

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Momentum for fouryear degrees at community colleges

The study, by the RAND Corporation, a nonprofit research organization, also cited concerns in the higher education community about mission creep at two-year schools and the potential for creating unproductive competition between universities and colleges. The report offered three options: make no changes to the current landscape, allow for unrestricted expansion of four-year degrees at community colleges or allow restricted growth. The choices, according to the study, "necessarily involve difficult trade-offs.' Paredes, who ultimately chose to recommend the third option, noted that the controls would be tight. Interested community colleges will have to demonstrate a work force need for their desired degree program, as well as show that the program was not duplicating any others in the region and that the possibility of collaborating with local universities had been exhausted, among other criteria. Even with the support of the commissioner, the proposal must still get through the legislative process. State Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, filed a bill in the 2013 session that would have allowed for the expansion of bachelor's degree programs in nursing at community colleges. After a significant watering down, it became the bill that mandated the RAND Corporation study.

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Since 2003, when South Texas College, Midland College and Brazosport College received permission to offer bachelor's degrees, several other community colleges have tried to acquire the same authority.

Ahead of the 2015 legislative session, momentum seems to be building for other two-year institutions to get a chance to offer four-year degrees.

Opening the door for new bachelor's degrees in nursing and applied sciences at community colleges is listed as a priority recommendation for the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

In early August, Raymund Paredes, the state's higher education commissioner, who had expressed skepticism about such programs in the past, notified legislators that he planned to recommend that such offerings be allowed at more institutions.

"I made my recommendation on the basis of trying to create another pathway for poor, nontraditional students in Texas to achieve a baccalaure-ate degree," he said.

His recommendation comes on the heels of a study, mandated by a bill that passed during the 2013 legislative session, that found that allowing more community colleges to offer bachelor's degrees could make it easier to meet work force needs and would increase access to education for would-be students.

AUSTIN — Ollie Besteiro's face lights up and she gushes praise when conversation comes to the topic of her only grandson.

"He looks to me for advice and I also give him unsolicited advice," she says. "He is the sweetest, kindest kid. He's warm. He's loving. He's never met a stranger. He has friends everywhere."

Besteiro, a retired teachers' association leader in Austin and the current state president of AARP Texas, knows she is not unlike other grandparents: overwhelmed with affection for their grandchildren and proud role models to a younger generation.

Sunday, September 7, is Grandparents Day, an opportunity to reflect on the essential role grandparents play in the lives of families.

"There's just a special relationship when you have a grandchild," said Besteiro. "Having a grandchild is just unconditional love.'

The topic of grandparentgrandchild relationships is so important that AARP has conducted extensive research on the issue. An AARP telephone survey of more than 2,800 grandparents age 50 and up found that the economy and generational differences have shifted more responsibilities, especially financial ones, to grandparents. It also found that more than 80 percent of grandparents report speaking to their grandchildren on the phone at least once a month. And they are often chatting about

Texas' David Ash to miss BYU game

quarterback David Ash, who missed most of last season with concussion symptoms, will not play this week against BYU after getting headaches and feeling dizzy in the hours following the Longhorns' season-opening win over North Texas

Ash took several hard hits to the head in the 38-7 win, but head coach Charlie Strong said Monday that Ash showed no symptoms during the game. Ash called staff to report his symptoms about 90 minutes after the game ended, and the medical staff brought him in for evaluation.

"It shows his toughness. I know how important this football team is to him,' Strong said.

Strong would not speculate whether Ash, who has 22 career starts, could or should try to play again. Ash had insisted that despite from questions from his family, he never seriously considered quitting.

"That's a decision his family is going to have to make," Strong said, noting that Ash would have to be cleared by doctors before he can return.

"You have to be concerned, any time you have that number of concussions. We will never jeopardize a young man's health for the sake of this football team. That will always be the case," Strong said.

Ash had been cleared by team doctors to return this season and told reporters in training camp about taking

Ash later ran for a touchdown and passed for another, but also took several more hits to the head, most notably when his helmet twice bounced off the turf after a sack and on his touchdown run.

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
