Statewide gas price average drops

IRVING – For the tenth consecutive week the statewide average for gasoline in Texas has moved lower. The average for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in the Lone Star State is now \$3.23, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is three cents less per gallon than one week ago and 18 cents less per gallon than one year ago. Texans are now pay-

Say what you want about Friday's exciting double-overtime football game; the one thing we can say is that rain had a factor early in the game.

This weekend, however, early projections show that Friday's showdown with the Whitefaces could have the same conditions the Harvesters faced when they travel down U.S. Highway 60 to Hereford.

During the weekend, Pampa received roughly an inch and a half of rain. Temperatures felt very cool, too, as they dropped well into the 50s to make for a very fall-like weekend.

"We had a strong cold front that moved through Friday and that dropped out temps and caused all the rain Friday into Saturday," Christine Klause, meteorologist for the National Weather Service in Amarillo said.

So far, over the next two days, highs are supposed to reach 93 and 81 today and tomorrow, respectively.

Klause said a trough blowing through the southwest is hitting our area, which is raising temperatures.

But that'll be a different story come Thursday and Friday.

"We are looking at another strong cold front and by the time we reach the end of the week temperatures in the low 60s," Klause said.

The early projections on www.weather.gov shows a high near 60 degrees, low around 48 degrees, on Friday with a 20 percent chance of rain.

What will the Harvesters be facing in Cowtown on Friday? Mostly cloudy with a low around 49 degrees and a 30 percent chance of rain Friday afternoon.

Amarillo popcorn shop owner, charity motorcycle missing

AMARILLO (AP) — A custom-built motorcycle is missing, along with \$160,000 paid by investors and those who bought chances to win the bike in a raffle proposed by an Amarillo popcorn shop owner who also has vanished.

Dave Goodwin Jr. commissioned "American Chopper" reality show star Paul Teutel Sr. to custom build the bike, incorporating themes of Teutel's Orange County Choppers, Goodwin's popcorn shop and the military.

The bike was the centerpiece for an "American Chopper" episode aired in November, and the finished product was displayed at a Texas Rangers baseball game in Arlington last September.

Now, the Amarillo Globe-News reports the May 31 motorcycle raffle to benefit veterans never occurred, the state closed Goodwin's popcorn store over \$44,000 in unpaid state taxes, and Goodwin appears to have left the

city.

In response to the newspaper's inquiries to Goodwin's Facebook page, the former owner of Goody's World Famous Popcorn in Amarillo declined to comment and referred questions to his Amarillo attorney, Walter Wolfram. He then changed his privacy settings to block further messages.

Wolfram said he had not heard from Goodwin "in quite some time" and added that invoices he had mailed to Goodwin were returned by the U.S. Postal Service as having been sent to an incorrect address.

The motorcycle's last known location was a residence in Crown Point, Indiana, Wolfram said. Tax records checked by the Globe-News showed the residence is owned by Dave Goodwin's parents.

Goodwin's father has been in a federal prison since April 2013 for Medicaid fraud. A woman answering an Indiana telephone listed to Dave

Goodwin said he was not available, and a recording on Goodwin's cell-phone said he wasn't taking calls, the Globe-News reported.

The \$160,000 needed to pay for the motorcycle came from two investors and the Kansas-based American Fallen Warriors Memorial Foundation. The missed May 31 raffle is under investigation by agencies ranging from the Amarillo Police Department to the FBI, Potter County Attorney Scott Brumley said.

In a letter to foundation attorney Greg Lam, Wolfram said about \$17,000 in raffle tickets had been sold. Lam has suggested in letters that Teutel's custom motorcycle business, Orange County Choppers, have no further involvement with Goodwin fundraisers until Goodwin repays the investors and makes good on the raffle. Lam also has filed complaints with the Texas and Kansas attorneys general.

Missouri, Texas plan executions Wednesday

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Two of the nation's most active death penalty states are planning executions on Wednesday, even as attorneys for the condemned men continue efforts to save them.

Earl Ringo Jr. is scheduled to die at 12:01 a.m. for killing two people during a robbery at a Columbia, Missouri, restaurant in 1998. Hours later, Texas plans to execute Willie Trottie for fatally shooting his common-law wife and her brother in Houston in 1993.

The executions would be the eighth this year in both states. Florida also has performed seven executions in 2014. All other states have combined for six executions.

Both Missouri and Texas use pentobarbital as their execution drug but decline to disclose where the drug is obtained.

"They don't tell you what it is and where it comes from," Trottie told The Associated Press. "What I've learned in 20 years here on death row is all you can do is say 'OK.'"

"I'm ready whichever way it goes. If God says 'Yes,' I'm ready."

Ringo, 40, did not immediately respond to interview requests. He and another man robbed a Ruby Tuesday restaurant in Columbia where Ringo previously worked, ambushing a deliveryman and manager trainee in the early-morning hours of July 4, 1998.

Both men were arrested several days later. The accomplice, Quentin Jones, pleaded guilty to first-degree murder and was spared the death penalty by agreeing to testify against Ringo, the mastermind of the crime.

An appeal in U.S. District

Court in Kansas City has asked that the execution be postponed until a hearing can determine whether Missouri's use of a pre-execution sedative is actually part of the execution process and violates the inmate's constitutional rights. Attorneys for Ringo say the dose of midazolam (also known as Versed) could make it difficult for the inmate to express any pain he might be feeling during the process.

"If the drug (the sedative) renders him incompetent, we want to know why they're doing that to him immediately before the execution proceeds," Ringo's attorney, Richard Sindel, said Monday.

In a response filed in court, the Missouri Attorney General's office said Ringo "has long been aware that Missouri uses Versed and valium as pre-execution

sedatives ..."

Separately, Ringo's attorneys have asked Gov. Jay Nixon to grant clemency on several grounds, including concerns that race played a role in his death sentence. Ringo is black and he was convicted and sentenced by an all-white jury.

Trottie, who turned 45 on Monday, shot and killed 24-year-old Barbara Canada, and her 28-year-old brother, Titus, at the Canada family home in Houston. Canada's mother and sister were wounded.

Lawyers for Trottie argue in their appeal that the one-time deliveryman and security guard suffered poor representation in his initial trial when his counsel failed to present witnesses who would have told jurors Trottie and Barbara Canada were romantically engaged at the time of the killings.

ing 20 cents less than the national average of \$3.43. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in El Paso are paying the most at \$3.31 per gallon while drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$3.18 per gallon.

Despite falling prices across much of the country, Hawaii and Alaska continue to lead the nation as the only two states where gas is more than \$4 per gallon. While prices in the western United States have drifted lower over the past several weeks, drivers in some states including Washington, Oregon, California and Idaho are still paying the highest

prices in the continental U.S.

Geopolitical developments in Ukraine and Iraq remain front page news, but oil markets have moved steadily lower reflecting the assessment that global supplies remain unaffected. Currently, drivers in Texas are paying about \$45 to fill up a 14-gallon size fuel tank.

"With the busy summer driving season officially behind us and children back in school, demand for fuel is less than what we've seen in recent months," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "Barring any major storms, geopolitical concerns, or refinery disruptions, we could see pump prices move even lower as refineries transition to producing less expensive winter-blend fuel in a few weeks."

Southwest Dairy Day to offer look at modern dairy Oct. 8 near Friona

Composting, irrigation, manure application demonstrations scheduled.

FRIONA — The annual Southwest Dairy Day on Oct. 8 at the Del Rio Dairy near Friona will be hosted by the Gingg family and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

Del Rio Dairy, with 3,800 milking cows and 2,850 heifers, is located just south of the intersection of State Highway 214 between Friona and Muleshoe and State Highway 86 between Bovina and Dimmitt.

"Southwest Dairy Day is an annual event conducted by AgriLife Extension," said Dr. Ellen Jordan, AgriLife Extension state dairy specialist in Dallas. "We rotate locations throughout the state to address new technologies that meet the needs of the industry. We also feature an area dairy that has adopted some of those technologies."

Danny Nusser, AgriLife Extension agricultural and natural resources regional program leader in Amarillo, said the High Plains dairy industry has unique needs created by dairy size and complexity, and many of the AgriLife Extension county agents have had to become part of the dairy team addressing dairy issues and questions. They will be on-

site to learn and help answer questions.

The program, free and open to the public, will begin at 10 a.m. and feature tours, exhibitor booths, product testing and lunch courtesy of Hi-Pro. It will conclude at 3 p.m.

Tours will include a Saudi-style cow barn, which is a covered open corral; a double-45 parallel milking parlor; a double-8 parallel parlor in the special needs facilities; the latest in cow comfort and cooling; and the dairy's composting operation.

In addition to tours, speakers and stops throughout the day will include:

- Composting Manure Solids and Their Nutrient Composition, Dr. Saqib Mukhtar, AgriLife Extension engineer, College Station.

- Efficient Irrigation Strategies, Dr. Dana Porter, AgriLife Extension agricultural engineering specialist-irrigation and water management, Lubbock.

- Manure Application/Calibration, Dr. Brent Auvermann, AgriLife Extension agricultural engineer/environmental systems specialist, Amarillo.

- Understanding the Dairy Provisions of the Farm Bill, AgriLife Extension economist, Amarillo, and Dr. Jackie Smith, AgriLife Extension

economist, Lubbock.

Producers who attend the event can receive two Dairy Outreach Program Area continuing education units. Producers in eight Texas coun-

ties are required to receive eight hours of continuing education every two years as part of their Texas Commission on Environmental Quality permit, Jordan said.

Having to see a doctor more often than not has been a hot topic at both of my breakfast clubs. I'm all of a sudden finding myself an incremental part of such conversation, joining friends recovering from knee this, hip that, bladder this, and prostate that. Hearing such instantly brought up two physicians, two pillars of our community from the 1950's-1960's that cared for we of the Palmitier clan. I'm fondly recalling

Dr.'s. R. M. Bellamy and Malcom Brown.

Dr. Bellamy delivered me some 65 plus years ago at what is now the hauntingly ugly old Worley Hospital, which for the matter, needs to be razed, but that's another story. Ahem. White haired with equally white mustache, Dr. Bellamy was the epitome of a Saturday Evening Post Norman Rockwell cover. One of the kindest men I've ever known, and of course, the best doctor I have ever had, which includes my favorite ex wife. Any fears possessed when entering Dr. Bellamy's office were quickly dispelled once I saw his always smiling face.

Only once was Dr. Bellamy forced to hospitalize me. To this day, I've never forgotten the concern he showed when, at age 17, I presented him with a very severe (I'm paying for it now) sunburn. Four days I believe it was that I was bedridden in the Worley all slathered up with zinc oxide ointment along with the stern warnings (unheeded) by Dr. Bellamy over what too much sun can do to a fair haired

young man. Pivotal, for it was Dr. Bellamy who helped save my family, the life of my late father by helping to cure his alcohol issues. Yes, I loved and still to this very day love Dr. Bellamy.

I'm laughing as I type his name, Dr. Malcom Brown. Dr. Brown was Dr. Bellamy's partner. If ever a Palmitier needed to see Dr. Bellamy and he was for whatever reason away from his practice, we got to see Dr. Brown. Dr. Brown was first, before his private practice, a military doctor. At that time of my life I understood by parent speak to mean, Dr. Brown could be a tad coarse during an examination. Imagine if you will this scenario in today's medical practice were you to be awaiting your doctor in an examination room when he knocks and enters and in his mouth is a three quarters smoked having about one inch of ashes dangling while chewing the remainder, Cuban cigar. Coarse? I didn't think so, but ask Melvin Ball about the size of Dr. Brown's fingers.

Indeed, I took Dr. Bellamy's sun exposure ad-

vice in one ear and out the proverbial other. Now this fair haired (at least I still have it) blue-eyed with light skinned complexion, tall drink of water Texan is experiencing some seniordom skin issues. Yup, Dr. Mohan yesterday diagnosed such, and now there's some required on my part surgical follow up. I am, however, in regard to my follow up duties, pretty much at ease, especially with Dr. Mohan.

History folks, in every aspect of our lives, history is there. It was Dr. Bellamy who brought Dr. Mohan to serve after him the healthcare needs of our community. On Dr. Mohan's wall is a portrait, similar to that Saturday Evening Post Norman Rockwell cover, of Dr. R. M. Bellamy. Comforting, TLC in my seniordom, is needed as well.

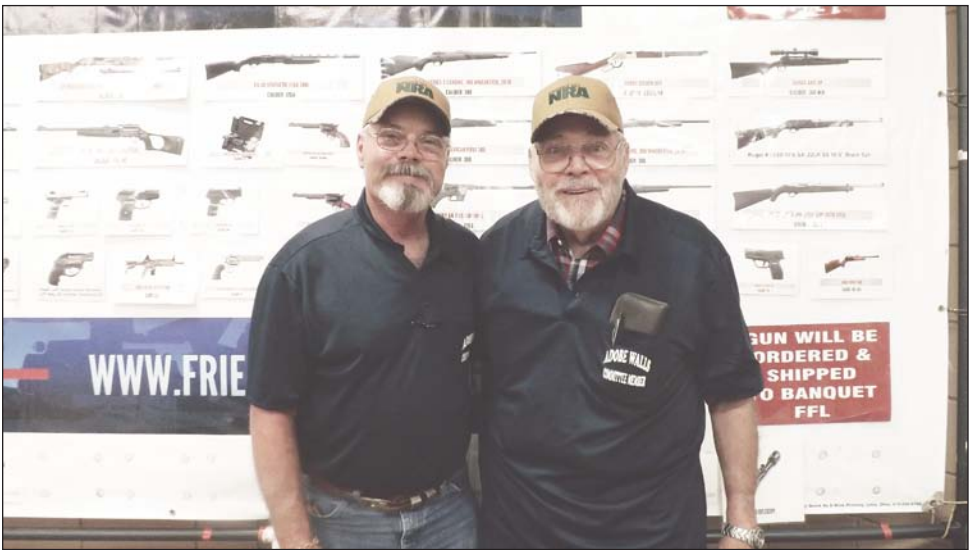

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Anti-fracking billboards in Ohio coming down

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — An Ohio man who uses a biblical reference and a statement against “poisoned waters” in opposing the disposal of gas-drilling wastewater says the messages will come down Tuesday.

Michael Boals, of Co-shocton east of Columbus, told The Associated Press the billboards’ owners are ending his three-month verbal agreement after two months. Well-owner Buckeye Brine, of Austin, Texas, filed a lawsuit in July over the ads, contending the signs contain false and defamatory attacks.

The company and the well’s local operator, Rodney Adams, objected to statements on the two billboards along U.S. Route 36, including a sign that quoted says “DEATH may come.”

A message left with Buckeye Brine on Monday wasn’t immediately returned. It defends the wells as safe, legal and compliant with all state regulations.

Boals, a 55-year-old timber harvester, had refused to pull the billboards on free speech grounds. He said they cost him more than \$1,000 and contained no false information.

One billboard states that injection wells “pump POISONED WATERS under the feet of America’s Citizens.” The second sign quotes prophecy from Revelation — on men dying

from waters “made bitter.” Shale oil and gas drilling employing hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, produces millions of gallons of chemical-laced wastewater. The liquid, called brine, is a mix of chemicals, salt-water, naturally occurring radioactive material and mud. It’s considered unsafe for groundwater and aquifers, so Ohio regulations require waste liquid to be contained and injected deep underground.

Ohio has recorded no aquifer contamination. But as the state grapples with some 16 million gallons of the wastewater a year, it’s seen earthquakes linked to injection wells and a

Youngstown-area businessman indicted in a federal wastewater dumping case.

The state announced on Friday that it was halting operations at a deep injection site in northeast Ohio

after finding possible evidence it caused a 2.1-magnitude earthquake on Aug. 31. An investigation is ongoing.

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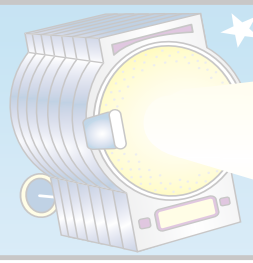

British royal couple expecting second child

LONDON (AP) — Prince George is not going to be an only child for long — the toddler will soon have a baby sister or brother to share his fancy digs at Kensington Palace. British royal officials said Monday that Prince William and the duchess of Cambridge, the former Kate Middleton, are expecting their second child. Once again, Kate is being treated for acute morning sickness in the early phases of her pregnancy. The first time she was so ill she required hospital-

ization. Now she is being treated by doctors at her residence in Kensington Palace. She canceled a planned engagement in Oxford to rest and receive medical care. Prince William told well-wishers in Oxford that Kate should be over the worst of her symptoms in a few weeks. He repeatedly thanked people for congratulating him and said Kate was disappointed she could not travel. “She wishes she could be here,” he said. “She’s feeling okay,

thanks. It’s been a tricky few days — week or so — but obviously we’re basically thrilled, it’s great news, and early days. We’re hoping things settle down and she feels a bit better.” The new baby, boy or girl, will become fourth in line to the throne, pushing Prince Harry to fifth. George, who is 13 months old, is third and likely to become Britain’s monarch one day. William is second in line, while his father, Prince Charles, is first. Britain had changed its

laws before George’s birth so that the couple’s first born would be in line for the throne regardless of its sex. Before the change, a girl would have lost her place in line if a boy was born later. William and Kate have often expressed an interest in having a larger family. The royal couple and their families are “delighted” with the baby news, said officials at Clarence House, the couple’s office. The announcement follows months of speculation in the glossy British

and American press about a possible baby brother or sister for George. After hospital treatment for severe morning sickness, hyperemesis gravidarum, Kate recovered and gave birth to George in July 2013 without further complications. The current illness means the 32-year-old duchess may need extra hydration, medication and nutrients. Britain’s Press Association news agency reported that Kate’s pregnancy hasn’t passed the 12-week stage, which is when she

became ill in her first pregnancy. Prime Minister David Cameron said he was “delighted by the happy news that they’re expecting another baby.” Royal officials said it wasn’t clear if the duchess will be able to carry out planned official engagements, including a trip to Malta on Sept. 20 and 21 that would mark her first overseas solo trip. Decisions on events would be made on a “case-by-case” basis, officials said.

Judge Judy offering book for free

NEW YORK (AP) — Judge Judy is offering advice to women free of charge. Television’s most popular judge is celebrating the 19th season opening of her syndicated show Monday by offering her new book, “What Would Judy Say: Be the Hero of Your Own Story,” for free to anyone who wants it. The book offers plainspoken advice primarily for women, telling them not to let anyone besides themselves define what makes them happy. It is filtered through stories of the charmed life of retired New York Family Court Judge Judy Sheindlin.

She can afford to be generous. With “Judge Judy” atop the daytime TV ratings, TV Guide reported last year that Sheindlin is by far the highest paid person on television with an annual salary of \$47 million. She hasn’t commented upon or disputed the number. “You should want to give something back,” she said. “If you can share with the people who’ve been good to you ... do it. Not everything has to be a money-making operation. You do things sometimes because it makes you feel good.” Sheindlin has written a handful of books, starting with 1996’s “Don’t Pee On My Leg and Tell Me It’s Raining.” She said her stepdaughter encouraged her to write the latest one. The 71-year-old TV jurist is signed to continue her

show through 2017. With ratings continuing to grow, she doesn’t see an end in sight. “Am I tired? No,” she said. “Do I still get a kick out of what I do? Absolutely. I always say that when I see that needle start to go in the other direction, when people have had enough of me, I’m going to be smart enough to say goodbye. It’s such a joyous ride to be on top, and it takes away from that ride if you sort of ride it down.” Fully recognizing and admitting that the moment has come isn’t always easy, but Sheindlin insists she will. “I hope my eyes are clear enough,” she said. “Certainly the Nielsen prelims (ratings) are published every Thursday and you’d have to be sightless not to

see them. You may not want to see them, but they’re there when you want to see them.” Instructions on receiving a downloadable copy of her book are available on her website, www.whatwouldjudysay.com, starting at 10 a.m. Monday. Ten thousand paperback copies of the book are available, with first choice given to people who have contributed to discussions on the website. Arrangements for the book to be distributed in other formats at a later date are still being worked out, spokesman Gary Rosen said. After a summer break and vacation in Japan, Sheindlin said she’ll be back at work filming new episodes of “Judge Judy” on Monday. Several have already been taped, and

NEW YORK (AP) — British actor James Corden will replace Craig Ferguson as host of “The Late Late Show” on CBS next year, part of a complete overhaul of the network’s late-night talk show lineup put in motion by the impending retirement of David Letterman. The network said Monday it had picked Corden, who won a Tony Award in 2012 for his role in the play “One Man, Two Guvnors” and appears in the movie “Begin Again” with Keira Knightley and Mark Ruffalo. Corden is also in the upcoming film

Killings by China anti-terror cops raise concerns

BEIJING (AP) — When attackers from China's minority Uighurs killed 37 people in a July rampage in far western Xinjiang, police responded by gunning down at least 59 of them. When three Uighurs allegedly killed a top state-appointed Muslim cleric, police shot dead two of them. When security forces led a raid on 10 suspected Uighur terrorists, they fatally shot all but one.

The incidents are part of a pattern raising concerns that Chinese police are excessively using deadly force in their bid to prevent more attacks by Uighur militants, who have killed dozens of civilians in train stations and other public places over the past few years. In some cities, patrolling SWAT units have already been authorized to shoot dead suspected terrorists without warning.

An Associated Press review of articles by China's official Xinhua News Agency and other state media has found that at least 323 people have died in Xinjiang-related violence since April last year, when the unrest began to escalate. Nearly half of those deaths were inflicted by police — in most cases, by gunning down alleged perpetrators who are usually reported as having been armed with knives, axes and, occasionally, vaguely-defined explosives.

Beijing's tight controls and monopoly on the narrative make it difficult to independently assess if the lethal action has been justified. And Chinese authorities prevent most reporting by foreign journalists inside Xinjiang, making it nearly impossible to confirm the state media numbers. Uighur exile groups and the U.S.-government funded broadcaster Radio Free Asia report far more violent incidents than Chinese state media do, and in some cases, higher death tolls and police shootings of Uighur protesters. But those reports are similarly hard to verify.

To understand just how tough it can be to determine whether China's hand is being forced — or whether officials are recklessly lashing out at those who resist them — consider this recent series of confrontations in Xinjiang: On Aug. 1, police cornered a group of alleged terrorists and shot nine of them dead, arresting one. In June, police gunned down 13 "mobsters" who allegedly attacked a local police station. In April, checkpoint police fatally shot a teen-

age Uighur motorcyclist after he allegedly attempted to grab their guns.

In many cases, the government's accounts of violence are wildly divergent from overseas reports. Of the June incident, Uighur exiles said Uighur residents were simply protesting outside the police station when police fired at them and their truck, setting off a fire. In the teenager's case, RFA reported that he had been shot after running a red light.

Who's to say what really happened? Xinjiang authorities operate with a "deeply disturbing" lack of accountability, said Sophie Richardson, China director at Human Rights Watch.

"If the use of force is justified, the Chinese government should be allowing independent, credible experts to review the evidence," she said. "It should be making that evidence public."

Experts in policing, terrorism and human rights, meanwhile, point to several aspects of the authorities' crackdown that make it all too easy for security forces to open fire unnecessarily.

China doesn't have comprehensive laws defining terrorism and how authorities should respond. The Chinese leaders' use of war-like rhetoric risks inflaming patriotic fervor instead of clear-headed rationality in the security forces. Above all, the ongoing "strike hard" campaign prioritizes tough, swift action over legal protections.

"Under the terms of the 'strike hard' campaign, they can dispense with the usual considerations about legality," said Willy Lam, an expert on Chinese politics at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. "They don't have scruples about shooting to kill suspects and they appear to be using disproportionately heavy force and firepower."

The trend has alarmed overseas Uighur activists, who say many innocent Uighurs may have been killed. "The use of force by the Chinese security against Uighurs is really like it's against foreign enemies," said Alim Seytoff, President of the Uyghur American Association in Washington, D.C. "The extrajudicial use of lethal force is rampant."

The Ministry of Public Security and police in Xinjiang did not respond to faxed requests for comment.

Though the death tally culled from state media is virtually impossible to independently confirm, and

some foreign media have cited higher tolls, the figures still provide a sketch of the human cost of the unrest that has rocked the region over the past 17 months. The ruling Communist Party leader Xi Jinping, head of the new national security commission, has staked his political prestige on stemming the turbulence — but it has been challenging.

"They have been a lot more aggressive in using military-grade equipment to combat the terrorists and underground groups, and also summary executions," said Lam, the Hong Kong-based analyst. "I think the major reason is that Xi Jinping thinks that unless they use extraordinary or draconian methods, they cannot solve the problem quickly, and the Uighur problem has proven to be one of the major policy failures of (his) administration."

Elsewhere in China, police rarely use firearms to quell violence or mass unrest, preferring to deploy riot police with truncheons and shields. Although the anti-terror campaign is being carried out by SWAT and paramilitary police, the operation more closely resembles war than policing.

"It's exactly the opposite of a criminal case. In a criminal case, we say we only get the guy if they're guilty. Otherwise, if there's a slight bit of doubt, let them go," said Professor Kam C. Wong, an expert on Chinese police at Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio. "In the case of terrorists, even when in doubt,

we will get them."

"In China, terrorists are to be treated as a contradiction between enemies and not contradictions amongst the people. They are afforded very few protections under the law," Wong said.

In that sense, China's counterterrorism effort bears similarities to the United States' anti-terror practices post-9/11, including assertions that deadly military force against terrorists — even if U.S. citizens — might outweigh their constitutional rights, he said.

Xi has cast the campaign in patriotic, militaristic terms, in one instance evoking the memory of a Ming-era Chinese military leader who fought Japanese pirates. "Sweat more in peacetime so you will bleed less in wartime," Xi said in a pep talk to Xinjiang police during a high-profile April tour.

Special police units in cities such as Beijing and Guangzhou have recently been authorized to fire without warning at suspected terrorists engaged in violence. The eastern city of Xiamen and the province of Jiangsu went a step further — saying SWAT officers were allowed to shoot dead such alleged perpetrators. The government hasn't specified how threats are to be assessed.

Xi has called for a "people's war" — an effort to mobilize the public to act as informants, with rewards in some instances. But without a counterterrorism law in place, "and with emotions running high, the people would act

like vigilantes," said Wong.

Public information tends to be based on personal prejudice, racial profiling and ethnic animosities, making it unreliable and of dubious use, with innocent people likely to be implicated, Wong added.

Part of the problem might be Xi's choice of words, saying he wants terrorists to be like "rats scurrying across the street, chased by all the people."

"They're using rhetoric that's very dehumanizing toward people," said William Nee, Amnesty International's China researcher. "It encourages an atmosphere in which excessive

use of force is condoned."

Catching terror suspects alive is a better approach anyway, because then you can interrogate them, said Raffaello Pantucci, a London-based terrorism researcher at the Royal United Services Institute, a defense think tank. "You can find out who their networks are, you can find out more information and you can then investigate that."

"That's counterterrorism practice 101."

Golf Thought of the Week

■ How can you reduce frustration on the golf course?

Do you have those days when everything is just perfect out on the golf course? You find fairways off the tee. If you miss approach shots, you get up and down courtesy of a great chip or a long putt. You go home and

you think you've mastered the game. You return to the course the next day, and you can't find a fairway with an 8 Iron. Spare a thought

for Patrick Reed. He was fifth going into the third round of the Deutsche Bank Championship and then shot an 82! And his wasn't the high score. Matt Every carded an 86.

But we all know those days, don't we? The good news is that it's usually something very simple that's caused the

problem. Your grip has changed slightly. Or, your setup and alignment at address is out, often not by much. The ball starts going right, wide of the fairway. We adjust, trying to get the ball to go left and only succeed in sending it further right. Cue four hours of frustration.

When the game is going wrong, make sure you have some basic checks to help you get back online. You want to be able to very easily check your grip, posture, alignment and setup are correct. And then, if the ball is still going right, it's worth knowing that golf is a game of opposites. Come and talk to us, and we'll show you some short fixes you can use out on the course to reduce the frustration.

IRVING (AP) — The Big 12 Conference has suspended a replay official after a questionable play wasn't reviewed in 19th-ranked Kansas State's 32-28 victory at Iowa State.

The conference said Sunday that the one-game suspensions are for a failure to follow established procedures in a timely manner.

An internal review by the league determined video evidence of the play was inconclusive. But Big 12 officiating supervisor Walt

Anderson said the unidentified replay officials should have stopped the game before the next snap to allow for a review.

Kansas State's Tyler Lockett caught a pass just before halftime Saturday.

He appeared to be in contact with a pylon, which is considered out of bounds, but on-field officials ruled it a completion at the 1.

Iowa State unable to challenge because it was out of timeouts, the Wildcats quickly snapped the ball and scored to cut it to 28-20.

But even more than the defense, I would say Tech's major problem is slow starts. 7-3 Tech over Central Arkansas and 6-0 UTEP over Tech were the scores after the first quarter of Tech's first two games. When you play a cupcake you have to pounce on them early and often. Kansas and Iowa State do not look any different than their awful normal selves. Kansas only beat an FCS team by six points. Kansas State will face Auburn on Sept. 18, we should really know what the Wildcats are about then.

"We didn't play to our potential," she said. "We have to play with a lot more passion than that. Yes they (Canyon) are a good team, and I give that to them, but we should be too and we didn't play very well."

Pampa faces off with Lubbock Monterey in Lubbock tonight at 6 p.m.

Video appears to show to Rice striking fiancée

BALTIMORE (AP) — The NFL says the league never saw until Monday a video that appears to show Baltimore Ravens running back Ray Rice striking his then-fiancee in February.

The grainy video, released by TMZ Sports, apparently shows Rice and Janay Palmer in an elevator at an Atlantic City casino. Each hits the other before Rice knocks Palmer off her feet and into a railing.

An earlier TMZ video showed Rice dragging

Palmer, now his wife, from the elevator at the Revel casino, which closed Sept. 2.

The NFL suspended Rice for two games in July for domestic violence.

"We requested from law enforcement any and all information about the incident, including the video from inside the elevator," NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said. "That video was not made available to us and no one in our office has seen it until today."

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell indicated as much on Aug. 1 when during the Pro Football Hall of Fame induction weekend.

"When we're going through the process of evaluating the issue and whether there will be discipline, you look at all of the facts that you have available to us," Goodell said. "Law enforcement normally has more ... information, facts, than we have. We'll get as much as we possibly can."

You have requested to have your blood drawn by an employee of Pampa Regional Medical Center. The purpose of this blood draw is to obtain specimens for laboratory testing.

1. PROCEDURES: If you agree to this procedure, the following will happen. Blood will be taken from a vein in your right or left arm or the top of your right or left hand. The blood draw will take about 10 minutes of your time. After the draw the blood is centrifuged, labeled, packaged and sent for testing.

2. RISKS/DISCOMFORTS: The risks of having blood drawn include temporary pain from the needle stick, bruising, and rarely, infection. Some patients may experience dizziness, possibly lightheaded or rarely fainting. In this case, the needle will be removed and the phlebotomist will proceed to keep the patient comfortable.
