The Gray County Commissioners met on Tuesday afternoon to further discuss repairs to the Gray County Annex building.

It was decided after much discussion that the court will open bids for the emergency roof repairs and rough drawings of the proposed roof design are available from Crenshaw Consulting Group, LLC as of today.

Bids from local roofing companies must be turned in by 10 a.m. Tuesday, July 15, which is when the next County Commission meeting will be held (the meeting will start at 9 a.m.). Those turning in a bid are encouraged to attend the meeting, and bids should include a projected start date for the project with the projected cost. The Commissioners will also be discussing interior annex repairs and the possibility of hiring a general contractor for these repairs during the July 15 meeting.



WASHINGTON - To hear President Barack Obama describe it, there's a setting in across the country, leading Americans to suspect that not only is Washington broken, it's beyond fixing.



Museum Musings Pampa's train depot

In 1915 the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company constructed a depot at 200 E. Atchison in Pampa.



was on the Wellington, Kan. to Texico, N.M. segment of the Santa Fe Main Line from Chicago to Los Angeles. In addition to passengers, this line was characterized by fast freight and grain elevators.

The Pampa station

OXLEY The Pampa depot, 26 feet by 131 feet, was a modification of the standard brick "County Seat" style and received a heavy pebble-exterior finish. This type of construction, more elaborate than that of the customary frame depots, was used for, but not limited to, towns that were county seats.

During World War I, the Santa Fe made great strides in the building of larger steam locomotives, larger

watertenders and more space for fuel. There was a switch from coalburning to oil-burning locomotives, thus eliminating 92 water stops and one-half of the fuel stops between Chicago and Los Angeles.

About 1923, trains going through Pampa were using oil instead of coal for fuel. A great amount of steam was needed for westbound trains to climb the grade from Miami to Pampa. In the distance of 21 miles, the elevation rose from 2,755.7 feet at Miami to 3,234.7 feet at Pampa.

E.L. Barton, telegraph operator at Pampa from 1951 to 1977, reports that an addition was made to the Pampa depot in 1935 and the boiler was placed in the basement. In about 1951, diesel replaced steam as fuel.


On Sunday, May 2, 1971, "All aboard" was called out for the last time in Pampa as the Chicago-bound Santa Fe pulled out of the quiet, dark city after arriving for a short stop at 1:22 a.m.

T.C. Narron, agent at that time, reported that many people who wanted to ride that last train failed to make reservations in time. Compartments and facilities were booked at departure points for as long as a month previously.

The discontinuance of passenger service came with the new system adopted by the Nixon administration to re-route and revamp the nation's railway system. The new system, first called Railpax and later dubbed Amtrack, went into full effect on Monday, May 3, 1971.

The Pampa depot closed in 1985, but in November 1991, it became the headquarters for a section crew of 23 — four for signaling and 19 for maintenance of way. Larry Gawthrop became the roadmaster for the section that extends from St. Francis to Lora on the Main Track and from Panhandle to Borger on the

time. I was really looking forward to the trip, but at the same time I was a little nervous making the drive with my trusty steed, Humphrey.

Humphrey cooperated about three times before he figured we were just teasing him. We called a locksmith and waited for about 20 minutes before he arrived to the neighborhood and passed the block three times. Here we go, I thought to myself.

When the locksmith finally found us, Humphrey was fast asleep in the passenger seat after staying awake for the majority of the seven and a half hour drive, and the guy probably thought we were crazy for saying that the dog locked us out when now he wouldn't even move.

On top of that, the operator on the phone told Kyle it would be \$20 to get the car unlocked. When the service technician (as he called himself) got there

Kyle laughed and said we would figure something else out. Meanwhile, I'm still tapping the window trying to get Humphrey to wake up and unlock my car.

The technician refused to leave before being paid his \$25 service charge (see how the numbers kept changing?), and Kyle held his ground saying that he had been told that it would be \$20 total.

The now angry service technician called his company to figure something out, and when he handed the phone to Kyle, the operator said that we would have to pay the now \$50 service charge since the technician came out to our location. Border money request won't include policy change

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama is preparing to ask Congress for emergency spending of more than \$2 billion to deal with the crisis of unaccompanied kids at the Southern border, but for now he won't seek legal changes to send the children back home more quickly.

That decision comes after immigration advocates objected strongly to administration proposals to speed thousands of unaccompanied minors Honduras and Guatemala, where many face gang violence

Administration officials say they are still working on ways to do it faster, but say that the request for specific legislative changes will move on a separate track than the emergency is sending to Congress on Tuesday.

Riders stranded for hours on California coaster

lif. (AP) — A roller coaster during the evacuation prohit a tree branch at the Six cess, Six Flags said in a Flags Magic Mountain amusement park, dislodging the front car, leaving four people slightly injured and keeping nearly two riders a thrill. dozen summer fun-seekers hanging 20 to 30 feet in the air for hours as day turned to night.

Two of the four people hurt Monday on the Ninja coaster were taken to the hospital as a precaution, but all the injuries were minor, fire and park officials said.

"We were going across one turn and all of a sudden a loud noise happened," Jeremy Ead, one of the injured riders, told KCAL-TV. "I ducked down just in time. A hard branch hit me in the head. I was there bleeding from my head, which was a little worse than this," he said, pointing to a gash in his forehead.

The coaster hit the branch about 5:30 p.m. and stopped, said Michael Pittman, a Los Angeles County Fire Department dispatch supervisor. It was nearly three hours later before all 22 of the riders were rescued.

At least one of the cars, which are normally suspended beneath the track, was dangling at an angle, derailed at the front.

Firefighters and park maintenance workers in harnesses removed the riders one by one. The riders waited patiently as firefighters tried to reach them through a tangle of track and trees, some talking with each other and others resting with their eyes occasionally closed.

"As you shoot down the snake-like steel track you'll grip the hillsides and blast through the trees swiftly, slicing through the landscape," the ride's online description says. "Ninja pivots with precision as you narrowly miss tagging land and water, whipping around at 55 miles per hour."

The ride would remain shut down while the accident was investigated, park spokeswoman Sue Carpenter said in a statement.

Six Flags Magic Mountain is in the Valencia area of Santa Clarita, about 25 miles north of Los Angeles.

The accident comes just over a week after dozens of people were stranded more than 200 feet up on a revolving tower at SeaWorld San Diego for hours. Authorities there said a power failure stalled the ride.

In July of 2013, a woman was ejected from a roller coaster at Six Flags Over Texas in Arlington and died. The death was ruled an accident, but her family has sued both Six Flags and the German company that built the coaster's trains, both of whom denied any wrongdoing.

In September 2012 at another Southern California amusement park, Knott's Berry Farm, riders were left dangling at 300 feet for more than three hours when its Windseeker ride broke down. No one was injured



What do the missing tribes teach us?

In Judges 1 God makes it a point to chastise by name each of the tribes of Israel for failing to "utterly destroy"



the Pagans in the area of land that their tribe was given as an inheritance. However, when you begin marking off the tribes as they are mentioned, five are not there. Now I know that I am strange because I

seem to ask ques-

tions that nobody else seems interested in. So when I noticed that five were missing I asked, "Why did God leave those five tribes out?" Since it doesn't comment on that matter in Judges 1, I started doing a little extra digging. Here is what I found and the lesson that I took from each.

Levi

This was the easy one to figure out. Joshua 13:14 says, "But to the tribe of Levi he gave no inheritance, since the food offerings presented to the Lord, the God of Israel, are their inheritance, as he promised them." Simple. The tribe of Levi received no land and therefore were not required to drive the Pagans out. Now they received some cities in which to live, but either they were not expected to do the destroying or they did it well and therefore were not condemned by the Lord. Lesson? The Lord does not hold us accountable for His expectations of others, but only for those He has for us. That is very important to remember because God deals the same way with us today.

Reuben and Gad

I had to look for a while on this one. The answer isn't in Judges, but in Joshua. The land given to Reuben and Gad was east of the Jordan, and therefore the details were listed in Joshua. Joshua 13:13 says, "But the Israelites did not drive out the people of Geshur and Maakah, so they continue to live among the Israelites to this day." Now if we start reading at 13:8 we discover that it was the tribes of Reuben and Gad that were given the areas of Geshur and Maakah and they failed to do their job. There was no need to mention them in Judges 1, their failure had already been recorded and noted. Lesson? God sees and notes our stubborn failures when we obstinately refuse to obey His commands.

Simeon

When the tribe of Judah began to drive the Pagans out of their land, they asked their brethren in Simeon to help; after all Simeon's land was within the boundaries of Judah. Judges 1:17 says, "Then the men of Judah went with the Simeonites, their fellow Israelites, and attacked the Canaanites living in Zephath, and they totally destroyed the city." Simeon isn't mentioned in the failures of Judges 1 because the only record of their actions is one of total bravery and faithfulness to God's commands. Lesson? God won't chastise us for the disobedience of others around us, rather He will take note of our faithfulness and certainly be proud.

Issachar

There is no mention of the actions of Issachar concerning the taking of their land from the Pagans. Manasseh had a few towns just over the border in Issachar and is condemned for failing to drive out the Canaanites in those towns, but not a single negative word about Issachar. Issachar wasn't mentioned because they didn't fail. Lesson? God clearly sees who willfully disobeys and is not fooled by superficial appearance. You see the failure of Manasseh took place within the boundaries of Issachar, but God saw who really failed and made note of it. Father God will not saddle us with the failures of others. PRAISE THE LORD!

In "Dawn of the Planet of the Apes," opening Friday, Notary plays more than 100 primates. He also taught the film's stars and stuntmen how to find their simian side. "He's like an ape Zen master," said director Matt Reeves. "He lives in every

frame that has an ape in it." Notary demonstrated his technique during a recent visit to the Hollywood dance studio he uses to prepare for films. The compact, muscular father of four visibly transforms as he describes how apes are gut-driven and grounded. His stomach softens, his neck and shoulders slouch, his lower jaw protrudes. His eyelids drop slightly as his eyes take on a present yet faraway quality.

He grunts and howls before springing from his chair and breaking into a quadruped run. He bounces around the empty studio on all fours, with "arm extensions" he developed allowing him to mimic ape-like movements. He stops suddenly, as though he's spotted a threat, and becomes even more animated, emitting loud wails of distress.
