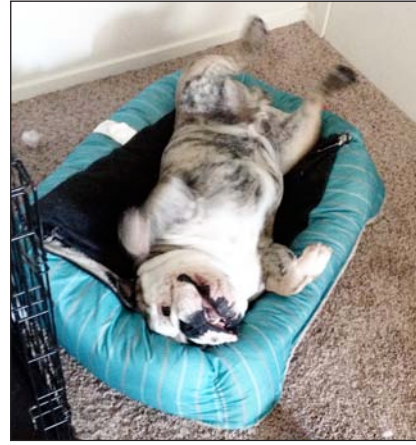

Free to choose vs. cost-free access

How did women get birth control before President Barack Obama's

Affordable Care Act? Before Obamacare, a woman could go to a doctor and get birth control.

She often had to pay or make a copayment for contraception. But in the 2014 political lexicon, that means she had no access. On Monday, the Supreme Court issued its 5-4 Hobby Lobby decision, which recognized family-owned corporations' religious right to not offer contraception mandated under the Affordable Care Act in their employee health insurance plans. In her dissenting opinion, Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg charged that the ruling would "deny legions of women who do not hold their employers' religious beliefs access to contraceptive coverage that the ACA would otherwise secure."

The Obama administration broadly prescribed what constituted health insurance coverage in 2012 when the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services announced that contraception constituted essential preventive care. Hence, under Obamacare, birth control is exempt from copayments and mandatory in most employer-sponsored health plans.

What if employers have deeply held religious objections against contraceptive methods that they consider to be abortion-inducing? Surely, the Obama administration expected resistance.

It came from Hobby Lobby CEO David Green, who, as a devout Christian, had been providing health care to his 13,000 full-time workers for years. The company plan included contraception — but not four methods that Green and his family believe "risk killing an embryo." In a court brief, Hobby

Lobby objected to being forced to be "complicit in abortion."

If the Obama administration were tolerant, then the White House could have worked to accommodate dissent by allowing employers with demonstrated religious beliefs to opt out of Obamacare.

Indeed, the Affordable Care Act already exempts grandfathered employer-sponsored health plans — which means about a third of workers have health coverage that does not include birth control. Obamacare also exempts small employers from the contraception mandate. Surely, if the Obama administration can exempt millions of workers for reasons of political expediency, then it can find a way to exempt the rare corporation with strong moral objections.

Mark Rienzi — senior counsel of The Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, which represented Hobby Lobby in court — hailed the ruling as "a great decision for freedom and diversity." In a free country, he argued, the government knows that "the answer is not to crush people for having different beliefs."

Justice Samuel Alito Jr. wrote for the majority: "There are other ways in which Congress or HHS could equally ensure that every woman has cost-free access to the particular contraceptives at issue here."

Here's a radical idea: If Washington wants to make birth control free, let Washington pay for it.

Here's another radical idea: To paraphrase the U.S. Constitution, let Washington pass no regulations prohibiting the free exercise of religion.

The whole push for reproductive rights started as a quest to establish a woman's right to choose. Now family-owned corporations have choice, too.

Broadway conjures magic with 'The Illusionists'

NEW YORK (AP) — Magic will be take center stage on Broadway this winter in a new, high-paced show but don't expect just one illusionist with a trick up his sleeve. Try seven.

"The Illusionists" starring seven international stars of magic — ranging from a card conjurer to a wizard with a crossbow — will play the Marriott Marquis Theatre from Nov. 26-Jan. 4, the first time in almost 20 years that a magic show plays Broadway. "We're going to bring magic back to how it's supposed to be — a good, solid, inspiring sort of form of entertainment," said Dan Sperry, whose macabre show often features spinning blades and whose motto is "Magic No Longer Sucks."

The rest of the lineup includes Italy's star escape artist Andrew Basso, Belgium's weapon specialist

Aaron Crow, campy magician Jeff Hobson, illusionist and "America's Got Talent" veteran Kevin James and Yu Ho-Jin, a Korean who just won the title of "Magician of the Year."

"The idea was to take the seven greatest living illusionists in their respective fields and put them together. It's almost like The Avengers of magic," said Simon Painter, the show's originator and lead producer.

The show first sold out at the Sydney Opera House in 2012 and went on to play Singapore, Mexico, New Zealand, Brazil, Venezuela and Britain. A new version focusing on futuristic acts — "Illusionists 2.0" — debuted last year in Australia and a hybrid of the two shows now comes to Broadway, called "Witness the Impossible." Tickets go on sale Tuesday.

Painter's goal is to do with

magic what Cirque du Soleil did with circus — get rid of the dated lions and sequins and make it adult, sophisticated fun. His show has a throbbing rock beat and intelligent pacing.

"What we've done is make it a theatrical experience rather than it being a flashy, Las Vegas, showmanship experience. The theatricality was an important change that we made," he said.

The show will do a few tune-up stops around Thanksgiving in Akron, Ohio, and Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania. Then, after its six-week Broadway engagement, it hits the road in America, visiting Washington, D.C., Indianapolis, Philadelphia, Dallas, Detroit, Houston, Salt Lake City and Tampa, Florida, among other cities.

The last big magic show on Broadway was a David Copperfield special that played a

few weeks in late 1996 and Sperry, who was inspired to do magic after seeing Copperfield at age 4, is aware of the pressure.

"We've got big shoes to fill," said Sperry, whose Broadway act is still being finalized but will likely include a shotgun. "It's like go big or go home. We really have to try and bring it."

To be sure, there's always been magic on Broadway, whether it's the tricks in "Pippin" to the costume changes in "Rodgers and Hammerstein's Cinderella." But the illusionists say magic deserves to be the main event.

"We're presenting it the way it deserves to be presented — not as a throwaway effect or an add-on to a song. But as a stand-alone act in and of itself," said Adam Trent, nicknamed "The Futurist," who will focus on technology-based illusions.

stating that it is on schedule with the first shipment July 11 and the second shipment coming on July 16.

After his update, Johnson presented the Board with a \$500 check on behalf of NextEra to be put towards the Heritage Room located at the administration building.

After approving the final budget amendment for this calendar year, it was time to move on to the compensation plan portion of the budget.

The first topic addressed was the shortage of certified ESL instructors. In order to help with the recruitment and retention of ESL certified instructors, Pampa ISD will include a \$3,000 stipend on top of the salary for these high-need certified ESL instructors. The certified ESL instructors currently receive a \$1,500 stipend.

There was also the discussion of a ELL coordinator position, one at the junior high and one at the high school. Should this position be filled by an instructor with a full class schedule, they will receive at \$6,000 stipend. Should it be incorporated into their schedule by giving the person open class periods, the stipend will be \$2,000.

The budget also included a three-percent pay increase. This pay increase, according to Pampa ISD executive director of finance, Danny Seaborn, is

taken from the middle point between the highest and lowest points on the salary scale.

It was noted at the meeting that the State-mandated recommended entry-level salary is \$27,320; Pampa's entry-level salary is \$43,458.

The Board approved the 2014-15 Pampa ISD Budget and Compensation plan.

Sticking to payroll-type topics, Seaborn then presented the Board with the Deferred Compensation 457(b) Compensation Plan.

Pampa ISD is no longer going to use First Financial Group of America as their administrator of staff's plans due to various complications, and the Texas Association of School Board severing ties with FFGA. The District will now use U.S. Employee Benefits Services Groups as their administrator, who uses Omni Financial as a 457 (b) provider.

The Board approved this switch.

The next agenda item concerned the property that is the Mann Facility. There were many options researched over the past several months concerning the facility, including turning it into a wrestling facility or a storage facility.

None of the options would have been cost-effective, so the Board approved the demolition of the building and for Pampa ISD to set out to bid on a demolition contractor. The Board will also address what to do with the property at a later date. Dr. Young said that it could still be of

use to Pampa ISD as it is very centrally located.

A technology upgrade was the next topic presented to the Board. Dennis Boyd, network administrator for Pampa ISD, presented the board with the District's needs.

The first need was a 24 TB district storage server, which will cost \$21,959.24.

The second need is a 10 TB back-up server, which will cost \$49,210.98. The back-up server costs more because it includes more software, while the district storage server is strictly hardware.

The wireless upgrade was the priciest item, costing \$249,105.04.

The Board only had to approve the 10 TB back-up server as everything else was being purchased with the funds received from Gray County. The procurement laws say that the Board has to approve anything over \$25,000. The Board approved the technology plan at an early meeting, the wireless upgrade was in the technology plan, which is why they didn't have to vote on it.

Ever the hot topic, assistant to the superintendent Eddie Gage presented the Board with the Student Code of Conduct.

The major addition was including "vape" products and electric cigarettes to the tobacco section of the Code of Conduct.

To the dress code, there was the removal of the requirement to tucked in shirt tails, the prohibition of outer wear for grades 4-12 such as hoodies and sweat-

ers and the allowance of letting the Board disallow writing on t-shirts.

The amendments made to the dress code was that all clothing must be appropriately sized, no pictures of facsimiles of non-school appropriate topics and cheerleading uniforms must conform to dress code except at pep rallies, games and cheer-designated events.

The Board approved these changes.

After being declared an emergency just last week, the designation of a contractor to repair the damage at Pampa Junior High was on the agenda.

The Board selected Blackmon-Mooring as a contractor, and Dr. Young is responsible for signing the contract for \$89,635 or any amount needed by the insurance company. The District is only out the \$10,000 deductible plus the 10 percent recoverable depreciation.

Moving on to the reports portion of the meeting, Dr. Young presented the board with the arrests and citations report for the 2014 Spring semester. Pampa Junior High had three arrests, Pampa High School had five arrests and Pampa Learning Center had one arrest. Pampa Junior High had one citation and Pampa High School had seven citations.

In the major injury report, there were 10 injuries across all campuses. Eight at the elementary level and two at Pampa Junior High. There were three injuries each at Travis Elementary

and Lamar Elementary, and one each at Wilson Elementary and Austin Elementary.

The end-of-year enrollment count was up 65 students this year at 3,671 students.

Executive director of curriculum and instruction, Tanya Larkin, then presented the Board with the STAAR testing and End of Course exam results.

On STAAR testing, Lar-

kin said there were areas of excellence and areas of concern. But on the End of Course exams, the District is comparable to the rest of Texas.

Gas prices drop heading into 4th of July

IRVING — People driving to Independence Day celebrations will get a slight break at the gas pumps this week. The average price for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in the Lone Star State is now \$3.50, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is two cents lower than one week ago and 17 cents less than the national average of \$3.67. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in El Paso are paying the most at \$3.57 per gallon while drivers in Amarillo and Corpus Christi are paying the least at \$3.41 per gallon.

Gas prices often decline in June as refineries complete maintenance and increase gasoline production in anticipation of the summer driving season. However, that did not happen this year due to unexpected violence in Iraq. The situation in Iraq continues to put pressure on global oil prices, as markets weigh the potential for supply disruptions from OPEC's second largest producer. These elevated oil prices have ultimately meant stubbornly high retail gasoline prices for drivers.

Despite the higher prices

at the pumps for this time of year, analysts do not believe they will have a significant impact on the number of people traveling, but could result in some consumers cutting back on dining, shopping or other trip activities. AAA Texas forecasts three million Texans will travel 50 miles or more away from home during the Independence Day travel period which runs from Wed., July 2 to Sun., July 6. Of those Texans expected to travel for the 4th of July, 2.5 million will go by automobile.

"Before heading out on a road trip, make sure your car or truck is maintained according to manufacturer recommendations, including tire pressure and tire tread," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "Also, make sure ev-

eryone is buckled up properly including children in age and weight appropriate child safety seats, pay attention to the road ahead by not being distracted, obey speed limits and never drink and drive."

2 special times with Ed

My friend and brother in Christ, Ed Cooley, is HOME. I'm so envious I don't even know how to put it into words. He is where I yearn to be every morning when I awaken. I rejoice with him and have been thinking of some of the times we had together while he was ministering here in Pampa at First Presbyterian Church. I want to share two of those memories.

When Ed and I were first friends, we weren't like best friends. We participated in some joint community projects and had a mutual respect for each other. One morning after I had finished my coffee time with Nathan Hopson, I stopped by Albertson's Supermarket (that dates this story). As I was walking to the entrance I heard someone call out my name. It was Ed. As he approached me I could see that his eyes were red, he had obviously been crying. I asked him if he was OK and if there was anything I could do. He had a hard time talking, so those of you who know me well know that I teared-up and had the same difficult time speaking. I'm sure it was a strange sight there in the Albertson's parking lot.

He shared with me that there were some people causing incredible trouble in his life and ministry and that he needed prayer support. I was so honored that he sought me out to pray for him. I asked him if several of us ministers could come over to his office and lay hands on him and pray. If you know Ed well, you probably know his answer. He thanked me for being willing to do that, but just asked me to pray myself and not tell others. I'm of the other extreme when I need prayer support, I want everyone to know and be praying. However, I respected his wishes and prayed hard for him. I called one day to check on him and he was full of joy. Somehow the Lord had delivered him from the troubles. We both praised the Lord together on the phone. That was a special day in our relationship.

The next memory I want to share is of another kind. To say that Ed and I did not agree on everything is a significant understatement. We even had a few conversations on spiritual matters that got pretty intense. One

Friday night at a Harvester football game I found myself contemplating on spiritual matters that I thought were very important and struggling with those ministers that I knew who were not on the same page. The more I pondered, the more agitated I got. So by the fourth quarter of the game, I was all angry on the inside. One of the ministers I found myself angry with was Ed. That is when, right there in Harvester stadium, Father God whacked me hard. I teared-up and knew that I had to leave. I told Shari I had to go and made sure that she had a ride home. I didn't even know where to go or what to do. Then God led me to the M. K. Brown Auditorium.

At first I didn't know why I was there, so I began to walk around the facility, praying for some guidance, some discernment concerning my anger. That is when the Lord reminded me of a conversation Ed and I had once. Ed was sharing his personal testimony with me and it moved us both to tears. I asked him about the theological and spiritual changes that he had made in his life as a minister, concluding with, "So Ed, have you changed your attitude toward scripture too?"

At first he got a little red faced, but then realized that my question wasn't a dig, but an honest question. He paused for a moment, his eye filled with tears again, his voice got shaky and he said, "Mike, I would die for God's Word."

That was the reminder that I needed from the Lord. You see, Ed and I disagreed about a lot of things that both of us felt very strongly about. However, we totally agreed on all of the "Jesus" matters. That meant that we agreed on the "mountain" issues and only disagreed on the "molehill" things. At that moment the Lord took away my anger, gave me the gift of peace and reminded me not to be angry over molehills. Father God used Ed that night to help me. And as I have been writing this article, it pains me to say that I don't think I ever told Ed about that night. So Ed, forgive me for not sharing that sooner. Enjoy your new cancer free home and keep my seat warm for me until I get there.

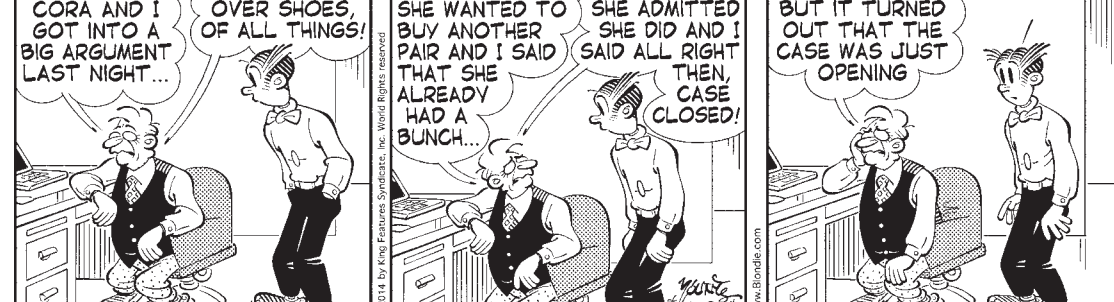
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Tens of thousands of Israelis mourn slain teens

JERUSALEM (AP) — Tens of thousands of mourners converged Tuesday in central Israel for a funeral service for three teenagers found dead in the West Bank after a two week search and crackdown on the Hamas militant group, which Israeli leaders have accused of abducting and killing the young men.

The deaths of Eyal Yifrah, 19, Gilad Shaar, 16, and Naftali Fraenkel, a 16-year-old with dual Israeli-American citizenship, have prompted angry calls for revenge and Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu convened his security Cabinet for an emergency meeting to discuss a response to the killings, hours after airstrikes targeted dozens of suspected Hamas positions in the Gaza Strip.

Israeli troops also shot dead a Palestinian man in the West Bank, where the teens disappeared on June 12. Israel has accused the Hamas militant group of carrying out the abduction, and Netanyahu has warned "Hamas will pay."

The three young men were buried side by side in the central Israeli town of Modiin. Mourners arrived in large convoys of buses arranged for the ceremony. Netanyahu and President Shimon Peres were among the speakers to eulogize the youths, whose bodies were wrapped in blue and white Israeli flags and laid on stretchers. Hundreds of people also participated in separate memorial services in the hometowns of the three teens.

"Recently, the people of Israel went through a great trauma," said Shirel Shaar, Gilad's younger

sister. "We are living as if we are in a movie, whose ending is as bad as can be," she said. "I don't have a brother anymore."

"We are burying a child today, a child who could have been the child of anyone of us," said Finance Minister Yair Lapid. "Therefore he is indeed the child of each and every one of us."

Israeli officials say the three were abducted while hitchhiking home from the Jewish seminaries where they were studying near the West Bank city of Hebron.

Hamas has praised the kidnappings but not confirmed or denied Israeli allegations that it was involved.

Their disappearances prompted the army to launch its largest ground operation in the West Bank in nearly a decade, dispatching thousands of troops to search for them and arresting nearly 400 Hamas operatives. The search came to a sad end on Monday afternoon when the bodies were found buried under a pile of rocks in a field north of Hebron.

The crackdown on Hamas in the West Bank has been accompanied by a spike in rocket fire out of the Hamas-controlled Gaza Strip. At sundown, Gaza militants fired five more rockets toward Israel, raising the total number of rockets launched Tuesday to 10, the army said. The barrage, which caused no damage or injuries, raised the likelihood of new Israeli reprisals.

Overnight Tuesday, the Israeli air force carried out airstrikes on 34 targets, including a Hamas compound, the military

said. Palestinian officials said four people were wounded.

In the West Bank, Israeli troops shot and killed a 20-year-old Palestinian man during a raid in the northern town of Jenin. Israel said the man had thrown a grenade at the troops. But his family said he had been carrying eggs home for a predawn meal before the daylight fast for the Ramadan holiday.

Israeli authorities have released few details on the abduction, or the search for the teens. On Tuesday, Israeli media published a recording of an emergency call made to police by one of the teens shortly after the abduction.

"They kidnapped me," a voice, believed to be Shaar, can be heard saying. Another male voice is then heard, shouting, "head down." Police confirmed the recording is authentic. Hotline workers initially dismissed the call as a hoax, delaying the rescue efforts for several hours, and several workers have been disciplined for the mishap.

Israel has not yet decided how it will respond to the deaths of the youths. Netanyahu's Security Cabinet held a stormy, three-hour meeting late Monday but was unable to agree on a response. It was to meet again on Tuesday.

The Israeli daily Haaretz said that Defense Minister Moshe Yaalon had proposed building a new settlement in the West Bank in memory of the teens. Another Cabinet minister, Naftali Bennett, proposed a large-scale military operation in Gaza and to begin using

the death penalty against Palestinian militants.

Israel is also reportedly considering the deportation of senior Hamas members from the West Bank to Gaza, where they would face tight travel restrictions and be separated from their families.

In Jerusalem, several hundred right-wing Israeli youths, many of them skullcap-wearing Orthodox Jews, marched through a main road, screaming for revenge. Police escorted the crowd, which briefly blocked Jerusalem's light rail service, as it made its way toward the city center.

The Security Cabinet was scheduled to meet later Tuesday after the funerals to continue its debate.

Thousands of Israelis have died in wars and militant attacks over the years, and Israel has grappled with the abduction of soldiers and civilians in the past. But the ages of the victims, and the fact that they were unarmed civilians, struck a raw nerve.

Israel has said two well-known Hamas operatives from Hebron are the primary suspects. The men, Marwan Qawasmeh and Amer Abu Aisheh, have not been seen since the teens went missing, and military officials said the search for them would continue.

Israeli soldiers blew up a door of Abu Aisheh's home in Hebron early Tuesday, said an Israeli military official, speaking on condition of anonymity due to protocol. AP photos show extensive damage to one side of the house.

Despite the public up-

roar, Netanyahu's options could be limited.

After a two-week crackdown on Hamas in the West Bank, few major targets remain there. Hamas had already been weakened by seven years of pressure by Israel and the forces of Western-backed Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas.

Israel could turn its attention toward the Gaza Strip, where it has been battling a surge in rocket fire since the teens went missing.

Israel also might consider stronger political action. The crisis has escalated already heightened tensions between Israel and the new Palestinian government, which

is headed by Abbas but backed by Hamas.

Hamas, an offshoot of the region-wide Muslim Brotherhood, is deeply rooted in Palestinian society. The movement's political goal is an Islamic state in all of historic Palestine, including the territory that now makes up Israel.

Netanyahu has called on Abbas to end his alliance with Hamas, saying he cannot be serious about peace while cooperating with a group sworn to Israel's destruction. Israel and its Western allies consider Hamas, which has killed hundreds of Israelis in suicide bombings and other attacks, a terrorist group.

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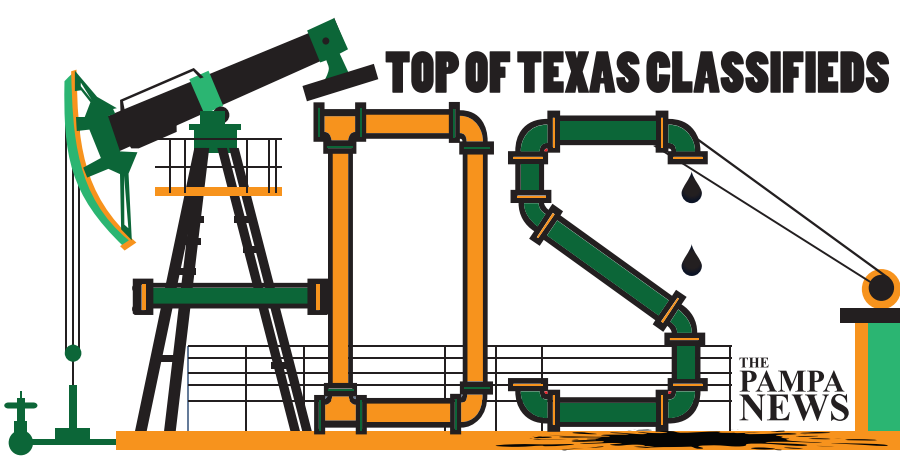

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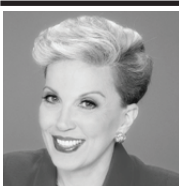

Summer TV: It should come with danger warnings

NEW YORK (AP) — It's a frightful world on TV these days.

A rash of scripted summer thrillers cautions viewers to batten down the hatches. Watch out who you let nibble on your neck! Hold your loved ones tight before they vanish into thin air! And with all the deadly viruses at large, you better bathe in Purell!

A certain brand of TV drama has always kept its audience on high alert, at least as far back as "The Twilight Zone." But these days, with agencies hacking your email, new diseases cropping up, ice caps melting and drones overhead, viewers are sitting ducks for the titillation of dramatized threats to offer welcome distraction from the real thing.

The message is clear: Danger lurks everywhere. On your airline flight, you might get something even worse than the food, resulting in a plane that lands at JFK full of passengers-turned-corpse.

That's the big start of "The Strain," premiering July 13. And things quickly worsen. Side effects for each victim on this FX series include rapid hair loss and a blood-sucking proboscis.

This apocalypse has been loosed by evil forces. The only hope for humanity's salvation is Dr. Ephraim Goodweather (played by series star Corey Stoll). He vows to save the day.

Same with the pandemic on TNT's new "The Last Ship" (airing Sundays). By chance, an Arctic-stationed Navy destroyer has evaded

this mass outbreak, leaving the crew with the duty of saving what's left of humanity. Good thing they just happen to have onboard a renowned paleomicrobiologist, Dr. Rachel Scott (played by Rhona Mitra). She's humanity's only hope for salvation. She vows to save the day.

This virus of unknown origin has already killed 80 percent of the world's population.

By contrast, a relatively meager 2 percent have disappeared on "The Leftovers," abracadabra, with no warning. But the 98 percent left behind are reeling from the mass exodus.

This HBO series (premiering Sunday) focuses on what's left of tiny Mapleton, New York, as citizens scratch their heads and feud

about the root cause: rape, or random catastrophe? Meanwhile, birth control — in outer space — poses a dilemma on the CBS drama "Extant" (premiering July 9).

Halle Berry plays an astronaut who returns home from a yearlong solo mission only to discover that, on her flight, she was somehow impregnated. Pretty awkward, since she has a husband who was waiting faithfully back at home — and who, like her, had long believed she was unable to conceive.

Could she be the victim of an extraterrestrial rooftop? But who's the dad? Something sinister seems to be afoot, with a NASA official part of the mischief. And to make matters worse, the

adorable robot child she and hubby are raising as their flesh-and-blood son just might be a psychopath, not to mention the harbinger of a robot uprising.

Is there any refuge from robot bullies, killer germs and cosmic abductions? Well, you might look to Chester's Mill, Maine, a once-serene village that was cut off from the outside world, with no notice or explanation, by a Pyrex-on-steroids prison.

This, of course, is the plight on "Under the Dome," the CBS hit returning for its second season June 30. The citizens of Chester's Mill are protected from invaders all right, but they manage to create plenty of grief for themselves, isolated claustrophobically within.

So pick your poison:

Cajun Country is plagued by the sexy but menacing vampires of "True Blood" (airing its final season on HBO on Sundays).

In post-apocalyptic Boston, civilians battle an intergalactic alien invasion on TNT's "Falling Skies" (in its fourth season on Sundays).

A sequel to last year's goofy Syfy horror film, "Sharknado," is set for August, when the CBS hit returning for its second season June 30. So pick your poison:

Analysis: Iraq producing unusual Mideast dynamic

WASHINGTON (AP) — Strange bedfellows, indeed.

The Obama administration has found itself in a foreign policy and national security pickle of rare complexity with the apparent entry of Syria into the Iraq conflict on the side of the U.S.-backed government in Baghdad, as well as active Iranian military support for Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki.

Washington already was toeing a delicate line with Shiite Iran, which the U.S. deems the world's most active state sponsor of terrorism, over their common short-term interest in turning back the advance of militant Sunni rebels in Iraq.

Now, to its dismay, Syrian President Bashar Assad — regarded in Washington as a pariah who should be ousted — has joined the club with what U.S. and Iraqi officials say are airstrikes against the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant in western Iraq.

ISIL had been fighting Assad in Syria before

turning its major focus to seizing large swaths of northern Iraq.

Assad is being supported by Iran in his country's own civil war with opposition forces, and a decision for Syria to hit ISIL on Iraqi soil is perhaps not surprising. While al-Maliki may not like Syrian attacks on Iraqi territory, "if it distracts the Islamic State from its trek toward Baghdad for a while, then they will welcome it," said Robert Ford, former U.S. ambassador to Syria.

But as Iraq's other immediate neighbors — Jordan, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and Turkey — bolster their defenses, the new fighting threatens to unravel a byzantine balance of Mideast alliances and enmities that the United States long has sought to manage. The U.S. is deploying 300 special forces to train and advise the Iraqi army and is conducting surveillance flights.

Iran is also flying surveillance drones over Iraq in aid of al-Maliki's government, and on Tuesday, Syrian planes killed 17

people in a strike in Iraq's mainly Sunni Anbar province, according to U.S. and Iraqi officials.

American and Iranian officials have had some direct discussions on the matter, though the administration has ruled out the prospect of direct military cooperation or coordination with Iran.

However, amid widespread concern, notably among Sunni Arab states and Israel, about the convergence of U.S., Iranian and Syrian policies on ISIL, President Barack Obama's national security team has scrambled to produce a consistent and coherent message to the region. Administration officials said intervention by Syria was not the way to stem the insurgents, who have taken control of several cities in northern and western Iraq.

"We've made it clear to everyone in the region that we don't need anything to take place that might exacerbate the sectarian divisions that are already at a heightened level of tension," Secretary of

State John Kerry said at a meeting of NATO foreign ministers in Brussels. "It's already important that nothing take place that contributes to the extremism or could act as a flash point with respect to the sectarian divide."

Obama and his top aides have said repeatedly that the only way to resolve the crisis is for Iraqi leaders to come together and form a truly inclusive and representative government in which all three of the country's main ethnic and religious groups — Sunni, Shiite and Kurd — have a voice.

Yet, it remains unclear if al-Maliki is willing to allow such an administration to be formed, and as long as the crisis continues, Gulf Arab countries with their long and deep distrust of Iran in particular are watching Iraq with increasingly dire concern.

Underscoring the urgency, Kerry, who traveled to Baghdad and the Kurdish city of Irbil this week, met in Paris on Thursday with the foreign ministers of Saudi Arabia, the United

Arab Emirates and Jordan.

"The move of ISIL concerns every single country here," Kerry said at the start of the meeting held at the U.S. ambassador's residence in Paris.

He said the talks with foreign ministers from Jordan, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates also would touch on "number of critical issues" — including negotiations about Iran's nuclear program and the stalled peace effort between Israel and Palestinian authorities.

Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Saud al-Faisal called the discussions "of immense importance for our countries."

In another sign of how critical the situation has become, Kerry was also meeting in Paris with Lebanon's prime minister and Israel's foreign ministers. He will fly to Saudi Arabia on Friday to hold similar talks with King Abdullah.

At the White House, spokesman Josh Earnest blamed Assad for the rise of the extremists and warned that Syrian intervention could make mat-

ters worse.

"The solution to the threat confronting Iraq is not the intervention of the Assad regime," he told reporters. "In fact, it's the Assad regime and the terrible violence that they perpetrated against their own people that allowed ISIL to thrive in the first place.

The solution to Iraq's security challenge does not involve militias or the murderous Assad regime, but the strengthening of the Iraqi security forces to combat threats."

Karim Sadjipour, an Iran expert with the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, said the situation in Iraq, coupled with ongoing U.S.-Iran nuclear negotiations, have produced a "bizarre dynamic" in which the United States and Saudi Arabia appear to be "allies but not friends" and the United States and Iran appear to be "friends but not allies."

The addition to the mix of Syria's Assad is likely to further muddy the waters.

Cannibal-plot case tossed; ex-cop gets out of jail

NEW YORK (AP) — A former New York Police Department officer left jail on Tuesday after a judge stunned prosecutors and overturned his conviction in a sensational case accusing him of plotting on the Internet to kidnap and eat young women, including his wife.

Judge Paul Gardephe ruled late Monday that there was insufficient evidence to support a jury's guilty verdict in the kidnapping conspiracy conviction of Gilberto Valle. He agreed with defense arguments that the defendant's bizarre exchanges

in fetish chat rooms about cannibalizing women never put anyone in danger.

Valle's "depraved, misogynistic sexual fantasies about his wife, former college classmates and acquaintances undoubtedly reflected a mind eased," the judge wrote.

But, he added, prosecutors failed to prove he had entered into genuine agreements to kidnap the women and taken concrete steps to carry them out.

At a hearing Tuesday before his release, Valle dubbed the "Cannibal Cop" by the tabloids

smiled at his family and hugged his lawyers in court. Once outside, he told reporters he was eager to go home after spending more than 20 months behind bars.

"I want to take this opportunity to apologize to everyone I hurt, shocked and offended with my infantile behavior," he said. He also thanked his family and fellow inmates at a federal lockup for helping him endure an "impossible situation."

Valle, 40, "is guilty of nothing more than very unconventional thoughts," said one of his attorneys,

Julia Gatto. "We don't put people in jail for their thoughts. We are not the thought police."

The judge set bail at \$100,000 and ordered home detention in Queens for the defendant after prosecutors told him they intended to appeal his ruling.

"The government believes the jury got it right," said Assistant U.S. Attorney Hadassa Waxman.

Valle was arrested in 2012 after his wife discovered disturbing material on his computer and reported it to the FBI. He

was convicted in March 2013 on the conspiracy charge — which carries a possible life term — and a misdemeanor count of illegally accessing a law enforcement database.

At trial, prosecutors had argued that Valle took steps to carry out his plot, including looking up potential targets on a restricted law enforcement database; searching the Internet for how to knock someone out with chloroform and where to get torture devices and other tools.

In one of the numerous online conversations

shown to the jury during the trial, Valle told a man he met in a fetish chat room, "I want her to experience being cooked alive. She'll be trussed up like a turkey. ... She'll be terrified, screaming and crying."

In another exchange, Valle suggested a woman he knew would be easy prey because she lived alone. The men discussed cooking her, basted in olive oil, over an open fire and using her severed head as a centerpiece for a sit-down meal.

The NYPD fired Valle after his conviction.

France wins vs. Nigeria

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — After being touted as one of the World Cup's entertainers, it was a gritty performance which got France through to the quarterfinals in a 2-0 victory over Nigeria on Monday.

France's forward line had made headlines with eight goals in its opening two group games, but there was little flair on display in a hard-fought contest against the African champions.

France needed a late header from midfielder Paul Pogba and an injury-time own goal from defender Joseph Yobo to overcome a robust Nigeria.

The reward is a quarter-final against Germany on Friday at Rio de Janeiro's Maracana stadium, following the Germans' 2-1 victory over Algeria.

Pogba's goal in the 79th minute followed Nigeria's best spell of the match and came soon after France goalkeeper Hugo Lloris had made a crucial save to deny Peter Odemwingie.

"We're not the prettiest or the best, but we can do good things," France coach Didier Deschamps said after the game. "The deliverance came late.

There was a lot of tension because we were up against a very athletic side and there were a lot of challenges."

Germany prevails over Algeria

PORTO ALEGRE, Brazil (AP) — From a comically executed free kick to the slapstick folly of the defense, a laughably disorganized Germany struggled mightily against a determined Algeria.

Struggled, but still won. The Germans beat a team many had underestimated 2-1 in extra time

Monday to reach the World Cup quarterfinals for ninth straight time.

But it was only after Thomas Mueller fell to the ground during a free kick, and after the Algerians forced goalkeeper Manuel Neuer off his line and out of his area several times, that the Germans finally produced a stroke of brilliance early in extra time.

Andre Schuerrle back-heeled in a goal in the 92nd minute, and then Mesut Ozil added another late in the match before the north Africans scored a consolation goal in the final seconds.

While it was Germany's first win in three matches against Algeria, the three-

time champions will need more to overcome France in the quarterfinals.

There was little order and discipline in Germany's game in the cool conditions at the Estadio Beira-Rio. The team produced some chances but also gave away many more than it normally does and was lucky not to concede in a poor first half.

"We had major problems in the first half to organize the way we played," Germany coach Joachim Loew said. "Yes, we had our problems, but at the end we were better and had a lot of chances. The important thing is to advance."

The statistics would make Germany look fully in control: 78 percent possession, 16 shots on target for Germany against four for Algeria, a 22-7 edge on overall shots. But it was Neuer's unorthodox clearances that kept Germany in the match.

In other words, Germany was lucky.

With central defender Mats Hummels out with the flu, new man Shkodran Mustafi played as the right back and the reshuffled defense looked so unstable that every Algerian counterattack put it under pressure. Mustafi ended

up tearing his left hamstring muscle late in the match and will miss the rest of the tournament.

But it wasn't just him. Normally reliable Per Mertesacker slipped while trying to clear a ball, allowing Algeria a big chance, and Jerome Boateng looked slow against the speedy Algerians.

Perhaps the most bizarre moment came in the 88th minute, with Germany about to take a free kick from a good position. Bastian Schweinsteiger ran past the ball, then Mueller slipped before running over the ball in an attempt to get behind the Algerian defense, and finally Toni Kroos tried to chip it over the wall. But his effort was low and the Algerians easily cleared what could have been a good opportunity.

The Germans have been working on set pieces, according to Loew, but that one surely needs some fine-tuning.

"You don't have to play fantastic every match," Loew said. "You have to win."

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Van Dyken staying positive on social media

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Not long after Amy Van Dyken-Rouen had surgery for a life-threatening spine injury, while she still wasn't completely out of danger, her husband placed a cellphone in her hands.

The decorated Olympic swimmer had always enjoyed sharing her life and thoughts on social media, so Tom Rouen figured it might do her some good when she awoke.

It worked more than he could have imagined, providing Amy a therapeutic tool as she makes the tran-

sition from elite athlete to possibly spending the rest of her life in a wheelchair.

"She sends stuff out there and gets so much positive energy and positive feedback that I really think it helps her a whole lot," said Rouen, a former punter for the Denver Broncos. "It's also been good to be able to have a distraction with everything that's going on."

Before the advent of social media, information on athletes had to be disseminated: Through agents, teams or hospital representatives, interviews with the

media, carefully worded statements by teams of publicists.

Now, athletes provide updates freely and instantaneously with a few keystrokes on their phones or computers.

Being unfiltered doesn't always go so well.

Dallas Mavericks owner Mark Cuban was fined \$50,000 by the NBA for criticizing officials on Twitter and numerous athletes were chastised for some of their negative posts at the 2012 London Olympics. Miami Dolphins safety

Don Jones and former Mississippi basketball player Marshall Henderson also took some heat this year for tweets critical of Michael Sam, the first openly gay player drafted in the NFL.

Social media can have a positive impact, however, when athletes use it to express their personalities more fully, give fans a window into their lives and have a personalized interaction with them.

"We do get to see them as real people living their lives," said Kelli Burns, associate professor for the

school of mass communications at the University of South Florida. "It may make her fans feel like they're right there with them and seeing a lot of what's happening. People are interested in knowing more about a celebrity than just their professional accomplishments."

Social media have become a conduit of information in an area that was once taboo: Athletes' health.

Teams still try to hide players' injuries like they're guarding state secrets, but now the athletes are freely

providing information on their own.

Kobe Bryant, Alex Rodriguez, Bryce Harper and Mark Teixeira are among the athletes who have posted updates on their surgeries or rehabilitation.

Most of the posts are superficial.

Van Dyken-Rouen seems to have taken it to a new, open-book level.

The six-time Olympic gold medalist was involved in an all-terrain vehicle accident on June 6, severing her spine and leaving her with no feeling in her legs.

A day after surgery, Van Dyken-Rouen posted photos on Instagram of her family in the hospital room and a drawing from her niece and nephew.

The next day, she posted a selfie in her hospital bed and later put up a shot of her sitting up for the first time. She even posted images of her X-rays; one showing her dislocated vertebrae, another of the pins and rods holding her spine together after surgery.

Van Dyken-Rouen continued to be active on social media throughout her stay in intensive care and after she moved to a Colorado hospital to continue rehab.

On Friday, Van Dyken-Rouen discussed her injury in an interview with NBC's "Today" show. "It's a setback; that's all it is," she told "Today." "And then we're gonna rock and roll."

The striking part about Van Dyken-Rouen's posts are they're just as open, positive and sarcastic as before her injury:

— Just thinking out loud. Now I will get really good seats at @dbacks and other favorite sports teams. #awesome #bringMyOwnChair #goodParking2

— Was in MRI until 4:00am today (started at 11:30pm) did whole spine and brain, and so far, so good. Yes, I have a brain! LOL #BabySteps

— Happy Friday! No more surgeries for this girl, so I celebrate with Frodo Loops... SHHH, don't tell!

— Well this is about a week late for me (with a photo of a TV story about national ATV safety week).

"She's doing it in such a positive and upbeat way, it's almost breathtaking how inspiring it is," said William Ward, professor of social media at Newhouse School at Syracuse University.

"I don't know if most people are that upbeat on any given day much less after going through something that traumatic, but here she within days of it is talking and interacting, really doing it in an upbeat way, inspiring people."

It's been a two-way street.

Before social media, well wishes came in the form of notes and cards, maybe signs outside the hospital.

Now, athletes and celebrities not only get instant messages from their family and friends, they can interact with them, adding another layer to their therapy.

"It's blowing me away. It truly is," Van Dyken-Rouen said before boarding a medical flight to Colorado last week. "I've gotten a lot of messages sending me thoughts, prayers, positive vibes. I feel them. It's helping me and I just want to say thank you to everyone."

And she has — on social media of course.

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
