AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), along with State Representative Joe Farias and the Texas Veterans Commission (TVC), today announced a new opportunity for customers to make voluntary contributions to the Fund for Veterans' Assistance (FVA) when they apply for an original or renewal driver license or personal identification card.

"For more than 200 years, courageous men and women have joined the U.S. Military and selflessly fulfilled a pledge to serve and protect this great nation at all costs," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "This donation option is a new way for Texas residents to honor and assist veterans across the state, and we're proud to facilitate this effort."

The City of Pampa is continuing with its cleanup efforts following the storm that brought high winds and caused widespread damage in the City. The City of Pampa crews are now removing hazards from the municipal parks as well as City maintained property so that normal mowing schedules can resume. City crews will not be making another street to street removal of limbs.

Citizens are responsible for cleaning and removing the trees and debris from their property. Please do not place limbs in the alleys or stack them in the street or frontage right of way. Placement of the limbs in the right of ways, including alleys is a violation of City Ordinance.

The City of Pampa Landfill tipping fees for trees and tree limbs has been waived while residents continue cleaning their properties. This will be extended

Knight also said that he thinks the program is a positive experience for the kids and he likes that the school year doesn't come to an end just yet for the children. The program also provides his daughter with a positive learning environment, which allows Lilianna, who is normally very shy, to open up more and make friends as well.

"They get to do activities that they may not get to do at home," he added.

Program Principal Keana Daughtry said that the program is focused on literacy, math and science. Through fun activities, the students received enrichment in these areas, and each child was sent home at the end of the program with an enrichment backpack, which will allow their parents to continue working with them in these fields of study.

The children also got to take field trips throughout the course of the program.

"They went to the library once a week and did activities there. They also went to the fire station and to the Freedom Museum," Daughtry said.

She added that the adults are not the only ones who get excited about the learning experience.

"The kids are excited to be here and they love the activities," she said.



Fleas are agile wingless insects 1/16 to 1/8-inch long). They are usually dark colored (for example, the reddish-brown of the cat flea), with tube-like mouth-parts adapted to feeding on the blood of their hosts. Their legs are long, the hind pair well adapted for jumping. Fleas can settle in a person's hair in less than ten minutes, causing soreness and itching. Flea bites generally cause the formation of a slightly raised, swollen itching spot with a single puncture point at the center. Combating a flea infestation in the home takes patience because for every flea found on an animal, there could be many more developing in the home.

Bouncin' Around

When we lived in Illinois, every year about this time my mother would look forward to our annual



trip to Thompson's Strawberry Farm in Kenosha, Wis. A 15-minute drive would take us to the entrance of the huge farm, where we were given large flats to hold whatever we picked. Then we'd drive to a parking

area, walk to the beginning of a row, and start picking. We were strictly on our honor to put more in the boxes than in our mouths, but a few berries somehow didn't make it to the box.

One warm June day, when our daughter was about four, our picking day coincided with Mom's birthday, and she was in fine spirits when we picked her up. Grammy promised our daughter strawberry shortcake for dessert when we got home. On the way, however, the skies started to darken with ominous storm clouds, and Catherine, who was afraid of storms, wasn't too sure she wanted to get out of the car.

Mom said, "Oh, honey, don't worry. If it thunders, just crawl under a strawberry plant."

We hadn't gotten too far down our row of berries when, sure enough, there was a rumble of thunder. Mom turned and started to laugh. I followed her gaze, and there was our daughter, head first under a clump of strawberries! The storm soon headed off away from us, and we finally coaxed Catherine out from under the plant to resume our picking.

We really enjoyed that strawberry

shortcake later! My husband isn't a fan of strawberries, but he really loves raspberries. So when our very dear neighbor, Audrey, gave us a few starts of her raspberry bushes, Ron was pleased.

Berry picking

The bushes did well, and the first summer we had a good crop of raspberries. I watched Ron cutting the grass in the back yard one afternoon, and laughed when I saw what he was doing. He'd cut a strip to the east, then come back and stop near the fence on the west, pick a few berries, and pop them in his mouth!

This went on until he ran out of bushes and he finally finished cutting the grass. Another year was a very dry summer. Raspberries need a lot of water for their sweet juiciness, so the bushes didn't produce many berries. I decided to try picking enough for supper one day, but only got a few, so I put them in a dish with a bit of sugar, and put them in the fridge.

I repeated this over a few days until it looked like there was enough for the three of us to have for dessert. Our daughter took the first taste, made an awful face, and said "These raspberries taste funny!" We both tasted ours, and to my horror and Ron's amusement, we found the berries had "turned"-and would have made some dandy raspberry wine!

In 2006, we spent a year north of Atlanta, in a rental house. We were delighted to find blueberry bushes along the whole fence line in the back yard. The neighbor said we were welcome to pick everything on our side of the fence. One day the four grandkids, who lived nearby, spent the day with us. I gave them

each a container and showed them how to pick the berries.

I made one "rule" to begin with—I told them they must eat one berry for every two they picked! They were more than willing to comply, and they were very happy kids when their mom used some of the berries the next day to make blueberry pancakes for them. The next week when they came over, we went outside to pick berries, and there was not a single berry to be seen.

There weren't any on the ground, or any evidence that birds had done the dirty deed. Our neighbor across the street came over and told us that the neighbors on the other side of our fence apparently decided we were getting too many berries, and they slipped over and picked them all after dark the night before! What brought about this line of berry stories?

A few weeks ago as I was weeding in our back yard, I discovered strawberry plants. Not the tiny wild strawberries, but real, honest-togoodness strawberries! The other day, to my extreme delight, I found two very lovely ripe strawberries. I picked them, brought them in the house and rinsed them off. I let them sit on the counter for about ten minutes, and then I ate those two strawberries, savoring every last bit of juicy goodness, and remembering all the wonderful times I've had berry picking.

Who knows, maybe next year the crop will be good enough for me to make a 2nd-generation strawberry shortcake.



Why government isn't working and how to make it better

Government just doesn't

work very well. That's the persuasive thesis of three important books published this year MICHAEL John

Mickle-BARONE thwait and

Adrian Wooldridge's "The Fourth Revolution" takes a historical and international (and British) perspective.

They argue that the welfare state, a creation of early 20th-century Brits, has become clunky in comparison to recent reforms in Scandinavia and the Asian model most highly developed in Lee Kuan Yew's Singapore.

Peter Schuck's "Why Government Fails So Often" looks at a multitude of federal programs and concludes that most, though not all, have "deep structures" which make 'policy failure and mismanagement" inevitable.

Philip K. Howard's "The Rule of Nobody: Saving

America from Dead Laws and Broken Government" takes a different approach.

Howard, a New York lawyer and founder of a group called Common Good, starts off with anecdotes showing how law prevents problems from being sensibly solved.

A bridge blocking New York's harbor from the newest supertankers can't be elevated without 47 permits from 19 government agencies, and environmental groups will bring lawsuits at multiple stages.

A lifeguard is fired for saving a man outside his zone of the beach. A community soup kitchen was shut down because it served potluck meals and had no kitchen to be inspected. Day care centers have to offer two sets of blocks with at least 10 blocks a set (who counts them each day?).

You get the idea. You've almost certainly encountered this sort of thing in your daily life. "Legal rigidity trumps everything,7 Howard writes. "Law has crowded out the ability to

be practical or fair."

American laws and regulations tend to be over-detailed and to rob government officials of all initiative and, therefore, responsibility. Case in point: The 2,700-page Obamacare, with a 28-word definition of "high school" and a (so far) 7-foot high pile of regulations.

How did this democratic nation come to be saddled with, as Howard puts it, "a government run by clerks and jerks"?

Howard traces it back to Progressive and New Deal legislation, which gave regulators wide latitude to enforce vague laws. In response, Congress in 1946 passed the Administrative Procedures Act, which tended to produce bureaucratic bloat and paralyze government action.

The biggest changes came in the 1960s. Southern segregationist officials purported to follow the law, but in fact blocked equal rights for blacks. The response — effective in breaking segregation, but a disaster otherwise — was a

distrust of all officials and detailed rules that robbed them of discretion.

At the same time, the just-born environmental movement used new statutes and court decisions to bring lawsuits to achieve the goal of BANANA (Build Absolutely Nothing Anywhere Near Anything)

These were liberal initiatives, but conservatives also got into the business of tying officials' hands. Corporations came to seek detailed regulations that would provide them "safe harbor" protection against prosecutions and lawsuits. K Street lobbyists with ties to both political parties developed a lucrative vested interest in complex laws and regulations.

Howard wants to undermine this "rule of nobody." Get rid of all the detailed instructions and trust the common sense of responsible individuals to make decisions promptly in line with social norms.

He notes that in 1988, Australia got rid of de-

Among the 22 percent who want to expand immigration are Democrats who view illegal immigrants as a way of expanding their party's political base. But that shortsighted political motivation is certainly not good for our country, and it is devastating for the dwindling job opportunities available to Americans.

In 2000, 114.8 million Americans who were born in the United States had jobs here. Nearly a decade and a half later, in 2014, that total had decreased to 114.7 million, and millions of Americans have been unemployed for many vears

Millions of new jobs were created during that same period in the United States, but immigrant workers soaked up all that job growth. There was a net gain of 5.7 million in jobs during those 14 years, from 17.1 million in 2000 to 22.8 million in 2014, but the overall net effect was that 100 percent of the job growth went to immigrants and 0 percent to workers born in the U.S.

Steven A. Camarota is research director for the Center for Immigration Studies and the lead author of this startling report. His investigation proves that there are now 58 million Americans born in our country who do not have jobs and that 34 percent of working-age Americans are without work, a number far higher than in 2000 when the number of out-of-work Americans born here was 26 percent.

Despite the scandal of so few jobs for Americans,

the legislation pushed by Democrats for so-called immigration reform would vastly expand job opportunities for immigrants at the expense of American-born workers. The Senate's misguided Gang of Eight bill would sharply increase the numbers of legal and illegal immigrants in our country, far above the 40 million who are already here, plus adding an incentive for many more to illegally enter our nation.

Republican Sen. Jeff Sessions of Alabama has been a leader against expanding immigration under the guise of the phony "immigration reform," and he persuasively explains how hurtful unrelenting immigration is for our nation and especially for U.S. workers. He observed that the recent findings in this report by the Center for Immigration Studies "are shocking, and represent a dramatic indictment of immigration policy in Washington, D.C.

In the last presidential election, Mitt Romney lost because he failed to attract the support of millions of working-class Americans who have been hit the hardest by the harmful consequences of liberal demands for more and more immigration. Sessions wisely advises Republican leadership to "sever themselves from these demands and present themselves to the American public as the one party focused on everyday working people."

Sessions is obviously right in counseling that "the sensible, conservative, fair thing to do after 40 years of record immigration is to slow down, allow assimilation to occur, allow wages to rise, and to help workers of all backgrounds rise together into the middle class." Republican Majority Leader Eric Cantor was defeated in a landslide in his own primary after failing to heed this advice. Will other Republican leaders finally get the message?

Meanwhile, the Democrats' and media demands for "immigration reform" have had another devastating effect on our nation: attracting a projected 100,000 children to cross our Mexican border illegally in this year alone and bringing with them contagious diseases that could "spread like wildfire," according to Dr. Jane Orient. "Legal immigrants have always been required to undergo health screenings," Orient explained, "but these kids coming have no medical screenings and no vaccine records.

The doctor observed that many childhood diseases have been largely and wonderfully eradicated from our country, such as measles and chickenpox, but that leaves Americans without natural immunity against them. If they are brought into this country by unlawful immigration, then they can spread quickly, and young doctors who have never seen some of these diseases may be slow to recognize them.

Noroviruses are highly contagious infections that carry symptoms of diarrhea and vomiting. "All we need is one outbreak of that virus, and we would have an overwhelming public health crisis," Orient warned.

tailed nursing home regulations (so many square feet per resident) and substituted general standards, including "homelike environment," "privacy and dignity."

Academics who decried this reform were surprised to find that nursing homes improved under the new standards. Regulating by principles rather than rules replaced arguments and nitpicking with cooperative conversations and consensus.

Howard would like to reconstruct the federal government along similar lines. Laws with budgetary impact should sunset periodically, to prune the legal code of the underbrush planted by now-defunct legislators.

Presidents should be freed from the entanglement of detailed restrictions and 1970s legislation barring them from not spending funds and hamstringing advisory committees

Judges should be empowered to dismiss invalid claims quickly. Someone should be given the authority to conclusively and speedily decide environmental issues. Congress should set up commissions to propose simplified legal codes on everything from education to entitlements

to the environment. Pretty radical stuff, and both liberals and conservatives will fear potential changes. The current president has low credibility and a demonstrated incapacity to compromise.

I'm not sure I'd trust Howard's inevitably elitedominated commissions. But his central insight that ordinary Americans can be trusted to behave responsibly — is a good starting place in reforming government.



Review: Evolutionary advances in new smartwatches

from Samsung and LG make a few evolutionary advances, though I won't be rushing out to buy either.

Samsung's Gear Live and LG's G Watch are good products and will appeal to those who like to be among the first to own new gadgets.

The watches serve as pedometers and let you catch up on email, texts and Facebook notifications while your phone is in your pocket or charging in the bedroom. Even with the phone in your hand, you can check messages on the watch and keep playing video on the phone.

Both smartwatches try to keep things simple through voice commands rather than touch. They use Google's Android Wear system, which I reviewed earlier.

Android Wear has a lot of potential but still lacks the functionality of even last year's smartwatches. Your ability to reply is limited, and there's not much you can do yet without a companion phone nearby.

The companion phone must run Android 4.3 or later, which covers about a quarter of the Android devices in use. It doesn't have to be a Samsung or LG phone. Visit http://g. co/WearCheck from your phone to check compatibility. Don't even bother if you have an iPhone.

Even with its release of the Gear Live, Samsung

Samsung's Gear 2 (\$299, released in April):

I find the Gear 2 most useful for its fitness features. The watch counts the steps you take each day. It estimates distance and calories burned and measures heart rate on your runs, hikes and bike rides. The features are rather basic, so active users might prefer a gadget dedicated to a specific task, such as measuring distance and pace using GPS. But the Gear 2 does offer a good introduction to newcomers.

Shots from the watch's 2-megapixel camera are mediocre, but that beats missing the shot entirely because your better camera is in your pocket or handbag. If you don't need the camera, you can save \$100 with the Gear 2 Neo, which has similar features otherwise. Both have speakerphones for making phone calls.

The Gear 2 line doesn't use Android Wear, but a fledging system called Tizen. Samsung says that helps extend battery life to two or three days, instead of the single day on the original, Android-based Galaxy Gear. Unlike the Android Wear watches, the Gear 2 and the Gear 2 Neo both require a Samsung phone.

> Unfortunately, the promised battery life is back down to a single day, though actual performance varied depending on use. The best I got was a day and a half on a full charge. In the worst case, about the same amount of time in half the charge was gone in my tests. just five hours.

The Gear Live doesn't have as many fitness features. You can count steps and measure heart rate, but you can't measure distance or calories with built-in apps.

In addition, there's no camera or speakerphone. To make calls, you need a Bluetooth headset paired to your phone.

Because the Gear Live and the G Watch both use Android Wear, they have similar functionality. You control both mostly by voice. There aren't many icons or buttons on the screen, as you'd find on previous smartwatches.

to swiping left (for more information) or right (to dismiss a notification). But otherwise, the interface is clean and simple. One thing I wish for: a central place to view notifications, including ones I've dismissed.

LG's G Watch (\$229, starts shipping Thursday):

LG is hoping to make its

The LG watch has about a third more battery capacity than Samsung's, but both watches lasted about

The resolution and colors on LG's always-on screen aren't as good as they are on Samsung's, though LG's notifications use larger type and are easier to read.

The G Watch can count steps but doesn't have a heart rate sensor — the biggest way it differs from the Gear Live. The G Watch doesn't have a camera or speakerphone either.

The G Watch's strap feels rubbery, but it's replaceable with any standard 22-millimeter watch strap. The hard-plastic feel on Samsung's watches isn't much better, but you can replace their straps, too.

Motorola plans to come You do have to get used out with the round-faced Moto 360 this summer, while the ones out so far have had square displays. And Apple is widely expected to have its own smartwatch this fall.

I recommend waiting to see what they do. You might still gravitate toward Samsung's or LG's watch, but you risk regret if you buy one now.



US employers added robust 288k jobs in June

WASHINGTON - U.S. employers accelerated their hiring last month, adding a robust 288,000 jobs and helping drive the unemployment rate to 6.1 percent, the lowest since September 2008.

It was the fifth straight monthly job gain above 200,000 — the best such stretch since the late 1990s tech boom. Over the past 12 months, the economy has added nearly 2.5 million jobs — an average of 208,000 a month, the fastest year-over-year pace since May 2006.

Thursday's jobs report from the Labor Department made clear that the U.S. economy is moving steadily closer to full health after having shrunk at the start of the vear.

June's job gain followed additions of 217,000 jobs in May and 304,000 in April, figures that were both re-

Investors appeared pleased by the news. When stock markets opened Thursday, an hour after the government released the appeared to reflect the slow jobs report, the Dow Jones industrial average traded above 17,000 for first time. By 10 a.m., the Dow had risen about 65 points.

Analysis: Purge displays Chinese leader's ambition

top military figures reflects Communist Party leader Xi Jinping's determination to impose his personal authority far more ambitiously than his recent predecessors.

Since being appointed party leader in late 2012, Xi has moved aggressively to make his personal stamp with campaigns against graft and official waste and by waging an offensive against liberal, Western ideas. Party and government officials and managers of state companies have fallen. Advocates for official transparency and a fairer society have been jailed.

In possibly his boldest move so far, Xi struck Monday at the core of the military elite when the ruling party expelled Xu Caihou (Shoo Tseye-hoh) a retired general who had been deputy chairman of its Central Military Commission, which controls the Chinese military. The party said Xu would face charges in a military court of taking money and property in exchange for promotions and other favors.

In last week's column, I shared some stories about the history of the Social Security number. That was a prelude to this week's column. I have been saving up some emails I've received over the past several weeks about SSNs. Here are a few of them.

Q: I saw an online ad that said there were hidden meanings to Social Security numbers and that for \$9.99 they would send me a booklet that explains the "secrets behind the SSN." I almost sent the money, but then remembered your column. Do you have any idea what I would get for the money? A: I'm not exactly sure what they will send you, but I can tell you it will be the world's shortest booklet! In fact, I will share with you the socalled "hidden meanings" to a Social Security number in the next couple of paragraphs. If you want to send me ten bucks for doing that, I'd appreci-

Now back to those first three numbers. Here is an example of what they can tell you for numbers issued before 2011. My Social Security number starts with the numbers "394." In dry California, water fetching record prices

- Throughout California's tems. desperately dry Central Valley, those with water to spare are cashing in.

As a third parched summer forces farmers to fallow fields and lay off workers, two water districts and a pair of landowners in the heart of the state's farmland are making millions of dollars by auctioning off their private caches.
